## Representative John E. Fogarty, Noted Rhode Island Legislator, Will Address Graduates July 31

Guest speaker at the 96th Commencement Exercises of Bryant College will be the United States Congressman from Rhode Island, John E. Fogarty. Congressman Fogarty is co-author of the "Health For Peace Bill" currently in Congress. He is also the author of the "Health Educational Facilities Construction Bill," which provides a ten-year program of grants for medical, dental, and public health schools. He also sponsored the legislation which resulted in the White House Conference on Aging and the Fogarty Bill which provided for expansion of teaching and research of mentally retarded children. President Jacobs will confer upon Congressman Fogarty the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters.

### PROCESSION

Doctor Jacobs will lead the distinguished guests and Bryant College officials during the academic processional. In attendance at this year's exercises will be Augustine Riccio, Director of Social Welfare for the State of Rhode Island, representing The Honorable Christopher Del Sesto, Governor, and Walter H. Reynolds, Mayor of Providence. The Very Reverend Father Darby Wood Betts, Dean of the Cathedral of St. John, will open the exercises with the invocation. Congressman Fogarty will then address the graduating class.

### Honorary Degrees

This year the recipients of honorary degrees are Mayor Walter H. Reynolds, D.S. in B.A., George H. Arris, Journal-Bulletin correspondent, D.S. in B.A., and Mrs. Ida Silverman, Leading Zionist, Doctor of Humanities. Senator Margaret Chase Smith of Maine will receive a Doctor of Laws Degree in absentia.

### BENEDICTION

After the awarding of degrees to the undergraduate candidates, the Reverend Cornelius B. Collins, Pastor of St. Michaels and Chairman of the Rhode Island State Education Committee, will close the program with the benediction.

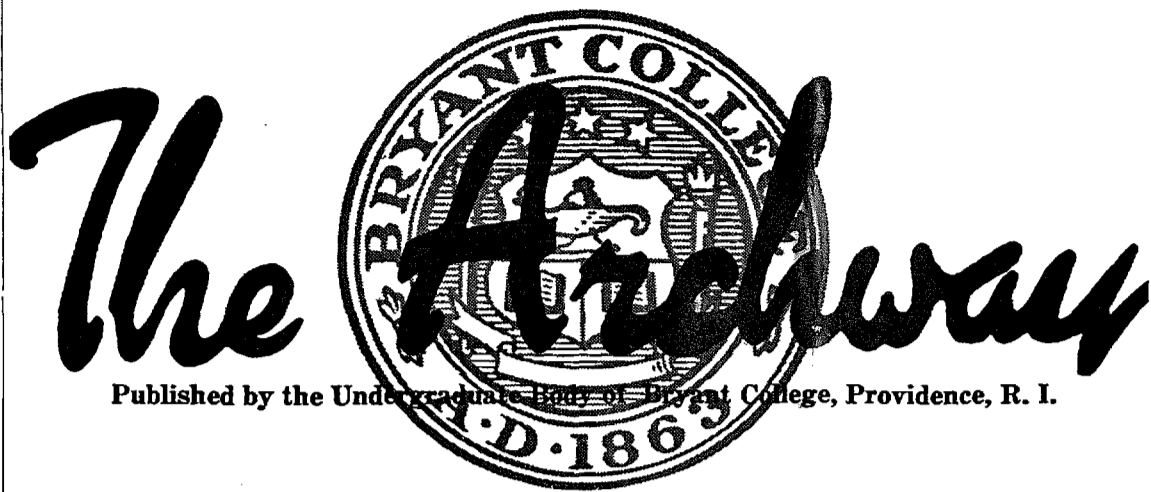
## H. V. Collins To Build New Bryant Dormitory For Men

Keep your eye on the activity at 154 Power Street for the next year! What's the occasion? Well, this is the location chosen for Bryant's new men's dormitory and construction will start with formal ground-breaking ceremonies on the 20th of this month. Our 27th building—the largest and most modern yet—is scheduled for occupancy in September of 1960, only one school year away.

This latest undertaking by the college in its improvement and expansion program reached the stages of reality earlier this year when an appropriation was approved and granted by the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency.

On June 9 the next step was taken. At a formal get-together in the faculty dining hall, representatives of the school and the FHHFA held a public opening for bids prior to awarding the contract for actual construction. Bids were received from twelve qualified builders in the area. The successful bid was submitted by the H. V. Collins Construction Company of Providence. On July 2, the agreement between the school and the Collins Company was signed authorizing construction.

So, at this point, Bryant's new dormitory construction is in the capable hands of the H. V. Collins Construction Company. On the evidence of the Collins' reputation and past experience in school and dormitory construction, Bryant's new dormitory will be a great asset to the campus and another step forward for the college.

