In Memoriam

The College Community has been saddened by the death of Mary Cisar, Associate Professor of Political Science. Dr. Cisar died Monday, December 6, of a cerebral hemorrhage.

One of the original members of the CSCSB teaching staff, Dr. Cisar joined the College in 1965 as an assistant professor. During her six years at the College she was active in all aspects of College life, including Faculty Senate affairs, serving on many committees. In 1966-67 she was elected Secretary of the Faculty Senate and in 1970-71 elected chairman. Recently she was appointed to serve as chairman of the California State Colleges' Academic Senate committee on the Role of Women.

In addition to being highly respected in her professional activities, Dr. Cisar was warmly regarded personally by students and co-workers.

A Bible Memorial Service was conducted last Wednesday with Father Leo Petit, Newman Chaplain; Arthur E. Gonzalez, graduate student, and Kent M. Schofield, Associate Professor of History, giving eulogies. Funeral services were conducted yesterday morning.

A Mary Cisar Memorial Fund is being established in her honor. Contributions to the fund, which will provide help to students with financial need, can be made to Ward M. McAfee, Chairman, Social Sciences Division, or Doyle Stansel, Associate Dean, Placement and Financial Aid.

"Peace on Earth" is the theme of the College's annual Christmas concert to be presented next Sunday, December 12, at 8:15 p.m. in PS-10.

Arthur Wenk will direct the College Chorus, Choral Society and Madrigal Singers in the concert, which includes "Gloria" from the mass by John Taverner, a number of Christmas carols, several settings of a French carol and a Spanish villanesca, and Heinrich Schütz's motet, "Hodie Christus Natus Est."

Bach's "Christmas Oratorio," sung by the Choral Society, will be accompanied by flutes, oboes, English horns, strings and harpsichord.

Soloists in the program are Robert Hemstreet, Kyla DeRemer, Carol Wellington, Betty Jackson and Joseph Chouinard.

The concert is open to the College community and the public free of charge. A reception will be held immediately following the program in the PS-10 Foyer.

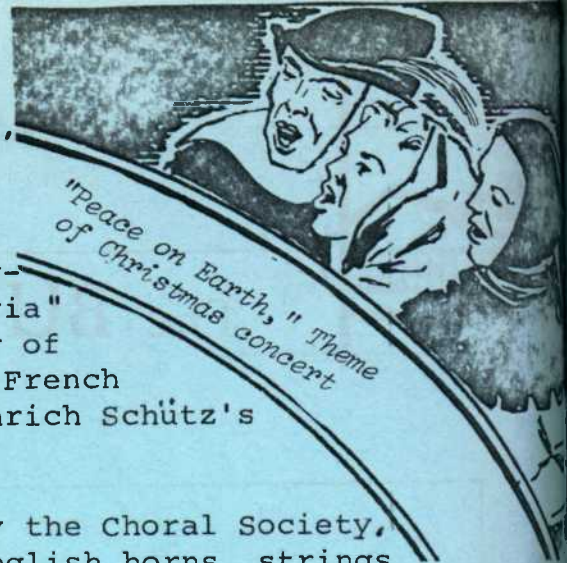
