The Bryant College Cheerleaders



Many years of study are represented by this achievement and the Attaining of this degree is held in high esteem throughout the Martial Arts World. This honor was conferred on Bill on July 23, and his rank is registered in the U.S. hy the United States Karate Association and in Japan by the Hakko Ryu Martial Arts Federation. On Tuesday all campaigning began for the candidates. Part of this campaigning consisted of an election rally. Of course, the most important part of the campaigning will commence with the actual casting of votes. On Tuesday, October 4, voting will begin at 8:30 a.m. and will terminate at 4:00 p.m. The later time is for the purpose of student teachers, who may return to campus to east their votes. Voting will take place inside

Votes will be counted at 4:00 p.m. immediately following the closing of the polls. Counting will take place in the Student Government Room, and one representative from each campaign committee (not the candidate) may be present at the counting. However, the representative may not UNDER AND CIRCUM-STANCES leave the room once the counting has begun.

And so, Fellow Students, it is up to all of us to support our candidates for class offices. When October 4 arrives, VOTE, If you want the best, support the best.


Attention, Freshmen


