






STU HASKELL

Serving as Acting Director of Physical Education and Athletics for the 1983-84 college year is Stuart Haskell, Jr. Stu, who is the first UMO graduate and Maine native (Lincoln) to hold the Director's position, succeeded Harold Westerman on June 1, 1982. Stu has been a member of the UMO staff for nearly 25 years, serving as Assistant Director of Publicity between 1957 and 1965 and as Business Manager of Athletics between 1966 and the present. He served as Director of Informational Services for the public schools of Evanston, Ill. in 1965 and early 1966. Stu is a journalism graduate of Maine and was employed for three years as a sportswriter for the Bangor Daily News and one year as Editor of The Republican Journal in Belfast in the mid-1950's. He and his wife, Gloria, are the parents of four children.



THE ORONO CAMPUS



The University of Maine at Orono, with its seven colleges and four schools, is the largest campus in the statewide university system. There is plenty of elbow room on its 1,100 acres, where the student is offered the diversity and challenge of a large university in the invigorating atmosphere of a small college. Close personal contact among students, and among students and faculty, is a tradition at Orono, where one knows one's neighbors and one's teachers.

Orono is a cosmopolitan campus in a classic New England setting. Last year students from 25 countries and 45 states studied here, and fully 20 percent of the total enrollment of some 11,000 students regularly is admitted from other states and nations around the world.

There is ample opportunity for students to enrich themselves academically and socially outside the classroom. There are seven scholastic honor societies, four nonscholastic honor societies, 22 departmental and professional honor societies, 56 associations, clubs and organizations, and six religious groups. Nineteen fraternities and 10 sororities have chapters at Orono.

The campus is located one mile from the center of Orono, an attractive town of about 10,000 population, and 10 miles from Bangor, the state's third largest city. It is in the center of the state's year-round outdoor recreation area, with ski slopes, scores of ponds, lakes, streams, and the beautiful Maine coast within easy driving distance.

Interstate Route 95, a scenic four-lane highway that bisects the state north to south to the New Hampshire state line, passes within a mile of the campus. Air travelers land at Bangor International Airport, where the University of Maine has established a campus in former Dow Air Force facilities, Bangor Community College. BCC, in the 1974-75 academic year, became the sixth college of the University of Maine at Orono. Although the 162 acre campus, with its 58 buildings, is located in Bangor, its relationship with Orono is the same as the other six colleges.

In its role as a community college, the primary objectives of BCC are to offer twoyear associate degree programs, one-year certificate, and short-term programs to meet special educational needs.

The University of Maine at Orono offers programs in physical education, intercollegiate athletics, intramural sports, recreation and related club activities. These programs are recognized as an integral part of the educational process which the university controls and supports within the limitations of budget, staff, equipment, and facilities. These programs are to promote educational leadership, physical fitness, opportunity for recreational pursuits, and athletic excellence through instruction and competition.

In 1968 the State Legislature created a system of public higher education for Maine. This action unified the University of Maine and the five state colleges into one "cohesive structure of public education in the State of Maine."

FOOTBALL AT MAINE



It all started in 1878 when an unidentified junior attempted to kick a round football over Brice Hall (now Oak Hall) in his leisure time. History doesn't record whether or not he ever succeeded or how many panes of glass he broke in the process, but he sowed the seeds of a game which was officially launched at the University of Maine in 1892 and is called football.

The first era stretched from 1892 to 1900 and was not fruitful for UM clubs as they posted a 10-28 record with one tie. The year 1896 brought a first—the hiring of the first full-time coach, Jack Abbott, a Dartmouth graduate. Systemized training was started and players ate at a regular training table.

The 1901 to 1920 period saw the first appearance of "Bananas," the mascot—a

black bear, and the hiring of former Harvard star Jack Farley as coach in 1901.

In 1921, "Foxy" Fred Brice began a 20-year coaching career at Maine which saw Black Bear teams win 79 games against only 58 losses and 15 ties. An innovative man, Brice specialized in trick plays and after a building year Maine went on to win State Series titles in seven of the next eight years. Tabbed as one of the finest periods in UM football history, the years between 1925 and 1934 saw the Bears win unofficial New England titles in 1925, 1927, and 1928 and share one in 1926. From '31 to '34 Maine won 12 straight State Series games.

The years between 1941 and 1950 saw teams depleted of personnel by the war, several coaching changes, and 26 wins, 28 losses and four ties during the decade. The most outstanding player was Jack Zollo, a guard who suffered severe wounds in the war. He led Maine to a 6-1 record in '47 and was named to the All-American team.

