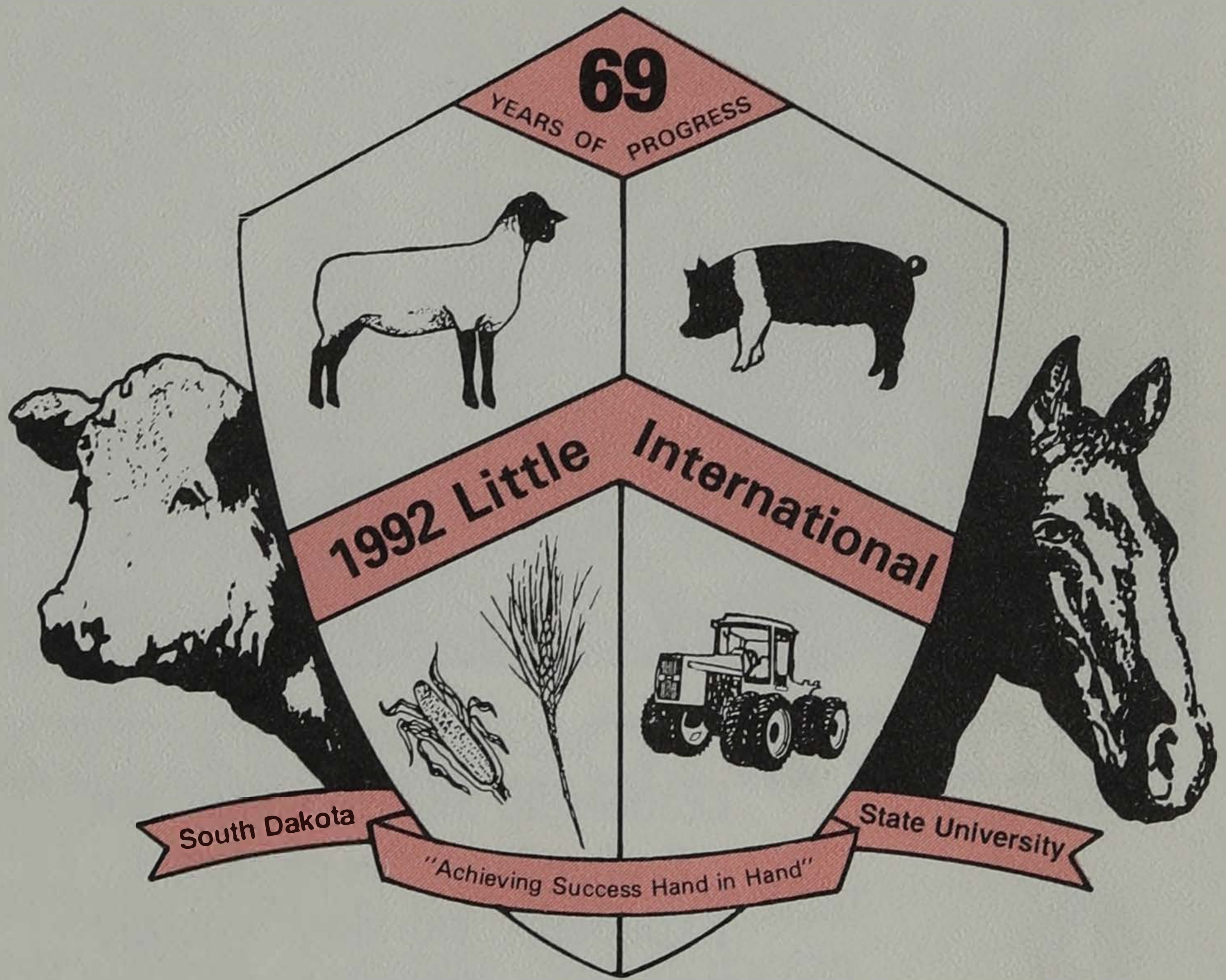

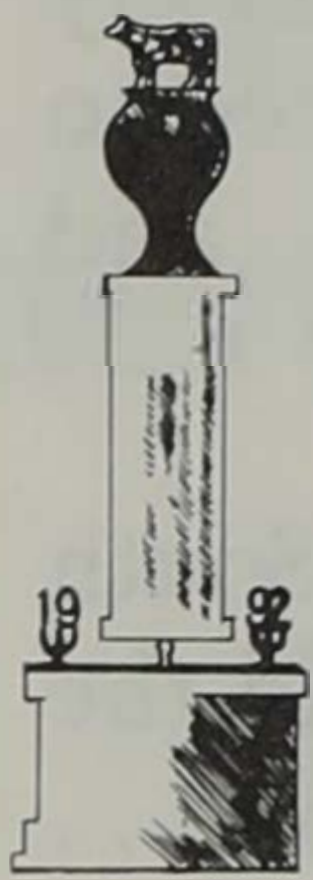

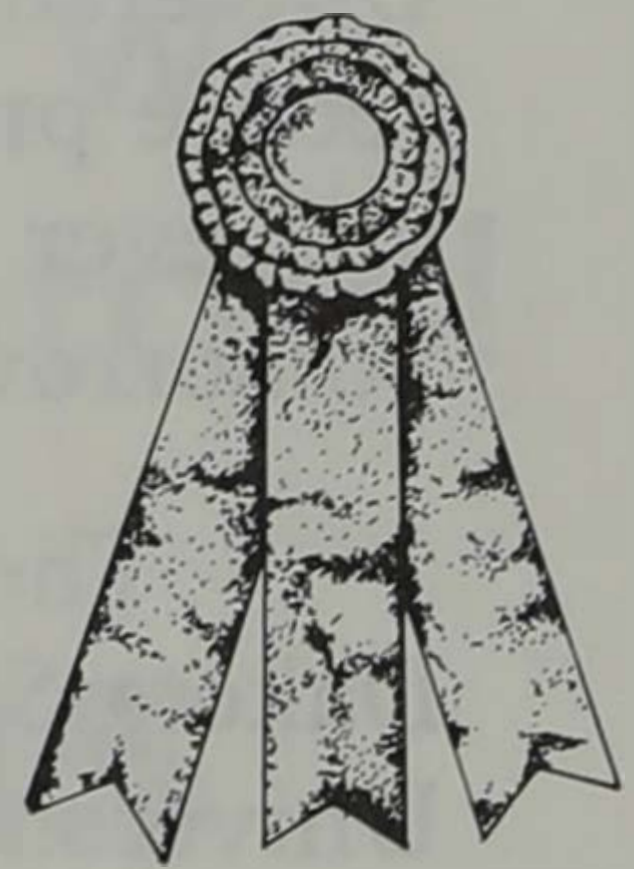

69th Show Last in a String of Successes

Achieving success hand in hand for the 69th time is what the staff of Little International is doing this year. Little International made its debut in 1921 as a one-day event, and was patterned after the Chicago International Livestock Exposition. Little International was intended to give students experience in their individual fields of study and demonstrate to the public the caliber of work being done by the SDSU students.

Lorenz Lippert, from Crow Agency, Mont., was the first Little "I" manager, working with seven staff members, and arranged for 100 students to show 80 animals. Today, the first female manager, Ann Gunderson of Lake Park, Iowa, works with 80 staff members. The two-day event includes over 160 students showing approximately 125 animals. There are also students involved in the Machinery and Ag Sales and Agronomy contests.

The first Little "I" was held in the Stock Pavilion, which is now the Agricultural Heritage Museum. It was then moved, in 1952, to the Intramural Building, and in 1977 to the new and larger Animal Science Arena, to accommodate the growing event.

Teamwork, cooperation, patience, and communication make the Little International possible and successful. All the staff members, students participating in the contests, and numerous faculty members have put in many hours to pull off the event. It is well worth the effort when you step into the arena anytime during the event—either as a contest participant showing an animal or even as a spectator coming to watch what is happening.

The overwhelming public approval and strong support from SDSU administration has proven Little International's worth as an educational and entertaining event.

The 1992 Little "I" staff would like to thank you for your support and for attending the 69th annual exposition.

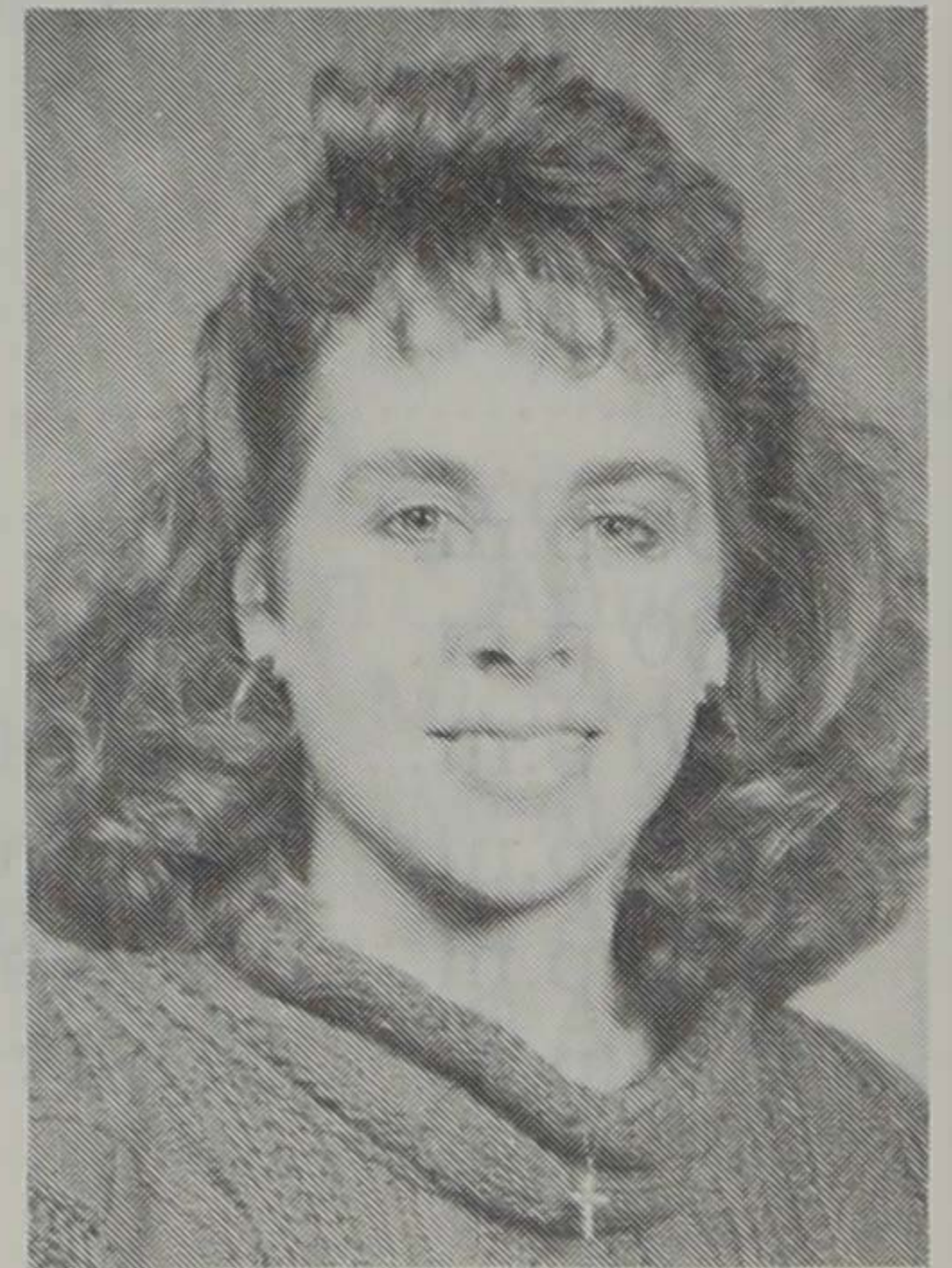


in Meat Science from Iowa State University in 1987.

