The new department is now included in the bookstore due to many requests both from students and faculty who find time too limited to attend to shopping for everyday necessities.

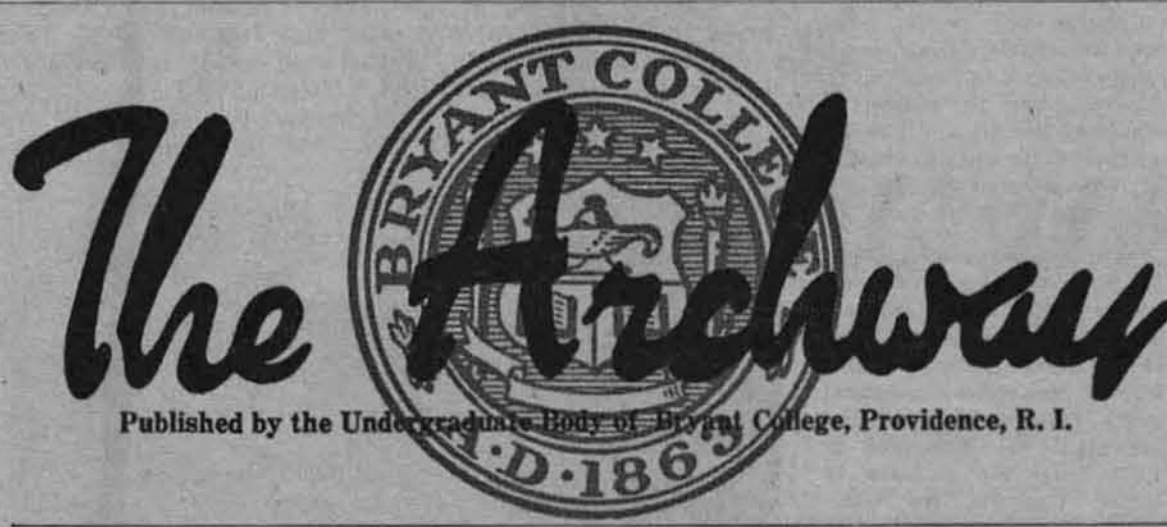
Secs Told 'Secretarial Job Stepping Stone to Executive Position'

The third in the series of Job Clinic lectures was held on Friday, June 5. Bryant College had the honor of having an outstanding woman in the advertising profession address the secretarial seniors on "what business needs, wants, and expects of the office worker." She is Miss Margaret T. Deasy, Vice President of the Standish-Barnes Outdoor Advertising Company.

"Business expects the beginner," Miss Deasy stated, "in addition to all the technical training, to be willing, co-operative, loyal, and trustworthy. Be mindful of your limitations," she said. "Bring to that job all the training you have received, but also be willing to assume that they know just a little more about that business than you do. Willingness, in specific terms, means to do just a little bit more than the job requires.

"Be ready to co-operate. Don't just rush in and try to do everything differently. Try to do things as you are told, and wait until your experience qualifies your opinion.

"Be loyal," she continued, "Keep all important information confidential, and don't associate with people

SS Wants Queen Voting Held Throughout College

The voting would be carried on in a manner similar to the way it was done for the mock presidential election held here in November. In this way all students would be able to vote for their choices without attending the dances, and the candidates receiving the largest number of votes would consequently be the popular choices of all Bryant students.

The same two fraternities that now sponsor the Snow Queen and May Queen Dances would remain the sponsors of their respective dances at which the queens would be crowned, but both the supervision and cost of the voting and crowning of the Queens would become the responsibility of the College.

The Senators present at the meeting were generally in favor of this proposal, and the matter is currently in the hands of the Student Activities Committee awaiting the decision of the Administration.

PSN Pledges Aid Underprivileged at Lakeside Home

Phi Sigma Nu—Pledges and brothers—have again taken a stand to aid underprivileged children at Lakeside Children's Home in Warwick.

