I am pleased to send greetings to the members of the Abraham Lincoln Association and to all those who are gathered for this special conference on the Life, Times, and Legacy of one of our Nation's greatest Presidents. Congratulations to your hosts at Southern University and Louisiana State University in Shreveport.

President Lincoln was a strong, courageous leader whose words still inspire us today, and I share your appreciation of his critical role in our Nation's history. When civil war threatened to destroy this great experiment in self-government, Abraham Lincoln preserved the Union while restoring her soul. His commitment to the vision of our Founders, his moral conviction in the face of bitter, divisive debate over slavery, and his faith in both the providence of Almighty God and the future of the American people — all have made President Lincoln a national hero and a model for his successors. I am proud to have his official portrait hanging in the Cabinet Room as a tangible reminder of his wisdom and example.