# Recipients of Honorary Degrees



Mrs. Margaret Chase Smith

**Mrs. Margaret Chase Smith**  
United States Senator from Maine  
Doctor of Laws (LL.D.)

Skowhegan, Maine, claims Mrs. Smith as its native daughter. She was first elected to the House of Representatives to fill the vacancy created by the death of her husband, the late Clyde H. Smith. Prior to her marriage, she was successively a teacher, telephone, newspaper, and woolen company executive. She was a nationally syndicated columnist for more than five years.

Only woman to serve in both houses of Congress, she was elected to the Senate by the highest percentage majority and the greatest total vote majority in the history of Maine in 1948. In 1954 she was re-elected for a second full six-year term in the Senate.

Her principal committee service in the House was on the Naval Affairs Committee for which she drew presidential commendation. In 1953 and 1954 she was Chairman of the Ammunition Shortage Investigating Subcommittee and is presently serving on the Appropriations Committee, the Armed Services Committee, the Space Committee and the Preparedness Investigating Committee. She has served as a Lieutenant Colonel in the Air Force Reserve and is the acknowledged Champion of Reserve Legislation in Congress.

Senator Smith holds honorary degrees from thirty-two American colleges. These degrees were conferred by institutions of higher learning in all parts of the country.

Among the national honors conferred upon her was that of "Woman of the Year in Politics" for several years both by the Associated Press and the United Press and the Political Achievement Award by the Women's National Press Club. She was rated sixth best senator in a poll of 50 leading political scientists of the United States and given the Freedom Award for Americanism from Freedoms Foundation. She was presented with the Distinguished Service Award from the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs and the National Defense Award by the Reserve Officers Association and designated "Economy Champion" in the Senate by the Council of State on two occasions and the "most charming woman in government" by the Charm Institute.

A member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in Boston, she holds Honorary Membership in Delta Kappa Gamma, education sorority, and Pi Sigma Alpha political science fraternity, among others.

Senator Smith has made eight extensive trips throughout the world from 1944 through to 1957. She has conferred with leaders of many nations and been rated as one of America's best and most effective ambassadors of good will.

Born in Providence, John E. Fogarty attended LaSalle Academy and was first elected to the United States House of Representatives in

Born in Providence, Mayor Reynolds, educated in the public and parochial schools of the City, began his career in the business world early, holding several administrative positions with the Western Electric Company. His political career began in 1940, when he was chosen as Executive Secretary to Mayor Roberts. In 1943 he was selected the first Budget Director of Providence, where he developed a system of municipal financial control recognized nationally. As the appointed head of the newly created Department of Finance in 1947, he united the functions of tax assessment and collection, which resulted in a more efficient and economical operation of City Government.

Elected Mayor and re-elected in 1952-54-56-58, he re-organized the Bureau of Police and Fire and established a Commissioner of Public Safety and a separate Bureau of Licenses. He also created the office of Personnel Director and initiated the principles of the merit system among public employees.

Mayor Reynolds has brought the City of Providence recognition in all categories of traffic safety through a vigorous program of improvements and a broad program of safety education.

He has also, in cooperation with the Providence Redevelopment Agency, completed the Willard Shopping Center redevelopment project and established the Division of Minimum Housing Standards to help halt the spread of slums and improve housing conditions.

The Mayor resides at 25 Elmcree Avenue with his sister, Mrs. Isobel O'Donnell, and her family.

1940. He is presently in his 19th year of service in that body.

Assigned to the Appropriations Committee in January, 1947, he has been a member and chairman of its subcommittee providing funds for the Departments of Labor and Health, Education and Welfare ever since, and is known as a champion of "Better Health for the Nation."

Co-author of the Hill-Fogarty "Health For Peace" bill, he is also the author of the Health Educational Facilities Construction bill, which provides a ten year program of grants for medical, dental and public health schools. He also sponsored the legislation which resulted in the White House Conference on Aging and the Fogarty Bill to provide for expansion of teaching and research of mentally retarded children.

John Fogarty has been awarded distinguished service citations from national health organizations, veterans groups, educational associations and business chambers. Parents Magazine awarded him its National Distinguished Service Medal. He was named as one of the Ten Outstanding Members of Congress who have done most for the youth of our country.

