Facebook Conquers Bryant University

Two weeks ago Symphonee Willoughby, a freshman management major from Middletown Connecticut, didn't even know what thefacebook was. "When I got here my friend made me sign up," she explained.

Yet in a week and a half's time Symphonee has confirmed dozens of friendships and is connected with some 700 people, more than a quarter of Bryant's population. "No, I am not addicted, I have heard that it is really addictive, for me it's just something you do when you are browsing on the computer," explained Willoughby.

When asked about her usage Willoughby sighed "Now I am going to sound like I am addicted, I check it whenever I check my mail, I would say about 5 times a day...damn I sound addicted."

While 700 people and 5 times a day may sound addicted, it is probably minor compared with many closet users here on Bryant's campus, who are not available for comment at the library's public computers where Willoughby was checking her facebook in the middle of the day. In fact a good percentage of Bryant students log on to thefacebook.com every day.

This phenomenon which has embraced our campus and others across the country represents the biggest communication tool since AOL's instant messenger. Since its introduction to the Bryant Campus on January 12, 1,881 profiles have been created with an average of 42 friend connections each.

To accurately describe facebook is to say that simple programming, at least in comparison to other programs we use everyday like Microsoft's Office, meets almost unlimited features and uses in the college world. The program designed by Mark Zuckerberg, a student at Harvard University, fits almost seamlessly into our college lives.

All features are based off its primary use as a profile service. Here students can post a picture, and detailed personal informa-

