Already you have discovered a great truth. "No life ever grows until it is focused, dedicated and disciplined."

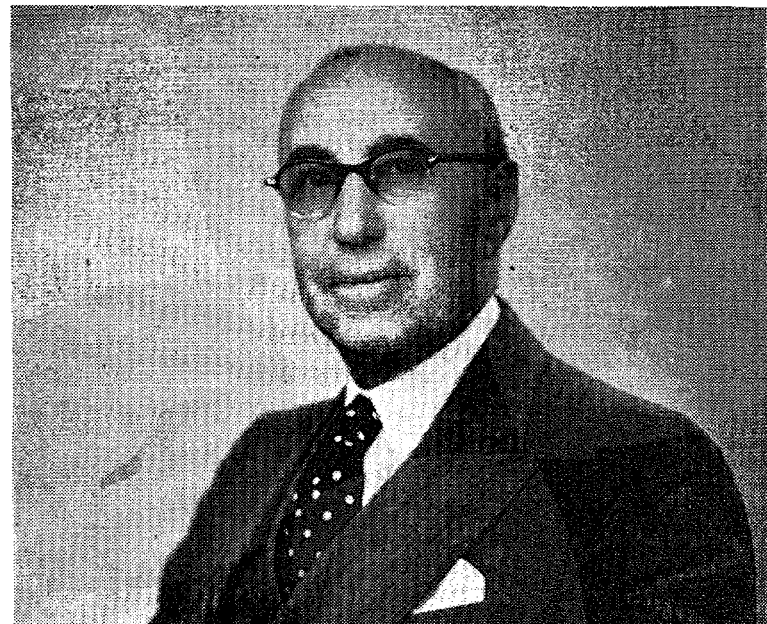
The many representatives of the large business firms, who have come to our campus this year to recruit Bryant graduates, have com-

Transportation Course Placed in Evening Division Curriculum

A new course, Traffic Management, has been inaugurated in the Bryant College Evening Division. Sponsored by the Rhode Island Chapter of Delta Nu Alpha Transportation Fraternity, Inc., it offers fourteen courses in Traffic Management, besides five regular courses, leading to a certificate in Transportation and Traffic Management.

Three men with extensive knowledge of transportation and traffic management have been appointed as instructors. They are Mr. John Carr, assistant traffic manager of U. S. Rubber in Bristol, who will teach Interstate Commerce Commission Law and Problems and Introduction to Traffic Management; Russell Curnett, General Traffic Manager of Arrow Transportation, teaching Motor Carrier Operation; and Ray Smith of Apex Tire and Rubber who will also act as instructor in Traffic Management.

This course was placed in the Evening Division curriculum by request of the transportation fraternity.

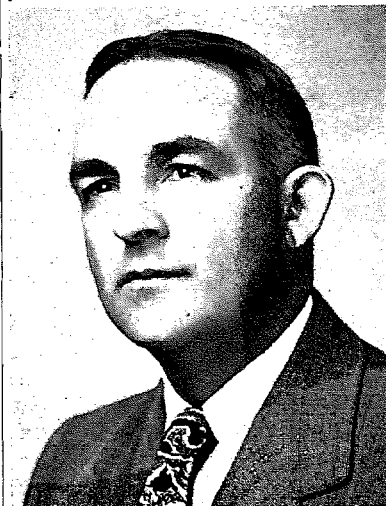

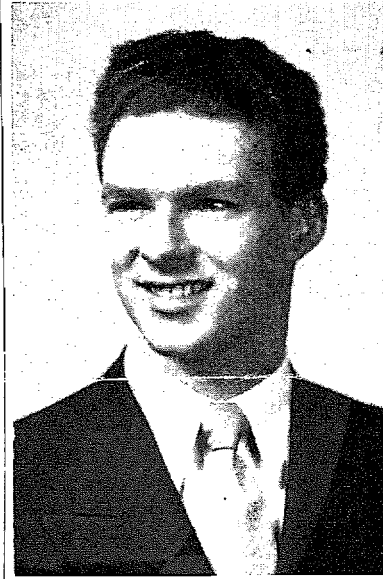

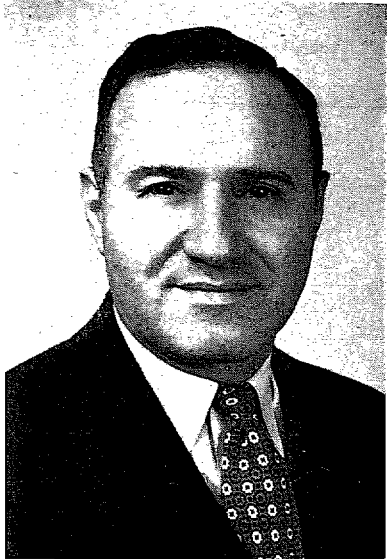
Veep E. Gardner Jacobs Hailed as 'Student Friend'

