Reading needs of secondary school pupils; examination and construction of materials; use and administration of reading tests; development of a secondary school reading program and personnel involved are stressed.

Ed. 382, Current Trends in Secondary Education, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

The effective use of instructional materials, media of communication, and organization of personnel and current research. Non-thesis candidates will plan a field study project and submit proposal for approval by the major professor. Open only to candidates for the master's degree. A survey of the more important philosophical developments during the last century: realism, pragmatism, positivism, analytic philosophy, materialism, existentialism, and certain other philosophical movements. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Phil. 23 or permission of instructor.

Phil. 141, Metaphysics, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

A systematic and historical study of the nature of metaphysics, including such topics as: causation, essence, mind, universal categories, presuppositions, and their relation to the arts and sciences. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Junior standing or permission of instructor.

Phil. 142, Epistemology, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

A systematic and historical study of ways of knowing; kinds of knowledge; integration of knowledge; the physical and non-physical sciences. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Junior standing or permission of instructor.

Pol. Sci. 108, African Governments and Politics, Sem. I, 3 cr.

Political developments in the new nations of sub-Saharan Africa. The stress is functional: the role of parties as integrative forces; democratic centralism; one party states; African political thought and common developmental problems. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Pol. Sci. 13 and 16.

Pol. Sci. 207, African Ideologies and International Relations, Sem. II, 3 cr.

A seminar devoted to the twin foci of African ideological frameworks and the stance of sub-Saharan African nations on the international scene. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Pol. Sci. 13 and 16.

Pol. Sci. 211, The United States and China, Sem. II, 3 cr.

A seminar focused on U.S. China Policy since World War II, with attention to American attitudes toward Nationalist China and Communist China; the role of public opinion in the making of foreign policy; interest groups and China; China and the United Nations; and major policy alternatives. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Pol. Sci. 13 and 16.

Pol. Sci. 167, American Jurisprudence, Sem. II, 3 credits

An analysis of the major theories of law: natural law, analytical positivism, and historical, sociological and realist jurisprudence. Prerequisite: One course in Business Law of Constitutional Law. (Lec. 3)

Acctg. 121, Cost Accounting, Sem. I, 3 cr.

Cost systems including job order, process, and standard costs with emphasis on the managerial control of costs. (Lec. 3)

Acctg. 131, Advanced Accounting, Sem. I, 3 cr.

Accounting theory applicable to partnerships, installment sales, insurance, consignments, receiverships, estates and trusts, and specialized accounting subjects. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Acct. 11.

Acctg. 134, Budgetary Control and Profit Planning, Sem. II, 3 cr.

Preparation of budgets and their relation to the control of costs and expenses. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Acct. 121 or Acct. 24.

Auditing standards, procedures, programs, working papers, and internal control. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Acct. 12.

The controller's functions, techniques and responsibilities for planning with text, problem, and case assignments. (Lec. 3)

Econ. 300, Principles of Economics, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

A survey of micro and macro economic theory. MBA students only. (Lec. 3)

Econ. 327, National Income and Forecasting, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Advanced macro economic theory and an analysis of short-run forecasting techniques. (Lec. 3) Prerequisites: Econ. 25 and 26 or 300.

4. Department of Finance

a) Delete Fin. 22, Investment, and Fin. 34, Money and Banking, as alternatives to Fin. 21, Corporate Finance, for undergraduate students majoring in Management.

b) Add (new):

Fin. 300, Principles and Practices of Business Finance and Their Application in Business, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Uses of financial instruments, problems of capital financing, financial expansion and reorganization, operations of specialized financial institutions. MBA students only. (Lec. 3)

Fin. 321, Financial Management, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Problems and decisions as to the management of business funds as viewed by the chief financial officer. Case method used. (Lec. 3)
Prerequisite: Permission of department.

Fin. 391, 392, Seminar in Finance, Sem. I and II, 3 cr. ea.

