FOREWORD

It is an honor to introduce Volume 11 Issue 1 of the *Journal of Race*, *Gender*, *and Ethnicity*. This volume devotes its discussion to reparations for historical injustices and how the impact of these injustices of the past remain evident in the inequities of the present.

The United States government and governments around the world are struggling with the question of how to address past harms. Many of the Essays and Notes in this issue were presented during the 2021 JRGE four-part Symposium titled, *Redressing Legacies of Injustice: From Slavery, Empire, and Beyond – Reparations and Restorative Justice.* The first panel of the Symposium set the foundation to create a vision of reparations and identify the actors responsible for repairing collective harms imposed on various groups. The second panel discussed historic state-based harms in the international context and the indispensable impact of restorative justice. The third panel explored the role that governmental actors played in constructing official accounts of the past that attempted to bury the existence of harms, disregard their impact, or diminish their scope. Finally, the fourth panel discussed what the United States would look like should a reparations framework be incorporated into its domestic policy.