Because of Phi Sig's national affiliations, its pledging season is longer than the other frats, thus giving the group time to put their pledges to work on a big task.

Right now, a dozen men are spending one or two afternoons a week cleaning and resurfacing the grounds, repairing some of the children's recreational equipment and also finishing the clearing out of a picnic area which they started last semester.

Once more a spirit of generosity will emerge from Bryant College just as the legendary Genie emerged from the magic lamp, and after briefly hovering over the students and transmitting this generosity to them, the Bryant Genie will withdraw once more, leaving behind a golden treasure for some worthy graduate.

As in the past, some member of the graduating class who wishes to further his education, will be selected as the benefactor of the Bryant Genie. The history of this new semi-annual event at Bryant is a short but exemplary one. Instituted in 1952, under the guidance of Robert Gaudette, the Genie Fund bequeathed over \$200 to Edward Geffkin last February.

Now a student at NYU, Ed's comment is this, "Students should plug hard at all the subjects in each course, especially the subjects that meet only one or two hours a week—they may be the most important. I am 100% for the Genie Fund. Without it I would not have or could not hold the job that I now have." In relation to his present occupation with GE and his studies at NYU, Ed finds that the most important subjects studied at Bryant were accounting, and credits and collections. Other subjects in order of importance were retailing, public speaking, English, and correspondence.

In a letter to the Genie Committee, Miss Shirley Weiss who graduated from Bryant in 1952 and who is now doing graduate work at the University of Miami in Florida, expressed her enthusiasm for and interest in this movement.

Other Bryant graduates who have gone on to do graduate work have expressed equally enthusiastic opinions concerning the importance and advantages of furthering one's education, and the tremendous service performed by the Genie Fund in helping worthy students to attain the advantages of advanced study.

The Committee is currently making plans for a Genie Fund Assembly and fund drive. This drive can be the biggest and best since the beginning of the Genie Fund if everyone opens his heart to that spirit of generosity which will soon be hovering over Bryant. May the Genie leave a bountiful treasure this year for one of Bryant's worthiest sons.

Prof. Ramey Postpones Scheduled Test

Bryant is proud of you! Yes, we're addressing those seventy-five students who volunteered to give blood at Worcester last Tuesday night, June 9. These Bryant men exemplified the true spirit of brotherhood and Americanism. The tornado disaster, which claimed ninety lives and caused millions of dollars' worth of damage, took place in a matter of minutes. Immediately, radio broadcasts carrying the news notified neighboring towns and cities of the urgency of volunteers for blood donations in the stricken area.

The party started out from Providence at 10:30 p.m. only to return in the wee hours of the morning—5:00 a.m. to be exact. Bryant men were standing in line at 2:00 and 3:00 a.m. Wednesday morning. The Providence Journal and Evening Bulletin made note of the Bryant response to the tragedy in their evening paper.

Dr. Jacobs has also personally commended Bryant College dormitory students in a letter which may be found in each dorm.

who are untrustworthy—who might be a corroding influence upon you.

"Another guidepost for the beginner is to be conscientious," Miss Deasy. "Give a good day's work for a day's pay, and always be on time."

"When you are ready to step into semi-executive work, you must realize that business will now make even greater demands upon you. You will now be expected to be extremely capable, resourceful, responsible, and trustworthy. To be capable and resourceful, you must have the ability to do all the things that a top-ranking secretary has to do—and that is anything and everything that needs to be done in the office."

A very interesting point which Miss Deasy made in her talk was that the advertising field offers many opportunities to the male secretary and "a secretarial job has been the stepping stone, in many cases, to a fine executive position in the advertising profession."

Following her extremely helpful and interesting talk, Miss Deasy dictated some of her actual business correspondence to the Advanced Shorthand class.



