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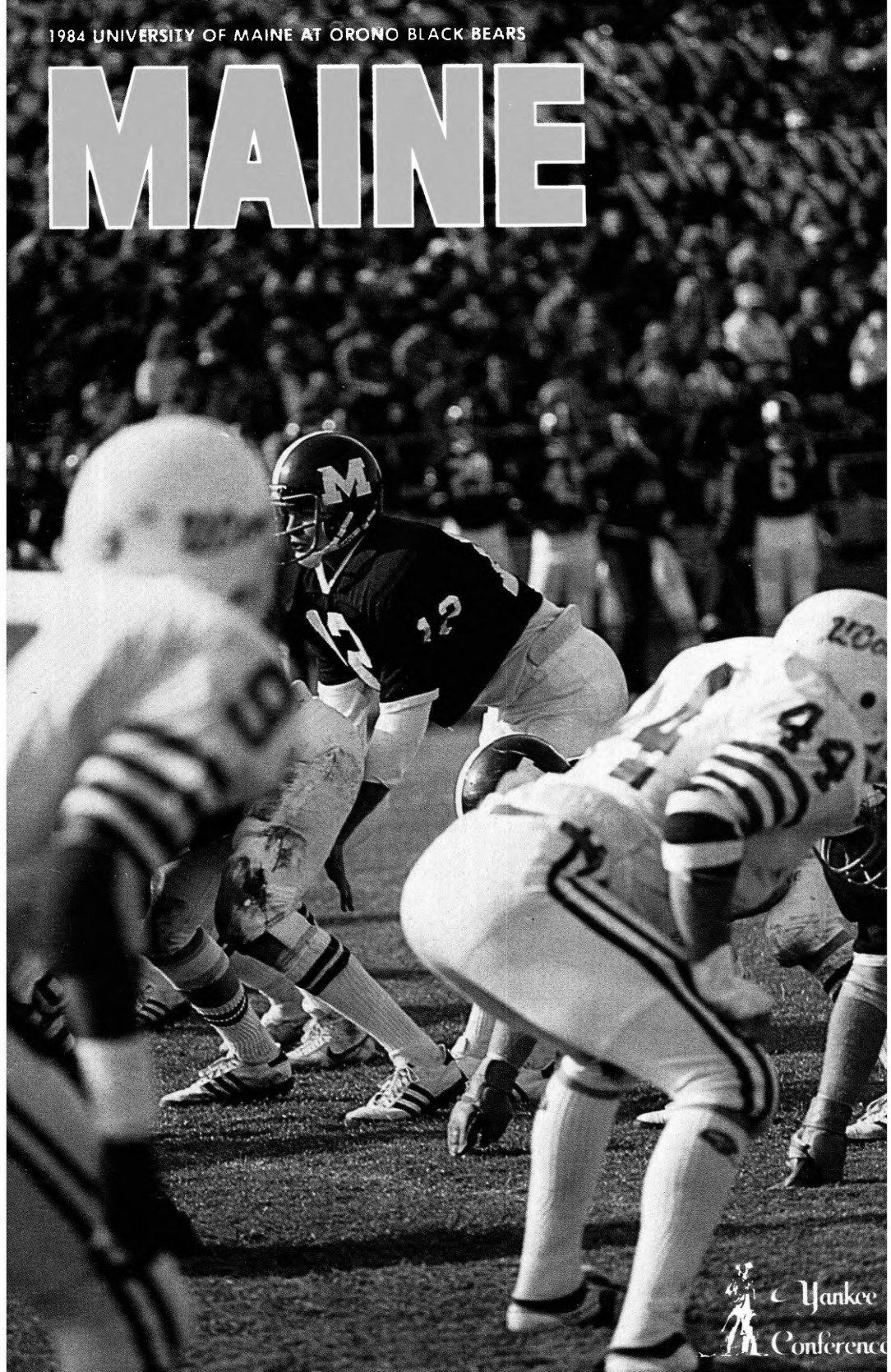
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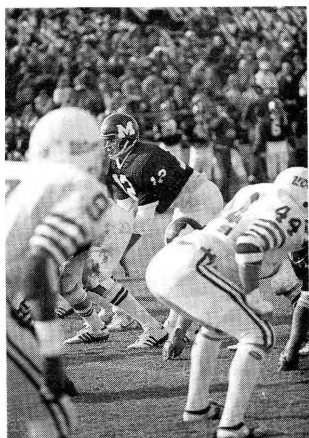