Maine won its first Yankee Conference crown in 1949 under a new coaching staffone of the finest ever assembled in New England football history. Head Coach during 1949 and 1950 was Dave Nelson, who later became Delaware's most successful coach. His assistants were Hal Westerman, who became Maine's winningest coach upon succeeding Nelson in 1951; Mike Lude, later head coach at Colorado State; and John Cuddeback.

The Hal Westerman Era lasted from '51 to '66 and saw Maine teams win 80, lose

only 38 and tie seven and chalk up 15 straight winning records. The '51 and '61 Bears were undefeated and the '65 team went to the Tangerine Bowl and won the Lambert Cup. Maine won Yankee Conference championships in 1951, 1952, 1961, 1965. Two players, guards Tom Golden and John Huard, were named All-America during Westy's coaching career.



The year 1966 saw Westerman succeed Dr. Rome Rankin as Athletic Director and after the 1967 season he retired as head coach. He was succeeded by Walter Abbott, popular line coach during the sixties under Westerman. After two below .500 seasons, the 1969 Bears posted a 5-4 record.

Former Boston College assistant Jack Bicknell took over the Bears' helm in 1976 and immediately led Maine to a 6-5 record. In 1980, tailback Lorenzo Bouier earned All-American honors after setting UMO and New England records with 1,622 rushing yards in 349 carries.

Current UMO coach Ron Rogerson took over the coaching duties in 1981 and reinstalled the Wing-T offense, used at Maine in the early fifties. After a 3-7-1 first season, Rogerson molded a championship team last year and captured the co-championship of the Yankee Conference. Maine's sixth league crown. He was named 1982 Yankee Conference Coach of the Year. Halfback Lorenzo Bouier completed a sparkling career by setting the New England career rushing record of 3,828 yards. Along with Curt Warner of Penn State, Bouier was named Exemplary Player of the Year by Football Roundup Magazine and the Downtown Athletic Club of New York.



1983 FOOTBALL OUTLOOK



Coming off the best season in 15 years, the Black Bears will be looking to keep the winning momentum gained through last year's 7-4 season. With a share of the Yankee Conference championship, the Bears missed out on an NCAA playoff bid on the two plays that gave Boston University the 48-45 victory over UMO in four overtimes.

This season, many of last year's notables return and although a number of key players have graduated the Maine coaching staff is optimistic about the potential replacements. Add to that one of the most successful recruiting years in recent memory.

"I was extremely pleased with the progress we made in 1982," says head coach Ron Rogerson. "We survived some bitter disappointments, but we had the character to bounce back and have a fine season.

"We're going into the fall season with a great attitude and some definite goals in mind. One goal will be to rebuild our fine offensive line and another will be to rebuild our defensive interior. With the graduation of defensive backs Matt Downey and John Chisholm, we'll be looking for some capable replacements—that will be no small chore.

"We felt we had an excellent spring practice and had the opportunity to evaluate all of our young players. We feel many of these young men have the talent to make some fine contributions."

Although the Bears are coming off their first winning season in 15 years, Rogerson indicates little will be changed in this year's campaign. "Despite our winning season our basic approach and philosophy will remain as it always has. We are going to continue to emphasize the fundamentals of football and not complicate matters by taking on too much too fast."

The Black Bear Offense

The Maine offense will be looking to replace a number of key players on the offensive line and halfback Lorenzo Bouier, UMO's record breaking rusher and scorer. However, on the positive side, many other key offensive performers will be back to wear the Blue and White.

The tight end spot will see the return of two seasoned veterans. Senior Bob Jowett caught eight passes last year for 174 yards (21.8 yard average) and scored four touchdowns. Senior John

Nockett will also be back to bolster the position. The 6-2, 230 pounder from Newark, DE caught 12 passes for 199 yards and four TDs.

Senior Matt Walsh is the only letterman returning at split end with the graduation of Jim Hersom. Walsh is a seasoned performer who caught 19 passes for 311 yards and scored one touchdown. Another candidate at split end is a familiar face to Black Bear fans, but not on the gridiron. Senior Clay Pickering who was a standout on the UMO basketball squad (8.4 points avg.-5.0 rebounds avg.) went out for football during the spring and greatly impressed the coaches. According to Ron Rogerson, Pickering is a talented athlete who will make a contribution to this important position.

