

About Bryant

Founded in 1863, Bryant is a private, coeducational college located on a 320 acre suburban campus 12 miles from Providence and 45 miles from Boston. Bryant draws students from 24 states and 29 countries and approximately 85 percent of the 3,000 undergraduates live on campus.

Bryant's undergraduate business program combines an intensive business curriculum with a strong liberal arts foundation. Students earn the bachelor of science in business administration with concentrations in accounting, applied actuarial mathematics, business communications, computer information systems, finance, management, and marketing. Similarly, the bachelor of arts degree offers concentrations in economics, English, history, or international studies, all of which are reinforced by a strong underpinning of business courses.

The Graduate School, which enrolls about 800 students annually, offers a master of business administration (MBA) with concentrations in accounting, computer information systems, finance, health care management, management, management of operations and technology, marketing, and taxation, as well as a master of science in taxation (MST) and certificates of advanced graduate studies (CAGS).

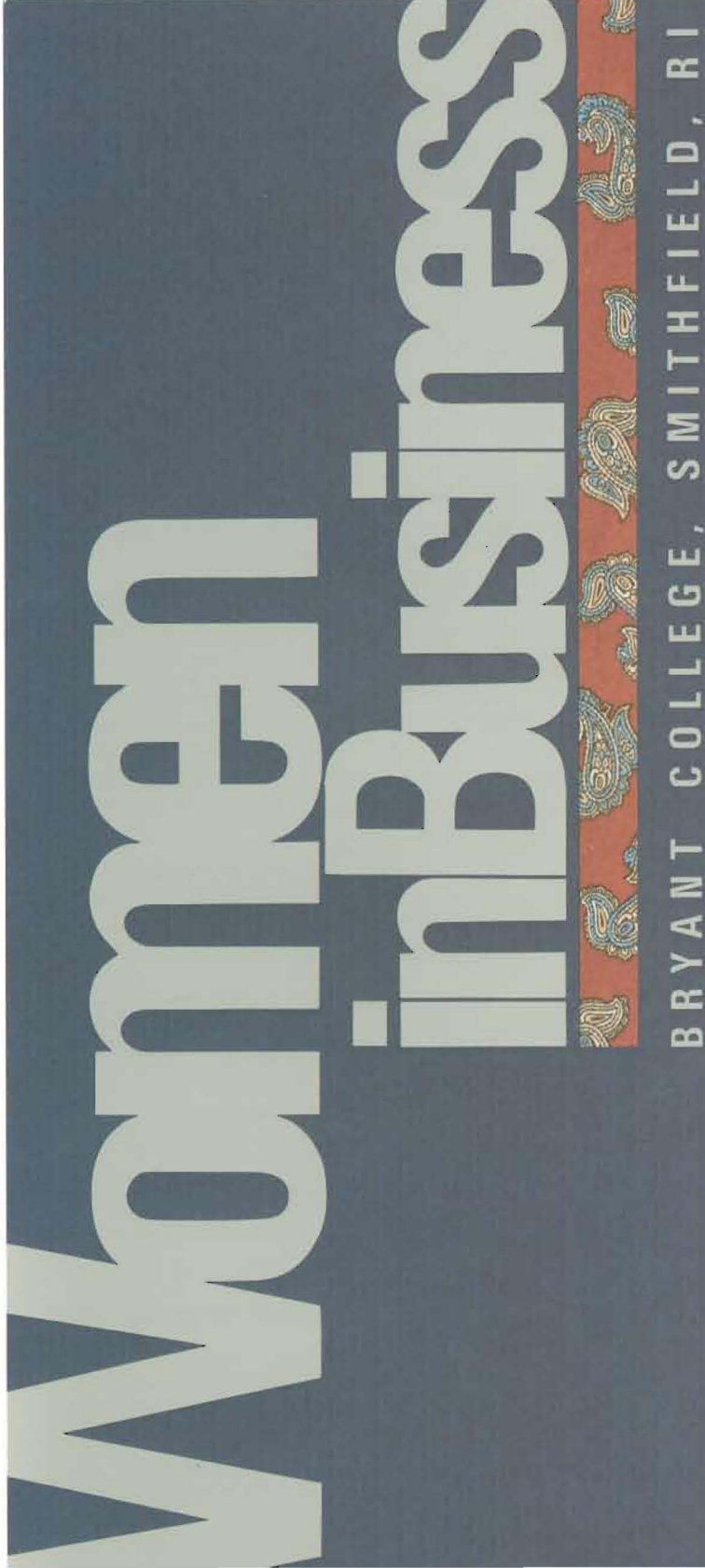

Even before she graduated from Bryant, Susan Groncziak Lucente knew she wanted to work in Florida.

Susan interviewed on campus with several Big Six accounting firms and accepted a position in Fort Lauderdale with Price Waterhouse. After working there for four years and passing the CPA exam, she moved on to Sensormatic Corporation, a major producer of electronic theft deterrent devices. Two years later, armed with experience in public accounting and private industry, she opened her own consulting business. One of her clients was so impressed with her abilities, he offered her the position of controller and chief financial officer of his company.

Gazebo Landscape Design is actually a group of eight privately owned companies with approximately 300 employees. "Although the individual companies are small, it's a big business when they're all combined," says Susan. "And the job is really interesting because I can get into all kinds of things, from tax returns to pension accounts."

When her son was born in May 1991, Susan arranged to work flexible hours. Her employer connected her home computer to the company computer system so that she can work at home, if she is unable to go into the office. "Companies have had to come up with flexible alternatives to retain women who make valuable contributions," she explains. "I think we're going to see more and more of this as time goes on."

As a student, Susan was president of the Bryant Players for two years. "I really enjoyed that," she says, "and in Florida I've been prop director for a community theater group I've been involved with."
