Keynote Speaker: Learn the Past, Watch the Present, and Create the Future.

By Assoc Prof Dr Khatijah Lim Abdullah, Head of Nursing Department (UM)



Abstract:

Transforming the health care system to provide a safe, patient centered, and quality care will require a comprehensive rethinking of the roles of many health care professionals, nurses' chief among them. Their close proximity to patients and scientific understanding of care processes across the continuum of care give them a unique ability to effect wide reaching changes in the health care system.

Nurses need to be prepared to meet the diverse patients' needs; function as leaders; and advance science to deliver safe, quality patient centered care. Nurses must achieve higher levels of education and training through an improved education system that promotes seamless academic progression. The need for specific training at both an undergraduate and post graduate level is not in question. What is in question is the professional readiness to change. So what are the blocks? Is there an opportunity for nursing to demonstrate its professional maturity and embrace change that is driven by the needs of our communities?

Through facilitation of literature review and personal experience, the main focus of this paper will considered the many challenges that face nursing education system in Malaysia and some of the solutions to strengthen health care workforce to better able to meet the health needs of the population. The paper will also argue the need to harness and simulate passion of all our nurses to help in the transformation of nursing in Malaysia.

Biodata

Assoc Prof Dr Khatijah Lim is Head of the Department of Nursing Sciences, Faculty of Medicine, University Malaya. She obtained most of her academic qualifications in the United Kingdom, Doctorate in Clinical Practice (Nursing) from the University of Southamptom (2007), Master of Science in Health Service Management (1997) and Bachelor of Science in Nursing Studies from the University of Manchester (1993). She also obtained Certificate in Understanding and Application to Research, Certificate In Teaching and Assessing English Nursing Board (1993), Midwifery from Berkshire College of Nursing and Midwifery, and Certificate in Intensive Care of the Newborn from Bath and Swindon College of Health Studies (1991) in the United Kingdom.

She joined academia in 1998 as a lecturer in the Nursing Sciences Unit, Faculty of Medicine, University of Malaya. Her research interests are in midwifery, intensive care of the newborn, paediatric, nursing and nursing education. Assoc Professor Dr Khatijah Lim has several book and journals publications, one of which is the Nursing Management published in 2010. Issues and Challenges Related to Nurses: A Major Workforce within the Health Care System

Abstract

Nurses make up the largest group of health professionals who are the closest and often the only available health workers to the population globally. The nursing workforce as a vital resource for health encounters various challenges and contemporary issues. These could have impacts on how nurses function in the health care system. The importance of a good working environment and significance of an educated nurse workforce which could influence the level of quality of care provision to the patients and families are discussed. The needs for nurses to assume personal responsibility and to work effectively and efficiently within the financial and human resource constraint will be highlighted.

Dr Chan Kim Geok, is a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Nursing, Universiti Malaysia Sarawak. She obtained her the certificate in midwifery cum public health nursing, certificate in post basic paediatric nursing, BSc in Nursing Science (Teaching), and Master of Nursing in Paediatric, Child and Youth Health from Queensland University of Technology, Doctor of Philosophy (Nursing) from University of Malaya in the year 2012. Chan Kim Geok is involved with teaching undergraduate nursing students, in particular, paediatric nursing courses. CNE I: Changing Practice: A Force for Change By Dr Sidiah John Siop (UNIMAS)

Abstract

Health care is continuously challenged as a result of the prevailing forces of economics, demographics and the ever – changing technology. Hence, nursing has and continues to keep abreast with theses changes. How do we measure up in the changing healthcare climate? Do we have what it takes to lead change in our profession? Nurses are aware that they are responsible for their personal and professional growth by continuing their education. However, increased education will only be useful if nurses are able and willing to fully use their knowledge, experience and expertise to improve practice. In this new millennium, I would like to challenge nurses to be courageous enough to change.

Biodata

Sidiah ak John Siop is a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Nursing, Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences, Universiti Malaysia Sarawak (UNIMAS). She obtained her PhD in Gerontology from Universiti Putra Malaysia, Master of Health Science (Hons) from the Auckland University of Technology New Zealand, and the Bachelor of Health Sciences (Nursing) from the University of Western Sydney Nepean Australia. She is a trained public health nurse before embarking into academia. She has served in several Health Districts in Sarawak including at the Sarawak State Health Department's Tuberculosis Control Programme.

Her area of research interest is the ageing population particularly in disability and health needs. She has presented papers related to her area of research interest both nationally and internationally. Her current research involvement is on constructing prevention framework about pandemic influenza outbreak for rural communities. She is a reviewer for the Asia Pacific Journal of Public Health.