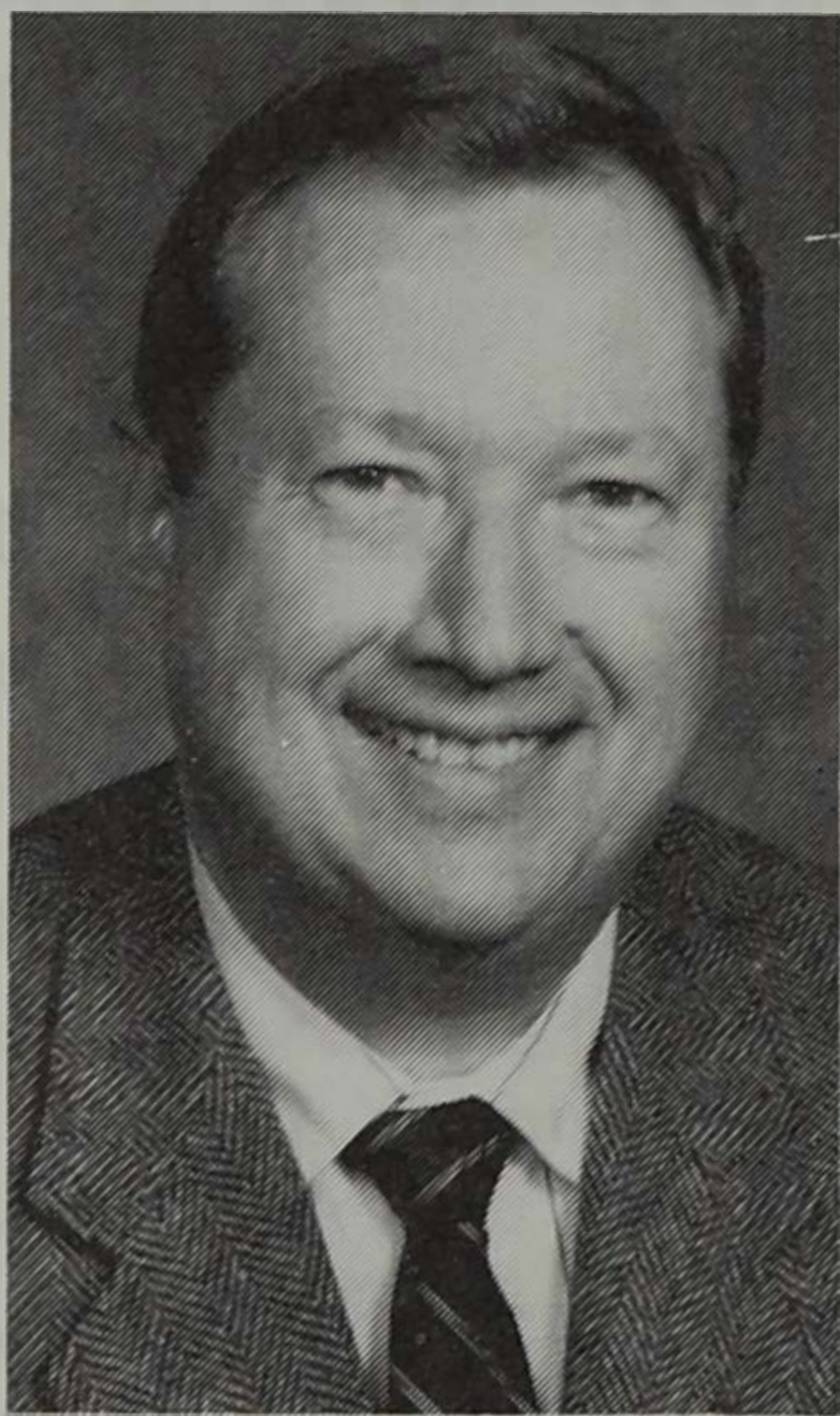

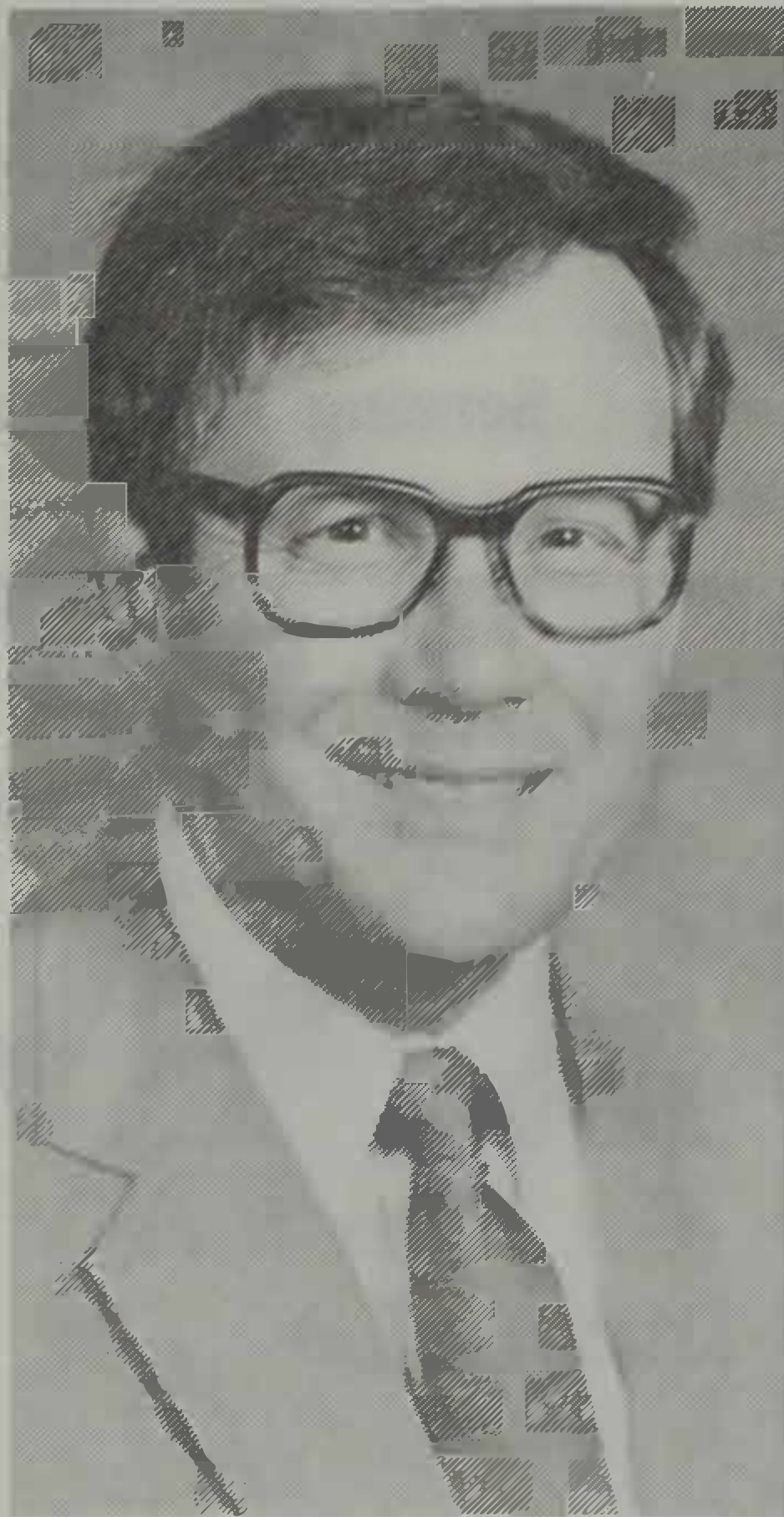
Greetings from President Wagner

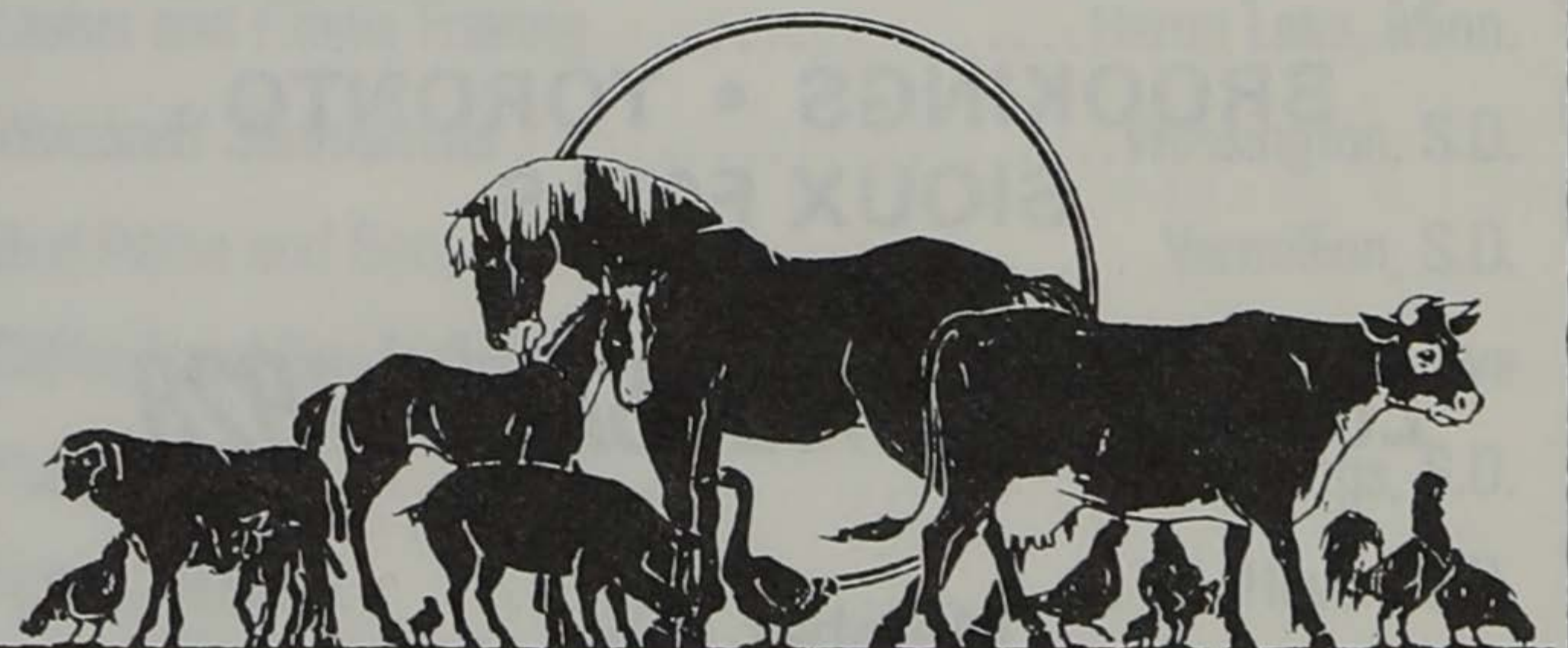

1992 Honored Agriculturalist

Vern Fritz, from Humboldt, S.D., has been chosen as the 1992 honored agriculturalist. He received a B.S. from SDSU in 1963 in Animal and Dairy Science, and then obtained his M.S. in 1967 from SDSU in Animal Science-Livestock Nutrition. Fritz now works as the livestock nutritionist for Zip Feed Mills, Inc., which he has been doing for 23 years.

Fritz is a member and has been involved with the American Registry of Professional Animal Scientists, the American Society of Animal Science, the American Dairy Science Association, and the South Dakota State University College of Agriculture Advisory Committee. Fritz has also served as past president and director of the South Dakota Master Pork Producers Program, and he was the past president and is now the current director of the South Dakota Livestock Foundation. He is also presently the director of the South Dakota Master Lamb Producers Program.



Fritz is a member of Zion Lutheran Church in Hartford, and has served as a past leader of the

Humboldt Hustlers 4-H Club, the past chairman of the Minnehaha County Extension Board, and on the West Central Vo-Ag Advisory Committee. Fritz has also been extensively involved with the Sioux Empire Farm Show Committee since 1970. He was general chairman in 1985, past chairman of the Swine Division, and is now current chairman of the Sheep Division as well as being on the Farmer Appreciation Day Committee and Sioux Empire Fair Swine and Sheep Committee.

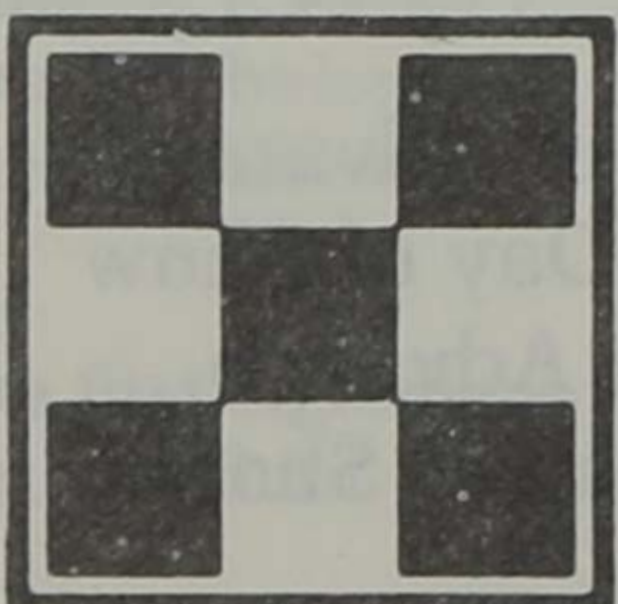
In 1977 Fritz was chosen as the SDSU Block and Bridle Club Honorary Member and as the Honorary Chapter Farmer by the Huron FFA. He received the Gamma Sigma Membership and Award of Merit from SDSU in 1989, the Sioux Empire Agri-Business Man of the Year in 1988, and the South Dakota Honorary Master Pork Producer in 1980.

Fritz's wife Pam is a Registered Nuclear Medical Technologist (CNMT) working in Sioux Valley Hospital in Sioux Falls, and their son Brian is a sophomore mechanical engineering major at SDSU.

While at SDSU, Fritz worked and lived at the sheep unit. He received the Outstanding Senior Award from the Block and Bridle Club in 1963, and served on both the Junior and Senior Livestock and Dairy Cattle Judging Teams.

