
Marymount College


Marymount College was founded by a group of progressive nuns from the Religious Order of the Sacred Heart of Mary.







Broke ground on June 9, 1962 as the first two-year Catholic junior college for women in Florida and the 5th Marymount College in the country.

Marymount College was dedicated on December 14, 1963. There were four original buildings: Founders' Hall (two-story student center, chapel, Rowley Library, dining room, auditorium, bookstore), Trinity Residence Hall (first dormitory), Carroll Hall (academic building), and St. Joseph's Hall (utility building).

The New York architectural and engineering firm, Evans and Delehanty, designed the buildings, and Frank J. Rooney, Inc. was the general contractor.

The first class had only 98 students. Reportedly, women came from 18 states and four foreign countries. There were also 12 local students.

CHILDREN'S ENRICHMENT PROGRAM — 200 boys and girls from ow-income families participated in an educational-recreational experience conducted by six members of the Religious of the Sacred Heart of Mary and College students. All were volunteer workers. The six week program, directed by Sister Simone, R.S.H.M., was filmed by a CBS-TV crew for national viewing in September. Funded entirely by donations received from private sources, the children benefitted from remedial academics, field trips, swimming, music, art and a good lunch each day.




UPWARD BOUND — 50 girls with college potential from low-income families were enrolled in the 2nd summer of UB at Marymount. Twenty of these girls will now go on to their freshman year at college better prepared to undertake the scholarly and social challenge of higher education.

In 1964, Marymount opens a second dormitory – East Hall – later known as Wixted Hall, now known as Freiburger Hall.









In 1967, Marymount opened a third dormitory – West Hall – later known as Patton Hall, now known as the de Hoernle Residence Hall.



On February 22, 1970, the Milton F. Lewis and Rita C. Lewis Library opened.









Men weren't allow to enter Marymount College as full-time degree candidates until 1967.

Fall 1971 marked the first time in Marymount's history that men are allowed to reside on campus.

YOUNG MEN AWARDED SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships awarded five young men will usher in a co-educational era at Marymount. The first males to enter as degree candidates, they will be day students in the liberal arts

curriculum. Although the college has enrolled males as part-time and special students in the past, this is the first group of men to be registered full-time.





In 1971, due to a decrease in enrollment and severe financial hardship, the Board of Trustees voted to close Marymount College, effective May 31, 1972.




President Gerard Fagan announced the news on September 30, 1971.



We, the undersigned <u>Donald E. Ross</u> , President and <u>Gerald B. Carville</u>
Executive Vice Pres. , of COLLEGE OF BOCA RATON, a Corporation duly
organized and existing under and by virtue of the Laws of the State of Florida,
do hereby certify that at a meeting of the Board of Trustees, of said Corporation
duly called and held at the office of said Corporation, in the City of Boca Raton
and State of Florida on the 15th day of December
19 74 , at which meeting a quorum was present and voted, the following
Resolution was adopted:

"Upon motion made, seconded and unanimously carried, it was agreed that the name of the institution should be changed to:

COLLEGE OF BOCA RATON

and that this should become effective February 1, 1975."

The Board of Trustees voted on the name change in December 1974, took effect February 1, 1975.











The College of Boca Raton Men's Soccer Team won the first national championship for the institution in 1987.



Lynn University launched Project Civitas, inspired by the Roman word for citizens with a shared sense of community - in 2015 designed to promote civility both on campus and in the community.