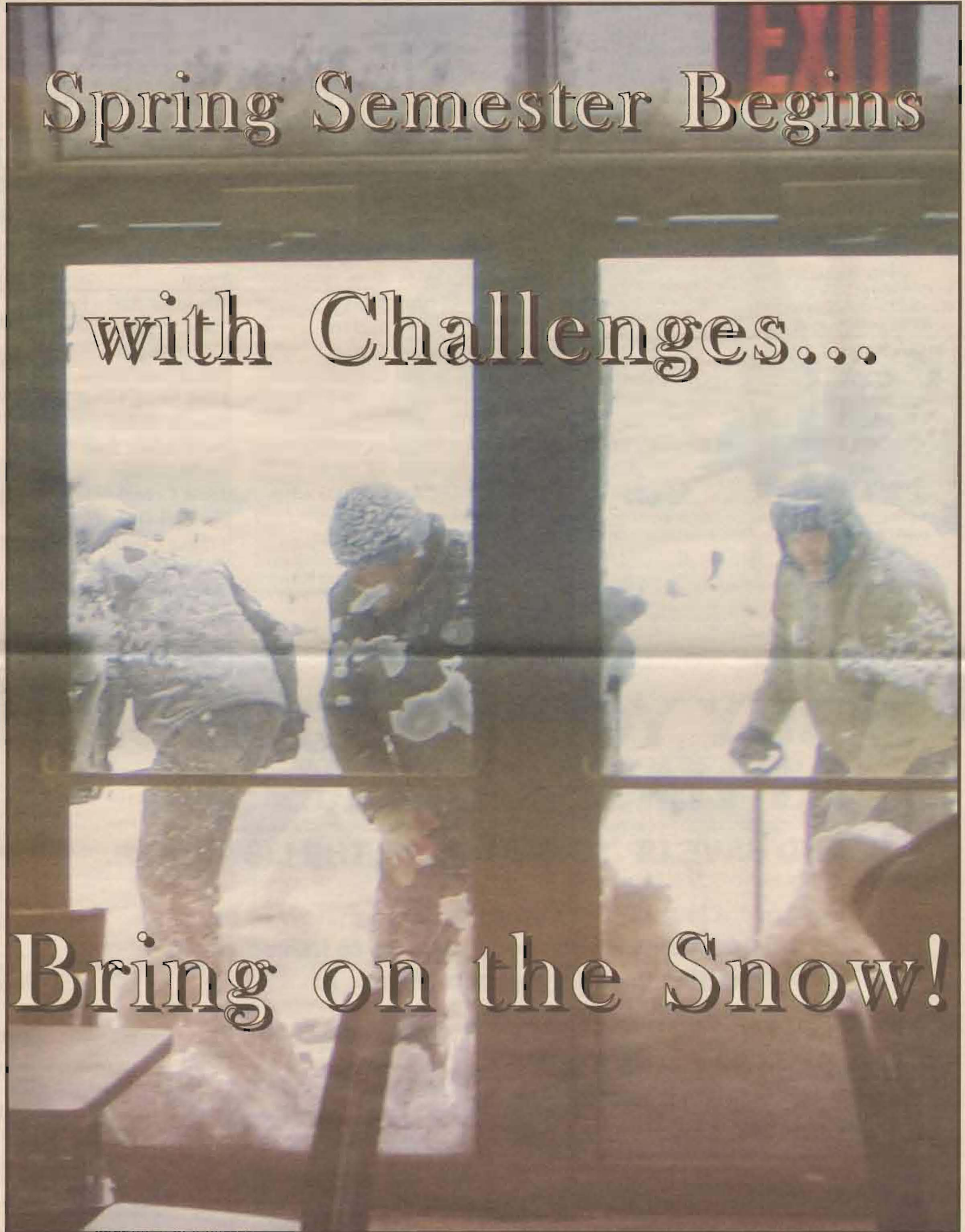

Mount St. Helens' surprises scientists

The rock was at least the size of a man's head, and geologist John Pallister said as he would a newborn which, in a manner of speaking, it was.

As little as a month ago, this beefy slab was in liquid form, a pulsating 1,500 degrees Fahrenheit and working its way up from five miles below Mount St. Helens to form a chunk of the region's most active volcano.

For Pallister, a research geologist at the Cascades Volcano Observatory, evidence of how quickly Mount St. Helens is evolving doesn't get more solid.

"It's hard to believe that several weeks ago this was lava flow in the middle of the Earth," he said.

Four months after the volcano stirred back to life, drawing curiosity seekers from across the country, the bulging

new oblong dome inside the crater has ballooned to 350 feet high, with nearly a 50-degree slope in places.

The dome now contains enough solid material to fill a basketball arena more than 100 times. At the peak of the flow, molten magma was being transformed into new rock pushing skyward at a rate of 11 yards per day.

Then earlier this month, an unexpected and significant explosion the biggest since October caught researchers by surprise and appears to mark some sort of transition on the sleeping giant's path to regrowth.

"It makes me think a lot differently about the range of possibilities for the future," Pallister said. "We were anticipating a different event."

"Figuring out what it means will take some time."

At 3:18 a.m. PST on Jan. 16, just 36 hours after geologists had walked along the surface of the new dome dodging

vents emitting loud, hot blasts, a release of gas blew rocks and debris several hundred feet. It spread ash 8 inches or more thick inside portions of the crater and destroyed a few thousand dollars worth of instruments researchers had put there during their visit.

In its aftermath, the tremors at St. Helens have slowed, as the movement of rock creating the new dome slowed. The sticky, protruding sections of the dome are, nevertheless, they are being scraped so hard against the existing surface they are turned white as the friction

wears down its surface.

"We would have anticipated a different event," said Seth Moran, a U.S. Geological Survey seismologist.

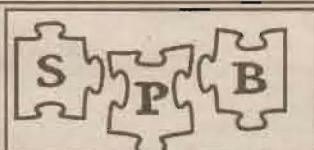
Volcanologists would not have been surprised if there had been a significant rockfall, a continuing hazard as sections of the new dome jut higher and stretch more than a thousand feet to the side. The explosive release of gas suggested that St. Helen's plumbing is more tricky than first believed, that even slight changes in gas, or moisture below the surface, can trigger a new scenario.

"The question is, why now?" Pallister asked.

He wondered aloud if there was a more gas-rich flow farther below trying to push its way to the surface.

In fact, one of the most predictable things about Mount St. Helens has long been the volcano's unwillingness to act conventionally.

It's a reminder, said Jon Major, a research hydrologist at the observatory, that "we've learned an awful lot about what we don't yet understand."

Burglars busted over winter break

While many students from Bryant went home to enjoy their winter break, a small minority returned to campus to start their winter session. Unbeknownst to the returning students, they were not the only people to be found on campus. One week into the winter semester, two people, not from the Bryant community, were arrested for theft and charged with five counts of burglary.

