Insurance and Taxes Subject of Two 'Bryant's View' Talks

Professor Dallas Lore Sharp's message to the radio audience on Bryant's View on March 10 was entitled, "What You Should Know About Life Insurance."

Professor Sharp said, "The latest accurate figures indicate that there are 90 million life insurance policyholders in the United States with insurance coverage amounting to \$3,400 each, and that the face value of insurance policies in force now is approximately the incredible sum of 304 billion dollars."

Professor Sharp indicated that the two major justifications for taking out an insurance policy on one's life were: for protection—for the family of the bread winner, and, second, to provide savings to help accumulate a sum for retirement purposes.

The three basic life insurance policies are, according to Professor Sharp, the term policy, the annuity, and the ordinary policy which is broken down into the straight life, the limited payment policy, and the endowment policy. All these facts and many others about life insurance were brought out in the talk, which proved to be interesting and informative to the listeners.

On March 17 Doctor Charles T. Powers, Professor of Accounting and Taxes at Bryant, spoke on the subject, "New Aspects of 1954 Income Tax Laws."


In his speech Dr. Powers pointed out just how the changes that the current administration has made in the tax laws of the nation will affect the persons who will have to file an income tax by April 15 of this year. He explained how parents could still claim minor children who earned over \$600 a year by the changes in the new federal laws. He also explained how a husband and wife may save money by filing a joint tax return. Other phases of the new tax law were also discussed in Dr. Power's talk.

Rules for Student Participation In Alumni Reunion Activities

At a recent meeting of the members of the Administrative Council in charge of student activities, the following rules and regulations concerning the attendance of undergraduates at alumni activities were passed on:

1. In accordance with past precedence, the president of each fraternity and sorority on Campus with his or her invited guest will be permitted to attend the Alumni Banquet, which will be held in the Ballroom of the Sheraton-Biltmore Hotel on Saturday evening, May 21. In the past the fraternities and sororities voted on whether or not they would send a representative, and they paid for the tickets to the Banquet.
2. Members of the present student body married or engaged to alumni will be permitted to participate in the alumni activities that weekend.
3. A male member of the present student body may attend the Alumni Banquet as an escort of an alumnus. A female member of the present student body may attend the Alumni Banquet if she is escorted by an alumnus. (The members of the Administrative Council are fully aware of the fact that this particular ruling could be abused, but they are hopeful that it will not be, so that in the future this ruling can remain in effect.)
4. The fraternities and sororities on Campus are privileged to attend the Alumni party which will be held in the Auditorium on Friday evening, May 20. If the members of the Greek Letter Council would like to consult with the members of the Administrative Council in regard to co-sponsoring this affair, the Council will be pleased to meet with them. If the members of the Greek Letter Council wish to arrange parties for their alumni on Campus on Saturday, May 21, in the Auditorium or some other building, it is permissible for them to do so.
5. It is a ruling not only of the Administrative Council but of the Board of Trustees that NO FRATERNITY OR SORORITY OR ANY UNDERGRADUATE ORGANIZATION MAY SPONSOR A COCKTAIL PARTY.



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Bryant Students Again Prove Their Sense of Charity in New Blood Bank Program

The fraternities and sororities of Bryant started a new blood program last week, which is to be sponsored by the Greek Letter Council.

This new blood program was initiated by Paul Dunne, President of the Student Senate, and Rosemary O'Neil, Secretary of the Student Senate. The program is being conducted in cooperation with the Rhode Island Hospital, and is to be headed by George Kotuby, vice-president of the Greek Letter Council.

Here is the new plan. Each month one member of every fraternity and sorority will donate a pint of blood at the hospital. This will mean that fifteen pints of blood will go into the bank each month. The blood bank will be under the name of Bryant College and will be used for the needs of the student body, the needy, or anyone else designated by those in charge of the program.

Another important phase of this new program is that any person donating a pint of blood will be able to transfer what he has given to the needs of a friend or relative, free of charge.

A pint of blood would ordinarily cost \$27.00. Bryant's plan will enable a person needing the blood to receive it for only the cost of the transfusion.

Nomination Papers Are Available Today for Class Elections

The Student Senate will sponsor class elections on April 1, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the gym. Tables will be set up on stage so that each student will have an opportunity to vote for his candidate.

In the past the student body has not taken full advantage of its opportunity to elect its own representative in the Senate. Last semester, for instance, the Secretarial Division elected only one slate of officers from all four semesters. It is intended that there be a separate slate of officers for each of the four semesters. Members of each secretarial semester group have the right to nominate and elect their own choices. The same thing happened in the sophomore BA class last semester, when the candidate for president was unopposed.

