Famous Environmentalist Coming To Parkland

A highlight of the Environmental Teach-In coming up February 9, 10, and 11 will be a visit to campus by Rene Dubos.

Dr. Dubos, a key authority in the field of environmental problems has been a moving force behind the nation-wide Environmental Teach-Ins. He has written and won a Pulitzer Prize for his book "So Human an Animal" and is a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee on Environmental Quality to President Nixon.

One of the most popular speakers in the country on environmental problems, Dr. Dubos approaches the future as a true scientific humanist—he is disturbed but not angry, and not without hope. Professor of Environmental Biomedicine at the Rockefeller University in New York City, Dr. Dubos is the recipient of numerous awards for his brilliant scientific research, including the Lasker Award in Public Health, the American Medical Association Award and the Arches of Science Award of the Pacific Science Center.

In addition to his active concern

with the effects that environmental factors exert on human life, Dr. Dubos is the man who first demonstrated the feasibility of obtaining germ fighting drugs from microbes over 20 years ago. His pioneer work paved the way for subsequent research leading to the development of other antibiotics.

Born in France, Rene Dubos has long been an American citizen, having received his doctorate at Rutgers. He has worked continuously at the Rockefeller University, except for a two-year period on the faculty of the Harvard University Medical School. Dr. Dubos was also President of the Scientists' Institute for Public Information from its inception until 1969, and continues to serve as a member of its Board.

Famous as an author, he won the Pulitzer Prize in 1969 for his brilliant book on man and the environment, "So Human an Animal"—hailed as "perhaps the most important message of our times" and "A significant manifesto in the intellectual history of man." His latest book is "Reason Awake (Science for Man.)"

Other important books by Dr. Dubos included "Man Adapting" and "The Unseen World" (both of which won Phi Beta Kappa Awards), "The Dreams of Reason," "The Torch of Life," "Pasteur and Modern Science" and "The Mirage of Health." He has also served as an editor since 1946 of the Journal of Experimental Medicine.

Combining historical perspective with professional laboratory experience, Dr. Dubos is a speaker of rare grace and eloquence on the most crucial problems of our time.

Dr. Dubos will be on campus to informally talk with students and faculty on the afternoon of Wednesday, February 10. At 8:00 that evening he will present a speech at the Centennial High School Auditorium. There will be no admission charged to Parkland students and staff. However, a 50 cent charge will be asked at the door for all others. Watch for more details in the Sprinkler. Dr. Dubos is an informative, exciting speaker, not to be missed by anyone!

Teacher Works For ZPG

Although Parkland math teacher Joan Taylor is an advocate of Women's Liberation, that's not what she wants to be known for. She said, "It is unfortunate that most people know me as being connected with Women's Lib, because my main concern is the population explosion." Mrs. Taylor belongs to Zero Population Growth and works in the Z.P.G. office one day a week answering the telephone. She said that since ZPG is a non-profit organization, the group can take part in politics. They support political candidates whose beliefs are in favor of population control.

Mrs. Taylor was involved in Women's Lib last summer when she took a course on women's rights in the department of political science at the U. of I. The class was split into action study groups with each group working on different projects. One group planned a child care center for the U. of I. community. Another group studied women's roles in children's books. Mrs. Taylor said, "Heroes of children's books are all male. The woman is always in the kitchen working." She also noted that the little girl in stories watches the little boy run and jump and listens to him tell that he wants to be a doctor when he grows up. The little girl sits around and seems to have little ambition about her future. The group that studied children's books has written a story for the fifth and sixth grade levels which portrays women as they should be portrayed.

Mrs. Taylor said, "Women's Lib has changed a lot of my viewpoints. It changed my whole attitude about life." She explained that she had always seen herself as a teacher, probably taking time out to have a family and then returning to teaching when her children were in school. Now she

knows that she can do more than that. She wants to get more education and become a school administrator. When asked what level of administration she wanted to work at, whether she had in mind being a dean or a president, she replied, "I desire to go as high in administration as my abilities will carry me. I will probably start at the bottom and I hope to work my way to the top."

As a member of the Convocations Board at Parkland, Mrs. Taylor along with Dianne Graebner, English teacher at Parkland, and Tom Krall, student senator, planned and organized the drug seminar which was held in Janu-

ary. She said that the board members met with students during the summer to plan activities for this year. The next activity they have planned is environmental week next Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. Dr. Rene Dubos, renowned biologist will speak at Centennial Auditorium Wednesday at 8:00 p.m.

Mrs. Taylor became a teacher because there are several teachers in her family, and she teaches math because it is an easy subject for her. She said, "It is a very interesting career—very challenging in some aspects. I enjoy being at Parkland with the students and faculty."