Brought to America as an infant, Mrs. Silverman's birth in Kovno, Russia, has given her the heritage which inspired her lifetime work in human welfare and international Zionism. Active in Zionism for more than fifty-four years, she is Honorary Vice-Chairman of the Jewish National Fund, a former Vice-President of the Zionist Organization of America, the American Jewish Congress, National Hadassah, the Hebrew University Hospital Building Fund and a former Deputy to the Inner-Action Committee of the World Zionist Organization. A colony in Israel, Nachlat Ida, is named for her. An organizer for synagogues in Israel, she has helped to build thirty-five synagogues in that country.

A member of the United States National Tercentenary Committee, she was appointed Chairman for the State of Rhode Island. Upon the announcement of the closing of the Butler Hospital for mental health, she was the one member of the Corporation who fought for a proper survey of the community's needs, and it was this survey which led to the re-opening of this great institution. Mrs. Silverman was Chairman of the \$50,000 appeal of the Rhode Island Association for Mental Health.

In 1951 she was named Jewish Mother of the Year and in 1954 was elected Rhode Island Mother of the Year. In that same year she received an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Education on the occasion of the hundredth anniversary of the Rhode Island College of Education.

In connection with her advancement of the cause of Zionism, she has lectured many times to audiences in North and South America, New Zealand, Australia, North Africa, all the countries of Europe and the British Isles.

The mother of four children and six grandchildren, Mrs. Silverman resides with her husband, Archibald Silverman, at 210 Blackstone Boulevard in Providence.

A native of Lewiston, Maine, Mr. Arris began his career in the world of business and economics as a customer's man. Later he became a branch manager of a stockbroker's office. This followed his career in the military service in naval radio communications during World War I. Studying on his own and under the guidance of university instructors he delved deeply into the subjects of mathematics; accounting and statistical methods; economics and economic geography; money, banking and credit; government finance, monetary management of the Federal Reserve system. He also attended college classes as an extension or special student at Colby, the University of Maine, Providence College, and Columbia University.

He joined the staff of the respected Providence Journal-Bulletin newspaper as a reporter in the financial department, which he now heads. His economic analyses of Rhode Island and New England business conditions are widely read and heeded. He has made extensive research into the New England economy and in the course of his editorial duties has traveled widely, investigating the state of business throughout the country. Because of his penetrating knowledge of the New England economy he is asked to write many reports and articles for "Business Week," a national publication.

As head of the O.P.A. Price Division during World War II, he supervised and controlled this crucial area of business for the government.

Mr. Arris resides with his wife, the former Maybelle White, also of Lewiston, in Cowesett, Rhode Island.

### Message to the Class of 1959

As the college year draws to a close and we make plans for commencement, I welcome this offer of the Archway to say a final word to you.

Speaking for the faculty, I should like to extend sincere congratulations on the completion of a task which has not been easy. You have overcome many difficulties—some seemingly insurmountable—and have attained your goal. The warm glow of satisfaction which comes from the attainment of a goal is one of life's greatest pleasures. May you experience it often.

Looking ahead, I should like to point out that while today you are seniors, tomorrow you will be freshmen in another school—perhaps the school of life. This school in which you will find yourselves will be basically the same as those you have known in the past. There will be people—teachers, co-workers, and bosses. You will have to work with them and for them. There will be problems—many kinds of problems and it will be up to you to solve them.

I cannot give you any magic formula which will solve all of life's problems, but I should like to remind you of a few old-fashioned virtues which are basic ingredients of all success formulas.

Every accomplishment, every victory has its price and most frequently this price involves work. It doesn't matter where you look, you will find proof of this. The figure skating champion you see gliding so gracefully and easily over the ice, the accomplished musician whose skilled fingers transport us to other worlds, the skilled surgeon who saves our lives: they have all bought their skill with years of study and thousands of hours of practice. The

boss you envy, because you think he has a soft job, carries his problems of production, marketing, finance, and personnel, home with him and stays awake half the night pondering them.

