# **Gemini House Provides Drug Rescue**

The staff at Gemini House is real, and they have all done drugs. The purpose of Gemini House now is to provide a rescue and information center.

Bob Walsh, director, explained the immediate and future goals of Gemini House Saturday. "Freak outs are unnecessary. Too much bad stuff, or being alone, can cause a bummer. The best thing to do if you do drop, is drop with a friend who is not high."

The drug resuce aspect is to "turn a bad trip into a good one." Someone having a bad trip can call in and be talked to, can be brought in, or we will go to them. "This is 24 hours a day seven days a week."

## Phase One

The drug rescue and information center are phase one of the project. Gemini House as such started September 1. Walsh has a bachelors in Sociology from the U. of I. He had been on the west coast looking at drug centers, but returned here and became active with the board of directors. At present there are six full time staff members.

Currently, Gemini House is not financed. Walsh said, "We are working on various sources for funds. Federal, state, and local sources are being canvassed. We are going to flood the place with letters asking for funds."

## Organization

Gemini House was being put on paper Saturday. Walsh explained that if everyone connected with the project should suddenly die, the concept and organization would still be there. "You must have the place on paper, but not so much as to lose informality. You have to sacrifice something when you organize this way, but it has to be or you would have well intentioned people not knowing what the hell was going on."

The second phase will hopefully begin May 1. It will include individual and family counseling, referrals from courts, and probationers.

Gemini will be "constantly revamping to care for the needs of the community." Walsh compared it to AA, which was started by citizens because they saw a need. In much the same way we have fulfilled a need."

## ".... youth project run by youth"

This is a youth project run by youth. It will have a flexible schedule. Walsh stated that he and the staff will canvass schools in the area to find what the students want and need. Gemini Foundation will lend its name to projects that a group may want to explore. It will not necessarily give financial assistance, but say, "We recognize this group."

#### **Community Support**

The community must get behind it and support it if it is to work. Much as the AA has the communitie's support, so too must Gemini. Along the support idea, the house is in need of a television and stereo; they don't have to be new, but in decent condition.

Adlai Stevenson III and Ralph Smith wound up their campaigns last week at Willard airport.

Smith said the Democratic machine in Chicago is "geared up for the usual vote frauds." He charged that a vote for Stevenson "is a vote against Nixon."

Ed Kucharski, travelling with Smith, said that the Republicans would carry Cook County.

Stevenson, coming in later than Smith, said he tried to talk the issue through the campaign and resort to insults. He denied that a vote for him is a vote against the President: "Not a rubber stamp or an obstructionist."

Stevenson, also made reference to the support Smith received from persons not from Illinois. "We don't need presidents, vice presidents, governors, or anyone else trying to tell the people how to vote." Stevenson had only had Muskie speak at a fund raising occasion.

Stevenson, Bakalis, and Dixon proved to be the winners as Tuesday ended. All won their contests with a good margin. It had been a bitter campaign, especially in the senate race. The question of "law and order" was constantly bombarding the voter.

Pictures of youths demonstrating, long haired persons calling the police "facists pigs" had been present in Smith's ads. It appears through Smith's ads that far left and far right were meeting.

Smith said he would change a lot in his campaign if he had it to do over, whereas Stevenson said he would not.


## **Tau Epsilon Is Here**

# **PROBLEMS OF OUR TIMES Race-The Human Absurdity**

Race is by far one of the most controversial issues of our times. I feel also, that it is probably one of the most ridiculous. This is so because almost every issue involving race is in essence a contest of biases and petty prejudices. Granted, many are the result of deep seated feelings. but this makes them none the less absurd.

There is only one way that we will ever solve our problems in this area, and this is to be completely objective in our judgment. Objectivity is an almost unsurmountable obstacle and can only be attained by full use of reason and logic. To use full reason and logic one must be aware of the facts: the true facts and not what one wishes to be the facts

There are, generally speaking, two categories into which the subject of race can fall, scientific and social. In order to deal with the social aspect we must first sort out the scientific.