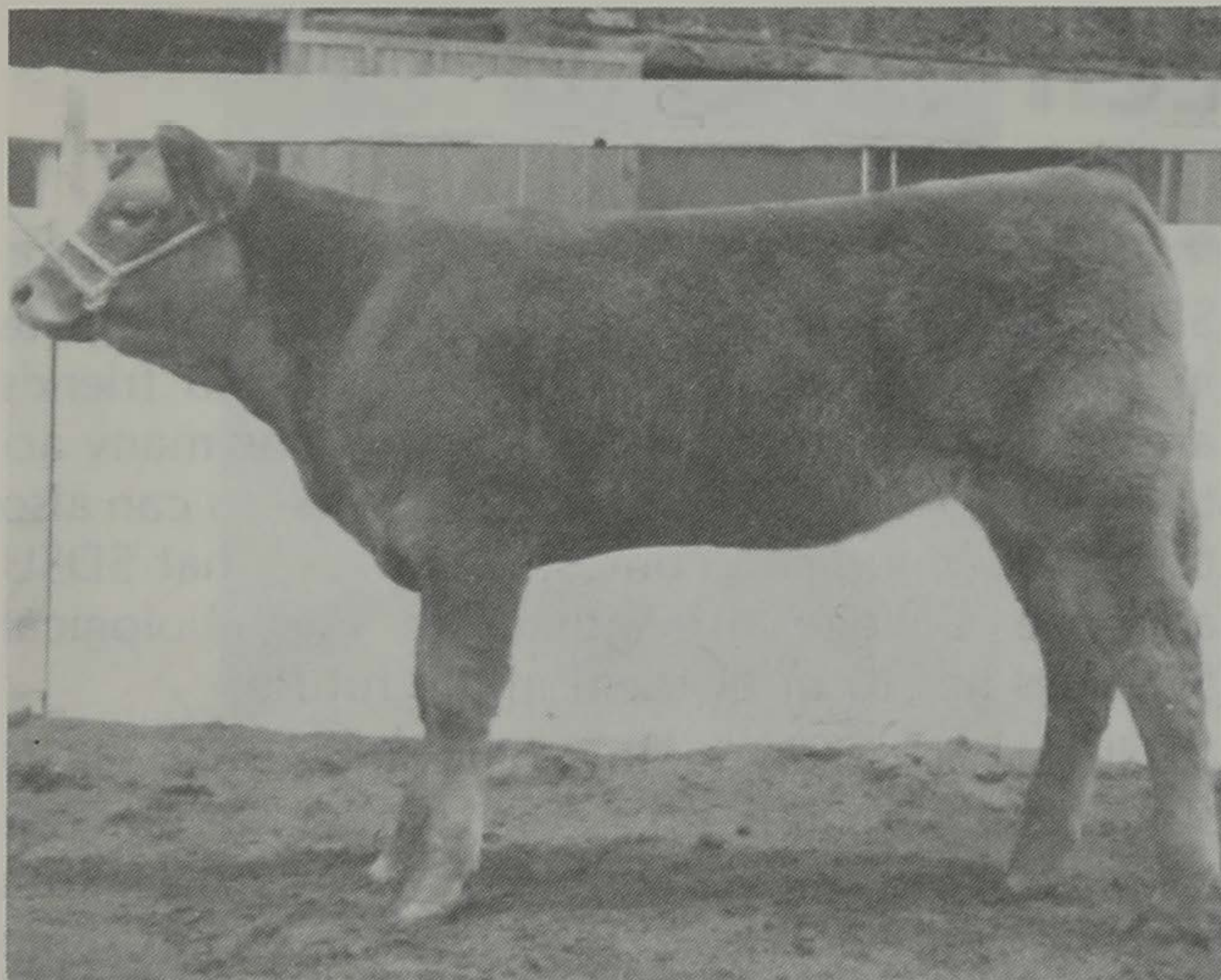
Dr. Robert Swanson

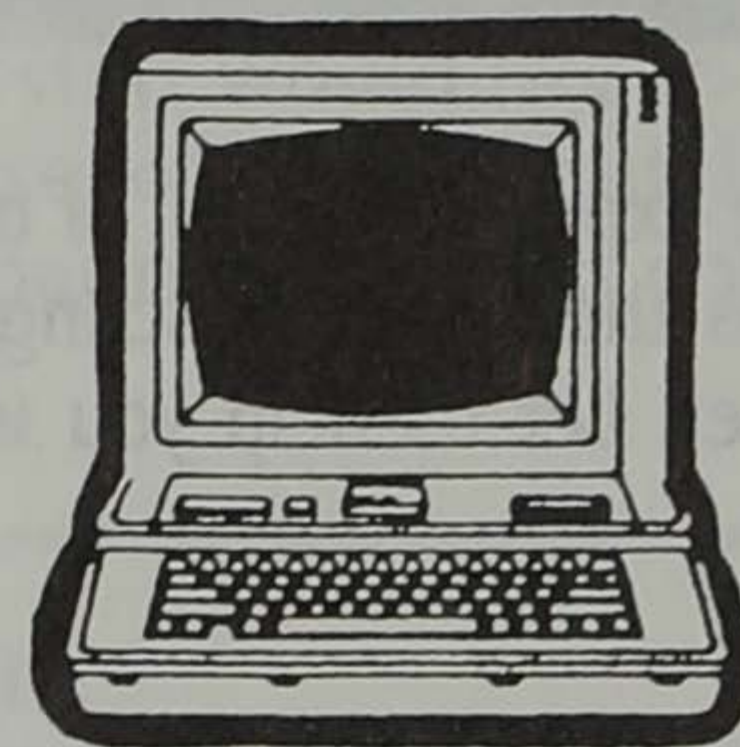
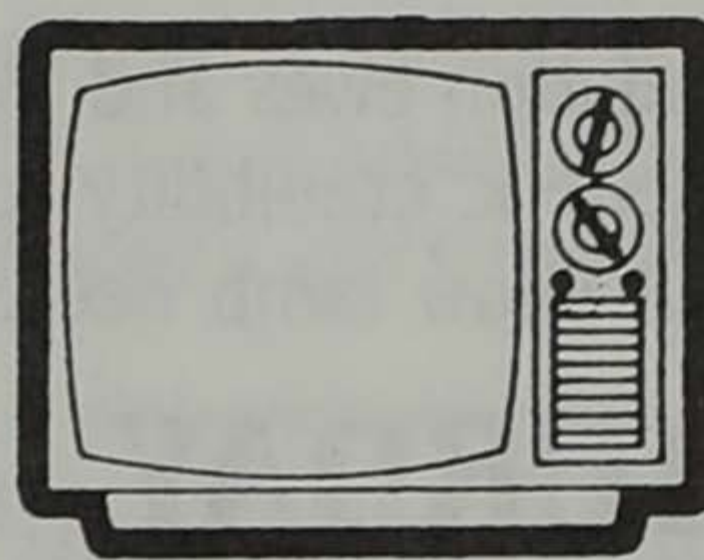
Little International Offers Three Judging Scholarships

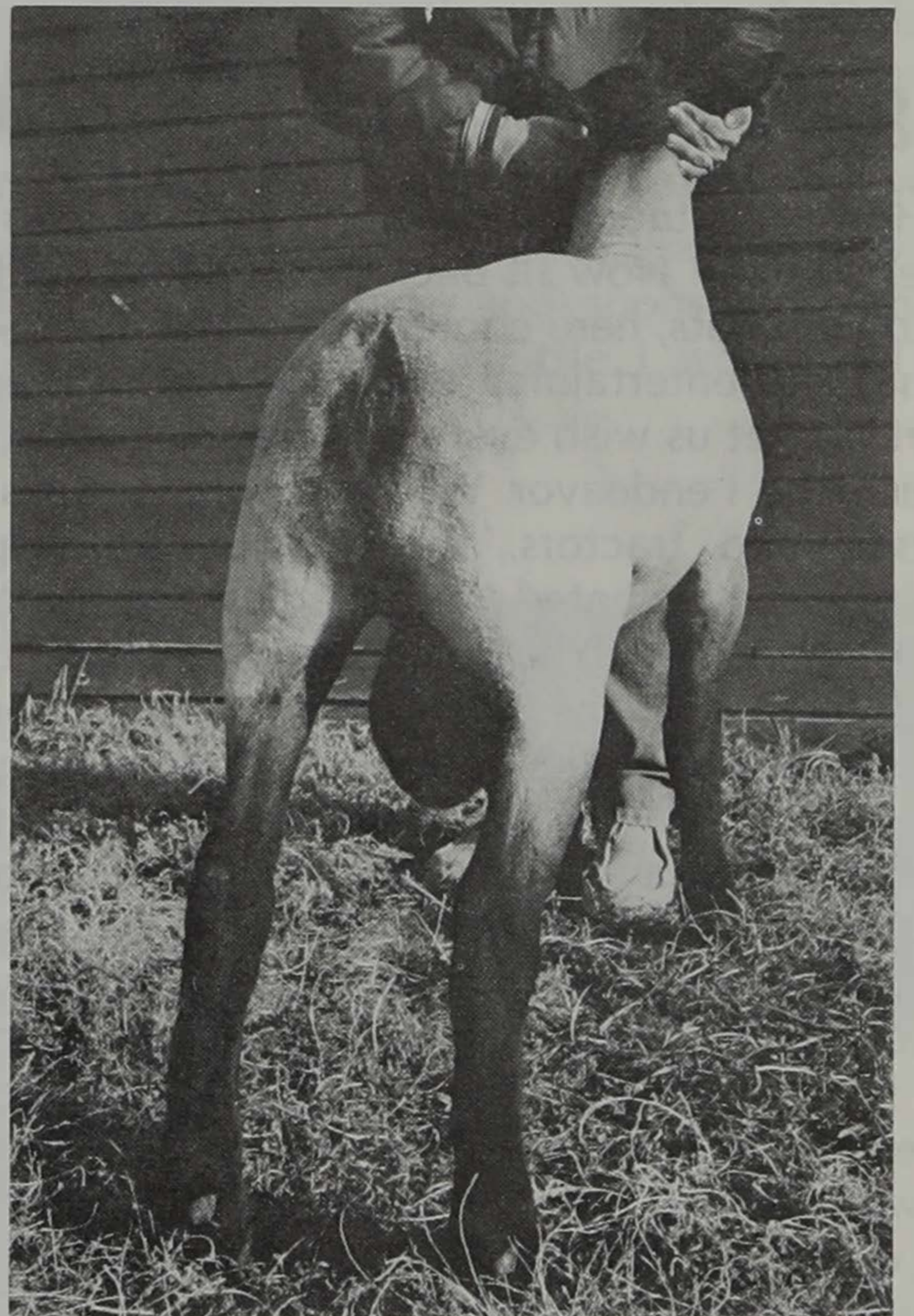

Sheep Unit Uses 600-Head Herd for Teaching, Research

The SDSU flock currently consists of two purebred breeds, Hampshire and Columbia, along with some commercial crossbreds. There are approximately six hundred ewes that will be lambing in 1992. The herd is used for both teaching and research.

Dr. Lowell Slyter, head of the sheep unit, and graduate students have been working with an out-of-season lambing study. The research team has had up to 80 to 95 percent success rate in sheep bred for fall lambing with the use of photo period control. The results are such that the market price can be spread throughout the year. Also, there is a palatability test of lamb creep feed in progress.

The sheep unit was moved to its present location, just north of Brookings, in 1969 from the current veterinary science location. In 1972, the SDSU sheep flock included approximately 100 head and

was used almost entirely for teaching. Since then the unit has mostly increased its commercial flock used for research.

Plans for a new research unit were completed in 1969 when the unit was moved. Appropriation of funds has recently passed for the new unit and construction will start within the coming year. The plans include a new multipurpose barn, which would include a small office and lab and an animal working area. The remainder of the building will be used for feeding and housing sheep.

Bruce Read, a 1990 South Dakota State University graduate, is the current sheep unit manager. The unit currently employs six part-time students.

The Little International staff would like to thank the sheep unit for the use of its Bobcat loader, which was used when preparing the wood chips for the night performance.

Ladies' Lead

The Ladies' Lead event requires knowledge of current sewing trends, sheep fitting and sheep handling. The contestants are required to make a commercial or original designed wool garment and sheep blanket of at least 70% wool.

A campus organization must sponsor the Ladies' Lead contestants. The sheep fitting may be done by the contestant or by any full-time SDSU student with a knowledge of sheep fitting.

The Ladies' Lead scorecard consists of four areas: personal interview, 25 points; garment and blanket construction, 15 points; appearance of blanket and garment, 10 points; sheep fitting and handling, 25 points; and general appearance/poise, 25 points.

The interviews and garment/blanket construction were held on Friday afternoon, April 3, and the sheep fitting judging during the Friday evening performance. The Saturday performance will be the final showing and the winners will be announced.

Wool Judging Team Competes at Denver Show

The 1992 South Dakota State University Wool Judging Team recently placed third at the National Collegiate Wood Judging Contest held at the National Western Stock Show in Denver, Colo., on Jan. 10. The team was only 31 points behind the winning team.

Team members included: Heather Sutton, Gettysburg, S.D.; Mik DeGroot, Pipestone, Minn.; Mike Jacobson, Brandon, S.D.; Mark Moeller, Pipestone, Minn., and Lori Halajian, Watertown, S.D. The team is coached by Dr. Lowell Slyter and assisted by Nasir Iman.

Members of the Wood Judging Team judge fleeces in two segments during a contest. There are placing classes and also participants must score and grade 15 different fleeces.

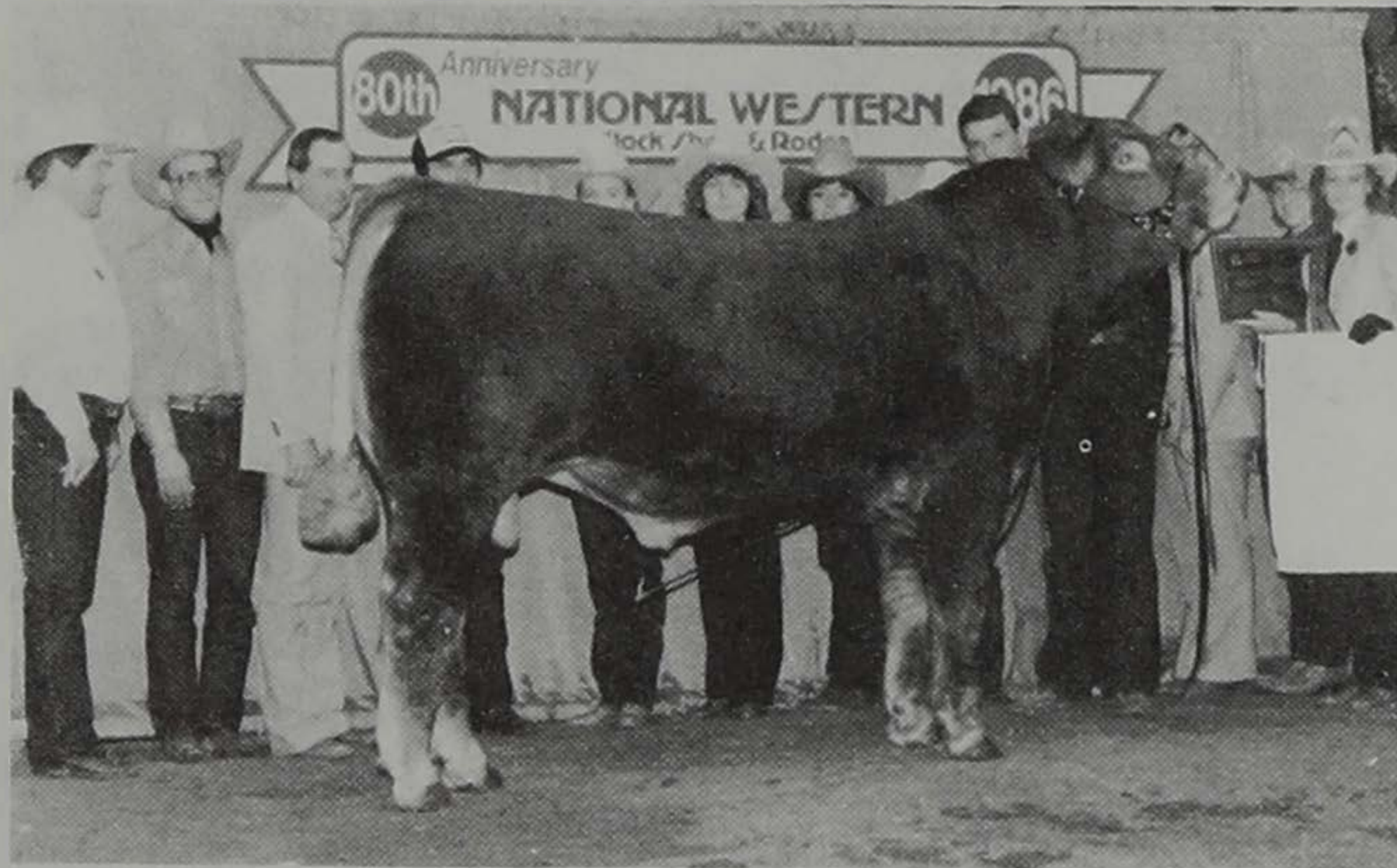
The placing classes are placed partly on fiber diameter and minimum length of fiber. The classes are further divided into commercial and breed fleeces. The commercial classes are placed on

pounds of clean wool of acceptable length. The breed fleece classes are placed with more emphasis on the breed of sheep and fleece actually came from.

