I went by to see your mother yesterday, and read your last letter. We both hope that your lack of stated disatisfaction with the placex means that you are liking it better. The fact that you have stayed this long proves that, I suppose. She misses you, and said she hadn't been feeling well, but nothing serious—not down in the bed, I mean. I've tried to get by once a week or so, but haven't made it every week but almost. She was out watering yesterday, and looking at the dead buds on camellias and brown leaves on azaleas.
