Bill Doherty received his first degree black belt in the Martial Art of Karate during his summer vacation. The black belt is the highest color ranked belt given in the Martial Arts. Many years of study are represented by this achievement and the Attaining of this degree is held in high esteem throughout the Martial Arts World. This honor was conferred on Bill on July 23, and his rank is registered in the U. S. by the United States Karate Association and in Japan by the Hakkō Ryu Martial Arts Federation. He is the protege of the famous Karate-Ka John E. Saviano, master instructor of the Warren Karate Dojo under whom Bill studied, trained, and received his degree. Mr. Saviano is considered a legend of his own time for his feats of strength.

At the Warren Karate Dojo, Bill is an assistant instructor. On Monday nights in Pawtucket Bill holds classes for men and women at a branch school of the Warren Karate Dojo and on weekends private instructions in Karate, Jui Jitsu, and self defense are given at his home.

Bill served on active duty in the United States Marine Corps from 1960 to 1963. He was in the fleet Marine Force, an instructor at the NCO Leadership School, and a guard at the Naval War College in Newport.

Bill is in the junior class at Bryant College and is enrolled in the Business Administration program. He is a member of the Bryant chapter of the American Marketing Association, and he is also a brother and the pledge-master of Alpha Omicron Fraternity.

The reason for this change in procedure is easily explainable. In the past, class officers were always elected in October. This time is definitely too late to adequately enable a president to plan things for his class.

The early elections for upperclassmen this year constitute part of a turnover. Class elections for upperclassmen will again take place this spring. In this way class officers will be able to begin their plans during the summer. Come fall, the only elections will be for the Freshmen Class. Thus, all elections except one will take place from now on in the spring to facilitate matters for those concerned.

On Tuesday all campaigning began for the candidates. Part of this campaigning consisted of an election rally. The rally began with SHORT speeches last night by the presidential candidates for their states and by independent candidates. The Noblemen, a local Combo, provided the music for dancing; and refreshments were available.

Of course, the most important part of the campaigning will commence with the actual casting of votes. On Tuesday, October 4, voting will begin at 8:30 a.m. and will terminate at 4:00 p.m. The later time is for the purpose of student teachers, who may return to campus to cast their votes. Voting will take place inside the college gym.

Votes will be counted at 4:00 p.m. immediately following the closing of the polls. Counting will take place in the Student Government Room, and one representative from each campaign committee (not the candidate) may be present at the counting. However, the representative may not UNDER AND CIRCUMSTANCES leave the room once the counting has begun.

And so, Fellow Students, it is up to all of us to support our candidates for class offices. When October 4 arrives, VOTE. If you want the best, support the best.

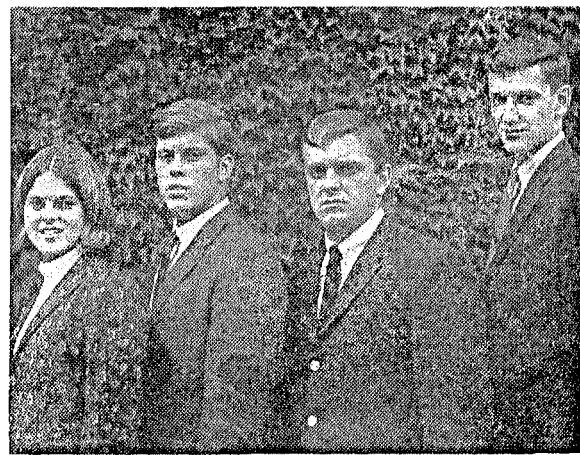

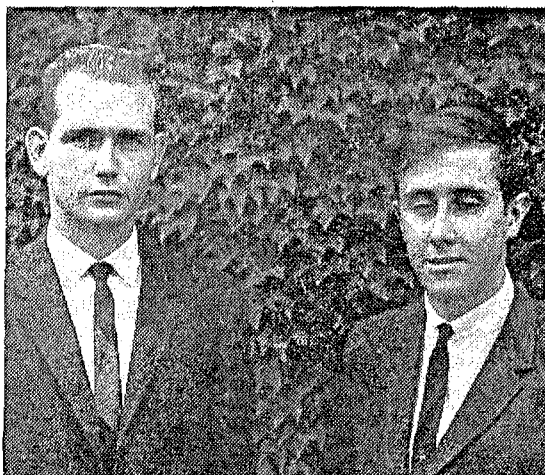
