
Choraliers To Present Candle-Lighting Service Dec. 15

Glee Club, Orchestra on "Bryant's View"

The Bryant College Glee Club, consisting of 108 voices, under the direction of Professor Mary Thornton Appleby, and the orchestra, directed by Professor Ralph S. Handy, offered a concert of popular music over radio station WPRO on Thanksgiving evening. The concert was dedicated to all those at home or away from home on this holiday.

On December 9, Mr. Howard W. Preston, Assistant Secretary of the Nicholson File Company, with the assistance of Priscilla M. Moulton, Supervisor of Secretarial Studies and Administrative Assistant to the President at Bryant, gave an informative discussion entitled, "The Job Interview — The Correct Approach." In their discussion they explained just how industrial personnel directors sound out job candidates and just what the proper attitude and preparation necessary for the interview are.