Four players will be returning at the offensive tackle spot. Although Mike Jenoski has graduated, the four returnees will give Maine a strong look at the position. Three players are juniors-John Hodgkins, a 6-3, 247 pounder from Greene, ME; Paul Misiaszek, a 6-2, 249 pound native of Yorkville, NY: and Al Peterson from South Easton, MA, who is 6-1 and 248. The fourth player is sophomore Bob Crowley (6-2, 242) from Norridgewock, ME.

The Black Bears have suffered key losses at the guard position with the graduation of Barry Buckley, Louis Ortiz and Peter Smith. The returnees are 5-11, 232 pound Hugh Campbell from North Huntington, PA and Dan Maloney, a 6-2, 231 native of Auburn, ME. In addition, Paul Buckley (Barry's brother) had a good spring and impressed the coaches. Although he did not see action last year, Buckley should have a chance this fall to make the team. However, since none of the three has the experience of the three graduates, the coaches feel they will have to watch this position closely.

Last year's captain. Steve Keating, has graduated from the center spot and turned the job over to the capable hands of sophomore Tim Cahill. The 6-4, 228 pound native of Baldwin, NY was called upon to fill in for Keating early in the 1982 season when the latter was injured. Cahill impressed the coaches, especially head coach Ron Rogerson who also coaches the offensive line. Despite his youth, Rogerson feels Cahill can do the job and has high praise for the center.

All-ECAC and All-American halfback Lorenzo Bouier has graduated leaving giant shoes to fill. Bouier holds almost every rushing and scoring record at UMO. While the Hartford, CT native will be missed, the halfback spot remains relatively solid with the return of four veterans. Paul Phelan was second in rushing behind Bouier with 619 yards gained on 124 carries and seven touchdowns. Nick DiPaolo was a pleasant surprise last year, gaining 155 yards on 29 carries and scoring three touchdowns. Another back who could have a big year is Mike Garcia. He gained 97 yards on 28 carries last year in only nine games. Chris Boswell, who saw limited action, is also expected to be one of the ground gainers for the Bears. Finally, Lance Theobald, who had only one carry in 1982, gained the attention of the coaches in the annual Blue-White spring game and will also get the chance to run with the ball.

The fullback position is solid with three returning players. Matt Bennett has been a



fixture at the position and is expected to continue in that role. Last season, he gained 294 yards on 79 carries. Gary Hufnagle came into his own in 1982 and should continue to improve. He gained 285 vards on 60 carries and scored a touchdown. Todd McAniff saw action in just three games but still gained 71 yards on six carries. Against Northeastern, he gained 69 yards and was named ECAC Rookie of the Week. In the Blue-White game, he was the leading rusher with 80 yards.

Possibly the strongest position on the Maine offense is quarterback. Rich LaBonte was the number three signal caller in the nation (NCAA I-AA) last year and this season he should be even stronger. He threw for 1640 yards and completed 112 of 204 passes for 54.9 percent. He threw for 17 touchdowns while being intercepted only nine times. Besides his passing abilities, the York, ME native was the fifth best rusher on the team, carrying the ball 67

times and gaining 202 yards and scoring six touchdowns in the process. LaBonte was named the Yankee Conference Offensive Player of the Year. Backing up LaBonte will again be the job for Mike Beauchemin. Despite losing the starting job two years ago, the Woonsocket, RI native has made important contributions to the team as both a backup quarterback and a leader. If LaBonte should be injured, Beauchemin can do the job.

The Black Bear Defense

Nine veterans from last year's defensive squad have graduated, but a letterwinner is returning at each position. The coaches are looking at several candidates to fill the vacated spots.

Defensive end Dave Sanzaro, often a playmaker, will lead the candidates at this position. Sanzaro was credited with 78 tackles last season including 53 solo efforts. He sacked the quarter-



back a team high of seven times, caught one interception and recovered two fumbles. Chuck Deluga, with 84 tackles and five quarterbacks, will also return to give Maine strength at the ends. Two other players will get a chance for a starting job. They are juniors Skip Foley and Jim Shutt, both of whom saw limited action in 1982.

Three players have departed from the defensive tackle spot. Ray Sullivan and Ted Venechanos were both standouts and will be missed. The other graduate is Fred Lonardo. Three players are back, led by senior Dan McClung. The 6-2, 253 pound native of Pocasset, MA recorded 11 tackles last year. Junior Ray Pacquette (6-1, 251) from Livermore Falls, ME and sophomore Ron Doody (6-5, 249) from Fairfield, ME are the other candidates.