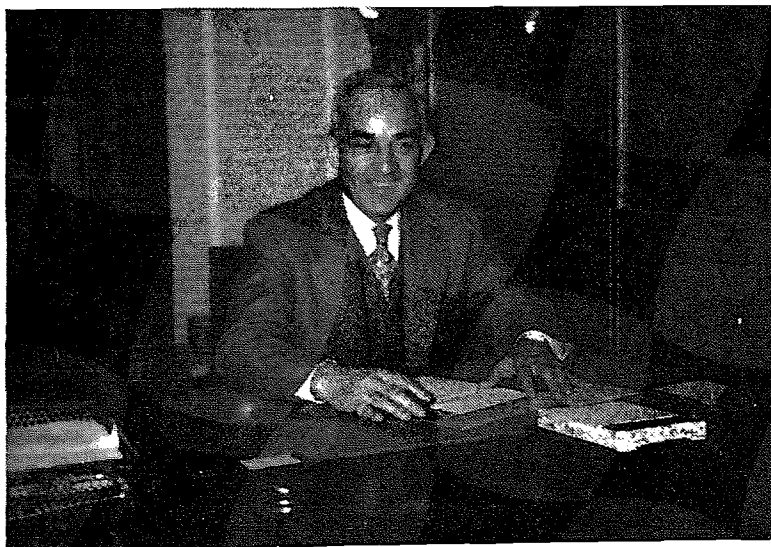

## Judge Addresses Law Society

Judge William E. Powers, Justice of the Rhode Island Supreme Court, spoke to a highly appreciative and enthusiastic audience of over 200 Bryant students, faculty, and their guests at Bryant Auditorium on June 29.

The Honorable Justice, introduced by Societas Jurisprudentiae President Bill Engelman, captivated his audience of Bryantites with his beginning address on law and what it actually consists of. The Judge traced briefly the history of law and then pointed out the way the functions of law operate here in Rhode Island.

Judge Powers, however, was at his inimitable best when he opened a question and answer forum near the conclusion of his talk. To a barrage of intelligent, thoughtful questions from the gathering, the Justice returned sharp, incisive, lucid, replies. Although both the Judge and the audience seemingly were prepared to go on till the early morning dawn, President Engel-

man prudently stepped in to give the Justice a temporary respite and also to present him with a certificate of appreciation from the Societas. It might be added though, that although Judge Powers was gratified to receive the certificate, perhaps even more gratifying was the spontaneous, standing ovation that deservedly greeted him for over two minutes at the conclusion of his talk.

The informal reception that followed the Justice's talk did not prove to be a deterrent to either the questions from the aroused audience nor the sparkling retorts from the learned Judge. Truly it was a toss-up whether the Judge felt unhappier about finally having to depart or the gathering felt unhappier at seeing him leave.

The debut of Societas Jurisprudentiae proved to be a highly successful one. This brand spanking new organization has proved to be a shot in the arm for the staid Bryant campus.



# Eight Men, Seven Women to Receive Senior Awards

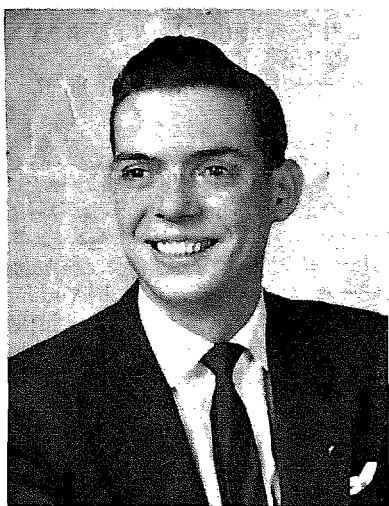

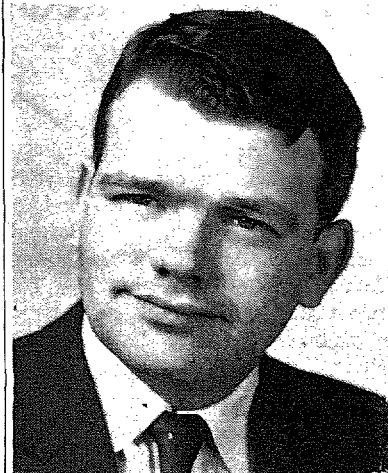
and research, thoroughness in analyzing facts and figures, and accuracy in deductions.

try in the interest of good citizenship and who has by example furthered better government on and off the campus.

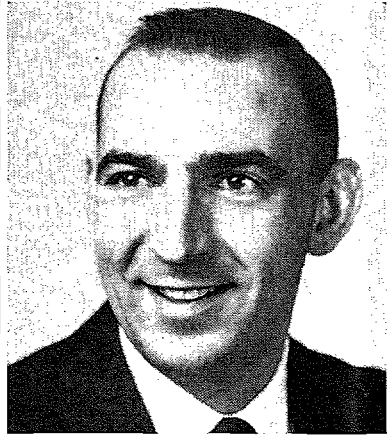

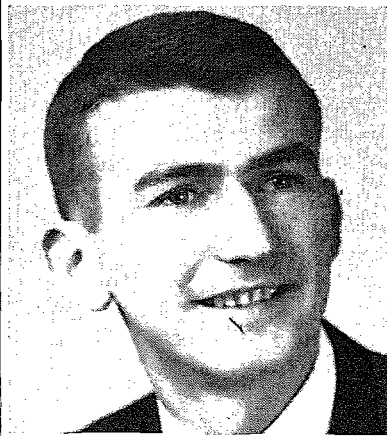