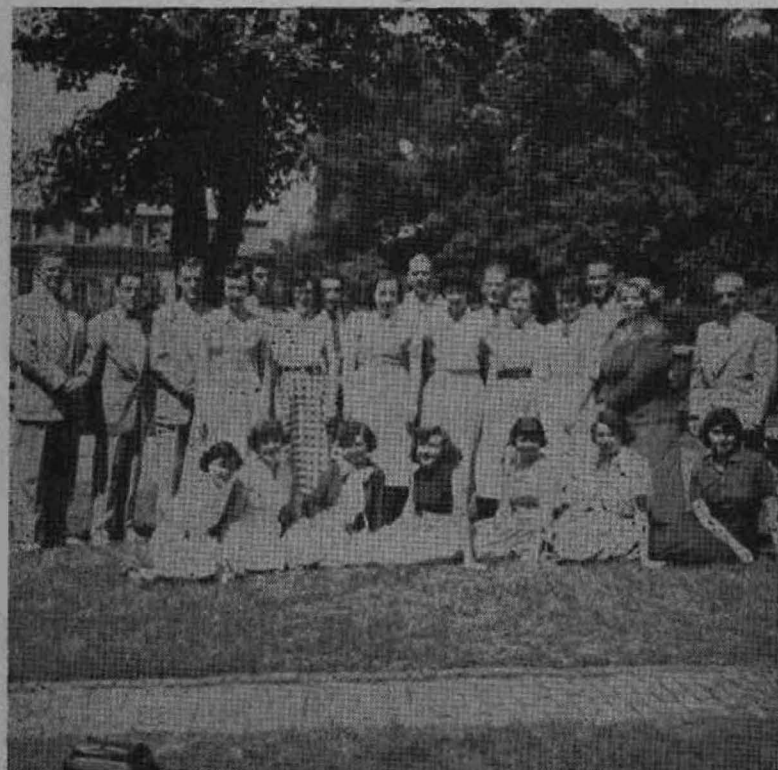

Switchboard Operation Taught to Secretaries

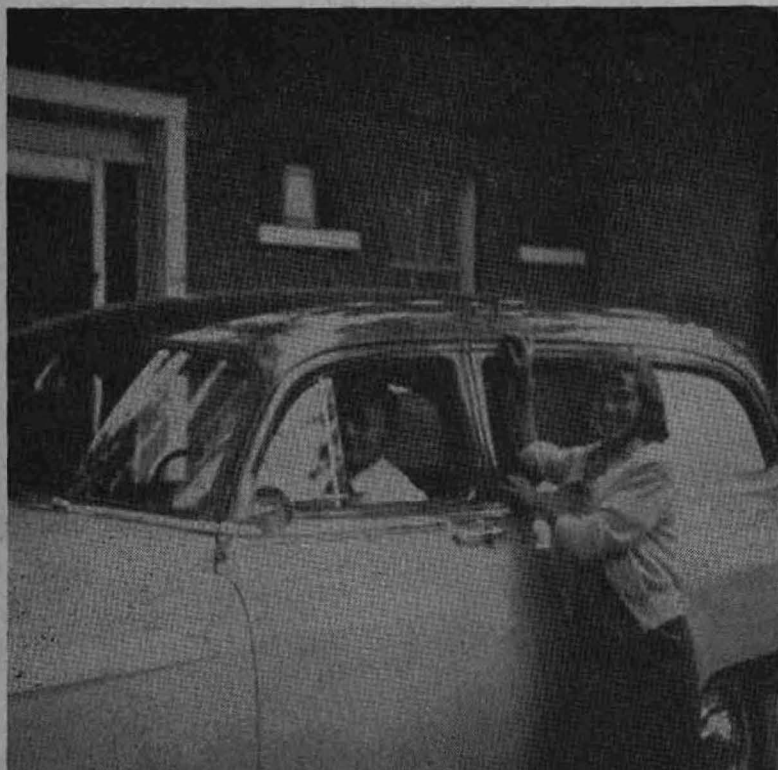
If you happen to be in the Administration Building and see a group of students clustered around the switchboard, you may wonder what is going on.