CNE 2: Nurses and Midwives: A Force for Health By Assoc Prof Dr Chang Ching Thon (UNIMAS)

Abstract

Nurses and midwives make up the largest proportion of the health workforce, providing expert and skilled care to the population and as such, play a key role in the successful delivery of health services. ICN states that "As the largest group of health professionals, who are the closest and often the only available health workers to the population, nurses have a great responsibility to improve the health of the population as well as to contribute towards the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals". Like the rest of the world, Malaysia is facing many challenges: inequality; climate change and urbanization, rural urban migration; an ageing population with more people living with chronic conditions and need long-term care. In addition, the implications of the global financial crisis and new emergence of infectious diseases also have health consequences for the population. Against this backdrop, it is necessary to examine how nurses and midwives are developing their professional roles and determine what challenges affect their contribution to health service development and delivery. This paper will share the research findings from European region and ICN's position in promoting the value and cost-effectiveness of nursing.

Biodata

Dr Chang Ching Thon is an Assoc Prof at the Department of Nursing, Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences, UNIMAS. She is currently a Board Member for Asia Pacific International University, Thailand, Board member for Adventist College of Health Sciences, Penang, Panel of Assessor for Malaysian Qualification Agency, and a member of Faculty Post-Graduate Committee. Presently she is involved in a research entitled "Physical activity and sustainable health: nutrition status, community wellbeing and environmental enhancement" under UniversitiSains Malaysia Research University Grand (Team) as well a consultancy project partnered with Universiti Malaya funded by National Population and Family Development Board Malaysia. She had published several papers in national and international journals and a reviewer for two international journals.



CNE 3: End of Life: Where is the Care? By Mdm Rose Nanju (UNIMAS)

Abstract

When cure is no longer possible, dying individuals primarily need good nursing care. Nurses are the firsthand witnesses to the plight of patients throughout the dying process and are able to recognize and appreciate their complex needs. As nurses are with patients round the clock, we have unique insights about what patients' value and desire for care at the end of life. Patients often trust their nurses to guide them through the dying process and look up to them to be their advocates when they cannot do so for themselves. Nurses should be their patients' hands when they cannot reach, their voices when they can no longer speak and to be their eyes when they can no longer see. The unique insight of nurses who provide hands-on care to dying individuals are therefore invaluable in defining the issues of care of the dying.

Nurses have been, and will continue to be leaders in end-of-life care. As the largest group of healthcare professionals and those most connected with the comprehensive needs of the terminally ill and their families, nurses have long advocated for humane and dignified care at the end of life. Without competent and caring nurses, end-of-life care risks to be reduced to a mechanical exchange devoid of human presence and holistic care. Nurses understand the failings of our current system for caring for the dying and are committed to fundamental reform of our education, practice and social systems. But is the care still there? Let us explore this together.

Biodata

Mdm Rose Nanju is a lecturer in the Nursing Department of Faculty of Nursing UNIMAS. Besides Nursing and Midwifery Certificates, she obtained her Masters of Nursing Degree, Bachelor of Nursing Degree, Post graduate Diploma in Teaching and Learning and Counseling Certificate. Mdm Rose has worked as a registered Nurse, Registered Midwife and Patient Educator with the Ministry of Health from 1982 – 2007, prior to joining UNIMAS. She has also been a Palliative Care Nurse, with the Oncology Department SGH. She is now the Student counselor for Nursing Department UNIMAS. She is also the year coordinator for Year 1 Nursing Programme as well as the Ahli Jawatankuasa Persatuan Akademic UNIMAS (PPAU) and member of many other NGO's.

We need nurses who are not only competent in research or clinical and technical practices but with professional ethics and regulations along with virtue. We need nurses who do the right things with practical wisdom or character. With advancement, nurses must still remember the basis: honesty, virtue and wisdom: lest we forget is it a job or a calling?

CNE 5: Making a Difference in the Clinical Area with Innovations: - Parental Participation in Care- Serving Oral Medications

Abstract

The theme "Nurses - a force for change - A vital resource for health" requires nurses to examine their roles and practices. They should no longer be chronic routine practitioners. They need to work with more critical thinking and be more innovative in their practices, having the skill, knowledge and confidence to question routine tasks and processes and work towards being the change agent for better patient care.

Innovation is about "doing something different". It is about better solutions that meet new requirement. For example, the traditional practice of nurses serving oral medications. Is it not possible for mothers to be empowered to serve the medications whilst in the ward.

