This new system wie designed to sive a stronger oice and greater participation to each student in the selection of our Student Senate officers. Prior to 1958 the Stucent Senate oficer dents of each of the cast by the presi dents of each of the Bryant sudent rganizations. Under the new sysheld. The resnltsl In the first elecon only $34 \%$ of the eligibe dents cast a vote. The total vote was 408 ballots cast, out of a possible1200. Iu the election just held, only $120 \%$. Iu the election just held, only
$20 \%$ of the eligible students voted. Total vote was 325 out of a possible 1600. The total votes cast decreased breased by $25 \%$,

How much has the "popular vote ystem inereased student participa detraeted from, rather that increased otudent participation. It is logical to draw the conclusion then, that in the hands of a disinterested student body a popular vote can be a dan gerous thing. Minority factions can and often do, win an election through sheer perseverance and not by virtious. And what of the calizer of candidates under the popular vor orytem? Where the student body is 4 deliberative, inquisitive group, candidate caliber is improved. But when the student body takes no interest in an election, and when candidates re elected, not via the route of achievement, but instead over the fees of student government can suffer immeasurably. The selection of leadership should not come from for the job. What are the qualifica
tions for the offices of the Studen Senate? Few of us really know The offices of the Student Senat are designed to be filled with per-
sons capable of leading other leadsons. When the power to vote is de posited iu the liands of a disinter ested body, minority factions can
back aud win an election without qualification wor election withou qualifications for the offce or the
support of those to be governed. In the first election, under thenew system, a candidate could win with just 204 votes. In the last election 163 votes would have constituted a lit fact, the highest number of votes cast for any one candidate was 205 . Does a total of 205 votes coustil
the wishes of 1600 students?
In our country's general elec on those persons to be appointed to on those persons to be appointed to
the House or to the Senate, do the House or to the Senate, do
they also take a vote to see what other person they want as a speak er or a leader? Of course not! The elected members of a governmeut