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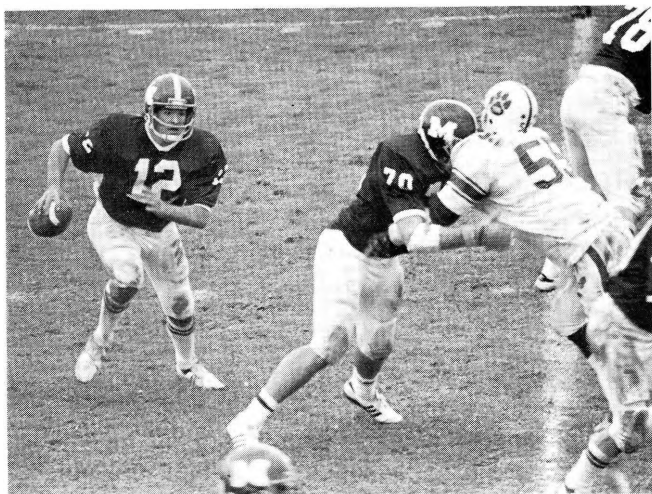

I wish for an outstandingly successful year for the Black Bears. I know that they have worked for it.

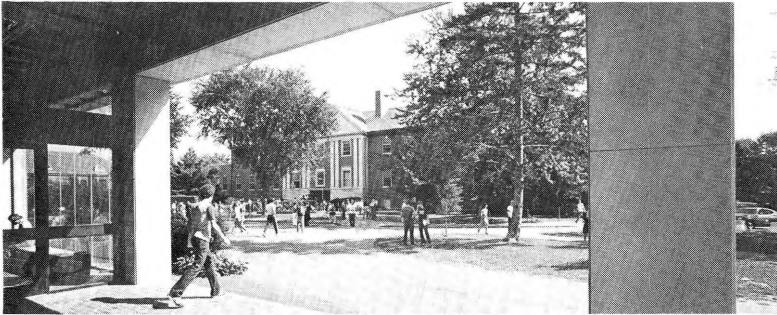

STU HASKELL

UMO's Director of Physical Education and Athletics is Stuart Haskell, Jr. Stu, who is the first UMO graduate and Maine native (Lincoln) to hold the Director's position, succeeded Harold Westerman on June 1, 1982. Stu has been a member of the UMO staff for nearly 25 years, serving as Assistant Director of Publicity between 1957 and 1965 and as Business Manager of Athletics between 1966 and 1983. He served as Director of Informational Services for the public schools of Evanston, Ill. in 1965 and early 1966. Stu is a journalism graduate of Maine and was employed for three years as a sportswriter for the *Bangor Daily News* and one year as Editor of *The Republican Journal* in Belfast in the mid-1950's. He and his wife, Gloria, are the parents of four children.



The University of Maine at Orono, with its seven colleges and four schools, is the largest campus in the statewide university system. There is plenty of elbow room on its 1,100 acres, where the student is offered the diversity and challenge of a large university in the invigorating atmosphere of a small college. Close personal contact among students, and among students and faculty, is a tradition at Orono, where one knows one's neighbors and teachers.

Prior to 1968, the campus was known as the University of Maine. In 1968, the State Legislature created a new system of public higher education for Maine. This action unified the University and the five state colleges into one "cohesive structure of public education in the State of Maine." It was at this time that the University adopted its present name.

Orono is a cosmopolitan campus in a classic New England setting. Last year, students from 45 states and 25 countries studied here. More than 20 percent of the total enrollment of over 11,000 students is admitted from outside the state of Maine.

There is ample opportunity for students to enrich themselves academically and socially outside the classroom. There are seven scholastic honor societies, four non-scholastic honor societies, 22 departmental and professional honor societies, 56 associations, clubs and organizations, and six religious groups. Nineteen fraternities and 10 sororities have chapters at Orono.

The campus is located one mile from the center of Orono, an attractive town of about 10,000 population, and 10

miles from Bangor, the state's third largest city. It is in the center of the state's year-round outdoor recreation area, with ski slopes, scores of ponds, lakes, streams, and the beautiful Maine coast within easy driving distance.

