Immediate victims of the new administration would reportedly be the departments of Sociology and Psychology, neither of which he considers a true science worthy of study. Ogilvie also reportedly won support on the Committee by condemning the Physical Plant services in general, calling particular attention to an old. abandoned car in the B-wing parking area. "Abandoned cars such as these breed rats, which carry rabies and social diseases," Ogilvie explained, reportedly claiming that he would never tolerate stripped autos on campus. He allegedly proposes tripling the campus security, allowing security guards to carry aerosol rat poison, and contracting with Lincoln Towing Service to tow away wrecked cars and other

vehicles parking illegally. Other Committee members, unimpressed by Ogilvie's promises, charged that Ogilvie had "secret plans" to eliminate most scholarships, raise tuition to over \$33 per trimester, and charge \$10 for the '74 yearbook. Ogilvie reportedly

had no response to the charges, although it considered unlikely that he could raise tuitions before December if he takes office in August. Another possibility, that he will levy a "classroom usage tax" is considered likely to pass the Faculty Senate shortly after his inauguration.

The dissident Committee members charged that Ogilvie would be a "fiscal disaster," and advocated the appointment of Charles Hurst instead. Hurst make few statements about his plans, commenting only that he "stands on his record." The Ogilvie advocates, however, immediately accused Hurst of conspiring to dissolve the Commuter Center, so that he could manage the cafeterial funds himself. Hurst dismisses the charges as

Administration was having its way in handpicking one of two liberals for the job. Earlier reports were that the Presidency was literally a toss-up between Campus Planning Director Melvyn A. Skvarla and University Communications Director Jerry Cannon.


Subject to approval by the Board of Governors this week, Richard B. Ogilvie should be arriving on campus shortly to begin the arduous task of studying the daily routine of his close personal friend, Dr. Sachs, and to see how he can improve on it.

One committee member summed up the situation gleefully. "Northeastern is in a state of financial crisis. We believe Richard Ogilvie is the one man who can put us back on a solid fiscal foundation . . if he can just get some money from that idiot Walker."

Parking Facility To Be Built at Northeastern

Mel Skvarla, Campus Planning Officer, announced that plans for a new parking lot facility have been approved. At the last Parking Advisory Committee meeting, Mr. Skvarla told the other committee members that the plan was approved by the Board of Governors. The author of the proposal to solve the problem is President Sachs. His plan calls for the clearance of all the buildings across from the school as far east as Kimball. Catalpa will be the southern boundary of the new site, and the facility will extend as far north as Bryn Mawr.

Ground-breaking ceremonies for the parking facility are expected to take place in June 1974. The lot is expected to have a capacity of 800 cars. The expected completion date for the facility will be sometime in the latter part of 1976. Nick Messina of the Hollywood Park Improvement Association said that those residents who are affected by the plans for the new site will be receiving their notices to move shortly. Mr. Messina said that a committee for the relocation of the residents is currently contacting those affected by the plan. The

Sachs Future Dean of culture

The Illinois Board of Governors of State Universities and Colleges announced today that Northeastern Illinois University is to have a new College

 the College of Agriculture. The Board announced that its intention was to reverse the trend of students going to school and subsequently leaving the farm for city life. "Once the youth of the city samples farm life, they will not be able to resist the temptation to move out to the country and become farmers," said the president of the Board. He went on to say, "The city is entirely too congested with college educated people. There is an abundance of jobs out on the farm.'

The plans call for the primary utilization of the land recently acquired from the Chicago Parental school as fields. These fields will be used for the testing of hybrid corn. The auxiliary parking lot will be used as a pen for the pigs that the college will use for livestock, while the handball courts will be used as the chicken coop.

The Biology and Earth Science Departments will combine efforts in the area of Soil Research. Dr. Qutab has been named Chairman of the Department of Earth Studies.

Dr. Jerome Sachs on the verge of retirement from the office of President of UNI has accepted the position of Dean of the College of Agriculture. When interviewed about his acceptance of this new position, he said, "I was going to retire to farm life anyway.

Governor Walker approved a Bill allocating over 15 million dollars for funding of the project. Northeastern has already begun the process of purchasing needed equipment. One of the first purchased was a tractor which can be seen moving about the campus at this time.

Excavation will begin in time for the start of the next trimester. All lots but the North Parking Lot will be closed.

Friendship, respect and compromise was met as the expanding UNI representatives and North Park Civic Association finally agreed. This meeting was held March 29th in UNI's Little Theatre. Alderman Seymour Simon was in attendance to hear the arguments of UNI to become a partially residential school and the wish of the NPCA to hold Northeastern's enrollment to what it originally was built to hold - 2500.

The agreement came about as the item of air rights over the Bohemian Cemetary came to light. When the dorms are built over the cemetary the community will have no objection to UNI opening its doors to more students.

Response to the compromise was, on the whole, a bursting enthusiasm from attending students, staff, alumnia, faculty and administration. The meeting ended on a note of relative silence instead of the usual shouting.

Plans are already being drawn up to provide about 8 blimps painted brown and gold. Each blimp will house 20 people each with one communal kitchen in each. Each unit of two rooms will have the potential to have one phone and one bathroom with

UNI's Planning director, Mel Skavala said, "This is a marvalous thing. You see we did not know where to build next. We hated to see dorm building go up in front of the beehive. We plan to use that land for academic considerations. As of now our priority is for a complex to house our newly instituted school of Urban Planning and Environment."

Cliff Harralson, director, Commuter Center stated, "Students will be given the opportunity to vote on a up to \$50 increase of Student Union Fee to pay for the dorm blimps."

Student reaction in favor of the compromise can be summed up by the statement of freshman Joe Cannon "I feel that although only a few people will be able to move into the blimps all Northeast-



The Reverend defended the station as a meeting place for youth and part of the community's history.



not going to be affected but will not be held in the gymnasium because that area of the school will be closed until the crisis is over.


An Indian spokesman for Northeastern praised the action of President Sachs and stated discrimination in sports against Indians as a basis for the societal problems. There will be a national representative of the Indian movement here at Northeastern today to help explain the Presidents actions. Gov. Walker is expected to speak at 3:00 PM and will share the platform with the Indian representative.

There will also be a meeting of the Concerned PE Majors who are expected to picket the meeting in front of the Classroom building. John Demas, spokesman of the irrate group of students said that "Politics should not be brought in to athletics," and thought he would be now transfering to another school which appreciated the sports activities.

General reaction from the student body was one of apathy, much the same as that attitude toward their varsity sports. There was however some concern over the required PE course which is in the basic curriculum. President Sachs thought that it could be waived in such an emergency situation as this.