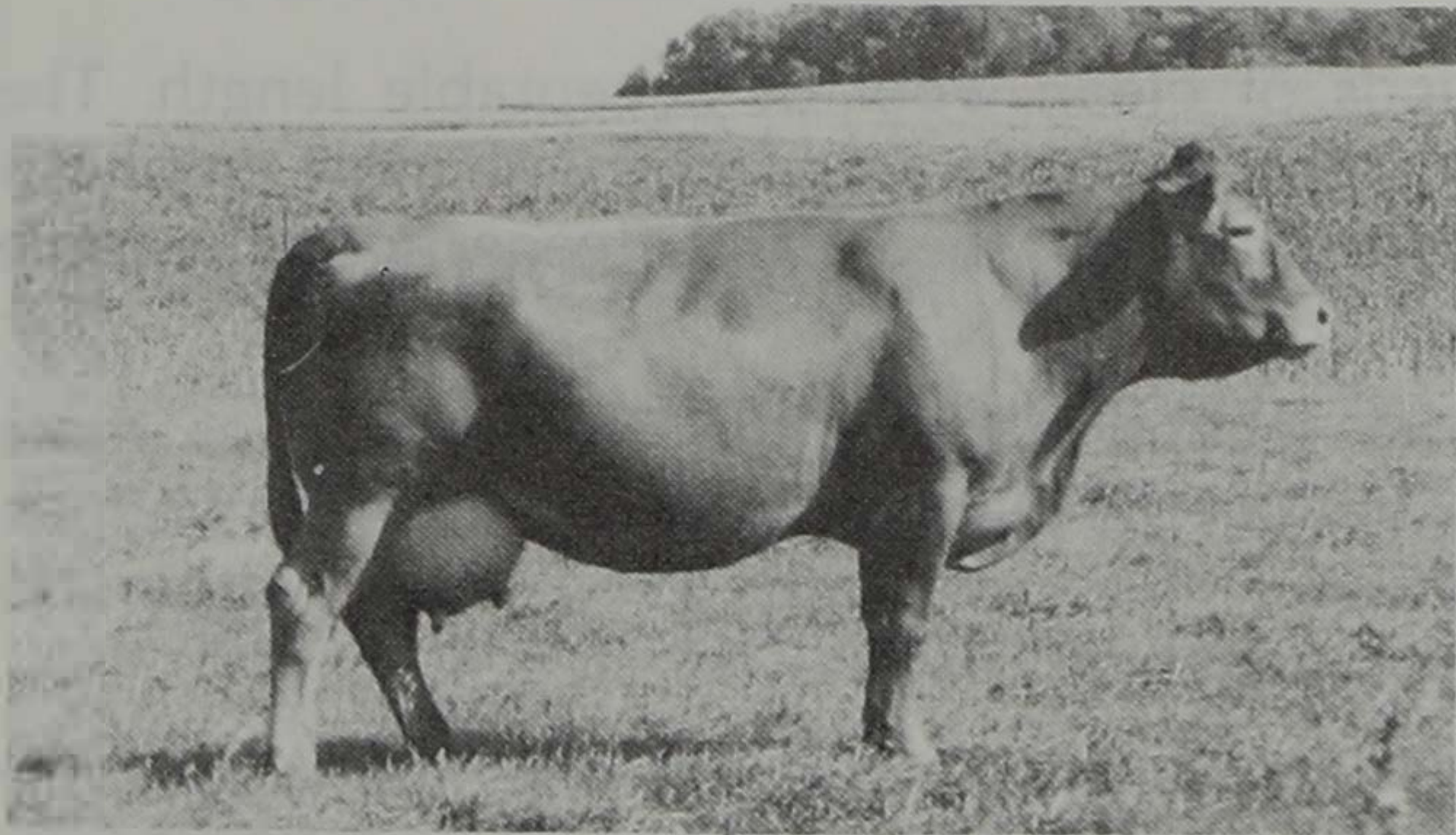
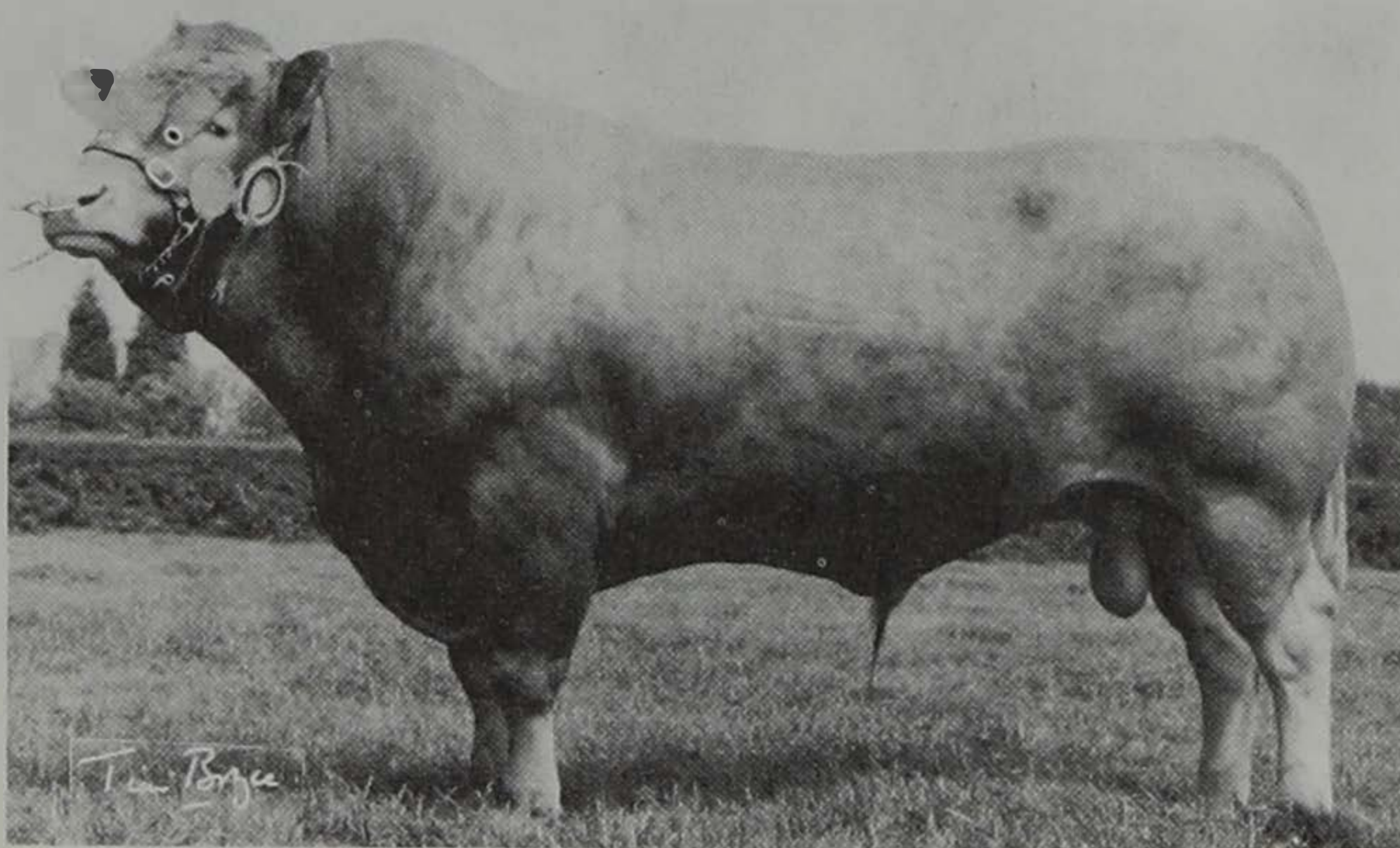
The second part of the contest carries more weight than the placing classes. In this segment participants must evaluate 15 fleeces within 45 minutes or three minutes per fleece.

Results from the National Collegiate Wool Judging Contest are as follows: Mik DeGroot and Heather Sutton tied for first in placing classes, dropping only three points each. Ties were broken on grading scores which resulted in Mik being first and Heather third in this category. Mark Moeller, was fourth individual in grading, four points out of first. In oral reasons Mik was second, Skip seventh and Lori Halajian eighth. In overall rankings, Mark was sixth, Heather tenth and Mik twelfth. Mike Jacobson was the other team member. The team was coached by Dr. Slyter.

