Bryant Men Break United Fund Record

November 17th and 18th at Bryant was the scene of Bryant's annual participation in the Rhode Island United Fund Drive. Bryant's Men's Economic Recovery Period versus the Women's Economic Recovery Period is the only student co-ordinated United Fund drive on a college campus in the state.

This year the men of Bryant broke all previous records by collecting \$102.19 in the two-day campaign. The women also bettered previous year's collections in collecting \$59.45 but were unable to unseat the undefeated and chivalrous Bryant men. The campaign was directed by the College Development Office and the Student Senate. The winning men's team was coordinated by the chairman, Howard Duckworth, a junior, while the women were capably led by Dianne Mielke, a senior and president of Alpha Phi Kappa sorority.

Both chairmen would like to thank all who contributed to

this worthwhile cause and especially to those who gave their time so unselfishly to help in the solicitation of funds. They would also like to thank the many Bryant instructors who allowed them to enter their classrooms to solicit support during the campaign.

This campaign has again proved that Bryant students do care enough to dig deep when the need is there. The fund's receipts from Bryant at a time when most students needed their money for transportation home at Thanksgiving are sure to be appreciated not only by the United Fund but by all of the many fine agencies which the fund supports. A Bryant student should hold his head high when he can say that his school spends its time helping others while at other institutions of higher learning the students are much too busy attacking speakers and inviting speakers to their campus under the guise of academic freedom who represent the core of moral lightweightness.

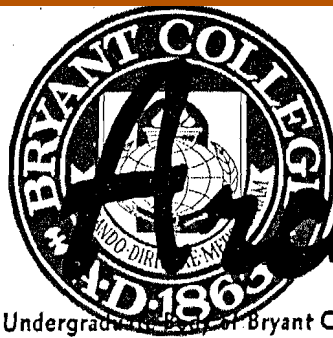

Young Democrats

Newly formed and, in fact, still in the infant stages of development, the Young Democrats of Bryant were most fortunate to have a national legislator as guest speaker at a recent meeting. Congressman Joseph I. Kesnick (D-N. Y.) of the 28th District gave an off-the-cuff speech concerning (1) attitudes voters have toward officials and (2) tactics used in Congress by legislators.

Claiming many citizens believe all public officials to be corrupt, Mr. Kesnick said he was appalled by the fact that people expect dishonesty in administrators and do very little to oust unscrupulous persons from office. He based the future of the country on the people's ability to support those men who will uphold the principles upon which our country was founded.

Numerous questions were directed at the Congressman: he answered each clearly and with factual, knowledgeable support. When asked about his personal thoughts on voting in the legislature, he cited some advice given to him as a freshman in Congress by House Speaker Mr. McCormack: "Vote for your country first, your district second, and your party, third." The reapportionment laws, election finances, Congressional sentiment toward escalation of the war in Viet Nam, and the progress of the 25th amendment were examples of the topics discussed by Mr. Resnick at the request of students.

Even when inquiries were made with regard to specific personalities in Washington, Mr. Resnick gave his observations in a frank and candid manner. Stating the consensus in the Capital and of the people in general, he made comments such as, "Robert Kennedy (by the New York delegation) is probably the most hated man in Washington." Prominent figures such as Ronald Reagan, George Murphy, Adam Clayton Powell, Thomas Dodd, and Edward Brooke were discussed. In addition, Representative Resnick's own fine record toward constructive action was brought out at the suggestions of the members.

Bryant's Parking Problem

The parking situation for the commuters of Bryant College has caused quite a stir among the student body. Upon asking the students how they felt about the problem these were some of the replies.

"They should take down the 8:00 A.M.-10:00 A.M. No Parking signs."

"Terrible, they ought to build a parking lot."

"They should take down the No Parking signs on Benevolent Street."

"If you come late you can't find a parking space unless you park 3 or 4 blocks away."

"If there is a solution to this problem, immediate action should be taken; I myself have received 3 tickets just trying to get to class on time."

Recently, in response to this situation, Fred Lowry, President of the Student Senate, appointed Paul Delude and Bill Arndt as co-chairmen of a committee to investigate and seek a possible solution to the parking problem. The immediate plans of the committee were two-fold: (1) Petitions to be signed by the student body and (2) Questionnaires to be sent to the residents situated in Bryant's vicinity. Upon gathering the statistical data the information will be presented to Dr. Jacobs for study. If successful it will then be sent to the Traffic and Control Division of the city of Providence and eventually to Mayor Doorley.

