MID-FALL CEREMONY PLANNED

EXTENDED EDUCATION BUILDING NAMED FOR BENEFACTOR

The Yasuda Center for Extended Education is the official name for the new building that will house extension programs on the CSUSB campus, reflecting the university's partnership with the Yasuda Institute of Education which contributed nearly \$1 million toward the construction project.

The action, says Judith Rymer, vice president for university relations, recognizes the "enormous generosity and the

unique relationship that exists between our respective institutions."

Approval for naming the edifice after the Japanese institute was granted by the CSU Board of Trustees July 19. The 15,600-square-foot building will be completed later this month and grand opening celebrations are scheduled for the week of Oct. 22.

The one-story classroom and conference building will house extension classes

and programs, including classes for the American Culture and Language Program (ACLP), which facilitates the Study Abroad Yasuda Students (STAYS) program.

Five classrooms, a multipurpose room, a language lab, two computer labs with state-of-the-art computer equipment (Macintosh and IBM-compatible), a student lounge and a patio area are among the new building's features. The contractor is H.P. Construction of Riverside.

YOUNG NAMED ACE FELLOW

Clifford Young, public administration professor at Cal State, San Bernardino for the past six years, has been named an American Council on Education (ACE) fellow for the 1995-96 academic year. He will be serving his fellowship at Cal State, Fullerton, working as a special assistant to President Milt Gordon.

One of 33 fellows selected this year in a national competition, Young will be exposed to administrative duties that will expand his leadership skills. His service will build on experience he gained here as the chair of the Public Administration Department for two years.

His fellowship duties will include a review and report on institutional technology, which will make use of his expertise in the field of automation. In addition he will be involved in institutional development and special events. His work will involve travel 50 percent of the time.

Designed to prepare promising faculty and staff members for responsible administrative positions in higher education, the ACE fellowship program has seen one-fifth of its participants become chief executive officers and more than half go on to become vice presidents, provosts or deans.

In addition to this one-year assignment, Young, a resident of Corona, participated in the Harvard University's Management Development Program in June. This program was aimed at mid-level administrators whose responsibilities demanded increased knowledge and skills.

Of the fellowship opportunity, Young says, "This is something I've been looking forward to doing for a long period of time. President Gordon is a wonderful person" and caring leader, whose style will help Young learn more about academic administration.

MARIACHI, JAZZ BANDS WAIT IN WINGS

The Los Amigos Mariachi Band and jazz trumpeter Andy Cleaves are next in line to perform as Cal State's Summer Entertainment Series continues.

Los Amigos' Aug. 9 show is its first at Cal State but one of the group's many Southland appearances. The Orange and Pomona county fairs, Knott's Berry Farm and Disneyland have enjoyed the band, which also regularly plays mariachi festivals, weddings and other celebrations.

Leader Gabriel Zavala has been playing for 20 years. Instruments for his band include the traditional guitarron and the vihuela, a small, guitar-shaped percussion and rhythm instrument. The best of these musical tools, Zavala says, are crafted in Mexico by a man named Morales. He is to the guitarron and vihuela what Stradivari has been to the violin.

On Aug. 16 Andy Cleaves and Friends will supply some cool contemporary jazz. A jazz instructor at Cal State, Cleaves has performed with En Vogue, Stevie Wonder and Natalie Cole. He also performs regularly at area jazz hot spots, including Mario's Place in Riverside.

Cleaves went to Cal State, Northridge and has been leading CSUSB's jazz ensemble for several years.

BAND WOULDN'T STAND FOR WATERED-DOWN BLUES

WATER LINE BURST CANCELS CONCERT

For all fans knew it was singer Patty Warder's big blues voice that broke an air-conditioning water pipe as the group Faultline (or should it be Floodline?) wrapped up a number during a July 26 performance on the Lower Commons Plaza. Minutes after the line burst, organizers canceled the concert when they determined that water around the stage area could not be quickly removed and posed a safety hazard.

Hundreds of gallons of water spilled into the Commons Sycamore Room after a pipe underneath the floor burst, the water seeping through window seals and doors and damaging books used for a conference.

"It was up to about five inches in the room" before doors were opened, says Randy Harrell, associate vice president for Student Services and the Summer Entertainment Series' chief coordinator. Large

vacuums were brought in last week to clean up the water-soaked carpet in the Sycamore Room.

The band had stopped playing when one member saw that some music and sound equipment cables were sitting in puddles of water.

Harrell hopes to bring Faultline back next year as the group was only a few songs into its first set. The show was over by 8 p.m.

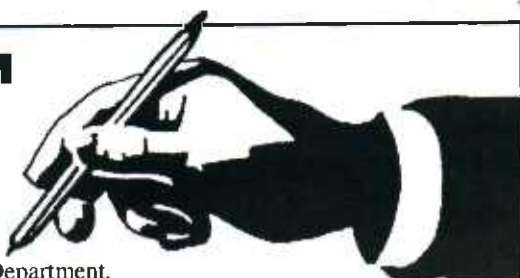