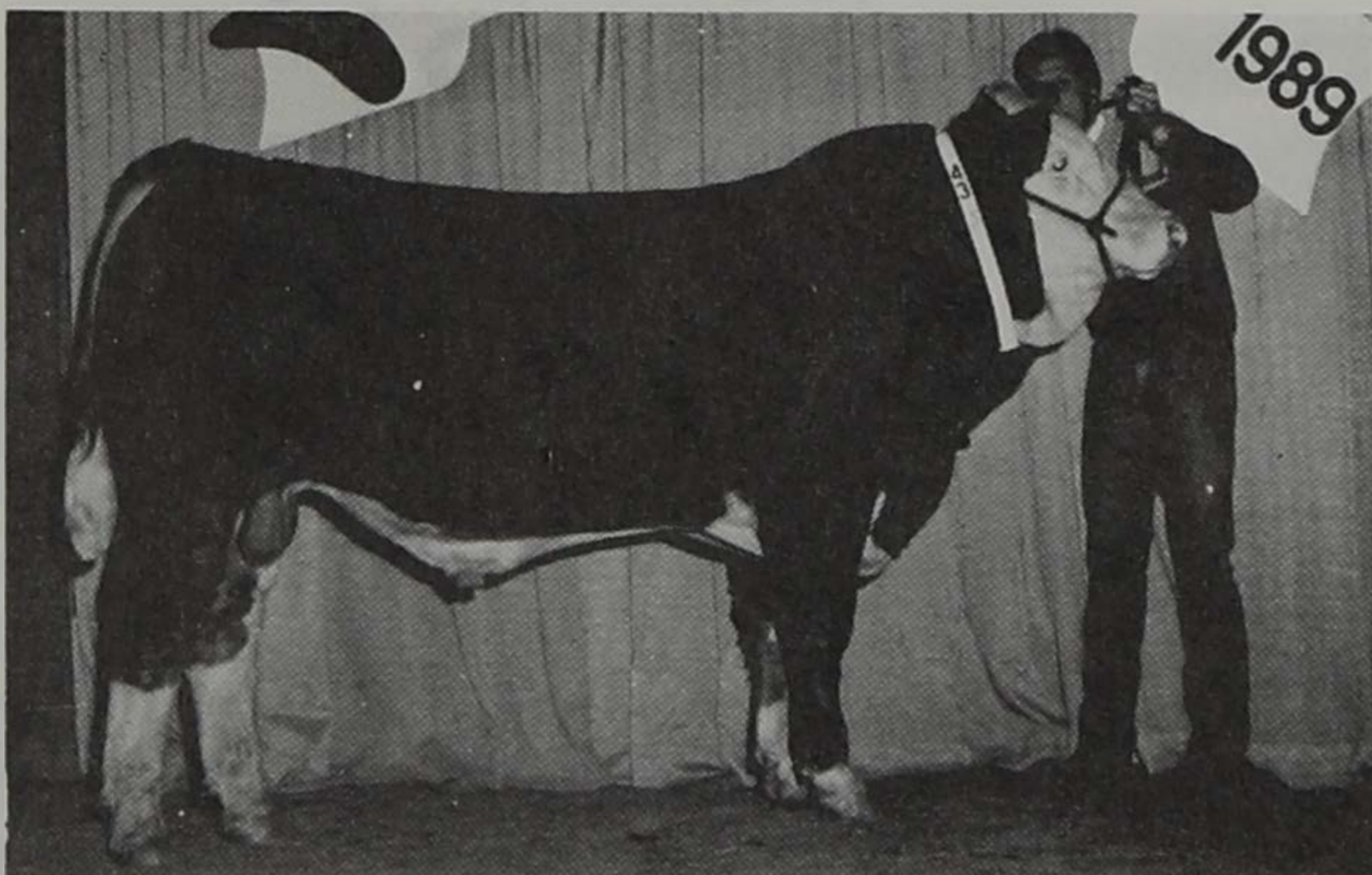

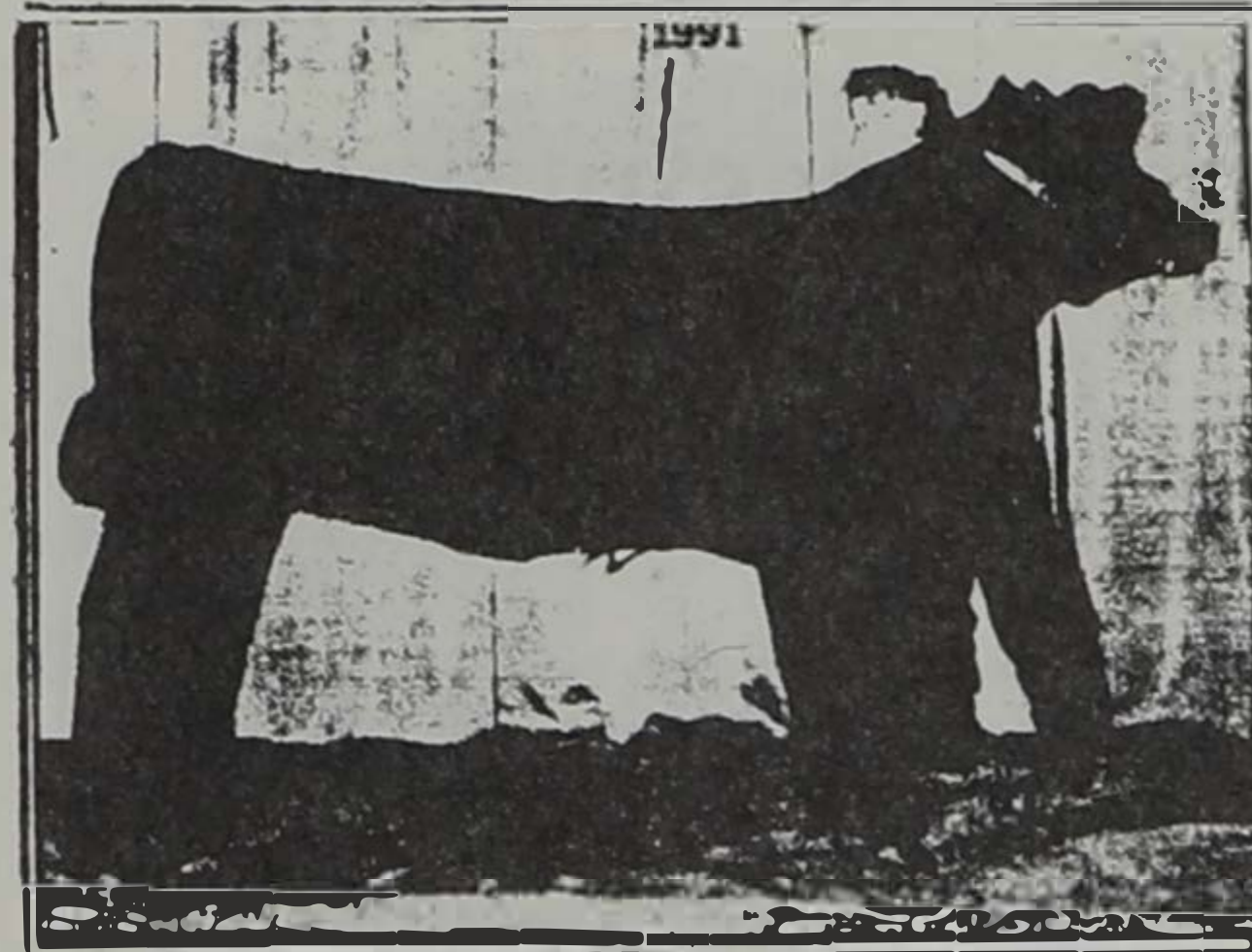

Cow-Calf Unit Supports Teaching, Research

The Cow-Calf Teaching and Research Unit is designed to maintain a purebred herd of Angus and Simmental cattle. The herd is used for teaching, research, and extension activities. Kevin VanderWal, a 1988 Animal Science graduate of SDSU, is manager of the unit, and Doug Ruble is assistant manager. Dr. Richard Pruitt, Assistant Professor of Animal Science, is in charge of the unit's projects. Reproduction physiology research at the unit is under the direction of Dr. Herley Miller.

This spring, 31 heifers and 77 cows will calve at the unit. The cattle are used for classroom lab activities and various field days, as well as 4-H and FFA events. Some of the bulls raised at the unit are used in other research farms in the state, and some are offered for sale at private treaty in the spring. Staff members have done some embryo transplanting this year, flushing one Simmental and two Angus cows. As a result of this, there will be 20 transplant calves this spring.

Replacement heifers and bulls are shown in Little International each year. The unit staff ties up the calves for at least a week prior to the time the

students are allowed to work with them. There has also been some new feed lots built along with fence line feed bunks.

Helping Kevin and Doug are students Jeff Grill, Rick Geppert, Tonya Schaefer, Chris Balcom, Corey Schrag and Brad VanderWal.

Beef Unit Measures Efficiency of Crosses

The Beef Breeding Unit measures and compares the efficiency of various crosses of beef cows. Efficiency is based on feed utilization, milk production, and total pounds of the calf produced.

Steven Goodfellow has been manager of the unit since August 1988. He oversees the use of the unit's facilities under the direction of Dr. Don Marshall who is in charge of research at the unit. Also helping Goodfellow is new assistant manager Donna Kopplin, recent graduate of SDSU.

This year the unit is calving about 70 cows. The herd consists of Simmental/Hereford, Angus/Hereford, and Tarantaise/Hereford. The Antelope Test Station supplies the unit with randomly selected heifers each year.

The calves, when weaned, will be taken to the North Beef Breeding Unit where they are split by sex and weight. These are computer fed and will be processed in the Animal Science Meat Lab so carcass data can be recorded and referred back to the dams.

Helping Goodfellow and Kopplin are students Kris Mauser, Kristy Strausburg, Reid Holverson, Barbara Borkowski, and Cody Moret.

Horse Unit Began in '20's with Draft Horses

The Horse Unit was built in the 1920's with the purpose of housing the draft horses that were used to farm the SDSU farmland. Through the efforts of Dr. Jim Kaiser, Animal Scientist at SDSU, American Saddlebreds and Morgans were introduced to the facility in the 1940's. Dr. Paul Kohler took over management of the Horse Unit in 1951 and served in that position until 1985, when Dr Larry Insley came to the university.

The first Quarter Horse brought to SDSU was a 1951 filly named "Gold Duster." She was purchased by Dr. Kohler at the 1952 Denver National Western Quarter Horse sale. This was the beginning of Quarter Horse production at SDSU. This versatile breed became the only breed at the SDSU unit by the early 1960's.

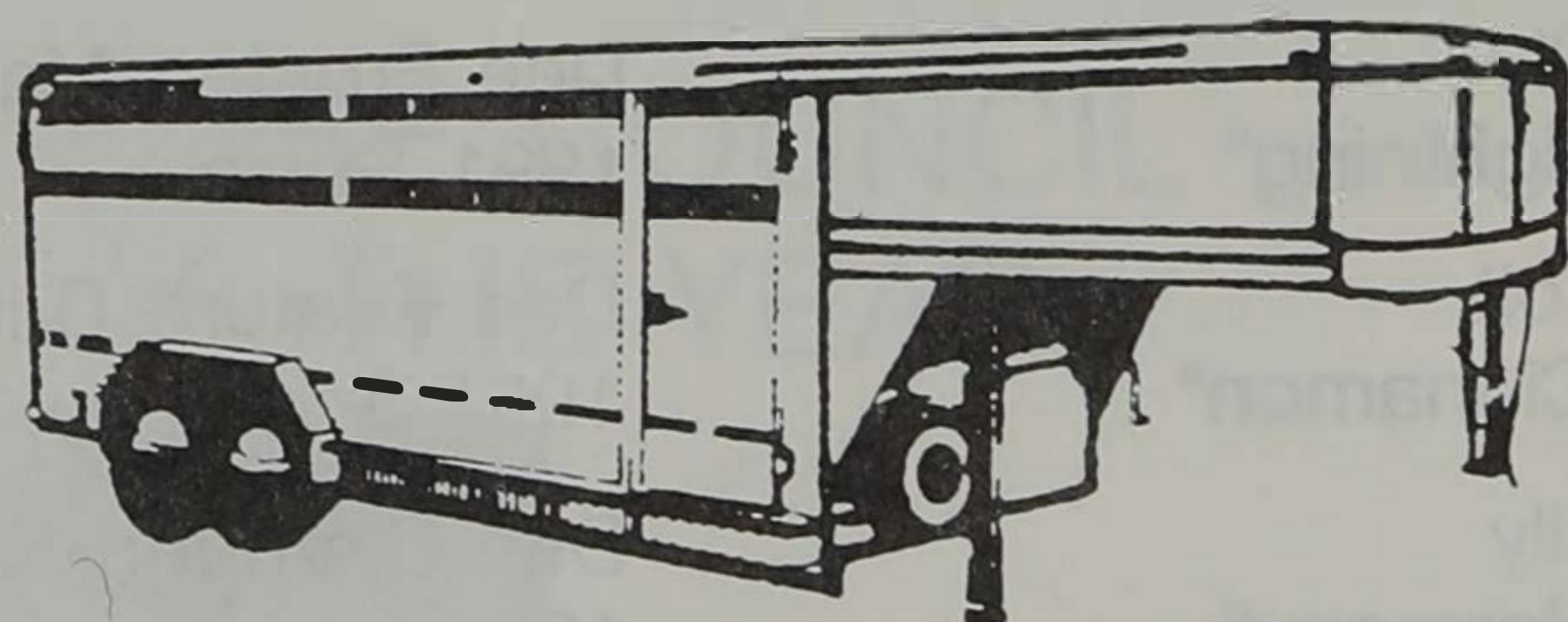
Draft horses were reintroduced to the unit in 1984 through cooperative efforts with McCrossan Boys' Ranch, Sioux Falls, S.D. Dr. Insley's interest and support of the draft animals led to the purchase of a team for the unit in 1988. A team of aged Belgian geldings has also recently been added to the unit.

The heavy draft horses are used in Heavy Horsemanship classes and for special functions of the university. The unit's team of Belgian mares were used in the 1990 South Dakota Centennial Wagon Train to pull the university's entry.

The Quarter Horse herd is used for teaching in the light horsemanship classes, horse production class, and for special campus events such as Hobo Day, Little "I," and the SDSU Stampede Queen Contest.

The Little "I" horse sale is being held for the fourth year on Saturday, April 4. All horses on the sale are raised at the unit.

Student manager at the unit is Corey Maaland. Students employed at the unit are Jennifer Forney and Kaylene Poncelet. Dr. Insley is supervisor at the unit.



