SECTION III

Joint Report of the Curricular Affairs Committee and the University College and General Education Committee on URI 101

On October 20, 1994, the Faculty Senate voted to direct University College to design a course proposal for a one-credit freshman seminar and submit the course proposal to the Curricular Affairs Committee for consideration in time for the course to be approved for Freshmen in Fall 1995. The course to be developed consistent with the outline of the course proposed in the UCGE report and to also incorporate other suggestions. The course was approved by the Curricular Affairs Committee on January 27, 1995 and a motion that URI 101 be required for freshmen was approved by the University College and General Education Committee on February 13, 1995.

A. Recommendation of the Curricular Affairs Committee:

University College

ADD: URI 101 Traditions and Transformations: A Freshman Seminar (I and II, 1) Introduces first year students to the traditions of higher education and academic culture and to significant societal and personal issues that bear on developing goals for the undergraduate years. May not be repeated for credit. Staff

Approved by the Faculty Senate on February 23, 1995 and amended on March 23, 1995.

B. Recommendation of the University College and General Education as amended by the Faculty Senate on March 23, 1995:

That the course, URI 101, be required of all new freshmen and new transfer students with less than 24 credits beginning in Spring 1996. That variations of the course, URI 101, be permitted, through the "topics" format (e.g., URI 101A, 101B etc.); these variations to be approved by the University College and General Education Committee. A student may enroll in any section of URI 101 without regard to intended major. URI 101 may not be repeated for credit.

Students selecting this field must complete a minimum of 33 credits (maximum 45 credits) in economics including ECN 201 and 202 (6), 305 and 306 (6), 327 and 328 (6), 445 (3).

d. CHANGE: Requirements for the B.S. in Economics to read as follows:

Students in this curriculum may elect either the economic theory and methods option or the applied economics option. Students must inform the Arts and Sciences Dean's Office which option they are choosing.

Economic Theory and Methods. A minimum of 30 credits in economics including ECN 201, 202, 305, 327, and 328. In addition, students selecting this option must complete MTH 141, 142, 215, 243, 307, and 435. This option is recommended for students preparing for graduate study in economics.

Applied Economics. A minimum of 30 credits in economics including ECN 201, 202, 305, 327, 328, 375, 376, and 445. In addition, students selecting this option must complete COM 101; MTH 451 or STA 308 or QBA 202.

A total of 120 credits is required for graduation.