Interstate Route 95, a scenic four-lane highway that bisects the state north to south to the New Hampshire state line, passes within a mile of the campus. Air travelers land at Bangor International Airport, where the University has established a branch campus in the former Dow Air Force facilities. Bangor Community College became the sixth college of the University of Maine at Orono in the 1974-75 academic year. Although the 162 acre campus, with its 58 buildings, is located in Bangor, its relationship with Orono is the same as the other six colleges.

In its role as a community college, the primary objectives of BCC are to offer two-year associate degree programs, one-year certificates, and short-term programs to meet special educational needs.

The University of Maine at Orono offers programs in physical education, intercollegiate athletics, intramural sports, recreation and related club activities. These programs are recognized as an integral part of the educational process which the university controls and supports within the limitations of budget, staff, equipment, and facilities. These programs are to promote educational leadership, physical fitness, opportunity for recreational pursuits, and athletic excellence through instruction and competition.



It all started in 1878 when an unidentified junior attempted to kick a round ball over Brice Hall (now Oak Hall) in his leisure time. History doesn't record whether or not he ever succeeded or how many panes of glass he broke in the process, but he sowed the seeds of a game which was officially launched at the University of Maine in 1892. That game was football.

The first few years were not fruitful ones for the UMO football team. From 1892 to 1900, the squad posted a 10-28 record with one tie. One important development occurred in 1896 when Jack Abbott, a Dartmouth graduate, was hired as Maine's first full-time football coach. It was also during this early period that systemized training was introduced and the use of a regular training table began.

The 1901 to 1920 period saw the first appearance of "Bananas," the black bear mascot, and the hiring of former Harvard star Jack Farley as head coach in 1901.

In 1921, "Foxy" Fred Brice began a 20-year coaching career at Maine which

saw Black Bear teams win 79 games against only 58 losses and 15 ties. An innovative man, Brice specialized in trick plays and after a building year Maine went on to win State Series titles in seven of the next eight years. Tabbed as one of the finest periods in UMO football history, the years between 1925 and 1934 saw the Bears win unofficial New England titles in 1925, 1927, and 1928 and share one in 1926. From '31 to '34 Maine won 12 straight State Series games.

The years between 1941 and 1950 saw teams depleted of personnel by the war, several coaching changes, and a record of 26 wins, 28 losses and four ties. The most outstanding play of the period was Jack Zollo, a guard who suffered severe wounds in the war. He led Maine to a 6-1 record in '47 and was named to the All-America team.

In 1947, Maine along with the five other land-grant universities in New England formed the Yankee Conference, the first college football league of note in the east. UMO won its first Conference crown just two years later, in

1949, under a new coaching staff—one of the finest ever assembled in New England football history. Head Coach during 1949 and 1950 was Dave Nelson, who later became Delaware's most successful coach. His assistants were Harold "Westy" Westerman, who became Maine's winningest coach upon succeeding Nelson in 1951; Mike Lude, later head coach at Colorado State; and John Cuddeback.

The Westerman Era lasted from '51 to '66 and saw Maine teams win 80, lose only 38 and tie seven and chalk up 15 straight winning records. The '51 and '61 Bears were undefeated and the '65 team went to the Tangerine Bowl and won the Lambert Cup. Maine won Yankee Conference championships in 1951, 1952, 1961, and 1965. Two players, guards Tom Golden and John Huard, were named All-Americans during Westy's coaching career.

The year 1966 saw Westerman succeed Dr. Rome Rankin as Athletic Director and after the 1967 season he retired as head coach. He was succeeded by Walter Abbott, the popular line during the sixties under Westerman. After two seasons below .500, the 1969 Bears posted a 5-4 record.

Former Boston College assistant Jack Bicknell took over the Bears' helm in 1976 and immediately led Maine to a 6-5 record. In 1980, tailback Lorenzo Bouier earned All-America honors after setting UMO and New England records with 1,622 rushing yards on 349 carries.

Current UMO coach Ron Rogerson took over the coaching duties in 1981 and reinstalled the Wing-T offense developed at Maine in early fifties. After a 3-7-1 first season, Rogerson molded a championship team in 1982 and captured a share of the Yankee Conference championship. The title was Maine's sixth. Rogerson was named 1982 Yankee Conference Coach of the Year. Halfback Lorenzo Bouier completed a sparkling career by breaking the then New England career rushing record with 3,828 yards. Along with Curt Warner of Penn State, Bouier was named Exemplary Player of the Year by *Football Roundup Magazine* and the Downtown Athletic Club of New York.

