AUTHORS OF ARTICLES IN THIS ISSUE

HOWARD C. GREER, author of "Differences in cost as a basis for price differentials," is professor of accounting at the University of Chicago and, since 1927, has been associated with the Institute of American Meat Packers as director of accounting. He is a graduate of Northwestern University. A certified public accountant under the laws of Illinois and Ohio, Mr. Greer was once associated with Arthur Young & Company, and later engaged in public practice at Columbus, Ohio. He was for a time professor of accounting and director of the bureau of business research at Ohio State University. Mr. Greer has served as president of the American Association of University Instructors in Accounting and, recently, as vice-president of the American Accounting Association. He is the author of many books and pamphlets dealing with accounting principles and accounting procedure in different industries.

HENRY H. HEIMANN, author of "Will we ever learn?" has been executive manager and secretary-treasurer of the National Association of Credit Men since 1931. Prior to that time he was associated with the Kawneer Company, of Niles, Michigan, as auditor, treasurer and vice-president, successively. Mr. Heimann served as vice-chairman of the Industrial Advisory Board to the N.R.A. in 1933, and as director of the United States Shipping Board Bureau in 1934. He is a member of the Business Advisory Council to the Department of Commerce. A graduate of St. Louis University, Mr. Heimann holds the B.S. and L.L.B. degrees, and is a member of the American Bar Association. His contributions to various national magazines are widely read.

CHARLES C. KIMBALL, author of "Accountants' reports from a banker's viewpoint," is assistant vice-president (in the credit department) of the Merchants National Bank, Boston. He is an active member of the Robert Morris Associates, and as such, has devoted much time to consideration of the problems which affect both bankers and public accountants. Mr. Kimball served as president of the New England chapter of the Robert Morris Associates in the year 1931–1932. He has also served on a number of technical committees of the Robert Morris Associates.

ROBERT H. MONTGOMERY, author of "The curse of balancing, or Theory v. practice," is president of the American Institute of Accountants and a partner of Lybrand, Ross Bros. & Montgomery, and is well known to American accountants. Colonel Montgomery was professor of accounting at Columbia University from 1919 to 1931, and served as a member of the administrative board of the school of business of the university. He was formerly president of the New York State Society of Certified Public Accountants, and was chairman of the International Congress on Accounting, held at New York in 1929. He is the author of many books on accounting and taxation.
