RENAISSANCE PERIOD RELIVED IN MUSICAL/DINNER CELEBRATION

Music from the Renaissance period, plus an appropriately named menu, will be featured at the Renaissance Festival hosted by the

Chamber Singers Friday and Saturday, May 9-10. The gala event will begin at 6 p.m. each evening in the Commons. Reservations for the dinner/theatre celebration are required and those interested in attending are urged to call the music department immediately for an invitation, ext. 7454. Only 108 tickets are available for each evening. The cost is \$15 per person.

The program will feature the Chamber Singers, directed by Dr. Loren Filbeck, associate professor of music, and a Renaissance instrumental consort performing selected 16th century madrigals from England and Italy. The theme of the program is "Festivo Musica Transalpina," which translated means--music from across the Alps.

Before the program, the costumed Chamber Singers will greet their guests, serve a full-course meal and entertain with songs and dance of the period. A full-dressed roast pig will be paraded around the room before being served as a side dish with the meal.

FESTIVE ARRAY OF ACTIVITIES PLANNED FOR CINCO DE MAYO

Cinco de Mayo will be celebrated at Cal State Monday, May 5 with a festive array of outdoor activities, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the

Commons Patio. Performances by the Mariachi Cocula and Folklorico Lindo will be scheduled throughout the afternoon along with a special cake-cutting ceremony and pinata-breaking activity.

According to M.E.Ch.A. president, John Zaragoza, "For the first time, this year there will be a pinata for adults as well as one for children to break." From the festive costumes and decorations to activities with cascarones, this year's celebration will be steeped in tradition," he added.

Food and information booths will also add to the afternoon's diversions. Everyone is invited to attend at no charge.

OPEN HOUSE IS A SUCCESS

An estimated 2500 persons--visitors and college family--took part in the 15th Anniversary Open House last Sunday. The overcast, but warm day was ideal for the multitude of outdoor activities. Participation in some of the activities where a count was possible included: 5K Family Run for Fun, 150; alumni brunch, 135; art gallery show, 678; library exhibits and tours, 780; Computer Center, more than 600; barbecue, 310 served; School of Education open house, 225; children's art fair, estimated at 150 youngsters. Racquetball courts were busy all day and the pool accommodated 75 swimmers over a four-hour span.

AUTHORITY ON SYMBOLIST ART TO SPEAK AT CAL STATE

Tecture series will be given by Dr. Henri Dorra, professor of art history at the University of California, Santa Barbara, Monday, May 5. The talk will begin at 12 noon in the multipurpose room of the Student Union.

Considered a foremost authority on symbolist art, Dr. Dorra will speak on the topic "Redon and the Unconscious." Focusing on Odilon Redon, a central figure in the symbolist movement, Dr. Dorra will examine the artist and his work from a psychological point of view.

EMINENT FRENCH SCHOLAR TO SPEAK ON GEORGE SAND Georges Lubin, the eminent French scholar who has revived studies of George Sand, will speak here Tuesday, May 6 as part of an American tour. Titled

"George Sand: The Rights of Women and Politics," the talk will be given at 12 noon on the fifth floor of the Library. He will also host an informal conversation at 3 p.m. in Room 241 of the Library. George Sand was a 19th century French novelist who wrote about the suffering of women and defied convention by smoking cigars and wearing men's clothing.

EARLY CHRISTIANITY
TO BE EXAMINED BY
DISTINGUISHED PROF

"Orthodoxy and Heresy in Early Christianity" will be the subject of an evening lecture, Tuesday, May 6, given by Professor James Robinson, director of the Institute for Antiquity and Christianity at Claremont Graduate School.

Considered one of the world's leading authorities on gnosticism, the beliefs of a religious sect during the early days of Christianity, Robinson will begin his talk at 8 p.m. in the Recital Hall of the Creative Arts Building.

Robinson, who has published extensively in the field of gnosticism, will provide a general overview of the luxurious spiritual environment of early Christianity as a contrast to the man-on-the-street notion that early Christianity was simple and free from internal controversies. His central focus will be on gnosticism and the importance of the Nag Hammadi find.

AIR FORCE PRESENTS AWARD TO DEPARTMENT OF NURSING

An Air Force merit achievement award has been presented to the department of nursing in recognition of its accreditation from the National League of

Nursing. Capt. Linda Gonzales, Air Force nurse recruiter, presented a plaque to Dr. Mary G. Patterson, department chairman. Construction on the 3500-square-foot facility is due to start any day. Contractor for the \$170,500 project is K. L. Neff Construction Co. of Ontario, the builder of the Student Health Center. The Children's Center is funded jointly by the city and county of San Bernardino with federal community development funds. The center is expected to be ready for occupancy in the winter quarter 1981.
