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# A Guidebook for Occupational Therapy in End-of-Life Care

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## BACKGROUND

- Patients at the end-of-life (EoL) experience decline in body functions, performance skills, and performance patterns, serving as barriers to occupational participation and engagement (AOTA, 2011; Martin & Herkt, 2018).
- Patients at the EoL desire continued occupational engagement despite declines, however, this desire is unfulfilled (Keesing & Rosenwax, 2011).
- The role, scope, and delivery of OT in EoL care are widely misunderstood by healthcare professionals, patients, families, caregivers, and OT students and practitioners (Keesing & Rosenwax, 2011; Knecht-Sabres et al., 2019).

## PROBLEM

**Insufficient education and training** for OT students on the role, scope, and delivery of OT services in EoL care contributes to a significant gap in OT practice and influences the limited presence of OT practitioners in EoL care settings, resulting in underutilization of OT services and failure to meet the occupational needs of patients at the EoL.

## PURPOSE

To provide education and training for OT students and practitioners to recognize, fulfill, and advocate for their role in EoL care.