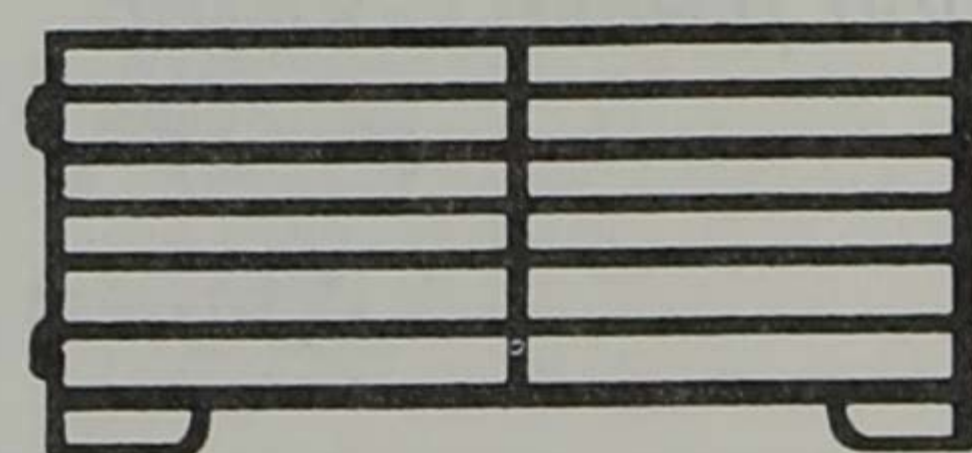

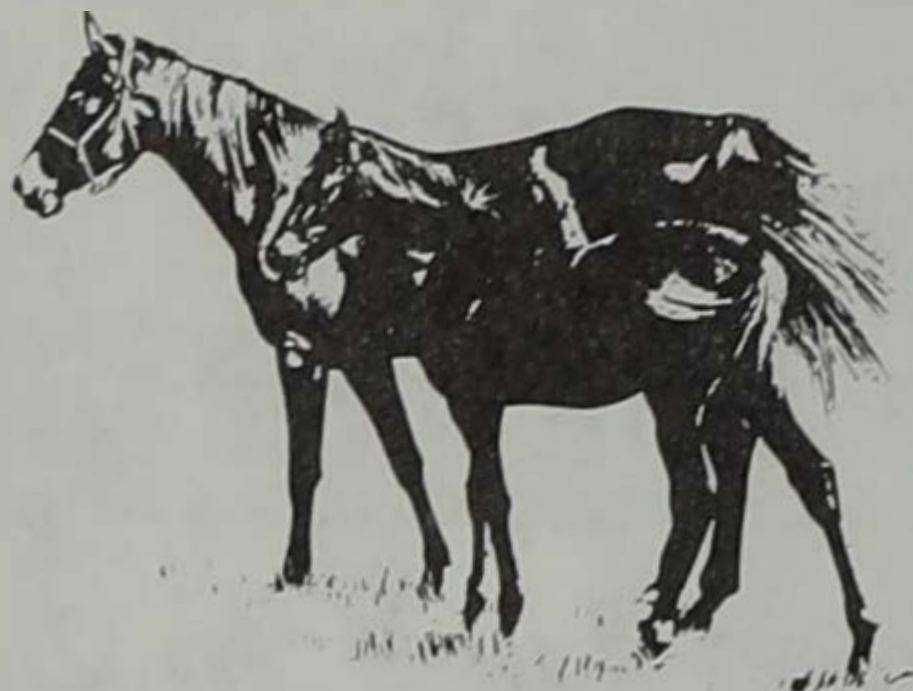

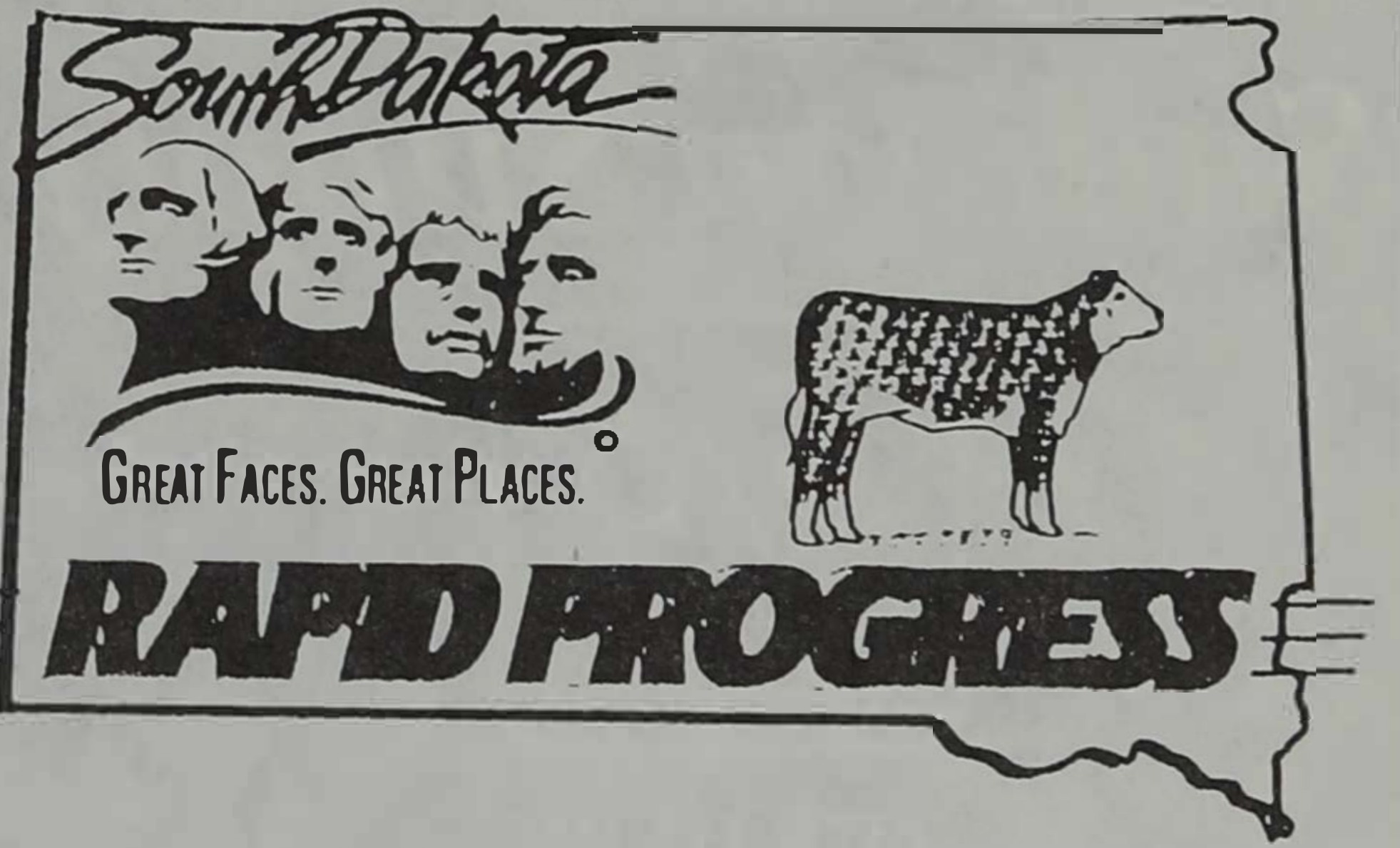

Stress Lab 'An Investment in the Future'

"An investment in the future of South Dakota." This is how Dr. David Bryant, dean of the College of Agriculture and Biological Sciences, describes the Northern Plains Biostress Laboratory.

Ground breaking ceremonies were held in May 1991, and construction was soon under way. The laboratory is scheduled to be completed in March 1993, with classes expected to begin in the building that fall.

Construction of the lab is based on an \$11.5 million budget, all of which is secured. Plant Science, Biology/Microbiology, Horticulture/Forestry, and Wildlife and Fisheries personnel will occupy much of the facility, with additions for Animal and Range Sciences and Vet Science planned as additional money becomes available.

"The most important thing is the concept we developed," said Dr. Bryant. "We've managed to bring together many departments within the College of Ag and Bio." Dr. Bryant added that crops, livestock, and humans are the three major areas the lab will explore. He said that when the human ele-

ment is added, the research also involves other colleges, such as Nursing and Home Economics.

Soil and water research labs, climate controlled environmental chambers, plant breeding facilities, and cellular and molecular biology labs are some examples of the type of facilities the lab will contain.

Biostress encompasses blizzards, droughts, soil erosion, floods, insect infestation, and other factors that stress livestock, crops, and humans. In a nutshell, the Northern Plains Biostress Laboratory will study the effects of these environmental and biological stresses. Ultimately, biostress affects our food supply and the price we pay for our food.

And that is important to all of us. "We're working on a center of excellence idea," said Dr. Bryant. "Not only for SDSU, but for the region."

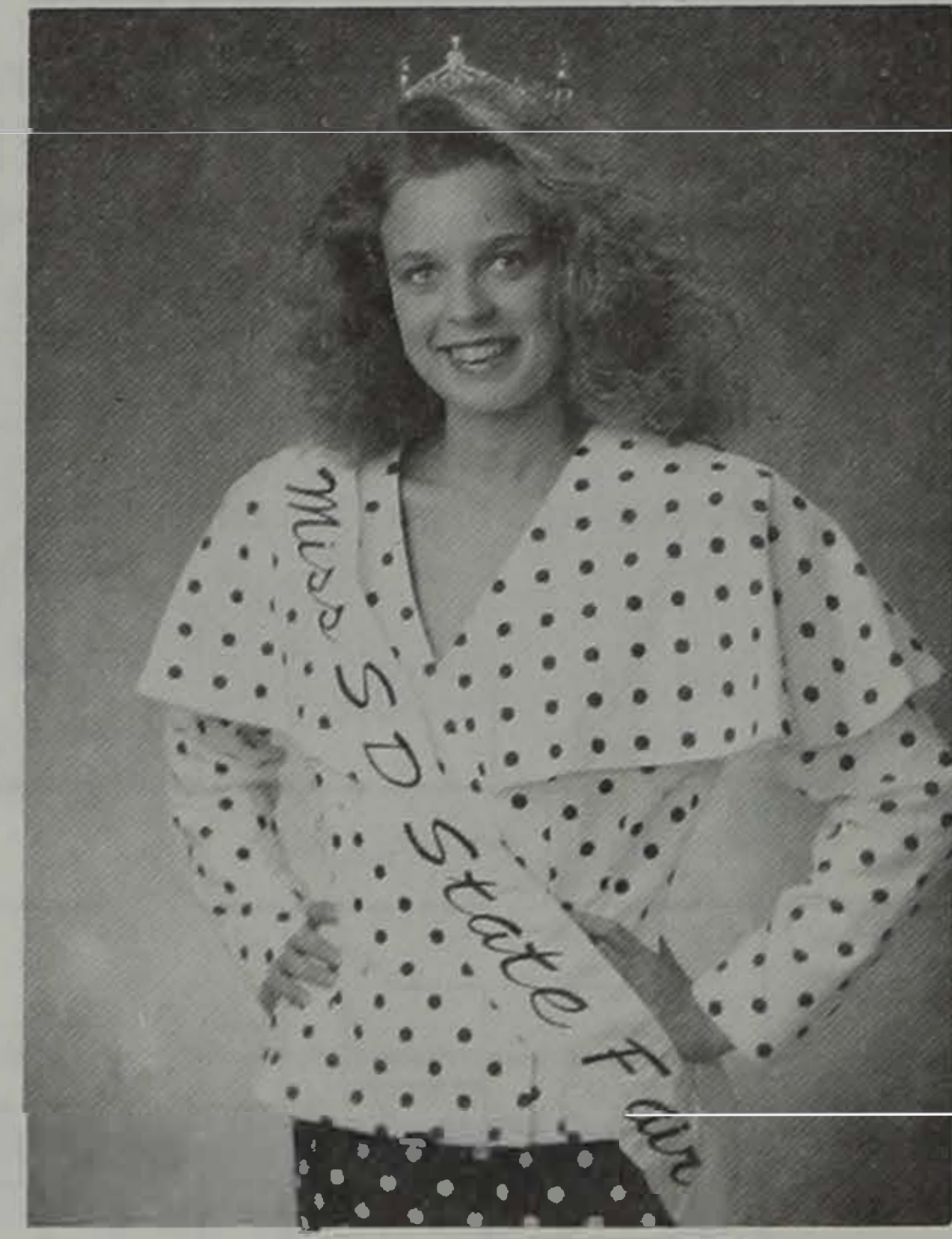

SDSU Opens New Swine Unit in February

February 22, 1992, marked the grand opening of the new SDSU Swine Unit facility. "We're really enthused about the new facility. We now have a facility that is state-of-the-art and will allow students to see and work with a modern system. The same goes for producers who may be looking to build a new system," said Dr. George Libal, Swine Specialist at SDSU.

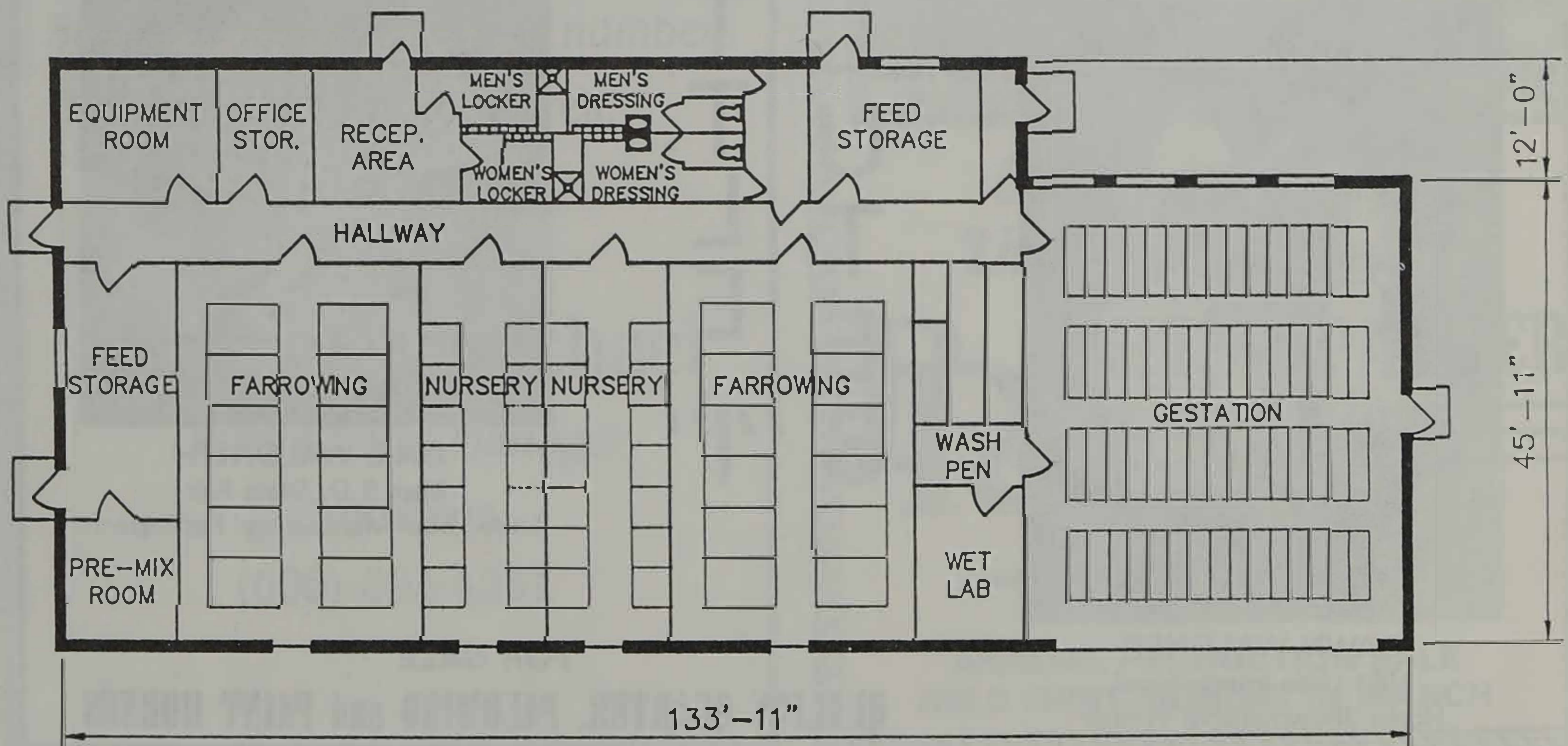
The unit features a gestation room with gestation stalls for 60 sows. The facility also includes two farrowing rooms which hold 12 sows each, as well as two nursery rooms with 14 pens each. If the farrowing rooms are run continuously, the nursery would take care of about half of the pigs. The rest would be cared for in the existing facilities in the Animal Science Complex. At this time, there isn't enough

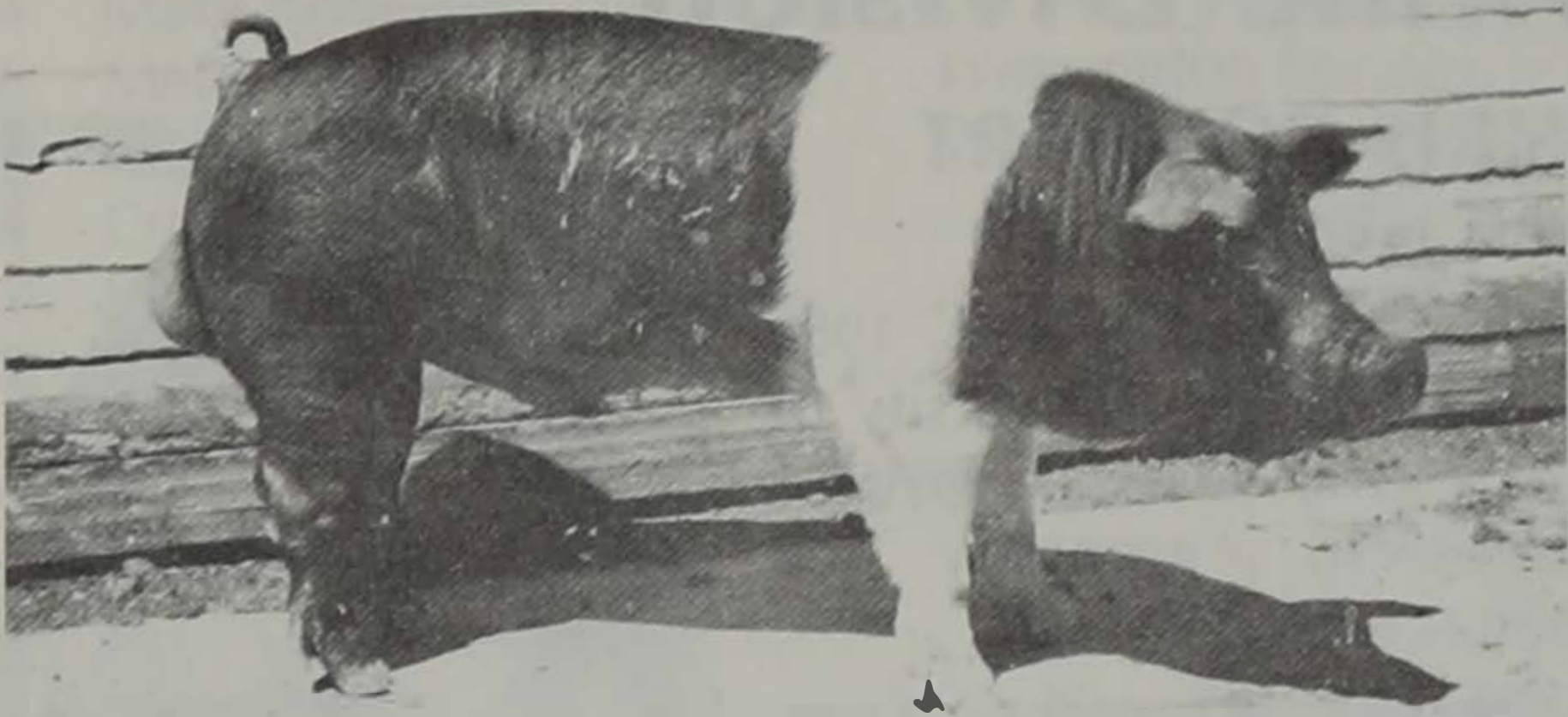
finishing space to handle all of the pigs, so some feeders will probably be sold.