## Physical Characteristics

We cannot deny the obvious, there are definite physical differences between the races of man. Because our race relations are most strained between black and white peoples in this country, I shall deal only with these. The Negro has a slightly narrower, longer, and shorter head. He also has a smaller braincase (Brain size has no necessary connection with intelligence). The Caucasian has a narrower gap between his eyes, and a higher hairline on the forehead. The Negro has a

broader nose with a lower bridge, a more jutting jaw, and thicker lips. The Caucasian has longer external ears and a longer torso (about 11/4 inches, ). The Negro has a shallower chest, a smaller and narrower pelvis, and longer legs He also has smaller stature with greater weight. He has characteristically darker skin and more frizzy hair. In addition he has more sweat glands, and slightly larger teeth. As for skin color science does not know enough about human biochemistry to fully understand the most important reasons for differences in human skin color. It might be noted here also that "The differences between races are of the same kind as the differences between groups of people within races." (Dr. Paul A. Moody, "Genetics of Man")

Just as there are differences between our two races, so are there similarities. First of all there is no difference in intellectual potential (this is a factor of environment). The brain of both races looks the same, and skull growth is similar. The Negro head appears to some people to be drooping, however, it is not and appears that way because of the The Negro hand is not Jaw. larger, but the fingers are generally longer than a Caucasians. The Negro's eyes are the same but have the larger appearance because of their less angular orbit. Finally, the Negro penis is not generally larger. This particular story is nearly 200 years old, dating from that pioneer antropologist Blumenback, who saw 'an Oetheopian

with a remarkable genitory apparatus.' Whereas, he, the scientist, only wondered whether this perogative was 'constant and peculiar with the nation,' many others for reasons of their own have assumed it to be the case. .It is not." (Anthony Smith. "The Body").

## Intelligence

The intellectual differences within any race are far greater than any differences between races. I stated earlier that there are no differences in intellectual potential and that this is a factor of environment. Any average differences that may be found tend to be small and of no significance. The important thing here is the application of intelligence factors in education and social standing. Any programs for education, or environmental improvement should, where they do not now, consider individuals without regard to race. The final outcome is that racial intelligence differences are due to environment and not to mental ability on the part of any race; it is strictly an individual characteristic.

## **Race Mixture**

The concept of 'pure races' has long been a strong racist assertion. The concept of 'pure race' is a myth conceived in a fuzzy mind. There has been racial diversity and mixing in existence since man became man. Race mixture has always been a characteristic of mankind. Biologically, it is normal and hybrids are normal and healthy. Actually, they tend to be sturdier. I might dispell another myth here also. There are no disharmonies

between the female pelvis outlet and the baby's head in mulatto births as is often believed

Race mixture is not a biological problem but strictly a social delemna. I do not consider it too optimistic to feature a future where race mixture is normal and matter-of-fact, after elimination of prejudices on the part of all concerned. I might also say here that I am personally in favor of miscegenation (interbreeding of races) as a definite possibility. I have seen only one reporting that indicated a disasterous result from race mixing. This book was "The Biology of the Race Problem", by Dr. Wesley Critz George. The significance of this work seems diminished when 1 contemplate the fact that it was commissioned by Governor George C. Wallace of Alabama. This fact has definite undesirable indications to me.

## Identity vs Equality

I have suggested by this heading that equality and identity are two different things. This fact disturbs many people and causes them to ignore differences in their devotion to bringing about racial harmony. All the matters I have introduced here shows one thing; race formation in man is no different than race formation in any other species. Movement of peoples and natural selection cause differences. However, these differences have nothing whatever to do with equality. This is a strict ethical concept and not a scientific one. Our Constitution reads that "All men are created equal", it does not say that they are identical. "Simply stated, equality means equal status before the law and equal status in human social relations in spite of genetic difference." ("Animal Species and Evolution" by Dr. E. Mayer. This means only one thing, skin color and all manner of other racial differences are immaterial in social and legal relationships. (Cont next issue)

As more stories about drugs and drug abuse come into the spotlight, the need for rehabilitation centers becomes greater. These drug centers can be an invaluable asset. Such is Gemini House.

I was at Gemini House last week, and talked with the staff members. I was tremendously impressed with the sincerity and dedication these people showed.