Problems Of Our Times

Laissez-Faireism

Recently Ayn Rand appeared at the Ford Hall Forum, in Boston, to give her annual public speech. In this speech I find that she has, much to my own dismay, completely denounced the ecology movement as the "pseudoscientific, supertechnological paraphernalia of Marx's economic determinism." To her present way of thinking, nothing will liberate the ecologists. She has deemed them as, "barbarians from 10,000 centuries deep, trying to send mankind back to the dark ages by introducing the savagery of government controls as a prelude to their ultimate goal; global dictatorship." In so doing she has determined that they hate science and its application, technology. She states that, "nowhere does one find any scientific evidence, not even to prove, let alone support a valid hypothesis, of global danger." She has found ecologists as callous and that their crusade is "antihumanitarian." "If concern with poverty and human suffering were the collectivists' motive, they would have become champions of capitalism long ago. . . now the collectivists are reduced to denouncing capitalism for creating abundance."

She further denounces the industrialists and businessmen who have come out on the side of ecology as following a policy of, "abject crawling." She alleges that: "In a mixed economy, the industrialist will swallow anything and apologize for anything. They would rather make a deal

with a few more bureaucrats than stand up and face the issue on terms of philosophical-moral principles." What she proposed in the place of mixed economy is, "A complete separation of state and economics in the same way and for the same reasons as the separation of state and church." This is laissez-faire capitalism.

Evidence

Considering the charge that there is no evidence for the ecology movement is unnecessary. We do not need statistical evidence to tell us that our natural world is deteriorating. More precisely, it is flat going to hell. There is definite scientific evidence to support the findings of science thus far in ecology. What Miss Rand has done is either conveniently ignored this evidence, or wishing it not true, has denounced it seeking to escape the consequences. This is, of course, assuming she is qualified to interpret such findings; and here there is no evidence in her support.

Saying that ecologists hate science is a contradiction in terms. The greatest percentage of ecologists are, in fact, members of the various scientific professions. I think Miss Rand's remarks in this area can be dismissed without consequence.

Business and Industry

The men of business and industry who have climbed on board the ecology bandwagon have swallowed nothing, and have only admitted what should be admitted in honest dealings with

the consumer. These men have no more than admitted that their processes might be causing damage to the environment, and rightly so. They too must live in this environment, and are attempting to find solutions to a potentially dangerous future. This charge too can, I feel, be lightly discharged.

Laissez-faire Capitalism

Laissez-faire capitalism is a system, or leak of a system, within which man's economical demise is eminent. Such a system would include absolutely no regulation of standards, no regulation of prices, no interstate regulation of commerce, and would allow industry to spread as it pleased, charge as it pleased, and use all manners of peoples as it saw fit. I do not feel I need expand on this for one to envision the eventual outcome.

In a society where men are more honorable than they presently are such a system may well be possible. Miss Rand is obviously honoring men to be much more honorable than they actually are. However, our society, far from being honorable, rules by the emotions; greed and self advancement at the expense of others prevails. Laissez-faire capitalism would lead only to the destruction of society and man's

erosion of himself.

Moral Principles

The real meat of the matter here is the moral issue involved, and Miss Rand has done no less than throw her own basic philosophy out the window. She has carried individual freedom to the point where there is absolutely no responsibility, where the individual sets his own bound regardless of the rights of others. She has failed to take into account that this form of individual liberty is impossible and impractical because man is a social animal. Her way would work well in a world of hermits; man is not such an animal.

Our system of checks and balances, which I shall be the first to state falls short in many respects, is far better than the laissez-faire chaos she would have us follow.

What Miss Rand has done is abdicate her own philosophical throne and disavowed her own moral standards. She has failed to realize that man is at best an emotional being, and that until he overcomes this hurdle he cannot hope to be self responsible and self-governing. There must be some form of check and balance to protect individuals from society, and society from itself.

Let's see if you'll print or comment on this letter. In your article "Students As Zombies" you stated the following: most of the students think of Parkland as a glorified High School. My questions are: Why shouldn't people think of Parkland as a glorified High School? For in a sense, that is what it amounts to. The only difference is that your time is your own. be done unless they know in which direction to go. And unless students give them ideas or things they wish to have done, the Student Government is helpless.