These elections are entirely for the students' benefit, and the student will derive much if he takes an active interest in the elections. As each citizen of this country has a duty to vote for its leader, so does each student have the duty to vote for the person he thinks best qualified to lead.

RULES FOR ELECTIONS: To be eligible for election, a student must be a member of the class which he intends to represent and must have a good scholastic standing. No absentee ballots will be accepted.

All nominees must have a "C" average or better in school work.

Nomination papers will be available from Miss Mary Henry in the Adm. Bldg. until 3 p.m. today. Each student is urged to take advantage of this opportunity to nominate his candidate for representation in the Senate. At least thirty-five names are required on the petition for nomination to make it eligible for consideration.

THE VOTING GROUPS FOR THIS SEMESTER ARE:

1. One slate of officers from the entire Teacher-Trainee Division.
2. The secretarial students who are here for one year will vote in their first semester with the first semester group of the two-year secretaries. Those who are in their second semester in the one-year secretarial course, will vote with the fourth semester of the two-year secretaries.
3. All BA students will vote with their respective semesters.
4. One slate of officers from all prep divisions.

So ends my interview with our Irish lass. We wish her all kinds of happiness and success here at Bryant.

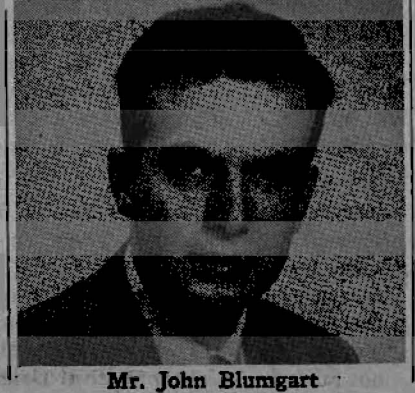
Now, I should like you to meet Susumu Yamazaki, who comes to the Bryant Campus from far away Shioiri-cho, Yokasuka, Japan.

The next issue will contain the results of the playoff games and the all-star game between the day league and the night league.

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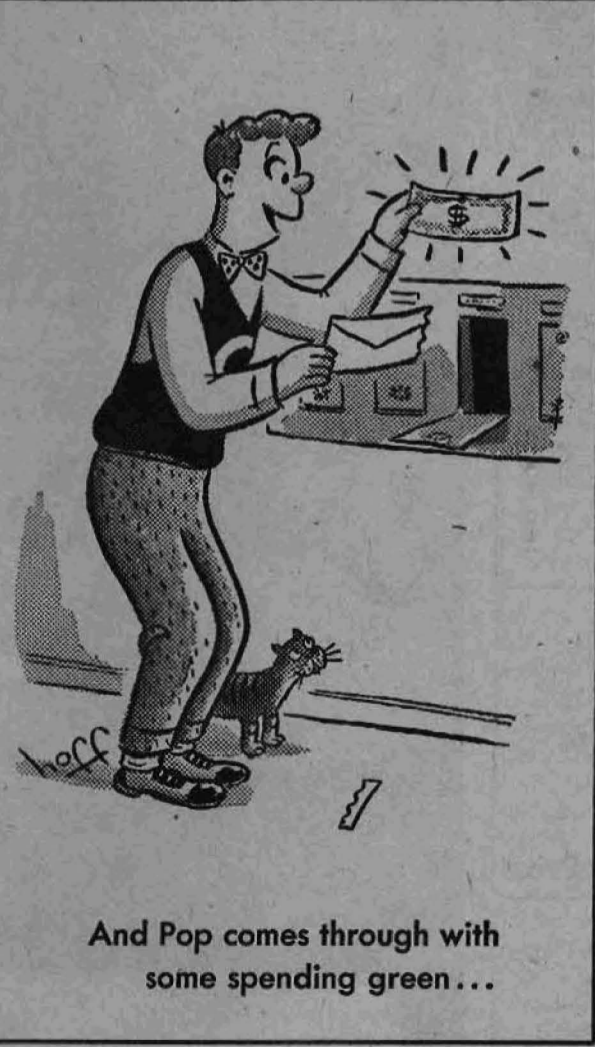
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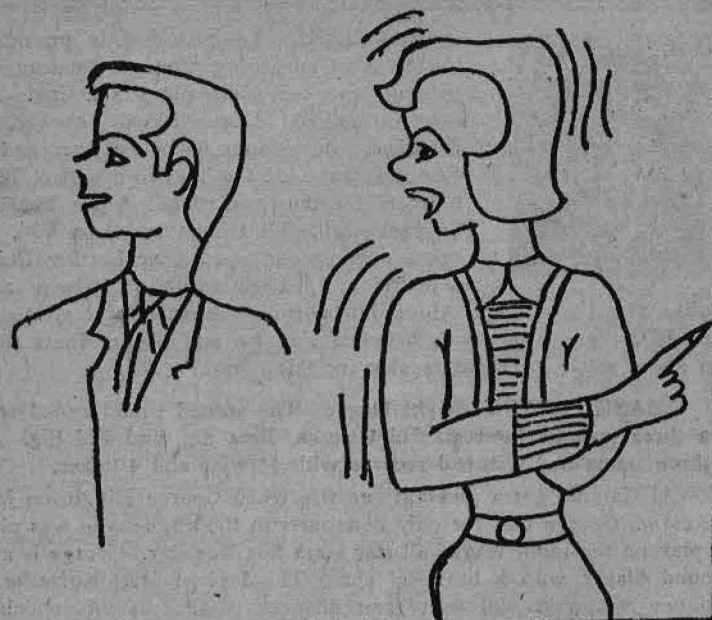

