The governing body of the students is an active and responsible Student Government. Student Government administers student affairs and acts in behalf of the student body

Students are elected to posi-tions on Student Government by the Students. Elections shall be conducted September 27 and 28. The deadline for all student candidates is September 21. Student Government encourages new students to be candidates for Student Government.

The requirements for the Treasurer candidates are that they be enrolled in a minimum of 12 credit hours for the Fall Quarter. The evening senators must be totally enrolled in the evening program. All other senators must be enrolled in not less than 9 credit hours.

Student Government is composed of two branches--Executive Branch (President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer) and the Legislative Branch (Senate). The Senate consists of ten senators, of which a maximum of eight represent the day student body and two represent the evening student body.

Job descriptions and responsibilities of Senators, applications for Senators, and petitions are available in the Student Activities Office or during Student Activity Day. Information will be forthcoming at the Activity Day.

This 1972-73, Parkland College will enter inter-collegiate debate for the first time. Parkland will attend approximately ten collegiate novice tournaments from October through February These tournaments are already scheduled: University of Illinois, Illinois State University, Eastern Illinois University, Northern Illinois University, Illinois Wesleyan University, Bradley University and Western Illinois University Also, there are possible tournaments in Indiana, Wisconsin, and Missouri; and highlighting the year, Parkland College debaters might fly to Los Angeles, California, for the Junior College National Championships if they win a major novice tournament during the tournament season.

Whether you've previously debated on the high school circuit or have no debate experience as of yet doesn't matter. If you're interested in learning how to present, defend, and refute ideas, debate might be the activity for

As you well know, debate consumes a great deal of time; however, debating can be an enjoyable, worthwhile, and profitable experience. Besides traveling out of state for overnight tournaments (Parkland assumes the expenses) and developing argumentative skills in communication, debate can reward you with a full scholarship to a major university upon your graduation from Parkland if you've become a competent enough debater. With only an investment of time, debate could

be the most profitable venture you'll ever attempt.

Of course time is of great importance to Parkland's future debaters because many of you are involved with your studies and part-time jobs. However, due to these conflicts much of the debate preparation and practice will be accomplished through individual and team efforts.

If you are interested in debating, the topic is, Resolved: That the Federal Government should provide a program of compre-hensive medical care for all U. S. citizens. Start reading all articles on this topic from Newsweek. Time, and U. S. News and World Report; check out books from the library, and think about arguments supporting or negating the resolution. But, most of all come and talk to Parkland's Director of Debate, Chuck Newman, on Tuesday, September 5 at the Building on Student Gergory Activity Day, or come to the first debate squad's meeting on Tuesday, September 12, at 11:15 a.m. in Methodist Room 13, or come by his office at the Jefferson Building. If you have any pressing questions and you can't find him, call his home, 359-2188.

Come out and try to make the Parkland College debate team; see if you can put your mouth where your mind is. Mr. Newman thinks the Parkland College debaters will have a good time this year, and he predicts that if you once taste competitive debate you'll be hooked. Why don't you find out by giving debate a try.

Some of you, when paying your tuition recently, may have noticed a fee called the Student Activity Fee.

The Student Activity Fee (S.A.F.) is levied upon each Parkland student at the rate of 50 cents per credit hour per quarter. For most of you registered as a full-time student this means you will pay about \$24.00 this coming year.

All money derived from the S.A.F. goes into the accounts of the Parkland College Student Association—which is administered by the Parkland College Student Government elected by YOU. Last year \$56,000.00 was derived from the

S.A.F. This year we anticipate a slight increase due to an anticipated increase in enrollment. This year the money will be spent similiar to last year. It will support activities as dances, movies, sports events, bands, folksingers, clubs, intramurals, literary magazine, lectures, plays, debates, etc., and student publications, one of which you are reading this moment.

In the past, it has not been customary to inform students regularly in detail about the manner in which their money was spent. In breaking with tradition, I felt it was necessary so that a larger number of the student body would be aware of the programs here at Parkland

that are financed with your money.

On behalf of Student Government, I would like to welcome new and returning students to Parkland. Also, I would like to invite all of you to visit the Student Government Office (It's in the back of the Student Center) and talk with us. Perhaps with better communication, this Student Government can be the most responsive in Parkland's history.

PARKING STICKERS FOR STUDENTS

The Parkland College Student Government has developed a program for student parking in four (4) downtown Champaign parking lots. This program has been developed in cooperation with the City of Champaign and your Student Government.

Parking stickers shall be issued to all students enrolled in ten (10) or more credit hours for the Fall Quarter 1972. 



Registration By Mail

A new registration by mail option was extended to Day and Evening Students during the Fall Quarter 1972-73. This option proved to be both popular and efficient so the same privilege will be extended during the Winter and Spring Registrations. Students are cautioned that only those individuals who preregister during the scheduled advisory period will be extended this privilege for the Winter Quarter.

Some students were unable to register by mail for the Fall Quarter because their current address was not on file with the Office of Admissions and Records. Others had neglected to have their financial assistance records brought up-to-date in time to have such assistance credited to their statement of tuition and fees. Hopefully, these matters will be taken care of during the Fall Quarter in order that all students may exercise their privilege of registration by mail for the Winter Quarter.

Want A Change In Your Courses?

No schedule changes, except to drop a class may be made during the registration period.

Interested in changing to a different section of a scheduled class or to drop or add a class—you have the pleasure of securing a "Request for Change in Class Schedule" at the end of registration or at the Admissions Office window in the Student Center. Also, it's your honor to have the signature of either your advisor or counselor on the form.

Also, you have until the 15th of September to add a class. Apply at the Admissions Office for further data.

The final day for withdrawal from classes with a 75 per cent refund of tuition is September 19th. In addition, the final day for withdrawal without a record is September 19th.

It is important that you contact the Office of Admissions and Records if you intend to "drop" a course or cease to attend classes. The result of "you" not notifying the Admissions Office may result in you receiving "F" grades for courses which you have ceased to attend and participate in during the quarter.