Craig Reynolds has departed the nose guard spot leaving four candidates. Russ Muise (6-1, 226) from Mansfield, MA and Bill Paven (6-1, 230) from Cinnaminson, NJ are the leading candidates for the job while Jim Farley (6-0, 228) from Burlington, MA and Joe McDonald (6-3, 249) from Stanhope, NJ both have a chance to win a starting spot. Muise has the most experience of the four with 35 tackles and one OB sack to his credit. Both Paven and Farley saw some action last year while McDonald is a converted defensive tackle who looked good in spring practice.

The linebacker spot could prove to be a problem because Maine's standout Bob Lucy has graduated. Lucy led the team with 109 tackles, made two interceptions and recovered three fumbles so replacing him will be a major order of business for assistant coach Bob Depew. Fortunately, UMO's other starting linebacker will be back. Dean Ramsdell (5-11, 215), who will be the captain of the 1983 Black Bears, finished just behind Lucy in tackles with 94. He also intercepted one pass. Both offense and defense will benefit from Ramsdell's leadership which could be an important factor late in the season if Maine is in the running for an NCAA playoff berth. Other returnees are Jamie Keefe (6-2, 213) and Steve Root (6-0, 201), both of whom saw some action last year. Root in particular impressed the coaches during the spring drills.

The defensive secondary is another area of concern because three players are gone and two were major contributors. John Chisholm, a UPI All-East Division I (New England Region) Honorable Mention, and Matt Downey are both gone and between them accounted for 102 tackles and eight interceptions (Chisholm had five). Tim Doyle (Hopkinton, MA) and Gary Groves (Westbrook, ME) will be candidates for the cornerback spot. Neither has any extensive experience as both were freshmen in 1982 but Groves did get some playing time. Veteran John McGrath is back at free safety where he recorded 69 tackles, recovered two fumbles and picked off a team high six interceptions. Other free safety candidates are Tom Gorman and Rich Smith. Strong safety Mike Ibrahim is back and he should do even better than his 57 tackles and two QB sacks from 1982.

Maine's kicking game may be the strongest in the Yankee Conference. Kicker Jack Leone is currently riding a 46 consective PAT streak which is an NCAA record. He also holds the NCAA I-AA record for most consecutive extra points in a season with 45. On field goals Leone hit seven of 12 with his longest being 41 yards. During practice, he has hit from over 50 yards. Bob Caito will again be the backup kicker. The punting duties will be handled by Dave Sanzaro who was a second-time All-Yankee Conference punter. He finished the season with a 34.9 yard average with a long punt of 58 yards. Quarterback Rich LaBonte is available as a backup punter.

COACHING STAFF



Head Coach Ron Rogerson Ronald A. Rogerson, 40, former assistant coach at the University of Delaware and a native of Brewer, ME, was appointed head football coach at the University of Maine at Orono in February, 1981.

Rogerson is the University's 29th football coach since the program began in 1892 and is the fourth head coach at UMO in the last 31 years. He succeeded Jack Bicknell who had resigned to take over the coaching duties at Boston College.

A former lineman who played for Maine in the midsixties, Rogerson spent a total of 10 seasons at Delaware, the last four as offensive line coach. During his tenure, he developed four All-Americans including current UMO assistant coach Bob Depew. After graduating from Maine in 1966, Rogerson was a graduate assistant at Colorado State where he was both a coach and a recruiter while he obtained his Master's Degree in Education. In 1968, he was named an offensive line coach and recruiter at Lebanon Valley College. He also served as an assistant track coach for the Flying Dutchmen before heading for Newark, Delaware in 1971.

Rogerson's coaching style and philosophy have quickly reaped dividends. In only his second year with the Black Bears, Maine produced its first winning season in 15 years, won the Yankee Conference co-championship after finishing last the year before and came within an eyelash of receiving a coveted NCAA playoff berth. Rogerson's efforts were recognized as he was named 1982 Yankee Conference Coach of the Year.

Rogerson, in addition to his head coaching responsibilities, is also in charge of the Maine offensive line, the development of which has been a key factor in the resurgence of Black Bear football.

Ron, his wife Ann, and sons, Greg (15), Aaron (13), Lincoln (5) and Joshua (3) reside in Orono.



