## Swank Executive, Ralph Destino, Tells Large B. A. Group Hard Work Is Key to Success

Practical views and experiences on salesmanship were vividly presented to a capacity audience by Mr. Ralph Destino, Manager of Chain Store Sales, Swank, Inc., guest speaker at the Business Administration Society meeting on December 5, in the Bryant Auditorium.

In his own words Mr. Destino stated, "Selling is the key to our economic system." He went on to say that work and willingness to work are the most important basic elements leading to a successful selling career.

Constant and unflinching effort, knowledge of the product and its uses, understanding of company policies and objectives, and ability to meet and get along with people are some of the requisites necessary for a selling career.

Many suggestions were conveyed, some of which follow:

Know your business and learn your customer's business. When making a new call, find out as much about the prospect as possible beforehand. Call your customer by name. Look your best all the time. Show your customer that he needs your merchandise. Avoid arguments. Give the customer a feeling

of importance. Respect his opinions and he will respect yours. Be a good listener. Don't knock competition. Instead sell the merit of your product.

In conclusion, Mr. Destino narrated to his captivated listeners, "Enthusiasm is one of the most contagious qualities on earth. Enthusiasm begets enthusiasm." (Continued on Page 2)

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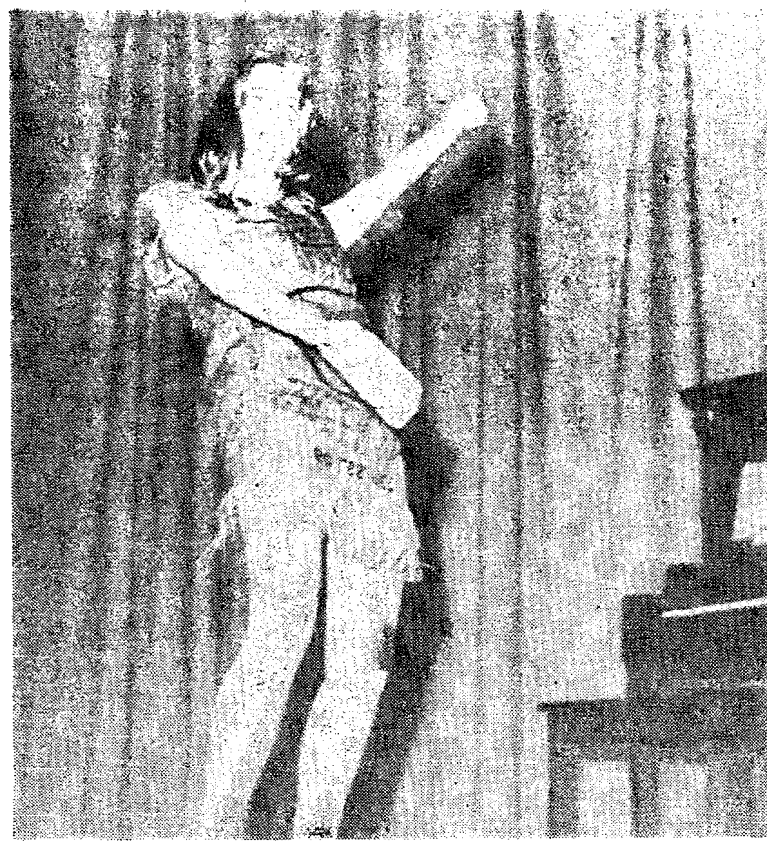

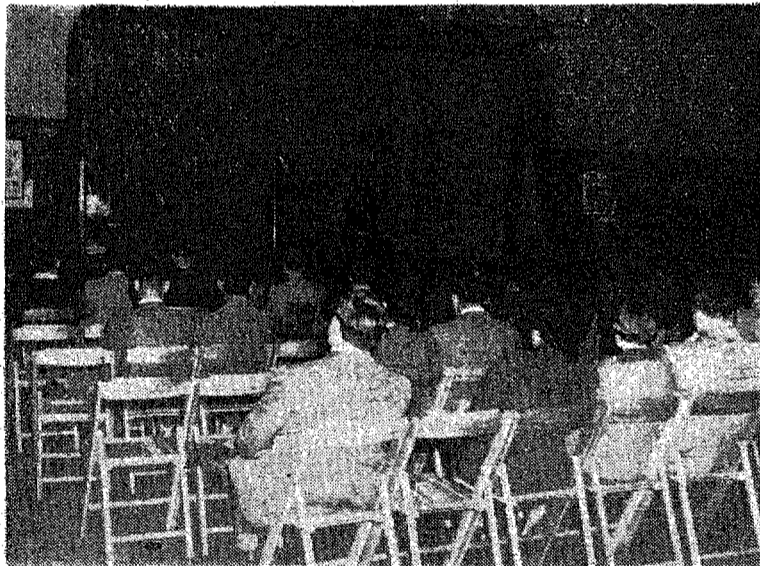

**Moscow, Idaho—(I. P.)**—Rules for freshman women concerning study table attendance for first and second semesters have been permanently set up for all women living groups on the campus of the University of Idaho by the AWS.

During the first semester of each year, all freshman women and sorority pledges will attend study table between the hours of 7:30 p.m. and 9:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday with a 10 minute break at 8:30 p.m. Exceptions are made for community concerts and plays, church nights, exchanges (study table must be held after exchanges from 8:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.), special school functions and library permissions.

Library permission is granted by the housemother, and the freshman coed must be accompanied by an upper-classman. Two 9:30 p.m. permissions are granted during the first semester and four 9:30 p.m. permissions during the second semester. These may be taken at any time.

During the second semester, all freshman coeds and pledges whose grades are under 2.5 will attend study table as above. Coeds with a 2.5 average at the end of the first nine weeks of the second semester will have 8:30 permission on school nights.

Second nine weeks of second semester late permissions are as follows:

- 3. and above—9:30 permission once a week.
- 2.7 to 2.999—one 9:30 permission every two weeks.
- 2.5 to 2.699—one 9:30 permission every month.
- 2.3 to 2.4999—one 8:30 permission a week.

Late permissions do not accumulate.

**Huntingdon, Pa.—(I. P.)**—Three new courses have been added in the department of economics and business administration to provide "better balance and a broader base," according to an announcement by President Calvert N. Ellis of Juniata College.

The new courses are: Business Cycles, International Trade and Finance, and Tax Accounting.
