Judge Powers, a native of Cumberland, first gained local prominence as a Rhode Island General Assembly representative for ten successive years. The Honorable Justice overcame the handicap of total blindness to be elected and to serve brilliantly as Rhode Island's Attorney General from 1948 to 1956. Judge Powers' outstanding career was culminated in January of 1958 when he was elected to be a Rhode Island Supreme Court Justice.

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Editorial

Last year, in June of 1958 the students of Bryant College saw an innovation in Student Senate electoral procedure. This new system was designed to give a stronger voice and greater participation to each student in the selection of our Student Senate officers. Prior to 1958 the Student Senate officers were elected by votes cast by the presidents of each of the Bryant student organizations. Under the new system a campus-wide popular vote is held. The results in the first election only 34% of the eligible students cast a vote. The total vote was 408 ballots cast, out of a possible 1200. In the election just held, only 20% of the eligible students voted. Total vote was 325 out of a possible 1600. The total votes cast decreased by 14%, while campus population increased by 25%.

How much has the "popular vote system" increased student participation in the election? None! It has detracted from, rather than increased, student participation. It is logical to draw the conclusion then, that in the hands of a disinterested student body a popular vote can be a dangerous thing. Minority factions can, and often do, win an election through sheer perseverance and not by virtue of their candidate's qualifications. And what of the caliber of candidates under the popular vote system? Where the student body is a deliberative, inquisitive group, candidate caliber is improved. But when the student body takes no interest in an election, and when candidates are elected, not via the route of achievement, but instead over the road of personal popularity the offices of student government can suffer immeasurably. The selection of leadership should not come from ballyhoo and glowing personalities,

but rather from the hands of persons familiar with the qualities needed for the job. What are the qualifications for the offices of the Student Senate? Few of us really know! The offices of the Student Senate are designed to be filled with persons capable of leading other leaders. When the power to vote is deposited in the hands of a disinterested body, minority factions can back and win an election without qualifications for the office or the support of those to be governed.

In the first election, under the new system, a candidate could win with just 204 votes. In the last election, 163 votes would have constituted a majority, enough to seat a candidate. In fact, the highest number of votes cast for any one candidate was 205. Does a total of 205 votes constitute the wishes of 1600 students? In our country's general elections, after the population has voted on those persons to be appointed to the House or to the Senate, do they also take a vote to see what other person they want as a speaker or a leader? Of course not! The elected members of a government are the obvious ones to decide on who they want to preside over their meetings. The general student body is not sufficiently aware of the inner workings of the Student Senate to appoint its officers.

Where does the answer lie? The Student Senate must either revise its election laws and give more publicity to the election of its officers, or elect its own officers as it did prior to 1958.

Notice from the Dean's Office

End-of-Semester Information for Business Administration Department Students

- Cards indicating that you are excused from, or ineligible for, the final examinations, will be distributed in your last scheduled class.
- If you receive a card indicating that you are ineligible because of excess cuts and feel that you have a valid reason for this extended absence from class, take the card to the Dean's Office at least three days before the examination and explain your case. If approval to take the examination is granted, this fact will be endorsed on the card, and when presented to the proper instructor, will authorize the taking of the test.
- If for some reason you have a conflict in time between examinations, please report the facts to the Dean's Office as soon as your complete examination schedule is known. A special examination will be arranged for you.
- Every student—unless barred because of excess cuts—may take the final examination, regardless of his average, if he wishes. If you elect to take the final in the hope of raising your grade, you must notify your instructor in advance so that he can report for you. Once you report for and take the examination paper, the grade thereon must be considered in determining your final average.
- All students taking final examinations should provide themselves with necessary paper and writing materials. Unless use of books and notes is permitted in taking the examinations, such material should be left at home or at least placed on the hat racks in the room. Cribbing of any kind can be most injurious to your record.
- All students must present an identification card at the time of each examination. If you do not have a photo I.D. card, you may obtain a signature I.D. card at the Records Office.

Special information for Students scheduled to graduate in July:

- Classes end on July 10.
- Final examinations for those not excused—July 13 through July 17.
- Students scheduled to graduate in July who are taking non-senior courses will be governed by the following rules:
 - Required attendance in these courses will not extend beyond July 18.
 - Averages and cuts to this point will determine whether a final exam must be taken.
 - If a final examination in a non-senior subject is required, it will be given during the senior examination week—July 10-17.
 - Every student requiring a special examination as indicated in (c) above, must report that fact to the Dean's office before 3:00 P.M. on July 10.
- Senior grades will be mailed on July 22. These reports will be mailed to your home address unless the records office is notified to do otherwise. Grades are not available either from instructors of the Records Office before that date.

- To expedite plans for graduation and avoid possible disappointments, please respond to requests for information from the Dean's Office promptly.

