Although the season is comparatively young, softball has been made a highly' spirited and competitive game here at the Annex by the enthusiasm which all concerned have displayed. The weather has been warmer, and by virtue of the time being set one hour ahead last Sunday, it is possible to play a complete seven inning contest instead of the game being called because of darkness.

So far, many of the games have been, high scoring and looselyplayed affairs. This, no doubt, can be attributed to early season errors and plenty of free tickets to first base by pitchers who, as yet, haven't found their stride. Then, of course, there are some pretty heavy stickers on each team who are fattening up their batting averages by walloping the cover off the ball. According to the records at this time (April 27), the only team yet to be beaten or tied is Team 10 which has collected two wins in as many outings. Team 14 banged out a victory over Team 15 by an 8-1 score, and although unbeaten, this club battled to a 5-5 stalemate with Team 13.

Three other clubs, Teams 3, 5, and 6, shape up as contenders hecause they have chalked up two ot three games thus far. Teams 2, 7, and 8 have garnered but one victory in three starts, and Teams 9 and 15 are still looking for an initial win.
