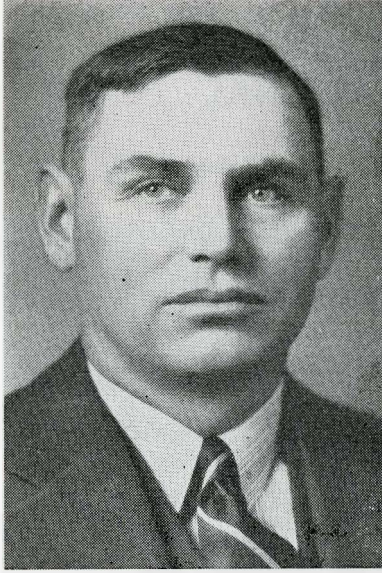

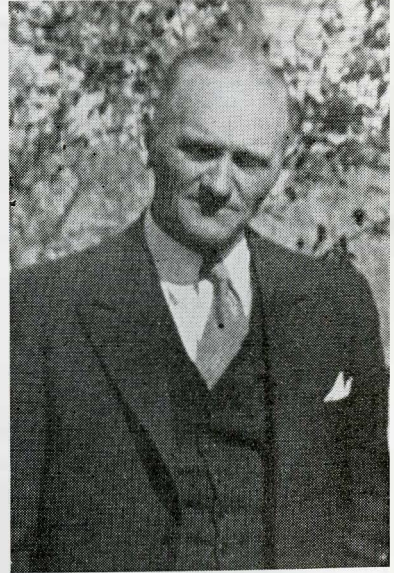

Dedication . . .

For four years, the Little International staff has honored prominent men in an agricultural field by dedication of their show to these men. Respect is paid this year to dairying, and we proudly present two outstanding men to typify their field of endeavor. State College requests "Hats Off" to Mr. A. F. Test, Mitchell, and Mr. Thad Oviatt, Huron.

Mr. Test and Mr. Oviatt, who both have high producing herds of registered Holstein-Friesian cattle, were popular favorites in their field according to a state-wide dairyman poll.

Settling on his present farmstead in 1905, two and one-half miles south of Mitchell, Mr. Test soon started the basis of his present dairy herd by the purchase of a registered heifer in 1911. Besides being very active in community and church affairs, Mr. Test has practiced a bull lend-leasing program for 12 years for small dairymen and farmers with grade herds, in a direct effort to improve the Holstein dairy cattle breed. This plan returns him one-half of the selling price of the bull after its use to the individual is over.

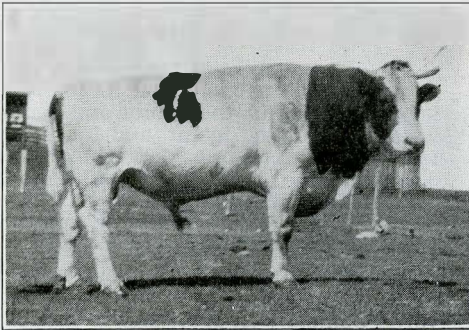
Graduating from Iowa State College in 1917, Thad Oviatt returned to his home town of Huron, and early established his present flourishing commercial dairy. Community activities require much of Mr. Oviatt's time, and he is considered one of the most outstanding 4-H club leaders in the state. Members of his club won the annual Hoard's Dairyman judging contest, and have been consistent winners at the State Fair. For the past two terms, Mr. Oviatt has been a state representative from Beadle county, and has been very active on the state livestock committee.

Many records have been established from their high producing herds, and last year Mr. Test had the Milking Derby contest winner at the State Fair, while at the same time Mr. Oviatt owned and showed the junior champion Holstein heifer.

Ag Club is proud of the privilege of dedicating their 1942 Little International to such outstanding men in the dairy industry.

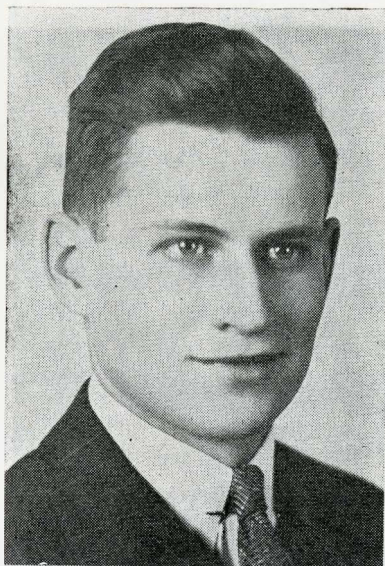



SOUTH DAKOTA STATE COLLEGE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY welcomes you to the 1942 Little International with the sincere but humble justification that since we have reached our 21st birthday we are qualified to demonstrate how young men are anxiously preparing to produce "food for freedom."

It was in the fall of 1920 when the show was first presented. Each year since then the show has been sponsored, with the exception of 1926 when a scarlet fever epidemic made it impossible. Each annual exhibition finds it a little larger and a bit more colorful than the previous one, but at the age of 21 it has by no means reached maturity. The Little International has succeeded in arousing interest throughout the Northwest, and we hope it will continue to progress.

Preliminary fitting and showing contests will be held in the stock pavilion during the day, and the finals are to be held in the College Armory in the evening. The entertainment is furnished by local talent, the entertainers being either college or School of Agriculture students.

This year, to our regret, we found it necessary to charge one dime for each souvenir catalog. This was brought about by the increased cost of paper and printing.

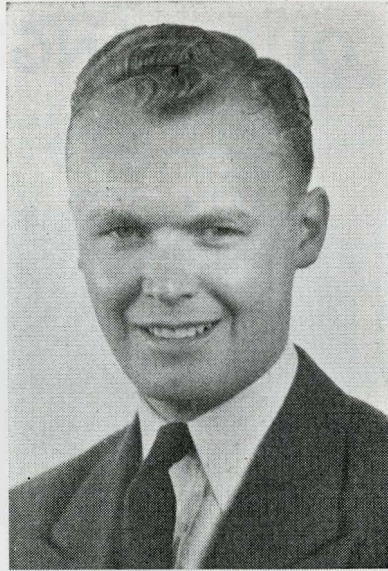

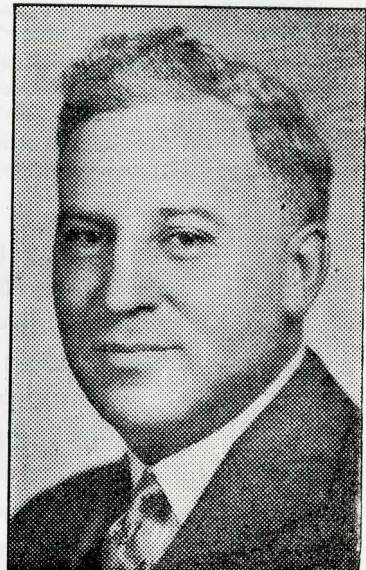
There is the opportunity to learn the meaning of winning with humility or of losing with grace.
