Dear Mr. Secretary:

I am writing to request the Administration's views on the desirability of initiating ratification proceedings for the Convention for the Protection of Cultural Property in the Event of Armed Conflict. The United States signed, but did not ratify the Convention.

It is my understanding that the United States decided not to ratify the Convention on the basis of Department of Defense concerns that the U.S. could not meet its obligations in the event of nuclear war. Whatever the merits of this argument may have been in the mid-1950s when the Convention was signed, the threat of U.S.-Soviet nuclear conflict has now receeded significantly.

As we cast off the tendrils of cold war policies, I urge the Department to reconsider whether the United States could ratify the the Hague Convention. This would send a strong signal of U.S. support for the protection of the world's cultural heritage.

I would appreciate knowing of your views.
