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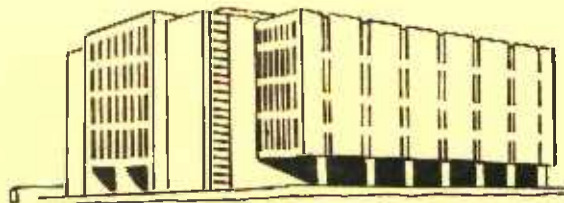

join the campus community in celebrating the inauguration of President Anthony H. Evans next Tuesday afternoon.

Chancellor W. Ann Reynolds will preside over the ceremony, which begins at 1:30 p.m. in the Gymnasium. Trustees attending will include Lynne Myers, vice chair of the board and chair of the Cal State presidential selection committee; Wallace Albertson, Blanche C. Bersch, Dr. Claudia H. Hampton and Dr. Robert K. Kully.

Past AS presidents who are representing their classes in the procession are: Richard J. Bennecke (Student Services), 1966-67; Barry B. Thompson, 1969-70; Judith A. Jones, 1974-75; Tim Hamre, 1980-81; Pauline Barbour, 1981-82; and Kathryn Fortner, 1979-80, who will be part of the platform party as president of the Alumni Association.

Five members of President Evans' family will be here for the occasion. They are his mother, Mrs. Thelma Romine and his brother, Jack Evans, from Piggott, Ark.; his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Don Crews from Houston, Tex.; and his brother, Dr. Robert C. Evans, from Baton Rouge, LA.

Caps and gowns for the inaugural have arrived in the Bookstore. Faculty, staff and students marching in the ceremony should be in full academic regalia and in the small gym by 1 p.m. for formation of the marching lines. The Music Department will present "Tubby the Tuba" as the final program of the Family Performance Series at 7:15 p.m., Friday, May 20 in the Recital Hall. George Kleinsinger's children's classic,

with words by Paul Tripp, focuses on the instruments of the orchestra, which in this production include strings, woodwinds, brass and percussion.

SUMMER STIPENDS AVAILABLE FOR GRANT PROPOSAL WORK

The Board of the college Foundation has made available funds to provide summer stipends to faculty who want to develop and write grant proposals. The purpose of the stipends is to provide faculty an

opportunity to seek external support for projects in their areas of interest, which may be research proposals in their disciplines or service proposals that would further the goals of the college.

The stipends may pay for limited time, travel, supplies and communications necessary to complete a proposal by the end of September. All full-time faculty, including lecturers, are eligible to apply. Priority will be given to those who have not received a grant in recent years and who have done some work in the project area. Past awards ranged from \$300 to \$800.

Applications must be submitted to the Grants Office, AD 186 or 189, by 4 p.m., Friday, May 20. Applications will be reviewed by a committee consisting of one faculty member from each school and Florence Weiser, grants coordinator. They will be forwarded to the Foundation Executive Committee for final approval. Awards will be announced about June 10. Additional information is available from Mrs. Weiser, Ext. 7517.

The CSU has initiated a computer reference service for faculty exchanges among the 19 campuses in the system. Dr. J. Cordell Robinson (Academic Affairs) is the coordinator here.

The Central CYBER Computer Reference Program is designed to facilitate intercampus exchanges by creating a centralized source for easy access of information on individuals and departments wishing to make exchanges.

SPECTRUM SERIES FEATURES SPEAKER ON COMPUTERS

Computer equipment adapted for the blind will be the topic for the Spectrum Lunch Series program at noon, Wednesday in the Multipurpose Room of the Student Union. Alan Crafton from Telesensory Systems, Inc., will demonstrate a system that permits spoken taped matter to be converted into Braille, a method of obtaining computer readouts in Braille and a system that transforms printed words into an alphabetic (not Braille) raised dot version. He will have films and schedule hands-on time for use of the equipment.

HOBBS' LEVIATHAN TOPIC OF LECTURE

Dr. Thomas S. Schrock, professor of political science at UC, Santa Barbara, will speak on "The Fate of Constitutionalism in Hobbes' Leviathan" at 3 p.m., Thursday in the Multipurpose Room of the Student Union. An expert in political philosophy and public law, Dr. Schrock currently is working on a book dealing with Hobbes' theory of punishment.