The Gemini program is headed up by Bob Walsh, with other staff members being Mark Smith, Pete Visel, Charles Burtis, Roy Grossman, and Wayne Carter.

Mark Smith, with whom I talked extensively, believes that most drug users will, sooner or later, tire of drugs as he did. "I quit," said Smith, "because I saw what drugs were doing to me. I said, wow, what a drag. I was getting wrapped up with myself and my own bag, and I wasnt' relating to other people. I was a real speed freak when I was about fifteen. When I came to Champaign, I started dealing. I mean I was really dealing big. I quit dealing because it was a big paranoia trip,' Many times drugs and drug centers can be touchy subjects. The people at Gemini have overcome their anxieties and have recognized a need, and a job to be done. That job is helping people in need. How do people get involved in drug centers? Smith got into it like this: "I worked at a medical tent at Woodstock. While I was there I learned a lot about treat-

ment. I kind of used Champaign as a base while traveling this summer. When I read that Gemini House was really happening, I said wow, they can use me. I was experienced at drug resuce by now, and I really got into it here

Gemini House has had some problems getting off the ground. One of the reasons is that they have no funds and not much support. They are beginning to get more moral support, but still not much financially

Smith said that in the beginning they were very unorganized and most of their time was wasted "We had very few ideas and a hell of a lot of potential, but no organization and no knowledge of how to channel our energy. We're moving faster now, and getting things done. This drug center is very unique. The only other one like it is the Aquarium Center in California.'

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

## Winter Transfer I.S.U. - Normal

Illinois State's enrollment increased by 2,800 which was about 600 over the projected enrollment; consequently, ISU is in hopes of cutting back its enrollment. The quota for this January for transfers with fewer than 60 credit hours has already been filled. There are, however, openings for transfers with over 60 hours. The university has limited acceptance of applications for admissions from transfer students with fewer than 60 credit hours. Up to now, there has been no minimum hour requirements for qualifed transfer students.





 $\label{eq:controlled} Athletic departments in Jr. Colleges throughout the country are controlled by regulations which limit recruiting of possible Athletes.$ 




Track practice begins December 1st in the Armory. Nine people have been working out and at least ten more are expected. If interested contact Coach Ron Butler in the Armory.



## The Abortion Procedure

## EDITOR'S NOTE:

We received this as a letter to the editor, but didn't have room to print it as such, because it is news, and could possible help someone, we feel obligated to print it.

We thought it would give you much relief to know more about the abortion procedure. We use the vacuum-aspiration method, and this method is the most advanced and really very simple, safe and painless.

First, the doctor's assistant will spend the first five to ten minutes in the office informally talking with the patient. Then the assistant will review the completed questionnaire determine the probable length of the pregnancy and any medical precautions that need to be taken. Next, the assistant will explain the entire procedure step-by-step to the patient. This understanding will remove any fears or doubts patient has about the the procedure, because she will see exactly how simple, safe and painless the vacuum-aspiration method of abortion is. While waiting for the doctor, the patient and the assistant will continue conversing. The assistant has been carefully trained to be sure to handle this conversation so the patient leaves here in excellent psychological condition.

Then the doctor will review her case and explain what he will do. He will examine her to be sure the length of her pregnancy. She will then be given a local anesthetic. When the doctor performs the abortion, the only discomfort the patient may experience is about one minute of menstrual cramps, but due to our methods, over onehalf of all our patients experience no discomfort whatsoever.

Most patients can walk right out after the abortion, though some may feel a little dizzy or drunk due to the anesthetic shot. A few patients feel a little tired after the abortion -especially if they have travelled far to get here or if they have not been sleepingwell for the last night or two due to worry. These sleepy patients we put in the recovery room for ten to thirty minutes afterwards. If your friend or relative goes to the recovery room we'll bring you there to sit and talk with her.

In any case, we will return her to you smiling, healthy, and much relieved, though slightly tired. She probably will be hungry and thirsty and will want to go to eat immediately.

You can help by carefully reading her "Instructions" sheet during the first few hours afterwards, and, by feeding her. While waiting in our lounge, please make yourself at home. Please do not hesitate to give us suggestions that you think will improve our services.


