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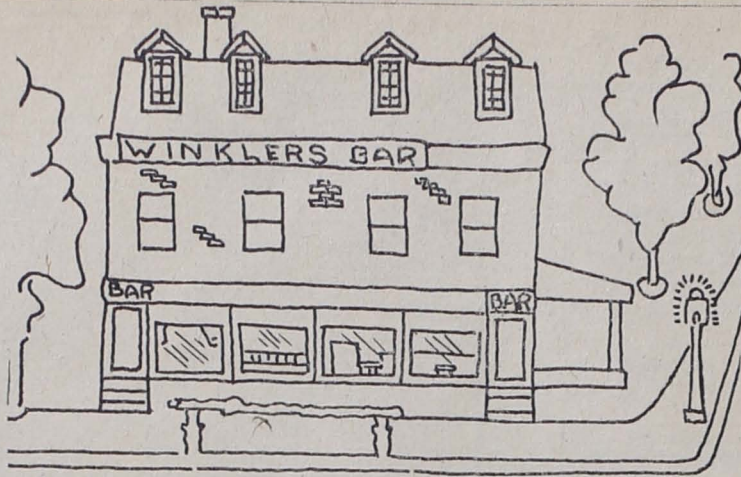
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Coed Choice for '46 (?) May Queen

Also since this is the Frank and Earnest issue, has Dwight been left to sing "Stardust" alone, Puddie?

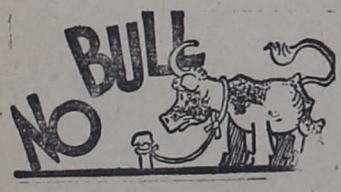