Parental participation in care is the conventional concept in paediatric nursing. It requires empowering parents with knowledge and skills in the care of their sick children. In 1996, nurses in Paediatric Ward of Sarawak General Hospital considered the possibilities of supporting and guiding parents with knowledge and skills so that an on going care can be safely delivered at home especially for the chronically sick child. One of the innovative changes was "Mother's involvement in serving oral medication". In 2004, a survey was conducted to evaluate its process, the pros and cons, its continuity and success. In 2010, the project was reviewed and the "Mother's Oral Medication Checklist" was implemented for Paediatric Medical 2B, Sarawak General Hospital. This project currently is the norm of practice in the paediatric unit of Sarawak General Hospital.

CNE 6: Undergraduate Nursing Students' Experience of Their Clinical Practice
By Mdm Lily Lim (UNIMAS)

Abstract

This qualitative research explored the nursing students' perception of their clinical experiences. Participants consisted of undergraduate nursing students who had their clinical postings at the hospitals and clinics in Malaysia. Data was collected using interviews from purposive samples. Data were analysed using NVivo software. The findings were categorized into three major themes that included: 1) "Gaining insight into the hospital setting"; 2) "Challenges"; 3) "Coping mechanism". This study proposed practical strategies to empower students in clinical learning and increase their self-esteem and confidence. In order to improve quality of students' clinical education, adequate and effective work collaboration between nursing education and health care services as well as future research are recommended.

CNE 7: The Effect of Education on the Level of Knowledge and Anxiety in Women Going for Colposcopy procedure

Abstract

Women experience a high level of anxiety and negative emotional responses at all stages of the cervical screening. High level of anxiety before colposcopy can have adverse consequences such as pain and discomfort. The aim of this study was to determine the effect of giving information leaflet on knowledge and anxiety in women going for colposcopy procedure. The result shows that there was a weak positive association between knowledge and anxiety level. There was an association between demographic variables with anxiety and knowledge level. In conclusion, the information leaflet has helped to reduce the anxiety level but not statistically significant. Providing information leaflet also has significantly increased the knowledge level in women attending colposcopy procedures.

CNE 8: The Importance of EQ in Nursing Profession By Mdm Chin Siew Kiaw (KSKB Kuching)

Abstract

This session gives awareness on the importance of EQ among professional nurses in the health care system and especially for future nursing leaders and managers.

Nurses are forced to develop and maintain high EQ in today's nursing profession in order to provide more quality care and especially to reduce morbidity and mortality rate in the health care system.

As a novice, she or he must be able to acquire the right knowledge, skill and a better understanding about EQ. This is particularly true, if we wish to be successful future nursing leaders and managers. As a young nurse he/she should be able to differentiate the right emotional bank account and to acquire the basic qualities in EQ and the characteristics of an emotionally intelligent nurse.

A professional nurse must always keep his/her basic qualities in EQ and have a self-awareness on the impact of high EQ for his/her nursing performance at workplace.

As nursing is a caring profession, A high EQ Nurse is a vital resource for health. Our profession needs more high EQ Nurses, more than ever.

Free Paper I: Reflecting Journeys: A Phenomenological Pilot Study of Malaysian Student Nurses' perceptions of Their Reflective Practices

Abstract:

Reflective practice is deemed a significant aspect in nursing education, and authors like Pierson (1998) suggest that it is important that nursing students be encouraged to learn how to think critically and be more innovative. The Malaysian nursing profession is still regarded as medically oriented, tended to positivist thinking, analyzing and solving problems without considering the human context. The Malaysian nursing profession is starting to become aware of the benefits of reflective practice, especially in view of keeping pace with advancements in technology and medicine in the country. However, promoting reflection among Malaysian nurses may be a challenge, due to majority of them were from traditional behaviorist education background. Although Malaysian nurse educators are beginning to implement reflective practice curriculum, it is still unclear as to what extent these students comprehend the practice of reflection, how they feel about it, and whether journal writing actually aids in acquiring skills of reflection. This presentation will share the findings of a study using phenomenological approach to understand the experiences, views and perceptions of Malaysian nursing students in a nursing school in Sarawak.