Although the 1983 season was a disappointing one, the enthusiasm and dedication of the program remains high. With a solid background, tradition and the current positive attitude, Maine football will remain exciting and competitive.





The 92nd season of Black Bear varsity football presents a major challenge to the players and coaches. After posting an outstanding 7-4 record in 1982, and being named one of the eight most improved teams in Division I-AA by the NCAA, the Bears slipped to a 4-6 mark last year. Perhaps the most disappointing aspect of last season was UMO's last place finish in the Yankee Conference. The 1982 team had been conference co-champions and had come within a field goal of qualifying for the NCAA playoffs. Last year, the Bears lost all five league games.

Fortunately, despite last year, no one connected with the team hierarchy is panicking. This season wipes the slate clean and the coaches will have an opportunity to use in game situations what they learned during a spring practice that head coach Ron Rogerson describes as "one of the best I've had since coming to Maine."

Rogerson feels the players have put last year behind them and are looking forward to the challenge of '84.

"Our attitude is outstanding," Rogerson says. "I think we're all anticipating the fall campaign and working hard to field the best football team we can."

Part of the excitement, and part of the challenge, will be to successfully negotiate the most difficult schedule in the history of Maine football. In addition to the traditional New England Yankee Conference rivals, the Black Bears will also play against the two new southern members of the Conference, Delaware and Richmond. The schedule will be filled out with Northeastern, Lafayette, Holy Cross and Howard.

"I believe our schedule is probably the toughest UMO has ever played in football," Rogerson notes. "We'll be playing 11 Division I-AA teams and all of the games will be demanding. Our first four games are all against Yankee Conference teams and three of those will count in the standings."

Rogerson indicates he expects several battles for spots on the team.

"We've graduated three offensive linemen and there are several candidates competing for those positions. We're extremely fortunate to be deep in running backs and any number of them will be competing for starting assignments. Rich Labonte has returned from shoulder surgery and will be pushed by sophomore Bob Wilder. Defensively, our line will have some new faces as sev-

eral spots must be filled. Our biggest loss here is last year's captain Dean Ramsdell. The secondary has some excellent talent and should perform well."

The Black Bear Offense

A total of 16 talented lettermen return to the Black Bear offense including quarterback Rich Labonte, the 1982 Yankee Conference Offensive Player of the Year. The team graduated 11 offensive players and thus will have to fill these positions. Among the notables who have completed their eligibility are Clay Pickering, a split end who led the team in touchdowns caught with five; Nick DiPaolo, who was the second leading rusher with 409 yards; fullback Matt Bennett who was a standout blocker, rusher and pass receiver; and quarterback Mike Beauchemin, last year's top UMO signal caller.

At the tight end spot, senior Bob Jowett is the leading returnee. Jowett received an extra year of eligibility when the NCAA modified its rule on freshman redshirting. He caught seven passes last year for a total of 58 yards and one touchdown. He averaged 8.3 yards a reception. Bryan O'Leary is the other candidate at the tight end position. A sophomore, O'Leary saw limited action last fall.

Split end Pat Murray is the only returning letterman at this position with the graduation of Pickering and Matt Walsh. Murray played in nine of the 10 games and caught five passes for 83 yards. His longest catch was a 44-yarder.

The offensive line, which is the specialty of head coach Ron Rogerson, loses five players while retaining six lettermen. The notable losses are both tackles, John Hodgkins and Al Peterson.

The two returning tackles are seniors Bob Crowley, 6-2, 243 pounds from Norridgewock, Maine and Paul Hughes, 6-1, 270 pounds from Dover, Massachusetts.

Three players will anchor the guard spot. They are junior Paul Buckley, 6-0, 237 pounds from Cohasset, Massachusetts; sophomore Dave Ingalls, 6-3, 225

pounds from Bangor, Maine; and senior Dan Maloney, 6-3, 245 pounds from Auburn, Maine.

Last year's starting center, junior Tim Cahill, will once again snap the ball. The 6-4, 252 pound native of Baldwin, New York made an impression his freshman year when he quickly stepped in for the injured Steve Keating.