Another feature of the unit is a completely enclosed waste handling system. It is a pull plug system with hairpin gutters under the flooring. The waste is contained in a Harvester slurry tank. Because the system is fully enclosed, there is no danger to the environment.

Everyone who enters the unit will be required to "shower in" and "shower out" to prevent the spread of the disease. Observation windows are available for anyone interested.

Bill Heylens has managed the swine unit for 20 years. He is assisted by Mike Kidwiler and six part-time work-study students.

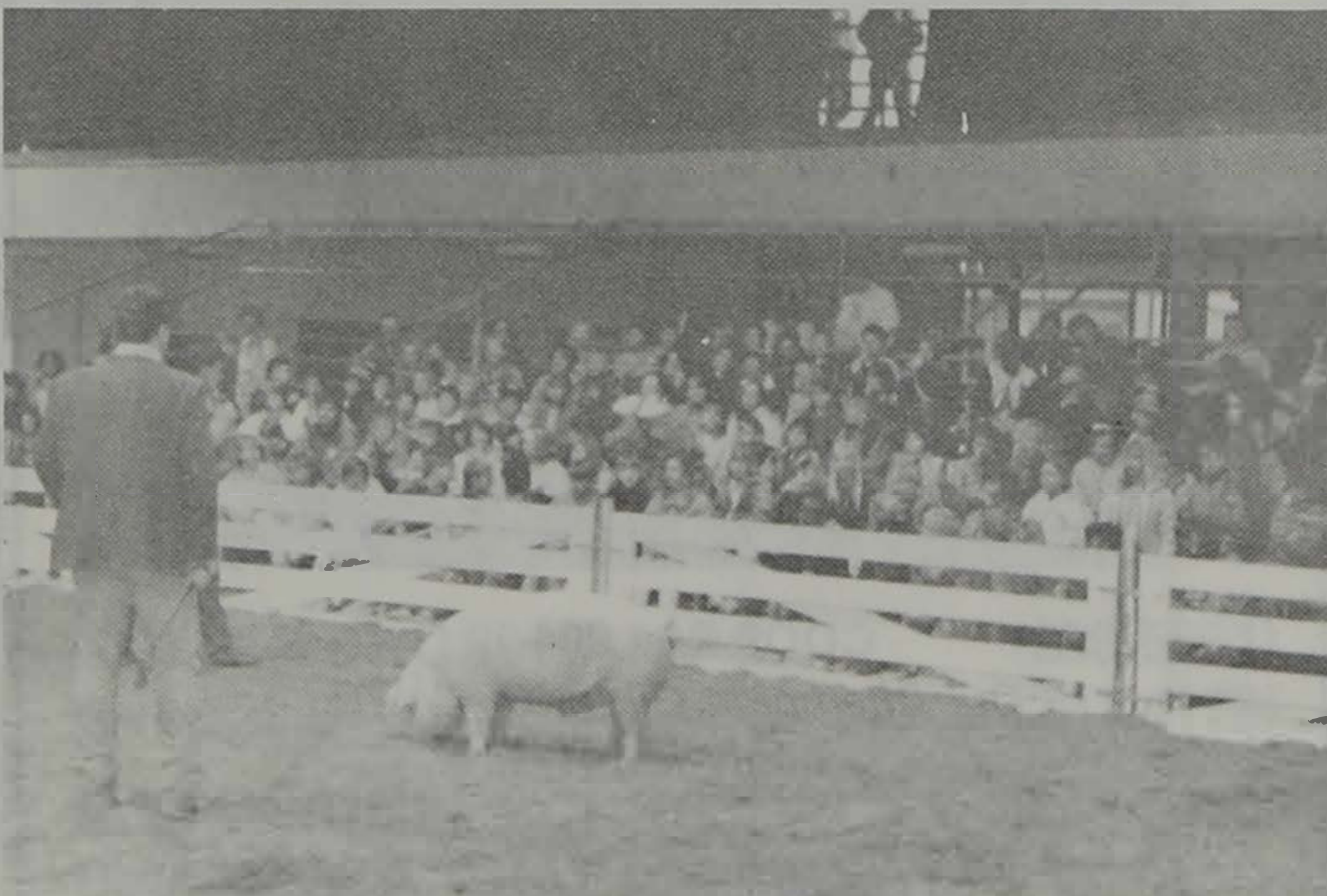
Field Trip

Dairy Unit Looks to New Barn, Parlor

The SDSU Dairy Unit has been managed for 18 years by Fenton Ludens, a native of Viborg, S.D. He graduated from SDSU in 1972 with a degree in Agricultural Education.

Prior to 1964, the Dairy Unit was located where the H.M. Briggs Library stands today. The present facilities were built in 1964 and 1965. The Dairy Unit was appropriated \$500,000 in 1988 from the state legislature to build a new barn and parlor. These new facilities could house an additional 96 cows. Construction of the new facilities is pending.

The Dairy Unit consists of 200 head of Registered Holsteins, 90 of which are milked. The cows are milked twice a day by seven full-time employees and part-time student employees.

Research is currently being done on protein-energy interrelationships and bovine somatotrophin, with additional experiments on ruminal fermentation, milk composition, and newsprint bedding.

The dairy herd has an approximately 19,000-pound rolling herd average for milk production. Most of the milk is utilized by the Dairy Science processing plant to supply milk and ice cream for

the University Food Service and also to make cheese and milk. The excess milk is picked up and purchased by Land O' Lakes.

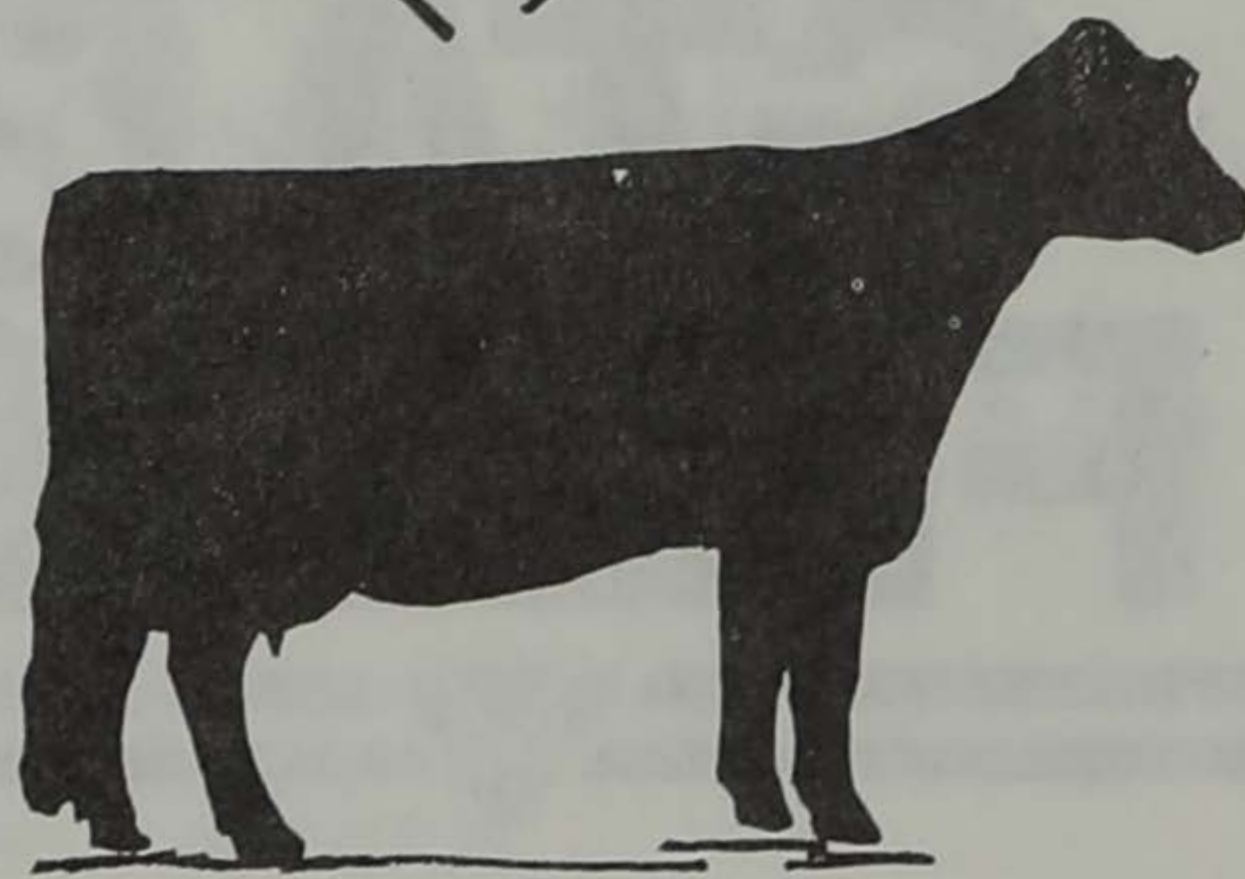

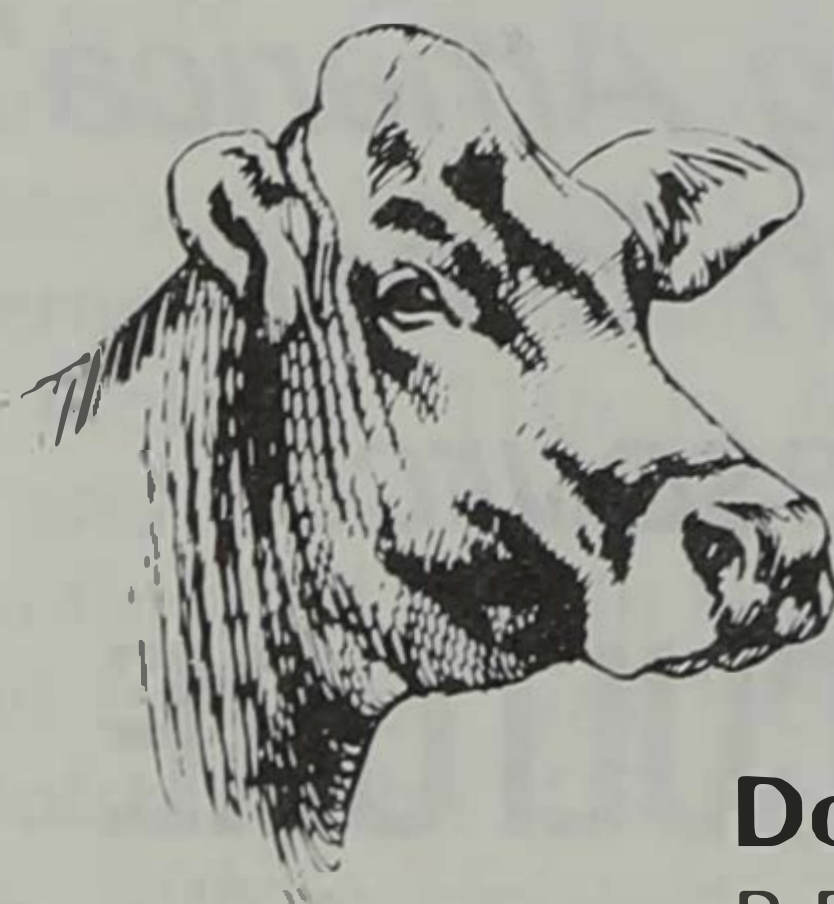

Dairy Products Team Wins National Title

The SDSU Dairy Products Judging Team took first place in all products to win the National Championship at the 70th annual Intercollegiate Dairy Products Evaluation Contest in Chicago, Ill. The contest was held on Oct. 28, and 17 teams competed. The contest is divided into six different product areas. These include: milk, butter, yogurt, cottage cheese, cheddar cheese and vanilla ice cream. Each product is ranked or scored in up to three of the following criticisms: body/texture, flavor and appearance.

