Protocol Points for Virtual Chapter Meeting

Sorors, as we prepare for our second virtual chapter meeting, the following protocol points are offered. Our meeting has an audio portion and a web portion which provides the visual. You may participate in only the audio portion of the meeting and be consider present. The Technology committee, Anti Grammateus, and I have made every effort for our meeting to run as smoothly as possible and for each of you to have a great experience!!!

- Please start to dial in as early as thirty minutes before the meeting to avoid the lines being busy. If you get a busy signal, Please do not Panic, hang up and continue to dial in with your phone muted; the line will clear and you will be able to complete your call. If you continue to have a challenge text the Anti Grammateus at 615-525-6600 to let her know your efforts to access the call. Again, please do not announce yourself. Every effort is to start the meeting on time.
- Sorors if you receive a call from a soror you can add/merge her onto your call if you so desire. Sisterly Relations continues virtually.
- **Do not announce yourself when you dial in.** When you dial in and enter the access code they will ask your name, just press # and you will be added to the call. Simply **mute your phone. Madam Basileus** will have the Moderator, Soror Nicole Arrighi to call the roll after the Chaplain has finished the meditation and will we start.
- Since we are not all in private settings, we will **NOT** start the meeting with pledge nor will we end the meeting with the hymn.
- The Roll Call can be quick; unmute, reply present then back to mute. We will only call Sorors who are not signed on the visual portion of our conference (Nearpod). We ask you to sign in using your Last Name first. This will allow us to mirror the roster and check everyone present in a timely manner. Please remember to sign in using your Last Name First
- If you join the call after the roll call, do not announce yourself, wait until the call is over and we will ask for any sorors who were not acknowledged during the first role call. If you are signed into the visual portion of the call (Nearpod) we have you as present. The Basileus/ Anti Grammateus and the moderator will get a print out of all call in. Additionally, she and the Anti Grammateus will do a cross check afterwards. She will then register your attendance electronically and you will be able to see your attendance ticket in Wild Apricot.

- We will a few items to vote on during our meeting. We will allow 3 minutes to vote. Please make sure after you have voted that you press submit for your vote to be counted.
- Place your phone on **mute**; only **unmute** when reporting, speaking or when making a motion or to second a motion. Identify yourself, wait to be recognized then speak.
- If you have a question or comment please wait until the Basileus or the presenter ask "Are there any questions or comments"? Unmute, identify yourself, be recognized first, then speak.
 - ➤ If you are using your cell phone, you can mute the mic on your phone or on a land line by pressing the mute button. You may also dial *6 to mute and unmute your phone.
 - > To maximize your participation and understanding of the information presented please have the Chapter meeting agenda, minutes at hand.
 - ➤ Please avoid areas with background noise; ie. The TV or music playing, other persons in the area etc. The noise is evident when you unmute to speak causing some distortion and inability to hear well.

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If you think your board and chapter meetings are dull, I have just the thing to liven them up. Make them virtual! That is right. For a small fee – or maybe even free – you can hold a meeting on the phone or on the computer, where we will all surely make better decisions surrounded by the sounds of pets and washing machines and the dance-party that Anita is having because she thinks her phone is on mute.

Seriously, though, having a virtual board meeting or chapter meeting may seem simple enough from a technology perspective, but holding a meeting that is both virtual and compliant is anything but simple. Here are the top three misconceptions about virtual meetings:

1. Any Group Can Have a Virtual Meeting.

False. Just because the technology is there does not mean your group can have a virtual meeting that is valid. Check the law of the state where your organization is incorporated, and look for law that applies to the type of group that you have (e.g., if you're a nonprofit, look for the law that talks about board and membership meetings for nonprofits). Better yet, ask a lawyer to check for you.

Even if the law gives you the green light, make sure you also check your governing documents (i.e., your bylaws). The law might say something like, "Sure! Have a virtual meeting as long as your bylaws say that you can." Moreover, if your bylaws are silent, you are back to square one. Alternatively, the law might say, "Sure! Have a virtual meeting as long as your bylaws don't say that you can't." If that is the case, and your bylaws are silent, you are likely still in good shape. Either way, check your bylaws.