The actual conflict in regard to the parking facilities appears to be one between the residents and the College. The residents pay taxes and are entitled to privacy but the students of the college have rights also. Since Bryant is a college and a non-profit organization released from taxes, the traffic division has in the past tended to listen to the tax paying residents. Another reason for the signs is political: for example, the 8:00 A.M.-10:00 A.M. No Parking signs are there for fire prevention purposes which of course is ridiculous. We can only hope that this plan does come through in our favor. If not the committee will look for alternative actions.

Litigated Laughter

1st Installment

As every student who has studied law knows, a requirement to a binding contract is the element called "consideration." In brief the law requires each party to an agreement to give something in return for what he receives, the so called "quid pro quo." Its value is unimportant either absolutely or relatively to the item received if in fact it is what the opposite party sought in exchange.

In a Massachusetts case that was appealed to the state's highest court before it was decided with finality, a successful businessman agreed to allow his lady friend occupancy of his beautiful penthouse apartment that was otherwise not in use. The lady insisted on a twenty-year lease, however, before she would enter such an arrangement. Whereupon, the parties laughingly agreed that the lessor would grant her the right to live in the premises for twenty years and as rent the lessee would give the lessor, on the first of every year, one "red, red rose." The written lease was drawn by the attorney accordingly.

When the lessor's spouse learned of the transaction she objected so strenuously that our hero was forced to ask his tenant to vacate. The lady refused to cooperate, however, and a lawsuit to evict her was initiated. The defendant relied upon her contract of lease in alleging that she had a perfect right to remain for twenty years.

The issue in the case was whether the plaintiff had received any "consideration" for the twenty year grant, for if he

had, there existed a valid contract and his law action would fail; whereas if he had not received any such "consideration" there was no contract and the defendant had no right to remain in the penthouse.

The court held there to be a contract and thus decided in favor of the defendant on the grounds that the requisite consideration in fact was present in the form of the agreement, ruling that "it is not within the purview of the court to measure the adequacy of consideration. It matters not how very valuable or how very valueless the consideration may be, as long as that what was bargained for."

action-packed evening game when DeQuattro drove the right side of the court only to be forced to the baseline by three Nasson players. Dribbling the baseline, he fed Smile with a beautiful pass right under the bucket and Tom dropped it in for a really impressive two-pointer. The combined rebounding efforts of Smile, De Quattro, Ted Alsap, Joe Goddard, and Dick Pettee, who also got 13 points, gave Bryant complete domination of the boards over the bigger Nasson squad.

It took no time at all for the Indians to get rolling with excellently run fast breaks. Figuring Bryant would soon tire from the fast running game, Bouschard started platooning his Nasson squad in hopes of keeping five rested men on the court at all times. Even this type of substituting was of little help to Nasson's effort as the Indians got stronger and stronger while the minutes ticked away.

Each student participating as a College Student Volunteer in our program will have an opportunity to assist an individual child, to contribute to the full extent of his capabilities, and to participate as a Volunteer in the War on Poverty.

Admissions Office Kept Busy Acquainting High Schools With Bryant

The Admissions Office of Bryant College is in the midst of its busy season. According to Mr. George C. Craig, Dean of admissions, the admissions staff at Bryant College has accepted numerous invitations to attend college orientation programs for high schoolers who are currently faced with the problem of selecting and applying to a college.

November 16 and 17, Mr. Craig attended a two-day conference at the Neptune Township and Middletown Township High Schools in Monmouth County, N. J. About 20 high schools were represented and a considerable number of colleges attended the conference according to Mr. Craig.

"The conferences," said Mr. Craig, "have a dual purpose: to exchange information with the colleges involved, and the high schools want to find out the current positions of the participating colleges." "The second purpose of the conferences," said Mr. Craig, "is to meet with groups of students and parents."

Mr. William D. Sprenger, Admissions Counselor, also represented Bryant College last week in a similar two-day regional parley at the Western Suffolk County, Long Island Conference in Deer Park, Long Island. A cross section of all types of business, liberal arts, and military colleges attended that conference.

On November 29, Mr. Walter S. Currie, Associate Dean of Admissions, will conduct admissions interviews with prospective students at the Sheraton-Eastland Hotel, Portland, Maine. On November 30 and December 1, Mr. Currie will conduct interviews at the Sheraton-Plaza Hotel, Boston. On December 6 and 7, the tour will continue with Mr. Sprenger at the Hotel Roosevelt, N. Y. High school students of Garden City, Long Island will hear about Bryant College when Mr. Sprenger visits the Garden City Hotel, Long Island, on December 8. December 9 and 10, Mr. Sprenger will be at the Governor Morris Hotel, Morristown, N. J.

The tour that the Bryant College Admissions Staff is participating in to interview high school students is conducted by the Educational Advisory Center.

Mr. Craig said that his staff makes 12 to 15 trips throughout the year to keep high schools and students informed about Bryant College.