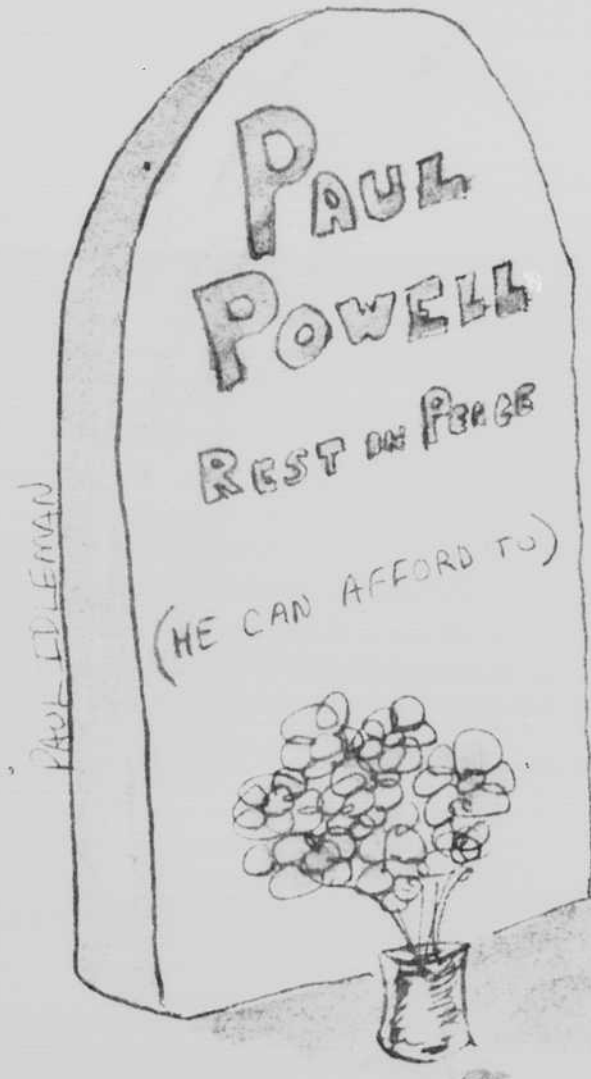

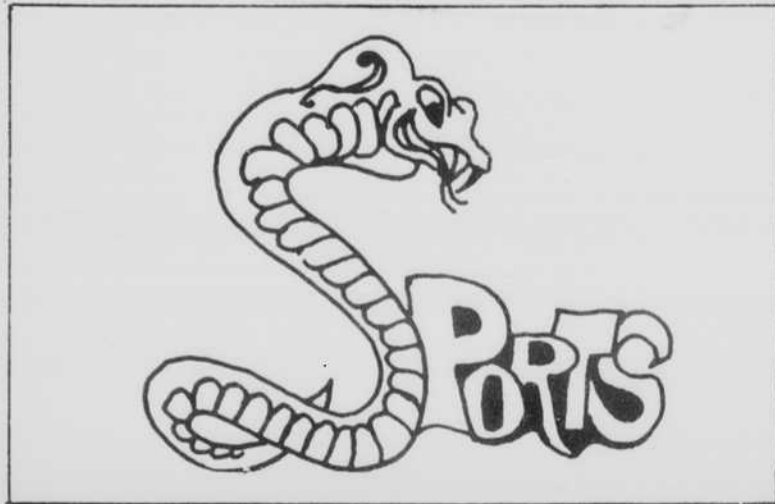

Rich Harper explodes for 23 Eastern Frosh Defeat Cobras

The Cobras traveled down Eastern Illinois University Monday night and lost to the Freshmen 85-74. Parkland found themselves up against a much superior defense.

Parkland was cold the first few minutes and were down 8-2 with only three minutes gone in the game. The Cobras had plenty of good shots, but they just wouldn't fall in for the team.

Once the ball started to go in for the Cobras, Leshoure and Harper began working the fast break and brought Parkland back into the game.

With the first half growing to a close both teams were using the fast break as often as possible and the score began to mount rapidly. Eastern was up by 2, 30 to 28, with 4:58 remaining in the half. The Panthers managed to increase their lead, 40 to 33.

The Cobras found Easterns zone defense tougher at the start and could not get a good shot off. The Panthers were hitting and outscored Parkland 14-2 in the first six minutes.

Rich Harper brought the Cobras back into the game hitting for fourteen points the second

half.

The Cobras made one last threat in the final minutes and brought the score within 6 points, 78-72. Eastern broke away in the last minute and ran the score up to a final 85-74.

Rich Harper played an outstanding game for Parkland and was the games high scorer. Harper also played an excellent defensive game, stealing the ball and rushing down on a lone fast break many times, to score for Parkland.

The events for the upcoming intramural swimming meet were announced this week by Coach Richard Norris. The meet scheduled for 4:00 p.m. Wednesday February 10 at Spaulding Pool has 8 set events at this time. There will be 50 and 100 yard contest in the free style, backstroke, breast stroke, and butterfly stroke. The events will be timed and awards given for every winner. Since this is the first swim meet at Parkland each winner will be setting a school record.

Individual medleys, long dis-

ance events, and diving will be scheduled based on the interest in these areas. Judges are available for the diving competition.

Women and men both are eligible to compete and there will be separate classes for each. Students wishing to enter should leave their name and events at the armory office. Those who pre-register are assured of being in the meet, however, those who fail to register and still wish to compete should report to Spaulding Pool at 4:00 p.m. on the 10th of February.

Parkland Places Third in Tourney

The Parkland grapplers placed third in a five-team Junior College Invitational Wrestling Tournament at Noma last Saturday.

Florissant copped the title by amassing 84 points. Blackhawk took second with 47 points and the Cobras a close third with 45. The points were computed on a 9-6-3 basis; nine for first, six for second, etc.

All of PC's wrestlers placed, with two winning the championship of their weight division. Calvin Beasley at 167 pounds won his two semi-finals and then swept to the title by defeating his opponent 8-1.