2. A Dial-In Number (and Maybe a Screen) Are All You Need for a Compliant Virtual Meeting.

Definitely not, true. *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* has all kinds of things to say about how to have a compliant virtual meeting. (So surprising, right?) This is because a deliberative assembly (a fancy name for a group where every person has equal rights and an equal vote) is all about an equal right to information, to discussion, and to vote. Put everyone on the phone or on Zoom! and all of sudden Mary Dogmatic – with the voice that reaches across the Grand Canyon – has *waaayyy* more of a "right to discussion" than Sarah Agreeable. And what about Doris Dark Ages? Does she even know what to do with a dial-in and passcode, not to mention a Go To Meeting log-in? If she does not, her right to information is seriously diminished. Of course, the elephant in the room is the voting, especially if you need to take a vote that is secret.

Now, do not misunderstand. I am not saying that a compliant virtual meeting is impossible. However, what I am saying is that you have to give serious thought to how to follow the same rules that you would if everyone were physically in the same room. Getting help from a lawyer and a professional parliamentarian is not a bad idea either. A professional parliamentarian who has lived through numerous meetings – the regular kind and the virtual kind – can help you navigate the traps and make sure the validity of your group's actions cannot be guestioned later.

3. Virtual Meetings Are Better Than In-Person Meetings.

Often not, true. There is a school of thought that virtual meetings are better because technology exists and because a virtual meeting can be organized more quickly than a physical meeting. As discussed above, there are many hurdles to having a virtual meeting that is compliant, even with stellar technology. In addition, even though our world is advanced, there is still something to be said for the progress that can be made when all parties are physically present in the same room to dialogue and make decisions. To be sure, COVID-19 is going to make less traditional measures the first (and perhaps only) option for board and chapter meetings in the short term, but let's not lose sight of the fact that there are benefits to an old-school meeting and that technology – while no doubt helpful – comes with drawbacks.

Are we Disaster Ready? By Soror Charlotte Mann

As Alpha Delta Omega Disaster Relief Coordinator, It is so important that I address the current conditions Nashville and the entire world are having to deal with. March 2020 is a month and time that will be remembered by many. We have realized first hand that disaster can strike in all corners of the world, during every season, on different scales and during different times. These events are often unexpected and leaving little time if any, to prepare. That is why it is so important to take the time to plan and prepare long before disaster strikes. During the March 14, 2020, virtual sorority meeting, I announced that on March 30, 2020 @ 6:00pm I would conduct a workshop on "Sorors Becoming Emergency Ready" in their homes as well at sorority functions. Because of the current "Safer-At-Home" orders from our government this activity was postponed since it was somewhat interactive.

However, as your Disaster Relief Coordinator, I would like to share information that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Center for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC) have stated that every individual should do in order to remain safe as we experience these trying times.

According to FEMA, everyone should take simple steps to prepare and respond to potential emergencies. Families should do three simple things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan, and be informed about the different types of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses. Families should have basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. Some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include: water, non-perishable food, battery-powered or hand crank radio/NOAA Weather Radio, flashlight & extra batteries, first aid kit, whistle to signal for help, dusk mask, moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation, wrench or pliers to turn off utilities, can opener for food and local maps. Additional items to consider adding to the kit are one month's supply of prescription medications; extra glasses; infant formula and diapers; pet food; important family documents; cash/traveler's checks and change; sleeping bags or warm blankets; change of clothing; matches in a waterproof container; feminine supplies and personal hygiene items; paper and pencil; books, games or other activities for the children; chlorine bleach with a medicine dropper and paper goods. Before an emergency happens, families should sit down together and decide how to get in touch with each other, where to go and what to do in the event of an emergency, and remember to keep a copy of your emergency plan in the emergency supply kit. We cannot stop emergencies from occurring, but by being prepared, we can limit their impact on us and those we love.

According to the Center for Disease Control & Prevention, these are the steps to help prevent the spread of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19.) If you are sick or think you might be sick take the following steps to help protect other people in your home and community: Stay home except to get medical care, call ahead before visiting your doctor, separate yourself from other people in your home, this is known as home isolation, clean your hands often, avoid sharing personal household items, clean all "high-touch" surfaces every day, wear a facemask if you are sick and if you have to care for a family member and monitor your symptoms. Follow all government directives, however, if there is a need to leave your home for any reason, avoid close contact and put as much distance between yourself and other people, practice social distancing at all times.

Finally, with the orders to close non-essential businesses and the "Stay-At-Home" order unless absolutely necessary to leave, we're all getting more valuable time with immediate family and opportunities to include in our favorite past times or to explore new hobbies, and more importantly, we can all be proud that we're doing our part to combat the spread of COVID-19 throughout the communities. As we move toward better days ahead, I urge all sorors to love on your families and friends, and to remain cautious and courageous.