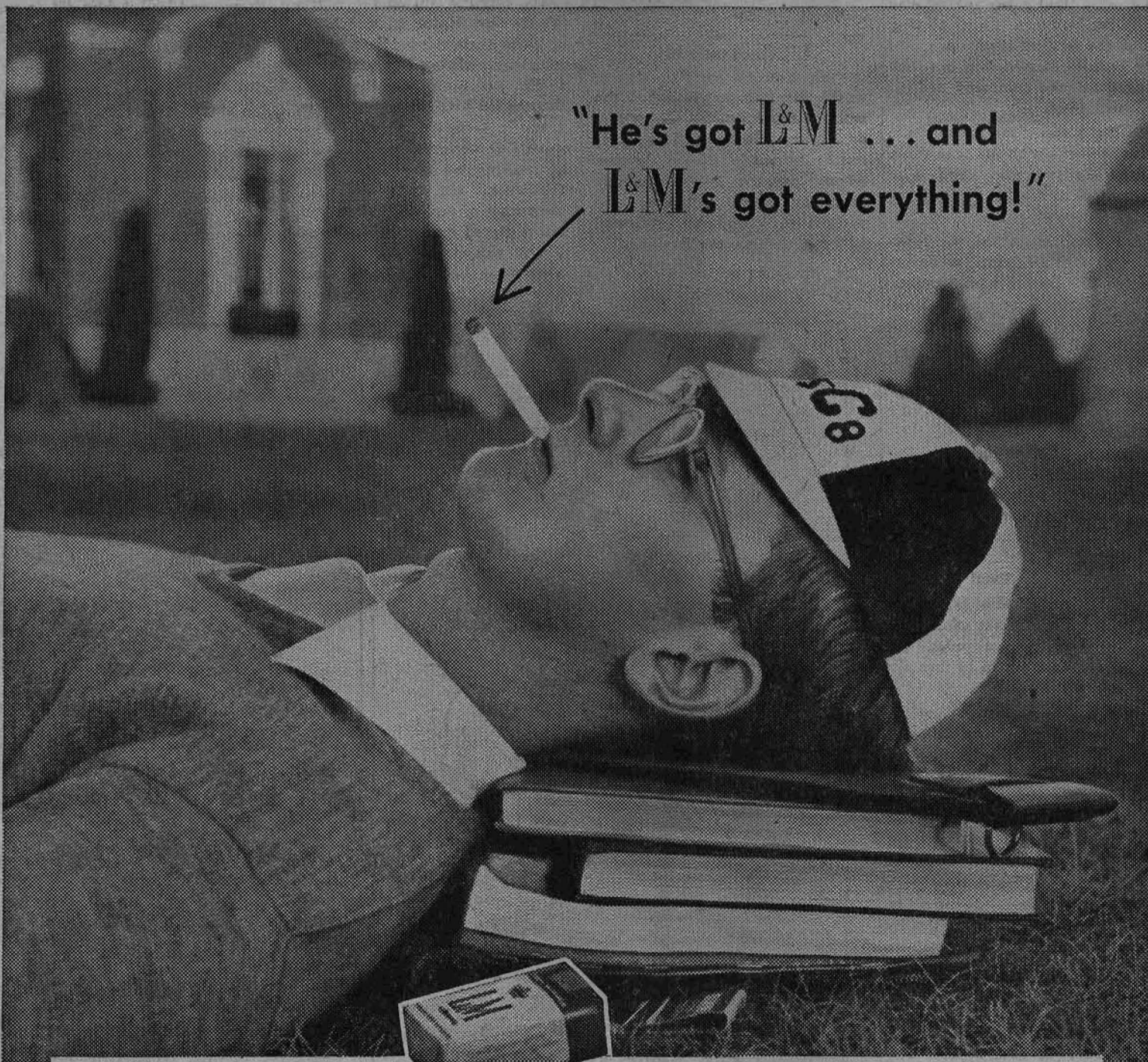
