Grading System Has N's and I's

In an interview Monday with counselor Stephen Fischer, a new grading system was explained. The major changes are an N and W grade.

An N signifies insufficient or non attendance. This is designed to help the student who for one reason or another does not attend class, or is not aware that to officially withdraw means to notify the Registrar.

The other major change is the W grade. With it a student may withdraw from a class up to the last day preceding finals. This letter is used also if a student wishes to audit a course. Mr. Fischer noted that at other schools "If you are doing well in an audited course you cannot usually change to take the course for credit. With this system, however, you need not take an audit grade right away but wait and see how you do and then decide."

An incomplete, I, has to be made up now in seven weeks instead of the entire quarter. This was done because students were running into final exams with other courses and finding it hard to make up an I. The I no longer counts against you when computing your GPA.

The idea of looking into grading procedures was first inaugurated about one year ago at the suggestion of the

administration. Under the direction of Mr. Fischer, ten faculty and two students studied the problem. The committee met about once per week at the outset and examined the grading system of Parkland and other schools around the state. Their recommendations were then sent to the faculty, administration, and then the board to be acted upon. The board approved the changes this past summer.

The Pass-Fail grading was not in the recommendations because of not knowing how other schools would count it. The Pass-Fail option is now being tried at the U. of I. It is also used at the University of Kentucky where this reporter went last year. It was also not accepted because of possible conflicts with scholarships, Social Security, G. I. Bill, etc.

This grading system according to Mr. Fischer, is better than last years. It is fairer to the student. He receives an N instead of an F, because he didn't know the procedure for dropping a course. The only problem with an N is that S.I.U. counts it as an F. "The system should be re-examined in about a year to see if it is working", Mr. Fischer stated.

Mr. Fischer also said that the student body president had a hard time finding interested students to sit on the committee.

New Policies Started For Parkland College

Parkland's Dean of Student, Gary James, has been here since last December. In an interview with him last week, we talked about some of the changes that have been made already, and some things to come.

One of the changes concerns the Ethics Committee. Their job is to hear and act upon complaints of the students. James said, "The Ethics Committee provides an avenue for grievances of the students."

A major change is in the residency policies. Adult students (including the spouse of a college or university student) who are otherwise not entitled to classification as "residents" of the District, may establish a claim to "resident" by presenting evidence that he (or she) has resided continuously within the District for a period of

at least 12 months subsequent to marriage.

This change enables people who could not attend Parkland before now to get a college education. The entire residency policy form is available in the Dean of Student's office.

Resident Classification

Changes in personnel have considerably helped several department. Kenneth Gunji has been appointed as Coordinator of Financial Aids and Placement. Gunji's appointment has taken a burden off of the Office of Student Activities.

Three new counselors have been added, making a total of eight. The new counselors are Mrs. Virlyn Leitner, Dr. Rose Marie Gray, and James Lyles. Timothy Neher has also been hired as Assistant to the Dean of Students.

James said that several policy changes are in the making. "We are in the process of revising scheduling to enable students to select time blocks." This will help those students who work part time. Instead of having to wait until registration to know his schedule, he will know when he pre-registers.

Last year attendance at graduation exercises was mandatory. This year attendance at the Commencement program is voluntary, but all students in attendance will be required to wear academic costume.

Apathy has been and is a big problem at PC. James said that the reason students don't get involved is because "they are still tied to their home community."

James also said that if "we meet the needs of 125 people, the Student Activities program is a

something that everyone is involved in, like it or not, in one way or another. It is something in which there can be no fence sitting; either you are doing something about the situation or you are part of the dilemma. My guess is that about 90% of us at Parkland are part of the problem, regardless of what we say. Take a good critical look at yourself, if you have that ability, and ask yourself what you are doing about the environment. Take a look at Parkland too, a lot of people are doing a lot of talking, but little else is being

A critical evalu essarily brings us back to the moral problem. This has always been an elusive subject. People do not wish to judge their own morals, but they have quite a time wih the morals of others. Before we can evaluate these morals we must first know what they are. Morals are far more than spiritual guidelines, they are the basic values by which we live. On the whole our society must have rather barbaric and perverse morals. I say this because of the results obvious to us all. Would reasonable and intelligent moral beings have created air pollution, water pollution, or over population? I rather think not.

- 4) We do not have the honesty to recognize the problems that exist, nor the potential disaster that is apparent in them. We are

- 6) We do not possess the productiveness to make the change required. When we realize exactly what it will mean in terms of personal sacrifice, we will be too morally weak. to produce. We are all words and no
- 7) Finally, we do not have enough pride in ourselves to prove that I am wrong, nor enough pride to make the changes needed.

Now, I imagine many of you already have pen in hand to answer my accusations. Good, prove me right immediately by jumping on the defensive and admitting your moral weakness. Only action, honest action, can prove me wrong, not words. I sincerely hope each of you can prove me wrong, but I seriously

Student Conduct Rules

The following actions or acti-vities will result in immediate expulsion from Parkland College or other disciplinary action:

- 1. Unethical conduct during examinations in preparation of assignments designated by the instructor.
- 2. Falsification of any official records required of the student by the College.
- 3. Possession or use of alcoholic beverages of College property, at any Collegesponsored event, or appear ance on campus while under the influence of alcohol.
- 4. Reckless driving and unauthorized parking of student cars on College property.
- 5. Engaging, while on College property, in initiation practices or organizations not officially recognized by the college and which obviously call attention to the initiates or members of the organization.
- Participation in the name of the College in non-sanctioned activities off campus
- Violating while on College facilities, municipal, county, state, or federal laws, stator ordinances. Such violations are also subject to referral to civil authorities for investigation and action.
- 8. Threatening, attempting, or committing physical violence against any person.
- 9. Preventing or attempting to prevent any student from attending class or any other College activities.
- 10. Preventing or attempting to prevent any person or any visitor to or guest of the College, on or off College facilities, from lawfully entering, leaving, or using any College facility
- 11. Preventing or attempting to prevent any members of the College community from carrying on any lawful business or purpose he may have while on College facilities.
- 12. Blocking pedestrian or ve vehicular traffic.



Mr. Bibee is well remembered for his recent direction of THE DEATH AND LIFE OF SNEAKY FITCH at the Studio Theatre.




Mr. Brady has recently appeared in PHILADELPHIA, HERE I COME and OUR TOWN.






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Cheerleading Tryouts

All girls interested in trying out for the cheerleading squad should meet in the Champaign armory on Sept. 29 at 1:00. There the girls will be briefed and given a copy of the cheerleading constitution. There will be three weeks of practice in the tryout clinics on Tues, and Thurs, at college hour. Some past cheerleaders will work with the new girls at this time. To be eligible to tryout all girls must attend four out of six practices.

All girls must have had a "C" average the previous quarter and

must maintain a "C" average while cheering. If a girl's grades fall below the "C" mark the first alternate will take her place.

Five cheerleaders and two alternates will be chosen by a board of six faculty members and six students. All cheerleaders will attend all home games plus five away games. No one may sign up for cheerleading later than October 7. Anyone signing up at that time must attend all remaining practices to be eligible for tryouts.

Linksmen Open Fall Season






Intramurals Start






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
