Nip Ashenfelter Wins Thrilling Olympic Steeplechase; Friends Plan Reception

Horace Beats Russian Rival in 3000 Meter Obstacle Race

Fleet-footed Horace Ashenfelter II, son of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Ashenfelter Sr., of Arcola, a product of Collegeville-Trappe high school, brought honor to the community this week when he ran off with first honors at the Olympic Games at Helsinki, Finland, in the 3,000-meter steeplechase run.

The Collegeville-Arcola youth, now an FBI man at Boston, started running while at Pennsylvania State College, where he captained the cross-country squad. Since graduation he has continued his running career.

His wife, the former Miss Lillian Wright, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alan T. Wright, of Orchard Farms, Collegeville R.D., is staying with her children at the elder Ashenfelter farm at Arcola until her husband returns from overseas in a few days.

He became the first American to win the Olympic 3,000 meter steeplechase as he broke the record for the second time in a week.

Ashenfelter's time was 8:45.3, the fastest time this event ever has been run in track history. There is no official world record for the steeplechase because courses vary.

Vladimir Katantsev of Russia was second and John Disley of Great Britain was third.

Ashenfelter won when he successfully negotiated the water jump about 150 meters from the finish and Katantsev faltered there. It had been a shoulder-to-shoulder duel all the way but the Russian forged ahead a yard on the backstretch of the last lap.

The crowd of 70,000 regarded Ashenfelter's victory the biggest upset of the record-shattering meet.

Mrs. Ashenfelter, in their home near Collegeville received the news with the comment that she should take off but she had to get dinner.

Happy that her oldest son won, she is now wondering about the second member of the family to run in the Olympic event, Bill. Mrs. Ashenfelter, expressing her joy in the victory, said she was worried when he broke the Olympic record earlier in the week for fear he would overwork himself before the final performance.

The old Olympic steeplechase record was nine minutes, 3.8 seconds, set by Volmari Iso-Hollo of Finland in 1936.

Ashenfelter lowered this record to 8:51 in winning his qualifying heat last Wednesday. Katantsev also bettered the old Olympic record in the trials.

The best listed non-Olympic record is 8:49.8, made by Katantsev in Moscow in 1951.

Katantsev was timed in 8:51.6 in finishing second and Disley ran it in 8:51.8.

This was the 12th gold medal the American track and field team has won in these games.

Ashenfelter, a consistent winner in longer races in the United States, never before had shown anything that would rank him with the great Europeans in the steeplechase obstacle race.

Gala Home-Coming Celebration Tentatively Set for Aug. 9

An informal reception and parade in honor of Horace "Nip" Ashenfelter, returning local winner in the Olympic games at Helsinki, Finland, are being planned by representatives of a large number of local organizations. The tentative date for the affair is Saturday afternoon, August 9.

A preliminary meeting of representatives was held on Tuesday night at the Collegeville fire hall with about 25 persons present.

Because of an uncertainty over the time that the 3,000 meter steeplechase winner will return to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Horace Ashenfelter Sr., only a tentative date was set on Tuesday night pending confirmation of the appointment.

The parade will form in Trappe and come down the Main st. of both Trappe and Collegeville and then proceed to the Ursinus College grounds where a reception will be held in the gymnasium of the college.

Burgesses Merri C. Mollier and Kenneth B. Nace, representing Trappe and Collegeville, are the honorary parade marshals. They will be assisted by Collegeville police chief George H. Moyer and Trappe chief William Sprouse.

Some prominent local person will be called upon to make a presentation speech when the cavalcade reaches the Ursinus gymnasium. If present plans prevail a purse will be given to Ashenfelter.

Corporal John Culp of the Jeffersonville police barracks will assist with the traffic problem.

Arrangements will be made with the fire police of both the Collegeville and Trappe companies to act in aiding with traffic and parking problems.

Refreshments will be served by a number of women in the community representing half a dozen auxiliary organizations.

Local persons are asked to decorate their homes on the day of the parade with flags and banners and other material appropriate for a returning victorious athlete.

A number of fire companies, bands and other organizations will be invited to take part in the parade through Main st. and a sound truck may be secured to tell news of the affair before the event and to take part in the parade.

If possible, the Collegeville-Trappe high school band will be activated and will take part in the ceremonies.

All local organizations are invited to send representatives to the meeting to make final plans next Tuesday night.

Several representatives of the group on Tuesday night were appointed to promote an Ashenfelter tag day to be held some time before his arrival home.