Senior Paul Phelan leads the half-back corps. The leading ground gainer for the Bears, Phelan rushed for 523 yards on 121 carries. He scored one touchdown and averaged 58.1 yards a game. Both Chris Boswell and Lance Theobald saw limited action in 1983 but figure more prominently this season. Boswell played in six games and carried the ball four times for 17 yards. Theobald appeared in nine games and rushed for 81 yards on 25 carries. He scored two touchdowns and was tied for fourth in team scoring.

UMO's two returning fullbacks are Gary Hufnagle and Todd McAniff. These talented players give the Bears strength at the position. Hufnagle, who is the 1984 Black Bear football captain, was the top fullback last year, rushing for 192 yards on 34 carries. His blocking often allowed the halfbacks to gain some extra yardage. McAniff gained 100 yards on 30 carries and is a former Yankee Conference Rookie of the Week.

Quarterback Rich Labonte has the capability to be one of the top field generals in the nation. Two years ago, he was the third ranking quarterback in NCAA Division I-AA. Last year, however, he suffered nagging injuries which kept him from having a banner year. Appearing in only five games, Labonte completed 41 of 87 passes for 511 yards and three touchdowns. He was intercepted six times. If Labonte can stay healthy this year, and that is the major question mark, the UMO offense will return to being one of the most potent in New England. Backing up Labonte will be highly touted sophomore Bob Wilder from Madison, Maine. If Labonte gets hurt, look for Wilder to step right in.

Although kicker Jack Leone's NCAA records for consecutive extra-points



have been erased, the master of the "football slam-dunk" will be back with his bare foot and enthusiasm. Leone led the team in scoring last year with 37 points on the strength of 19 conversions and six field goals.

The Black Bear Defense

The Black Bear defense returns 19 lettermen from last year's team while eight players have finished their eligibility. Among those eight are such stalwarts as Chuck Deluga, Dave Sanzaro, Russ Muise and last year's captain, Dean Ramsdell. One bright spot for the Bears is the return of John McGrath who gained an additional year of eligibility via a new NCAA rule on freshman redshirting.

Sophomore Chris Gillmann and junior Tip Spina are the two returnees at the defensive end spot. Gillmann recorded six tackles last year while Spina had four tackles and one assist. Spina also recovered an opponent fumble. Both players are expected to see more action this fall.

There will definitely be a new look to the Maine defensive line as vets like Dan McClung, Russ Muise and Dean Ramsdell have graduated. Ramsdell was the leading tackler last year with 67 solo efforts and 47 assisted tackles. He

leaves behind big shoes to fill but the coaching staff believes it has several candidates to successfully handle the job. Ron Doody and Ray Paquette are the leading candidates at the tackle positions. Both are regulars and both made their presence known to opponents last year. Doody had 28 tackles and 21 assists and also had six sacks for a total of 36 minus yards. Paquette recorded 16 tackles and 12 assists, recovered a fumble and had two sacks for a loss of three yards. Another letter winner vying for a spot is Jim Shutt, who saw limited action last season as an end.

Senior Bill Paven has been the understudy nose guard for two seasons and this year looks to be his first as a starter. Paven had six tackles and five assists last year.

The linebacker spot returns two solid players in Mark Coutts and Jamie Keefe. Coutts, who originally played both football and baseball as Maine, has chosen to concentrate on football this year. He had a strong 1983 campaign, recording 24 tackles and assisting on 17 others. Keefe had an even better year with 29 tackles and 27 assists. He also recovered one fumble. The third candidate is Bob Brainerd who has been a reserve (solo and assisted) last year.

Nine defensive backs are returning and the secondary figures to be an important strength. Two of the players, Jeff Durr and Gary Groves, did not participate in the spring practice session due to injuries but both should return this fall. As mentioned previously, the top returner, John McGrath, is back because of a change in the NCAA rule regarding redshirting of freshmen. McGrath's presence will definitely be a major factor in the success of the secondary. Last year, he recorded 35 solo tackles and 21 assists. He also led the team with five interceptions and currently has 13 lifetime pickoffs which ties the UMO record. Groves, when he recovered, will also be force. He had 25

tackles and 16 assists and two interceptions. Other players returning are Steve Costello, Jay Davenport, Tom DiGeromimo, Jim Hinds, Marc L'Heureux and Rick Ouellette.

