





Mrs. Margaret Chase Smith United States Senator from Maine Mayor of the City of Providence, International Zionist Leader and Doctor of Laws (LL.D.)

Skowhegan, Maine, claims Mrs. Smith as its native daughter. She was first elected to the House of Representatives to fill the vacancy created by the death of her husband, the late Clyde H. Smith. Prior to woolen company executive. She was a nationally syndicated columnist for more than five years.

Only woman to serve in both houses of Congress, she was elected to the Senate by the highest percentage majority and the greatest total vote majority in the history of Maine in 1948. In 1954 she was re-elected for a second full six-year term in the Senate.

PRESIDENT JACOBS

The President's Message

If I were asked to single out the dominant trait of this graduating class of 1959 I would choose the mature quality of "Responsibility." Your fraternities and sororities this year have piled up a record number of hours spent in the service of others.
