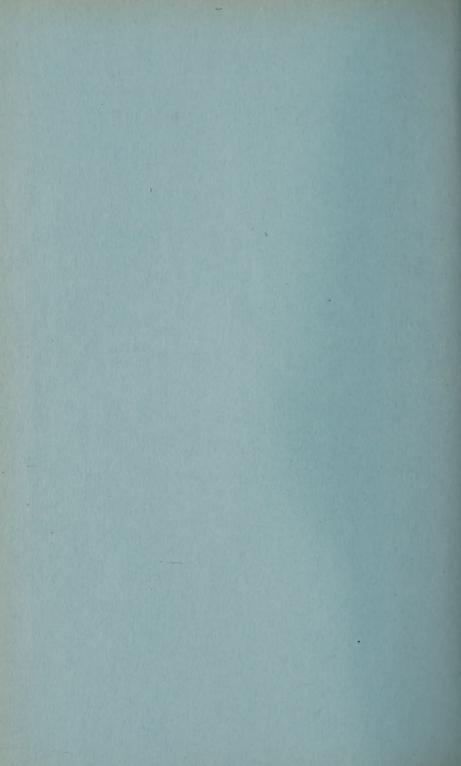

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Castle Qualified to Vote in Town Affairs:—

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the second Tuesday of March, 1923, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
 - 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum as stated in the budget.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid within a limited time.
- 5. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for discounts on taxes for the year ensuing.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on the credit of the town.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to pay half the expense of putting in a culvert from the Messrs. Kimball and Lockwood swamp to the ocean.
- 8. To see how much the town will vote to raise and appropriate to carry in effect article 7.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to exterminate the white pine blister rust in the Town of New Castle.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

TO THE NEW CASTLE SCHOOL BOARD :-

I am pleased to submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. I also transmit to you the report of the School Physician, and the tabulation of the customary school statistics.

WORK OF THE YEAR

A careful diagnosis of the scores made in the standard tests, which were given in the fundamental subjects last spring, shows good results in all schools in almost all grades. Normal to high scores were made in both the rate of Reading and in comprehension; low to average scores in general in writing; high scores in every grade in Spelling, and normal scores resulted in Composition and also in the four fundamentals of arithmetic.

TEACHERS

We were fortunate this year to retain the same corps of teachers we had last year with one exception. Miss Greta Myers, who had given excellent satisfaction in all her work for the past two years, resigned in June to remain at home this year. Mrs. Lee Scott, a normal graduate, of many years successful experience, whom the board elected to take Miss Myers' place, is making excellent progress with her room. We do not need to extol our other teachers; they are giving the same faithful, high type of service they have in the past.

ATTENDANCE

The per cent of attendance, 93.7, last year was only .3 per cent less than it was for the previous year. The number of cases of tardiness last year, 270, was 5 less than in the year before.

Good regular attendance and punctuality on the part of all pupils is a fairly good barometer of the kind of work any school is doing. When pupils are in their places promptly, one may be reasonably sure their attitude toward the school is business-like and the work of the school will be promptly and probably more efficiently done. The cooperation of parents will do much to make this condition possible.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

A study of the report of the school physician as compared with his report for the previous year shows that very few pupils received treatment for defects previously found. In the spring of 1921, according to the report of the school physician, 120 cases were found, and last spring only 10 had received treatment, leaving 110 who still needed medical attention. Evidently the services of a school nurse for "follow up work" are needed in order to get more pupils treated

for certain defects. Possibly New Castle might unite with other districts of this Union in the employment of a community and school nurse or arrange for the part time services of the school nurse in Portsmouth.

One thing which I wish to suggest for the consideration of the Board is the possibility of instruction in Music for our children in New Castle. Our boys and girls have just as good voices and natural abilities along this line as those in other towns have, but they do need some special instruction in this subject which affords so much enjoyment in the lives of all peoples. We have teachers, I am sure, who could teach music very well under the direction of a competent Music Supervisor. We now have such a supervisor for all the towns of this Union except Hampton Falls and New Castle, and I recommend that the Board include in your budget an amount sufficient to engage the services of a supervisor, to see if the district would not approve of the same.

In closing, I wish to thank the Board for your advice and loyal support, and the parents and teachers for their co-operation in making a successful school year.
