



Challenging opportunities for parents and teachers to meet today's educational needs were related by Dean Elmer C. Wilbur of Bryant College on the evening of March 4 at a meeting of the Aldrich School Parent-Teachers Association in Fall River, Massachusetts.

Dean Wilbur stressed the urgency of helping the child to develop positive attitudes and personal discipline so that he can become a worthy contributor to the society in which he will grow.

"Our new frontiers of expansion in better human relationship are on our home fronts. The responsibility of both teachers and parents is necessary if the desired results toward better communities are to be attained," he said. He warned parents against over security as a panacea to cure all social ills which lead to the softening of the moral

Mr. Wilbur is a professor of education and Dean of Admissions at Bryant College.



eriod. The Comets started their barrage of accurate shooting and hit the nets until they had a nine basket edge over the Indians at the end of the third period.