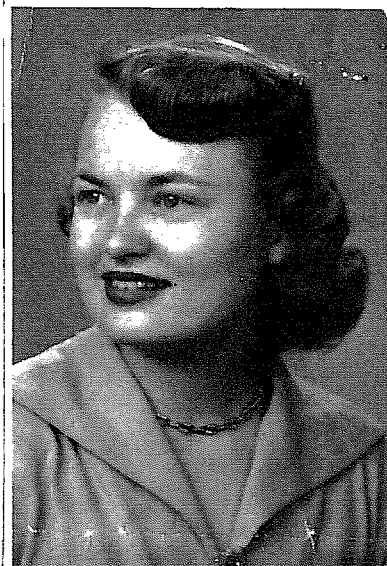

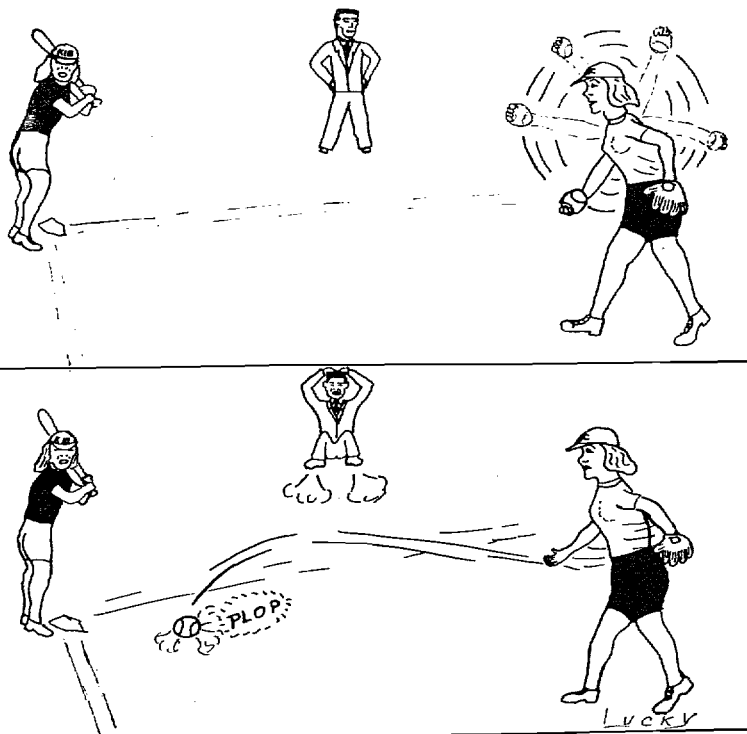

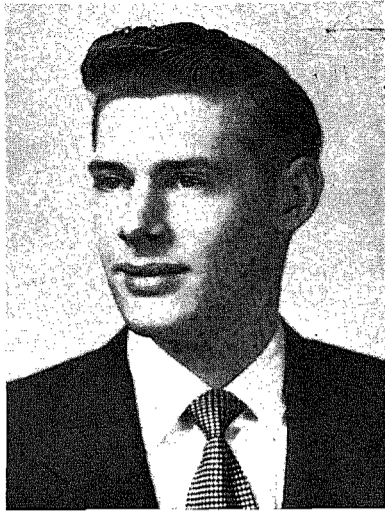
Fred Kenney, one of the head men of all student activities here this past semester, has been a leading figure in various organizations during his two years at Bryant.

Tom Dunklee, for the past year, has kept the student body of Bryant informed on the news behind the news in his ARCHWAY column, "One Man's Opinion."

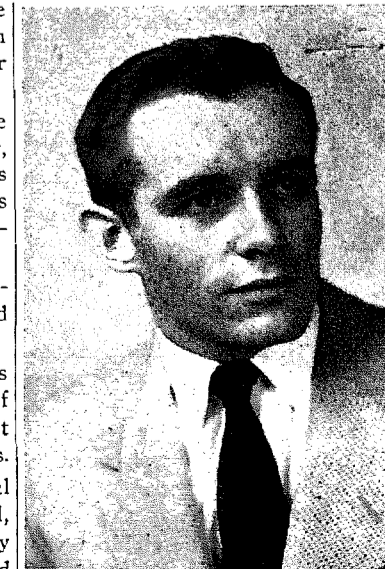
But the admirable job he has done on this newspaper is insignificant in comparison with his many other accomplishments.