The punting situation is somewhat undecided now that regular punter Dave Sanzaro has graduated. Quarterback Rich Labonte has been the backup punter and, in fact, was originally recruited to punt rather than play quarterback. However, injuries to Labonte and his status as top signal caller make it difficult for the coaching staff to decide whether or not Labonte will handle the job. As of this point, the coaches will go with the York, Maine native but are looking at potential replacements.



Head Coach Ron Rogerson

Ronald A. Rogerson, 41, former assistant coach at the University of Delaware and a native of Brewer, Maine, was appointed head football coach at the University of Maine at Orono in February, 1981.

Rogerson is the University's 29th football coach since the program began in 1892 and is the fourth head coach at UMO in the last 32 years. He succeeded Jack Bicknell who had resigned to take over the coaching duties at Boston College.

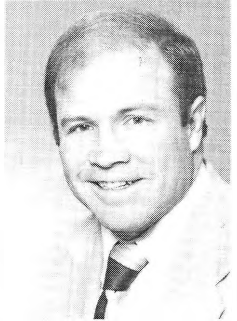
A former lineman who played for Maine in the mid-sixties, Rogerson spent a total of 10 seasons at Delaware, the last four as offensive line coach. During his tenure, he developed four All-Americans including current UMO assistant coach Bob Depew.

After graduating from Maine in 1966, Rogerson was a graduate assistant at Colorado State where he was both a coach and a recruiter while he obtained his Master's Degree in Education. In 1968, he was named an offensive line coach and recruiter at Lebanon Valley College. He also served as an assistant track coach for the Flying Dutchmen before heading for Newark, Delaware in 1971.

Rogerson's coaching style and philosophy have quickly reaped dividends. In only his second year with the Black Bears, Maine produced its first winning season in 15 years, won the Yankee Conference co-championship after finishing last the year before and came within an eyelash of receiving a coveted NCAA playoff berth. Rogerson's efforts were recognized as he was named 1982 Yankee Conference Coach of the Year.

Rogerson, in addition to his head coaching responsibilities, is also in charge of the Maine offensive line, the development of which has been a key factor in the resurgence of Black Bear football.

Ron, his wife Ann, and sons Greg (16), Aaron (14), Lincoln (6) and Joshua (4) reside in Orono.



Bob Depew

Bob Depew (Delaware '73), 33, is Maine's defensive coordinator and linebacker coach. After three seasons at Delaware as the defensive line coach, Bob returned to Orono, where he had been a graduate assistant coach for two years while earning a Master's Degree in physical education. Depew played for the Hens' 1971 and 1972 national championship teams, earning Little All-American honors in 1972 and was named to the Academic All-American team. His athletic and academic talents enabled the Schenectady, NY native to receive the Alexander J. Taylor Award as the "Outstanding Male Graduate of the 1973 University of Delaware Graduating Class." Bob and his wife Carole have a daughter and a son.

Steve Tosches

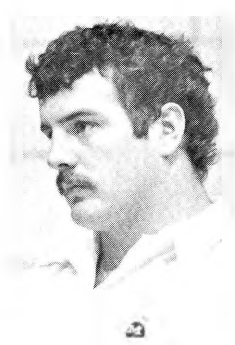
Steve Tosches (Rhode Island '79), 28, is the offensive coordinator and will coach the Bears' offensive backfield. The former University of Rhode Island quarterback is a familiar figure to Maine fans who watched him play for the Rams. During his college career, he earned All-New England, All-ECAC and All-Yankee Conference honors. In 1978, in a game against Massachusetts, he set three URI game records for most completions (22), most yards passing (327) and most total offense (339 yards). The Stamford, CT native coached the offensive backs at URI after a free agent trial with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League. Steve and his wife Carole live in Orono.

**John Skladany**

John Skladany (Central Connecticut '72), 35, is Maine's defensive secondary coach. The Lexington, VA native has a wealth of coaching and playing experience that belies his age. After a brilliant career for the Central Connecticut Blue Devils as an All-ECAC and All-New England tackle, he earned a Master's Degree at Ohio University. Skladany then played through the exhibition seasons of the NFL's New England Patriots and Washington Redskins before he put in two seasons with the Hartford Knights of the Atlantic Coast League. After a season with the Birmingham Americans of the World Football League, he concluded his playing career in the 1975 pre-season with the CFL's Ottawa Rough Riders. Immediately prior to coming to Orono, John was defensive coordinator for a season at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy. He also previously coached at Ohio University and served as head coach at Utica (Ohio) High School.