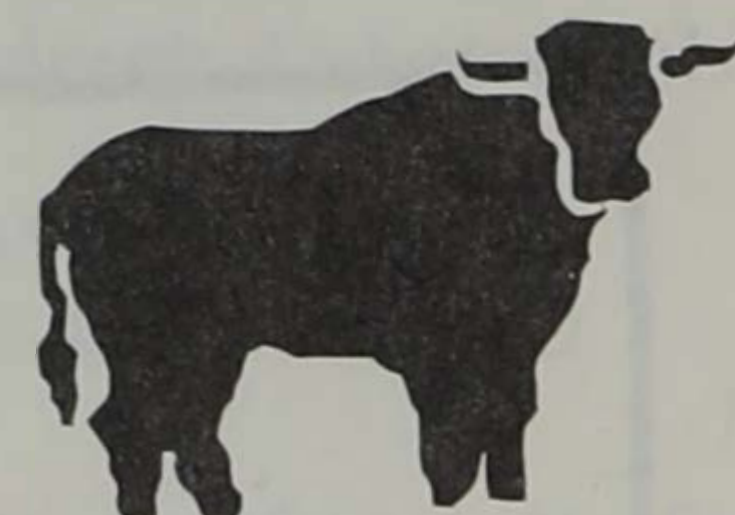
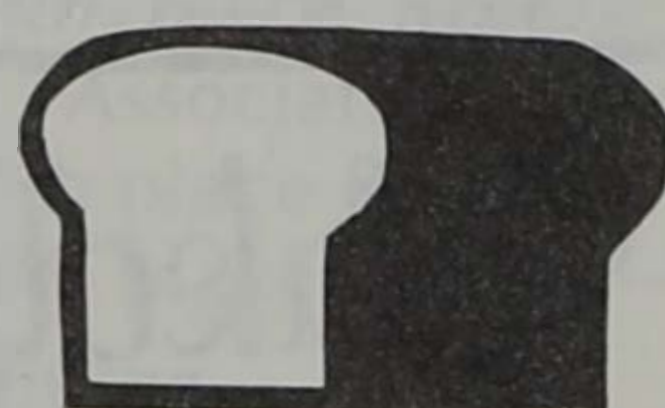
Team members were Troy Gascoigne, Brookings; Sue Hawkins, Lawlor, Iowa; Tom Heilman, Bowdle, S.D.; Tom Kinder, Willow Lake, S.D., and Lloyd Metzger, Lester, Iowa. Individuals placing in the national championship were: Kinder placed first overall in the contest; Metzger was sixth, and Hawkins was eighth out of 51 contestants. Kinder also placed second in ice cream, third in butter, third in milk and was presented a special plaque and cash award for placing first overall in the contest.

This was the tenth time the SDSU Dairy Products Judging Team has won the national title.

Two weeks earlier the team won the Regional Contest, held at Kraft General Foods in Glenview, Ill. The team finished first overall, first in butter, first in yogurt, first in cheddar cheese, second in milk, and third in ice cream. Individually, for all products, Metzger was first, Kinder second, and Heilman was third out of 33 contestants. Metzger

was third in yogurt and cheddar cheese, Kinder was first in yogurt, and Heilman was third in yogurt.

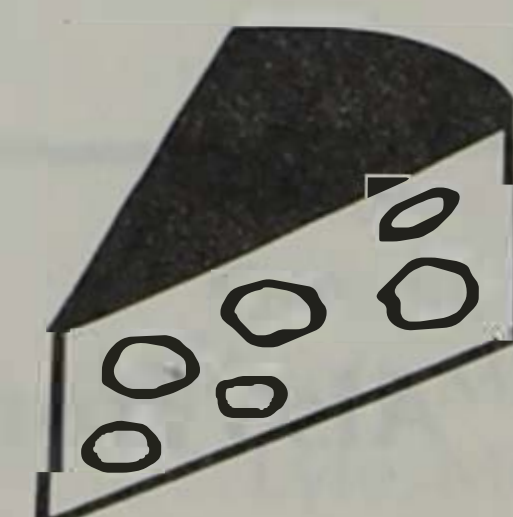

Dairy Cattle Team Competes in 2 States

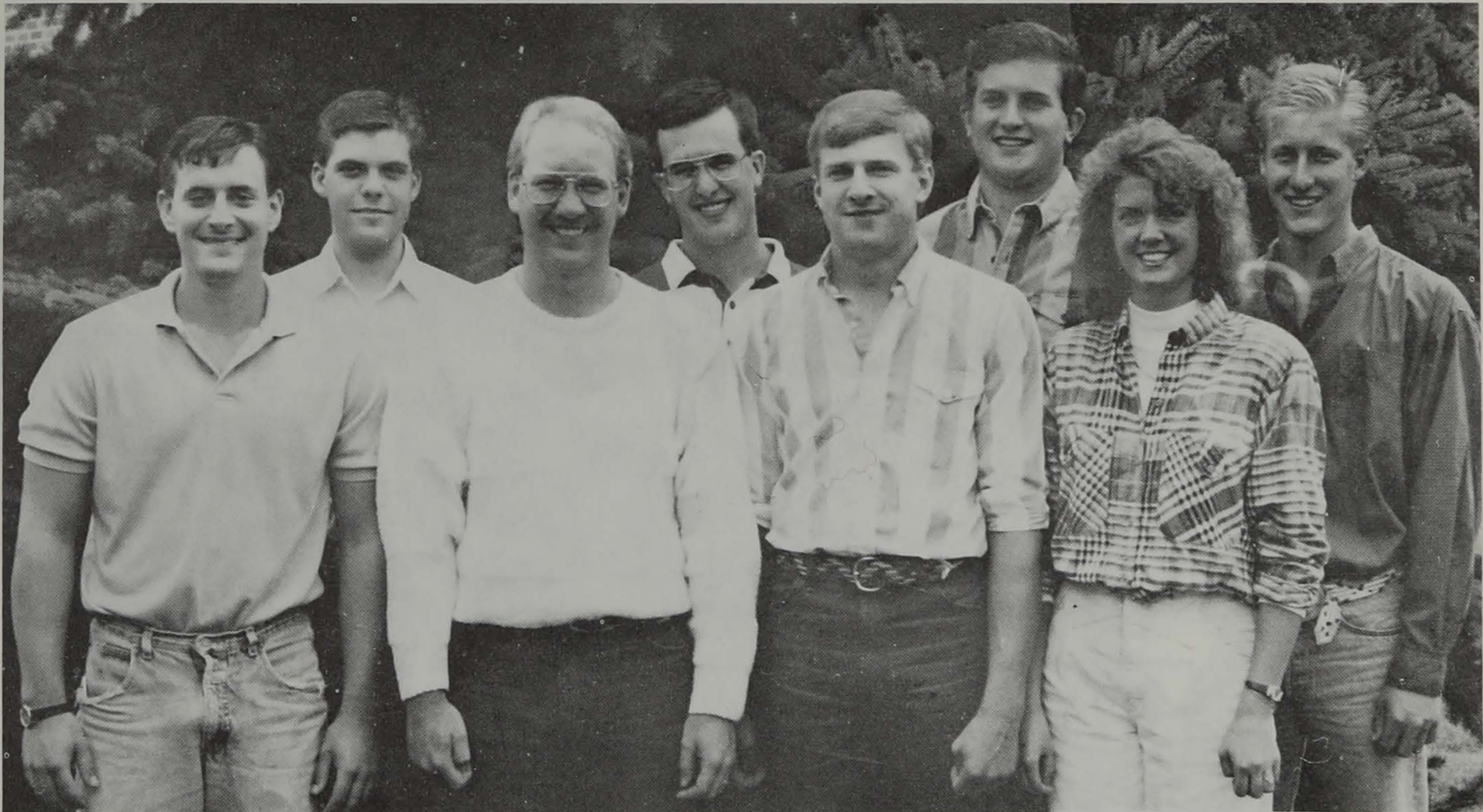
The SDSU Dairy Cattle Judging Team competed at the Midwest Intercollegiate Dairy Cattle Judging Contest in Waterloo, Iowa, on Sept. 15, 1991. For individual placings, Koerner was high individual in Guernsey, second in Holstein, 11th in Ayrshire, and 15th in Reasons and Overall. Owens was fourth in Guernsey, Tripp finished 16th in Holstein, and 17th in Ayrshire, and Patterson was 15th in Brown Swiss and 21st in Holstein. The SDSU team finished second in Guernsey, fifth in Holstein, sixth in Ayrshire, and placed eighth Overall.

The team also competed at the National Intercollegiate Dairy Cattle Contest in Madison, Wis., on Oct. 1, 1991. Twenty-eight teams and 108 contestants competed. For individual placings, Koerner

was 15th in Milking Shorthorn, 28th in Guernsey, 23rd in Reasons and 56th Overall. Owens was 22nd in the Jersey breed. The SDSU team finished 11th in Guernsey, 12th in Jersey, 18th in Milking Shorthorn and Holstein, and was 20th Overall.

Livestock Teams Judge 3 Species

Each spring semester all students are offered the chance of being a member of the Junior Livestock Judging Team and may return in the fall to be part of the Senior Team. Team members use both subjective and objective methods of evaluating breeding or market beef, swine or sheep throughout the season.

A contest consists of evaluating 12 classes of four animals in each class. The participants are then given the chance to explain and justify their placing through oral reasons. Giving reasons improves each team member's overall confidence, oral communication skills, and livestock evaluation skills.

Mary Nesvald, team coach, stated that there is no set formula that you can put into a computer and come out with the correct placing of a class of livestock every time. Therefore, there is always a method to improve livestock evaluation skills.

Plant Team Tops in U.S. for Third Time

For the third time in the last four years, the Range Plant Identification Team from South Dakota State University is the number one plant team in the United States. The team placed third at the International Society for Range Management meeting held in Spokane, Wash. The plant team from Antonio Narro (Mexico) won the international competition for the fourth straight year and the Chapingo team, also from Mexico, finished second. SDSU students who participated in the 24-team competition included: Shawn Weishaar (fifth), Lemmon, S.D.; Mary Sunstrom (13th), Alcester, S.D.; Bruce Nachtigall (19th), Hot Springs, S.D.; Jeff Tomac (23rd), Keldron, S.D.; Jennifer King, Philip, S.D. and Krecia and Kindra Beitelspacher, both of Bowdle, S.D. The team was coached by Dr. Gary Larson, Department of Biology/Microbiology. Dr. Larson's teams have collected seven top-five finishes in the past nine years.

The Undergraduate Range Management Exam (URME) team placed fifth among 15 teams. Weishaar was high individual and received a free trip to Washington, D.C., courtesy of the U.S. Forest Service. Nachtigall (19th) and Jeff Tomac (39th), Rod Voss, Brookings, Sundstrom, Krecia and Kindra Beitelspacher and King also competed. The team was chauffeured by Bok Sowell.

Weishaar captured top overall honors for having the highest combined plant and URME scores. This is the second year in a row that a Range student from South Dakota has finished first in this category. Misty Linaberry of Crookston, Neb., won the award last year. Shawn will receive another trip to Washington as the guest of the Soil Conservation Service.

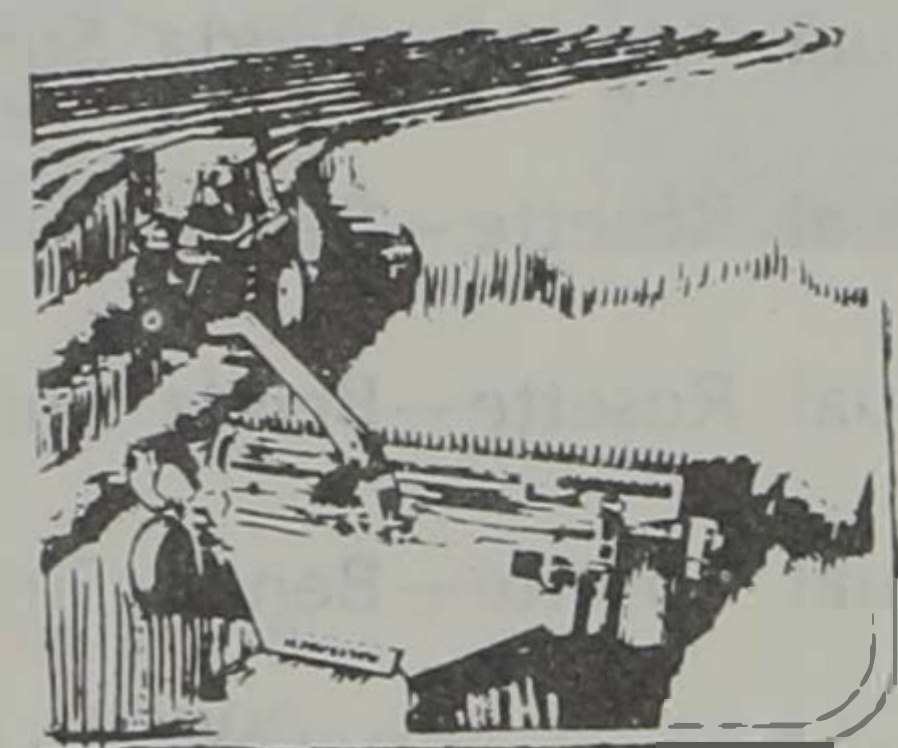
Tammy Humble, Newell, S.D., a freshman major-

Meats Judging Team Considers Quality, Yield

In late November of every year, all SDSU students are offered the chance to compete in intercollegiate meat judging. Interested students then start practicing to be on the Junior Meats Judging Team which competes in the spring semester.

Students from the junior team may return in the fall to participate on the Seniors Meats Judging Team. Practices are two to four times per week. During the week, the main practice location is the SDSU Meat Laboratory. On weekends, the team practices at various packing plants, such as those in Sioux Falls, Luverne, Minn., and Norfolk, Neb.

A contest is made up of nine placing classes, in which the student has to rank four exhibits. Placing classes are beef carcasses, pork carcasses, lamb carcasses, fresh hams and various beef wholesale cuts. The student then must justify his/her placing on five of the classes with written reasons.

In addition, the students must establish USDA Quality and Yield grades on 15 beef carcasses. Finally, the students are required to inspect 10 meat cuts to insure they meet proper USDA specifications for cut and trim. Of course, the contest ac-

tivities are all timed and this puts the students under additional pressure.

In the spring, SDSU participate in one or two contests; the senior team competes in four contests in the fall. Here are the results of 1991 Meat Judging Teams:

National Western, Greeley, Colo.—Team: seventh overall, second total placing, third beef judging, fourth lamb judging; Buisker, seventh overall, second pork judging, third total placing, fifth specifications.

Great Plains Invitational, Sioux Falls, S.D.—Team: second overall, second beef judging, second lamb judging, second specifications, third beef grading, third pork judging, third total placings, third reasons; Buisker, sixth overall, fifth beef grading, fifth beef judging; Connor, eighth overall, fourth lamb judging; Dykes, fourth specifications.

High Plains, Plainview, Texas—Team: twelfth overall, third lamb judging, eighth reasons, eighth beef grading, eighth pork judging.

ISU Regional, Ames, Iowa—Team: fourth overall, second specifications, fourth pork judging, fifth beef judging, fifth beef grading; Buisker, first overall, first specifications, second beef grading; Dykes, third specifications.

American Royal, Emporia, Kansas—Team: fourth overall, first specifications, second beef judging, fifth reasons, fifth