Bob Depew

Bob Depew (Delaware '73), 32, is Maine's defensive coordinator and linebacker coach. After three seasons at Delaware as the defensive line coach, Bob returned to Orono, where he had been a graduate assistant coach for two years while earning a master's degree in physical education. Depew played for the Hens' 1971 and '72 national champions, earning Little All-American honors in 1972 and was named to the Academic All-American team. His athletic and academic talents enabled the Schenectady, NY native to receive the Alexander J. Taylor Award as the "Outstanding Male Graduate of the 1973 University of Delaware Graduating Class." Depew and his wife Carole have a daughter and a son.

Steve Tosches

Steve Tosches (Rhode Island '79), 27, will coach the Bears' offensive backfield. The former quarterback for Rhode Island is a familiar figure to Maine fans who watched him play for the Rams. During his college career, he earned All-New England, All-ECAC and All-Yankee Conference honors. In 1978, in a game against Massachusetts, he set three URI game records for most completions (22), most yards passing (327) and most total



offense (339 yards). The Stamford, CT native coached offensive backs during the 1979 season at URI after a free agent trial with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League. Steve lives in Orono.



John Skladany

John Skladany (Central Connecticut '72), 34, is Maine's defensive secondary coach. The Lexington, VA native has a wealth of coaching and playing experience that belies his age. After a brilliant career for the Central Connecticut Blue Devils as an All-ECAC and All-New England tackle, he earned a master's degree at Ohio University. Skladany then played through the exhibition seasons of the NFL's New England Patriots and Washington Redskins before he put in two seasons with the Hartford Knights of the Atlantic Coast League. After a season with the Birmingham Americans of the World Football League, he concluded his playing career in the 1975 pre-season with the CFL's Ottawa Rough Riders. Immediately prior to coming to Orono, John was defensive coordinator for a season at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy. He also previously coached at Ohio University and served as head coach at Utica (Ohio) High School.

Mark Harriman

Mark Harriman (Springfield '80), 25, begins his fourth year at Maine, however, this is his first year as a full time staff member. As in the previous three seasons he will handle the Defensive Ends. Mark, a native of Westbrook, Maine, went to Springfield College where he played linebacker while earning a degree in Physical Education. During his senior year he attained All-New England and All-ECAC honors as well as being named the team's Most Valuable Defensive Player. Harriman is also the Strength Coach for the Bears and coordinates all off-season and



in-season conditioning programs. Mark and his wife Sue reside in Orono.

Mike Hodgson

Mike Hodgson (Maine '79), 26, will switch from the Offensive Line to Receivers this year. Craig Cason (Howard '83), 22, comes to Maine after an



TIM CAHILL So., C, 6-4, 228, Baldwin, NY



JACK LEONE Jr., K, 5-7, 160, Quincy, MA



THE YANKEE CONFERENCE

The Yankee Conference developed from the New England College Conference on Intercollegiate Athletics. Shortly after World War II, sentiment developed to create a college sports conference composed of the six New England Land Grant institutions. Late in 1945, a committee was appointed by the NECC to look into the matter. On March 16, 1946, this committee met and recommended the formation of the Yankee Conference out of the NECC. The Conference became a reality when Northeastern resigned from the NECC shortly thereafter. The Yankee Conference officially opened for business on December 3, 1946.

Football was the original Yankee Conference sport followed a year later by cross country, basketball and outdoor track. Conference play began in 1949 for baseball, relay, tennis and golf. Rifle competition began in 1958 but was dropped in 1966 while hockey made an appearance from 1963-67. Indoor track was added in 1964, soccer in 1965, and swimming and wrestling in 1973.

For more than 24 years, the Yankee Conference prohibited membership to any college or university other than the six state universities. A new era for the Conference began in June, 1971 when two non-land grant institutions, Boston University and Holy Cross, were accepted as members. For internal reasons, Holy Cross resigned in November, 1972.

The Yankee Conference continued to function as a multi-sport conference until the end of the 1975 season. At that time, with the costs of athletics spiralling, and the Eastern College Athletic Conference's new program of championships in baseball, basketball and other sports set to begin in the fall, the Yankee Conference ADs voted to disband the conference for all sports except football. In addition, since Vermont had dropped football in 1974, the vote had the effect of terminating the Catamounts' membership.

In the late 70s, talk surfaced of possibly discounting the football league as well. However, when the NCAA created the Division I-AA championship, the Yankee Conference was given an automatic berth. This has revived the fortunes of the Conference and, once again, the league is a viable organization. With its fortunes bright, the Conference voted to expand at its spring 1983 meeting. Delaware was accepted as the seventh Yankee Conference member and will begin play in 1986. Two more teams will be added for the 1987 or 1988 season.