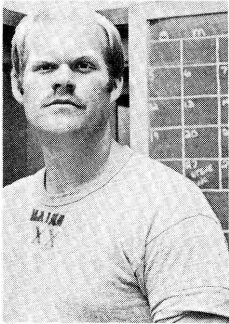
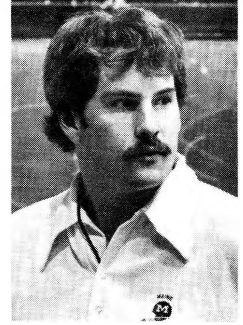
Mark Harriman

Mark Harriman (Springfield '80), 26, begins his fifth year at Maine and his second year as a full-time staff member. As in the previous four seasons he will handle the defensive ends. Mark, a native of Westbrook, ME, went to Springfield College where he played linebacker while earning a degree in Physical Education. During his senior year he attained All-New England and All-ECAC honors as well as being named the team's Most Valuable Defensive Player. Harriman, who also was UMO's wrestling coach until 1983, is also the strength coach for the Bears and coordinates all off-season and in-season conditioning programs. Mark and his wife Sue reside in Orono.



Mike Hodgson

Mike Hodgson (Maine '79), 27, will again coach the receivers this year. An All-State quarterback at St. Mark's High School in Wilmington, DE, Mike came to Maine in 1975 and was a three year starter for the Black Bears as a tight end and place kicker. Following his graduation in '79, Hodgson stayed at Maine as a graduate assistant to coach the offensive backs under former coach Jack Bicknell. He received his Master's Degree from Maine in Education Administration and joined Ron Rogerson's staff in 1981. Mike is single and resides in Orono.



Max Lowe

Max Lowe (Bridgewater College '76), 30, beginning his second year, is the newest member of the Maine coaching staff. Max handles the Black Bear defensive line. The Front Royal, VA native came to Maine from the University of North Carolina where he coached the offensive line for three years. While at North Carolina he helped coach the Tar Heels to three bowl victories: a 1982 Sun Bowl victory over Texas, a 1981 Gator Bowl win over Arkansas and a 1980 Bluebonnet Bowl win over Texas. Prior to his stint at North Carolina, he coached four years at Park View High School in Sterling, VA. He was a three year starter at Bridgewater College. Max and his wife Barbara live in Bangor.

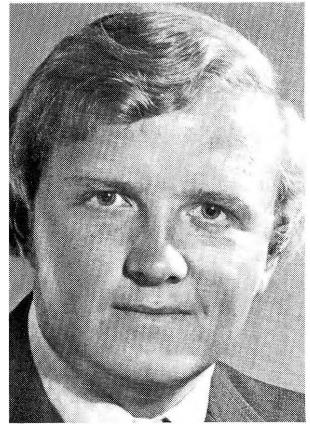

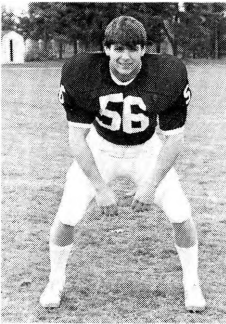
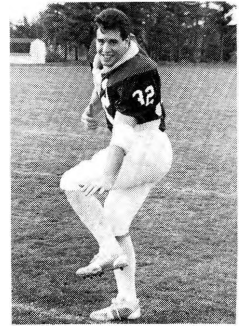