Free Paper II: Public Perceptions and Attitudes towards People Living with HIV/AIDS

Abstract:

People living with the diagnosis of HIV infection suffer both physical and social consequences. Not only having to face the challenge of living with managing the disease, they may also experience social stigma. A qualitative study which explored public perceptions and attitudes towards people living with HIV/AIDS (PLHAs) was conducted in Bintulu Sarawak. Findings from this study showed that the public still had negative perceptions towards PLHAs. They assumed that PLHAs were promiscuous. Apart from that they had misconceptions on transMsion of HIV/AIDS and fear of contagious of the disease. For attitudes, the public avoid physical contact with PLHAs; they rejected and discriminated the PLHAs. There should be more study and program to outreach the public on HIV/AIDS. Through this program and project we can increase public awareness on HIV/AIDS and also change their perception and attitude towards PLHAs who have undergone hardship as a result of the infection.

Free paper III: Behind the Curtain of Single Adolescent Parent Having Unwanted Pregnancy in Sarawak

Abstract:

This study was done among adolescents with unwanted pregnancy in Sarawak. This qualitative study was to exploretheir experience of unwanted pregnancy and their coping strategies. The data was collected using in-depth interview. Data saturation was used to determine the sample size. Data analysis was done manually via thematic analysis. The findings encompasses four main themes namely, risky sexual behaviour, problems of unwanted pregnancy, coping strategies and orientation of choice for pregnancy. The main cause for unwanted pregnancy among adolescents in this study is risky sexual behaviour which further divided into two sub-categories, consented sex and unsafe sex. Problems aroused during unwanted pregnancy were disappointment, stigma and financial problem. Adolescents preferred emotion-focused coping and problem-focused coping. Furthermore, all adolescents chose to keep their child as their orientation of choice for pregnancy with supports. More efforts are recommended to prevent this social problem of unwanted teenage pregnancy and to improve public acceptance to these adolescents.

Free paper IV: Women's Perceptions & Experiences of Exclusive Breast Feeding at Kampung Sigandar

Abstract:

Exclusive breast feeding is recommended to the mothers for a better investment in infants' health for their first six months of life. Despite the benefits of exclusive breast feeding very small percentage of mothers in Malaysia do so. The purpose of this qualitative study was to explore the perceptions and experiences of mothers who exclusively breastfed their infants. In-depth interview was conducted on five mothers. Thematic analysis of the transcripts was done manually. Findings showed mother perceived breastfeeding as a gift given from God to share with the infants, feasible to practice and was a maternal willingness to sacrifice for their loves one. The mothers spoke of experiencing great joyful feeling to breast feed, the benefits of breast feeding and support needed for the continuation of exclusive breast feeding. Mothers who discontinued exclusive breast feeding felt stressful and been challenged as their baby kept on crying, they perceived to produce insufficient breast milk, been housebound and fear of their infants got addicted to breast milk. It is recommended that nurses to include findings of this study in their promotion activities to increase the percentage of mother to exclusively breastfeed.

Innovation Project I: 4E's Box

The work process of Emergency and Trauma Department (ETD) should be systematic in order to provide quality care to the patients. During our posting to a hospital, we found that procedures such as wound dressing, catheterization, and toilet and suturing are frequently performed in the ETD. With the existing practice of organising storage of sterile items and sets, we found that it was time consuming to prepare the requirements for the procedures. As such we came out with the innovative project entitled 4E's Box which stands for Easy, Effective, Energy-saving, and Efficient Box. It helps the health care provider at ETD to perform their procedures effectively, efficiently, less time consuming and energy saving. Hence, it is recommended that 4E's Box can be used in the ETD setting to facilitate a better deliverance of care.

Innovation Project II: Rapid Restraint

Physical restraint is still widely used in many healthcare settings. In the psychiatric setting, physical restraint may be necessary as a last option when alternatives have failed to prevent patient from injuring himself/herself, others or destruction of property. However, physical restraint may often lead to negative experiences and psychological trauma such as loss of dignity and respect and even death in some cases. Currently, the existing physical restraint practice meets the Mental Health Regulation Malaysia (2010). During our Elective Nursing posting at Hospital Sentosa, we noticed that the nurses have difficulty to untie the restraint during emergency. Some of the patients also ended up with bruises or red marks on their wrists and ankles particularly when the patients were struggling to remove their restraints. The Rapid Restraint idea came when we see the needs to improve the current restraint that should be user friendly for both the medical staffs and patients. The implementation of the project was carried out in the Female and Male Acute Ward, Hospital Sentosa for three weeks involving staff, students and patients. At the end of the product test, it was found that patients reported more comfort with our product and we found that it was easier to apply as well as release the patients under restraint in a shorter time. However, retraining of the staffs is necessary to maximize the benefits of the Rapid Restraint.

Innovation Project III: Breastfeeding Support Pillow

This innovation project was carried out during our Nursing Elective posting at Maternity Ward Serian District Hospital.