Independent research conducted along lines of a theme established by the instructor; individual topics based on reading and research interests of the students; each student to present two papers during the course of each semester. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: MBA standing and Fin. 321.

5. Department of Management

Mgt. 300, Principles of Management, Sem. II, 3 cr.

Management applied to business; objectives, policies, organization, staffing and control; production personnel, behavioral science application, the role of quantitative methods. MBA students only. (Lec. 3)

Mgt. 341, Production and Personnel Management, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Decision making in production and working force; objectives, planning and decision models with special attention on behavioral models and development of efficient labor force. (Lec. 3)

Mgt. 342, Managerial Economics, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Mathematics, statistics, and econometrics as tools in dealing with typical problems of managerial economics; application of economic concepts to

decision-making of the firm. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Econ. 300, Q.B.A. 300, and Stat. 300, or equivalent.

Mgt. 391, 392, Seminar in Industrial Management, Sems. I and II, 2 cr. ea.

Class discussion of typical cases, original research work in the field of industry with discussion of data collected and analyzed by individual students. (Lec. 2) Prerequisite: Permission of department.

Q.B.A. 7, 8, Introduction to Electronic Computers, Sems. I and II, 1 cr. e

Introduction to concepts and basic functions of electronic computers; instruction on FORTRAN and COBOL; materials relevant to newest computers, such as IBM 360. (Lab. 2)

Q.B.A. 300, Quantitative Methods for Business Analysis, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Application of quantitative methods to economic analysis and business decision-making; theory and application of functions; differential and integral calculus; vectors and matrices; linear programming; and theory of games. MBA students only. (Lec. 3)

Q.B.A. 361, Quantitative Business Analytical Techniques, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

The development and application of the principal mathematical, statistical and digital techniques used in model building and decision-making of the firm, under certainty and uncertainty. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Q.B.A. 300 and Stat. 300.

Stat. 300, Fundamental Business Statistics, Sem. I, 3 cr.

Statistical methods as tools of management; statistical inference, decision-making, index numbers, correlation, quality control; the collection and interpretation of data. MBA students only. (Lec. 3)

6. Department of Marketing Management

Mkt. Mgt. 300, Marketing Survey, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Fundamentals of marketing; the place of the field of marketing in the economy. MBA students only. (Lec. 3)

Mkt. Mgt. 351, Marketing Management, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Analysis of marketing problems and determination of marketing policies in product development, promotion, pricing, channel selection; legal aspects. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Permission of department.

Mkt. Mgt. 356, International Marketing Management, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Marketing policy-making for the multinational firm; organizing for international marketing, market opportunity, pricing, channels, promotion, research. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Permission of department.

B.A. 355, International Business Administration, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Problems and policies of international business enterprise; economic, legal political, social and cultural aspects. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Permission of department.

B.A. 371, Methods of Business Research, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Toward an understanding of the role, spirit, and methodology of business research. Assigned research projects. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Permission of department.

B.A. 381, Administrative Policy and Decision-Making, Sem. I or II, 3 cr.

Integration of the function areas such as finance, production, marketing, personnel, into the decision-making process, as viewed from top management position. Utilization of case method and simulation. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: College of Business Administration graduate.

Design of oceanic experiments to determine spatial and temporal sampling rates, precision, accuracy, signal-to-noise ratio, etc. Description of typical ocean data collection and analysis systems. Development of relevant techniques. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: Math. 151 or equivalent.

The candidate must pass a comprehensive written examination near the end of his course work. This examination will test the candidate's ability to integrate the knowledge gained in the several major functional areas of the program. This examination will be determined and directed by the appropriate body in the College of Business Administration.

A Reading List of the current literature in the various fields shall be given to the candidate in September of the year in which he is to obtain his degree. The written examination will cover the reading list and the course work.

If the candidate has met the basic requirements of any required course in the curriculum he should then take the next advanced course in the same area.

This program will follow the general requirements of the U.R.I. Graduate School.

Each candidate must submit an ATGSB test score with application.