Special information for Students not scheduled to graduate in July.

- Classes end on July 17.
- Students in this category who must take examinations in fourth semester courses will be governed by the following rules:
 - If a senior final conflicts with a non-senior class, the exam should be taken and excused cuts will be given for the classes omitted.
 - If senior final conflicts with a non-senior quiz, the quiz should be taken as scheduled and notice should be given to the Dean's Office so that a special examination in the senior subject may be scheduled during the week of July 20.
- Final exams for those not excused—July 20 thru July 24.
- Grades will be mailed on July 30 to your home address unless the Records Office is notified to do otherwise. Information will not be available at an earlier date.

The Cinema

"TERROR IN A TEXAS TOWN"
In contrast to my last offering in which I reviewed a motion picture run as a second feature that should have received top billing, here is a presentation where real courage was displayed in showing it at all. In fact it is my prediction that this reel will receive the coveted award "Worst Picture of the Year."
It would have been sufficient to combine an atrocious screen play with a ridiculous plot, but the conglomeration further thickens with the utilization of Sterling Hayden in the lead part. Now not only is dear Sterling a personification of what I consider the best non-actor in the United States, but I am sure that drama schools, in using the before-and-after technique on entering aspirants, hold Mr. Hayden forth as the prime example of "before."
The story is set in a dusty Texas town that is run by the typical fat, rich, unscrupulous land grabber who is out to extend his empire by confiscating every inch of soil he can lay his hands on. Now enters poor, bedraggled, virtuous Sterling. It seems that Sterling is the son of a Swedish immigrant who has been mysteriously eradicated - western style, but before his elimination has

unscrupulous land grabber has no intention of giving up Papa's former possession even if his son does resemble Frankenstein. So he decides to apply a mild form of the western style eradication to the second generation Swede. This chore is accomplished by the land grabber's henchmen who do a very commendable job of fisticuffs in working Sterling over. They then dump him on a train headed further west.

But Alas . . . the story has not ended. Sterling awakens before the train reaches California and walks back to the du bent on avenging this outrage. is thirst for vengeance is so great he doesn't even stop to wash up but grabs a harpoon (yes, a harpoon!) and marches straight to town. Unbeknownst to Sterling is the fact that the fat, rich, unscrupulous land grabber has been murdered by his chief henchman, "Fast Draw Dan," who now is the top banana.

Visualize poor, bedraggled, virtuous Sterling standing with a harpoon poised for the kill. Directly in front of him at about 15 paces is Fast Draw Dan who confidently fingers his well oiled 32's. Both men stand there waiting. Suddenly Fast Dan draws his 32's with rattlesnake-like swiftness. In that same instant with Frankenstein-like agility. The bullets from Fast Dan's 32's rip into Sterlings leg. The harpoon from Sterling hands gouges into the chest of Fast Dan. Sterling lays there with a superficial leg wound . . . Fast Dan looks like the base of a flag pole. A sad miscarriage of justice has just been committed.

It would have been far more acceptable to the audience and definitely more humane to the acting profession if at the beginning Sterling had been shot and harpooned. Then everybody could have gone home and forgotten about the whole thing.

The fund is available to any senior who has been accepted to a graduate school and who has met all other requirements necessary in order to be eligible to obtain the scholarship.

Since the Genie Fund Scholarship has been announced by the administration as being available to all seniors meeting the requirements, very few applications have been received for the scholarship. There certainly must be a good number of students who are going to graduate school upon leaving Bryant College who are eligible for the Genie Fund Scholarship.

If for some reason or other a student, meeting all the requirements necessary for applying for the fund, has not yet applied, he may still do so even though he has not met the deadline for applying.

Bryant College also has available, for its students presently attending college or wishing to go to graduate school, another fund for which few applications have been received. This fund is known as the National Defense Student Loan Program Fund, out of which money can be borrowed by students to help finance their college education.

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VA Does Not Back Any Products Vets Warned

Door-to-door solicitors implying that they represent Veterans Administration or have VA endorsement for a product are acting without sanction of VA.

This statement was issued today by Manager John L. Reavey of the Providence Regional Office of VA, in response to inquiries from individuals and groups seeking verification of verbal statements made by agents soliciting subscriptions or funds, or selling products in behalf of veterans.

"VA does not endorse any product, project or commercial endeavor for the profit of individuals, organizations or corporations," Manager Reavey said. He added that no VA employees are permitted to use their official connection with VA to identify themselves in connection with any project other than one directly connected with their official duties.

Manager Reavey said VA neither endorses nor condemns door-to-door solicitations in behalf of veterans. However, he advises those who may suspect the legitimacy of such endeavors to check with their Better Business Bureau or any community organization acting in that capacity.
