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

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


It's so hard to choose between the pink skirt and the purple skirt.

movement and light.




Degas liked to paint ballerinas during their long hours of practice at the studio.

The rays of sunshine that pour through her window...




remind Delilah of pink and yellow tutus.



As she ties her sneakers for school,




she imagines tying her pointe shoe ribbons before a performance.



At school Delilah's teacher asks the class, "What is 5+4?"




But Delilah imagines the ballet teacher in Degas' painting saying, "Straighten your back and point those toes!"




