Medicine at National and International Forums

AKUPI NCD Symposium





The global crisis of non-communicable diseases (NCDs) is extraordinary; in low-middle income countries (LMIC) more than three-quarters and around 82% of premature NCD-related deaths occur. According to the WHO, in Pakistan, NCDs are the top 10 causes of morbidity and mortality and are not equipped to manage this epidemic. In most LMICs, locally relevant and high-quality data on NCDs are inadequate, which is a cause of a critical gap in the response to the NCD epidemic. To overcome the gaps, an understanding of the prevalence, and risk factors, and the development and testing of safe, effective, and low-cost solutions are required through trained researchers in this area. With the aim to address this dearth and directly increase Pakistan's research capacity, the AKUPI-NCDs Research Training Program was launched in late 2021. In December 2022, the AKUPI NCD Research symposium: the landscape of research in Pakistan was organized by the Department of Medicine supported by the Fogarty International Center, National Institutes of Health, and the USA. Experts from AKU, Dr. Zainab Samad, Chair & Professor Department of Medicine, Aga Khan University, declared the conference opening along with welcome remarks by Dr. Adil Haider, Dean Medical College, Aga Khan University.

Dr. Zia ul Haq, Vice Chancellor of Khyber Medical University Peshawar provided the Chief Guest. The event highlighted national & international field experts as speakers & panelists, who encouraged dialogues for the promotion of a conducive atmosphere for NCDs research in the country. To prioritize NCDs research, efforts should be made for the formation of collaborative research networking at local, national & international levels. Symposium participants also included Dr. Gerald Bloomfield, Associate Professor of Medicine & Global Health, at Global Health Institute, Duke University, USA, who shared his experience of NCDs research methodology. Dr. Bashir Hanif, Executive & Medical Director, Tabba Heart Institute, Karachi gave a brief intro on the PAK-SEHAT study; Ms. Mishalle Afzal, Gallup Pakistan, Islamabad shared insights on NCDs from Gallup surveys. Cardiovascular disease & the Health Insurance program was discussed by Dr. Khalid Rehman, Assistant Professor of Public Health, at Khyber Medical University, Peshawar. Dr. Faisal Khan from Precision Medical Lab, National Center for Big Data & Cloud Computing, CECOS & RMI, Swat & Peshawar led a session on oral cancer and multiomes. Diabetes & Mental Health as NCD in Pakistan was discussed by Dr. Zohaib Khan Director-office of research innovation & commercialization, Khyber Medical University, Peshawar & Dr. Saima Aleem, Institute of Public Health & Social Sciences, Khyber Medical University, Peshawar. Panel discussions on

Climate Change and NCDs and the Role of media in NCD awareness were led by Dr Sameen Siddiqui and Dr Ayeesha Kamal and included distinguished panelists such as Professors Abdul Hakeem, Sabha Bhatti, Mr Bilal Gilani and Ms Zofeen Ebrahim. Dr Wasay led a panel discussion on barriers & facilitators to research funding in LMICs and panelists included Professor Salim Virani and Major General Aamir Ikram. The symposium ended with poster award distribution along with concluding remarks by Dr. Aysha Almas, Associate Professor, Medicine, at Aga Khan University.



AKUPI NCD symposium ended with Gala Dinner and a networking event. Guests were offered cultural Sindhi Ajrak and cap. A fun networking activity was conducted by Barbara Dcruz and staff colleagues. All the members present enjoyed the Live music and scrumptious dinner.

The year 2022 ended with appreciation and gratitude. One of these events was organized by the Neurology section. Faculty members, residents




and staff were present to mark the occasion. It was well attended and an enjoyable evening highlighted by the musically inclined and vocally gifted Neurology faculty.


