## Affirmative Action Grant Recipients Announced

Twelve faculty members have been awarded Affirmative Action Grants for use during the winter and spring 1985 terms. The funds allocated in the program total \$13,183.50 and include \$11,784 for ad-

signed time reimbursement, \$1,199.50 for operating expenses, and \$200 for travel.

Dr. J. C. Robinson, associate vice president for academic personnel, said the purpose of the program is to assist faculty who have demonstrated the potential for successful academic careers in meeting qualifications for retention, tenure or promotion, and to enhance the possibility of career advancement. The awards may be used to meet one or more of the following objectives: to prepare to teach a greater variety of courses; to complete publication of instructional studies or research already underway; to undertake research and publication projects; and to aid in the completion of a terminal degree.

Dr. Margaret Atwell (Education) was awarded \$1,964 in release time and \$133.80 in operating expenses to examine the basal reading instruction of exemplary teachers.

Dr. Louise Burton (Education), awarded \$982 in release time, will analyze data and develop a publication-ready manuscript for submission to the Journal of Career Development for Exceptional Children.

Dr. Joan Hallett (Mathematics) was awarded \$170 in operating expenses to enroll in a statistics class at University of California, Riverside in the spring quarter.

Dr. Mildred Henry (Education) received \$182 in operating expenses to study the needs of minority re-entry females at Cal State by describing their characteristics, perceptions, utilization of institutional services, and assess the factors that may impact the attrition rate of these students.

Dr. Janet Kottke (Psychology) received \$1,964 in release time and \$200 in operating expenses to explore further work begun in her doctoral dissertation on the perceived reasons for the differential pay of women and men.

Kathleen Lewicki (Theatre Arts) was awarded \$213.70 in operating expenses to complete four text portions of Making Theatre Easy, A(n) (Elementary) Classroom Production Guide, a reference for performance-oriented productions in elementary schools.

Dr. Phyllis Maxey (Education) received \$100 in travel to study the effects of stress within school culture and to discover strategies used by teachers to cope with the public's negative image of public schools.

Dr. Behrouz Moti (Computer Science) was awarded \$982 in release time to produce and publish a book on C-Language.

Dr. Kathy O'Brien (Education) was awarded \$1,964 in release time and \$100 in travel to compare the psycholinguistic development of spelling strategies for children whose native language is Navaho with the stages previously hypothesized for speakers of standard English dialect.

## Trustees Study Tougher Admission Requirements

The CSU has signalled its intent to require a comprehensive pattern of college preparatory subjects from incoming freshmen no later than 1990.

Wide consultation is to take place with high schools and other groups before final adoption of the new standards by the Board of Trustees, within two years. The proposed pattern, one of the items on last week's Trustees' agenda, includes:

- \* 4 years of English (now required);
- \* 3 years of math (an increase of one year);
- \* 3 years of social studies;
- \* 2 years of science, one with lab;
- \* 2 years of foreign language;
- \* 1 year of visual or performing arts; and
- \* 1 year of college preparatory electives.

The proposed standards for first-time freshmen would bring the CSU more in line with requirements of the UC system. In the past the CSU set forth "recommended" preparatory courses but requirements were not introduced until the fall of 1984.

Acting Vice President Ward McAfee will spearhead the efforts by this campus to confer with other educational systems and to study the impact of stiffer requirements on minority or disadvantaged students.

The trustees also requested a proposal to modify admissions requirements for undergraduate transfers.

Other actions by the trustees at their November meeting included:

- \* Increased allowances for travel expenses and reimbursable rates for housing and lodging; for employees covered by collective bargaining, the CSU is conferring with the exclusive representatives over implementation of the changes.
- \* Approved funds for an average salary increase of approximately 7 percent for executive employees (campus presidents and senior administrators in the Chancellor's Office), retroactive to July 1; increased hospitality allowances for presidents in recognition of increases in cost of living in California.
- \* Designated a faculty position, the Trustee Professor, to be occupied by a tenured former president, chancellor or vice chancellor; position to be funded by Chancellor's Office.
- \* Accepted the Trustees' Audit Staff reports and replies on hazardous materials management at seven campuses including San Bernardino.
- \* Established an ad hoc committee to examine the Board meeting process, to study scheduling, timing and effectiveness.
- \* Approved schematic plans for a faculty office building on the San Bernardino campus and construction on seven other campuses; approved architects and changes in master plans for other campuses.

## Trustee Kully To Visit Campus Tuesday

Dr. Robert D. Kully, a member of the CSU Board of Trustees, will visit the campus Tuesday, Dec. 4 to address the Faculty Senate and speak with other campus groups.

Trustee Kully will meet with President Evans at 10:45 a.m. followed by an 11 a.m. meeting with the Administrative Council. At noon he will have lunch with President Evans, Vice President McAfee, the school deans and the dean of extended education in the new dining room in the Lower Commons. At 1:30 p.m. Trustee Kully will meet with AS Board of Directors in the Student Union Senate Chambers; meet with faculty in the Department of Communication at 2 p.m. in Creative Arts Room 186; and address the Faculty Senate in the Lower Commons at 3 p.m. His visit will conclude with a wine and cheese reception at 5 p.m. in the Lower Commons.

All faculty and staff are invited to the wine and cheese reception at the conclusion of the Faculty Senate meeting at 5 p.m. in the Lower Commons. If you plan to attend the reception, a reservation should be made by calling the Executive Dean's office, Ext. 7413.

Trustee Kully, a professor of speech communications at California State University, Los Angeles, since 1965, received his B.A. degree in 1950 from Hastings College in Nebraska, earned an M.A. in 1954 from the University of Oregon, and completed a Ph.D. in 1956 at the University of Illinois.

Dr. Kully, the first faculty member appointed to the CSU Board of Trustees, has served on more than 100 state, CSU systemwide and local committees concerning higher education.

## Campus Sets Finals, Holiday Schedules

Campus facilities will operate under special hours during finals week and the quarter break. The Commons will close after dinner Thursday, Dec. 6 and reopen for dinner, Wednesday, Jan. 2.

The entire campus will be closed Dec. 20-25 and Jan. 1 for the holidays and to use holiday time not taken earlier.

For finals week, the Library will be open an extra hour in the evening, closing at 11 p.m. rather than 10 p.m. from Monday through Thursday, Dec. 3-6. Beginning Friday, Dec. 7, the Library will maintain normal campus office hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday and close on Saturdays and Sundays. The exception will be Saturday, Dec. 8, when the last finals are given, and the hours will be 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The Bookstore will be open Monday, Dec. 3 from 8:30 a.m. to 7 p.m.; Tuesday, Dec. 4 through Thursday, Dec. 6, 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m.; and Friday, Dec. 7 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Hours for the remainder of December will be 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The Physical Education Building will be open Monday, Dec. 3 through Thursday, Dec. 6 from 8 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. and activity areas 8:30 a.m. to 10 p.m.; from Friday, Dec. 7 through Wednesday, Dec. 19, the building is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and the activity areas from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekdays. From Wednesday, Dec. 26 through Saturday, Dec. 29 and also on Monday, Dec. 31, the building is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., with activity areas open from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Large and small gyms will be closed for maintenance starting Tuesday, Dec. 11.