Philadelphia, PA**CAPTAIN**

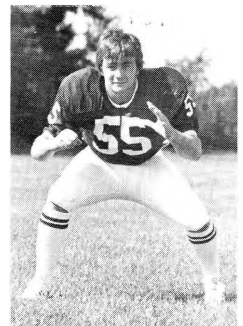
Gary M. Hufnagle (March 15, 1962) Gary is a hard-hitting fullback who gained 192 yards on 34 carries last season. He is a threat to go all the way on any play and is an excellent blocker. Also caught five passes for 35 yards and one touchdown. Elected 1984 captain by his teammates because of his leadership both on and off the field. He was the recipient of the Maxwell Award given annually to the outstanding high school football player in Philadelphia. Played at Germantown Academy for coach Jack Turner. He was also the MVP of the Germantown-Penn Charter game, the oldest high school football rivalry in the nation. Gary is enrolled in UMO's College of Arts and Sciences. He is the son of John and Lorraine Hufnagle and has one brother, John Jr. "Gary is one of the finest natural leaders I've ever observed. He has a contagious enthusiasm and his optimistic outlook rubs off on anyone associated with him. As a player he is a breakaway threat from the fullback position and he catches the ball well." Robert N. Brainerd (December 12, 1962) Bob spent last season playing behind team captain Dean Ramsdell, but will see plenty of playing time this season. Known for going all out in practice as well as in games, Bob should help the Bears replace their leading tackler. Bob played basketball and ran track in addition to football while attending Edward Little H.S. and won his school's Athlete of the Year award. Earned three letters under coach Lawrence Lawrence Hersom. Lists old cars as a hobby and hopes to go into coaching after graduation. The son of Robert and Ira Brainerd, he has one sister, Belinda. "Bob is a very hardnosed linebacker who has a great knowledge of our system. He always plays with total abandon and gives his most on the field." [Rogerson.]

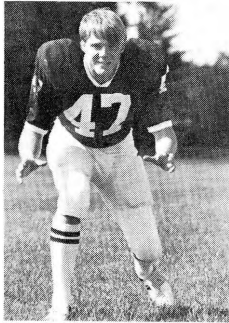
PAUL BUCKLEY

Paul J. Buckley (January 15, 1964) Paul will be competing for a starting offensive guard spot after spending his first two years as a reserve. He earned three varsity football letters under coach John Leone at Cohasset High and won the best lineman award. One of the premier Division I-AA conferences in the nation, the Yankee Conference, begins its 38th year after undergoing many changes since it began in 1947. Originally set up as a conference for the New England Land Grant institutions, the Yankee Conference now consists of eight schools. Five of the six original members (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Rhode Island) are still in the Conference. Boston University joined the league in 1971, but was not eligible for the championship until 1973. The University of Delaware was voted into the league in 1983 and will be eligible to play for the championship in 1986. The newest member of the Yankee Conference, the University of Richmond, was added in 1984 and will also be eligible for the 1986 title.

The Yankee Conference developed from the old New England College Conference of Intercollegiate Athletics. When Northeastern University offered its resignation from the NECC, the Land Grant institutions appointed a committee to pursue a new league. On December 8, 1945, the committee recommended an athletic conference be formed by the six New England Land Grant colleges, namely; the University of Connecticut, the University of Maine, the Massachusetts State College (now the University of Massachusetts), the Rhode Island State College (now the University of Rhode Island), the University of New Hampshire and the University of Vermont.

On August 24, 1946, representatives from the schools met. A preamble and code of the Yankee Conference were adopted, to become effective on December 3, 1946. The first league championships were conducted in 1947.

Football was the original Yankee Conference sport followed a year later

by cross country, basketball and outdoor track. Conference play began in 1949 for baseball, relay, tennis and golf. Rifle competition began in 1958 but was dropped in 1966 while hockey made an appearance from 1963-67. Indoor track was added in 1964, soccer in 1965, and swimming and wrestling in 1973.

In June of 1971, Boston University and the College of the Holy Cross accepted invitations to become members of the conference. For internal reasons, Holy Cross withdrew from the conference in November, 1972. Vermont dropped football following the 1974 season.

Between 1975 and 1978, the league gradually disbanded in all sports with the exception of football. With Vermont not having football, its membership ended after 1978 leaving the conference with six members.

Since then, the Yankee Conference has become one of the top Division I-AA leagues in the country. It was one of the original conferences to receive an automatic berth in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. Prior to the creation of the division, New Hampshire had represented the league in the Division II playoffs twice and Massachusetts once. Since the formation of I-AA Massachusetts has represented the league in the NCAA playoffs in 1978, Boston University went in 1980, 1982 and 1983, and Rhode Island was the YC representative in 1981.

The Yankee Conference has member institutions in seven states of the northeastern region of the country including Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Delaware and Virginia. With the recent addition of both Delaware and Richmond to the league the Yankee Conference remains one of the top playing conferences in Division I-AA.