At approximately 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday, January 4, 2005, DPS was notified of a burglary. Which, by definition, is an illegal entry and a crime committed within, had taken place in one of the Bryant residence halls. The burglary consisted of forced entry and the theft of a student's laptop. At that time, DPS officers notified the Smithfield police.

While an investigation ensued, DPS received a call about a suspicious car parked in the Hall 16 lot. DPS responded to the call and upon arrival found a 28 year old female placing a laptop into a white Ford Explorer. Upon questioning, the young woman broke down and blurted out the blame on an older man. She gave the officers a description of the man. Due to the description, officers were able to identify the 41 year old male and locate him on campus.

Once officers found the gentleman, they noticed he seemed to hide behind a vehicle and then stand back up. While they questioned the

man, a student came up and said he had seen the man place something under his vehicle. When the officers checked the vehicle, they found two laptops underneath and one laptop inside the man's vehicle. A cell phone and a box of jewelry were also among the stolen items. All items were returned to students.

Due to FERPA (Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974), DPS was not able to release the names of the students involved in the incident, however Andrew Tolmich, a junior and finance major was willing to discuss his personal interaction with one of the burglars.

According to Andrew, he encountered the male burglar just moments before he was apprehended by officers. Andrew, who is in RA in Hall 15, had just returned from his winter session class. He propped open his door prior to entering the bathroom and upon return, he saw a man exiting his room with a laptop in his arms. The man asked Andrew, "Have you seen the cleaning staff?"

Not realizing who the man was, he casually said no and the man exited his room. Soon after, Andrew received a phone call from a girl within the building who claimed to have had her laptop and jewelry stolen. He immediately contacted DPS and was surprised to hear that DPS was in the process of apprehending the man.

Although the burglars were both caught and charged for their crimes, Andrew still questions how the man even entered the residence hall, "I am not sure how he managed to get in. He doesn't have a FOB. Maybe he used an emergency exit?"

The man and woman were arrested and currently face five counts of burglary and theft.

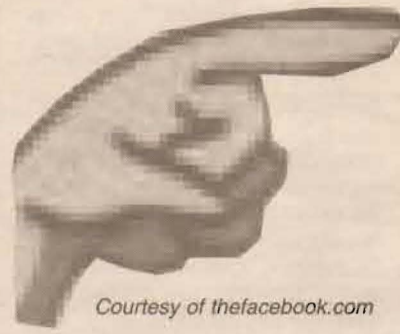

The program also provides simplistic integrated e-mail communication and every other possible contact information one could ever want. Better yet it integrates

seamlessly with AOL's Instant Messenger, another obsession of college campuses.

Users create groups, which also helps to facilitate communication and allow individuals to meet people with similar interests. Groups at Bryant range from the Anti-Bush: Bring Back Monica Lewinsky special interest groups to a I Went to Public School ...Bitch common interest group. Many Bryant University Students recognize teams, clubs,



and organizations.

Perhaps one of thefacebook's more useful features is its Courses List. Utilizing this, students can contact, or get to know better, people in each of their classes... extremely useful for the night before a big test, or when checking out the girl two rows back that you can't seem to get a good look at in class.

"I get to see what high school friends at other schools are doing and can message them,"

Willoughby said, hitting on another of thefacebook's key features.

As thefacebook.com moves its way up into Bryant students' favorite college related web pages, joining the ranks of rate-myprofessor.com, collegehumor.com, and others. Students gain more options for procrastinations, but also a better social network which will inevitably bring Bryant's community closer together.

What woman did you guys want to get with that lead to the creation of thefacebook? No, but seriously, how did it all get started? Why?

Mark Zuckerberg, a student at Harvard, had the idea last winter. He wanted to combine an idea for a universal online database with an interactive social networking interface. The idea was sort of an extension of the traditional college facebooks combined with terrible freshman ID photos and boring information.

Zuckerberg said, "After a few weeks of dedicated work and late-night dorm-room conversations with the other four guys who started thefacebook with me, thefacebook was released at Harvard."

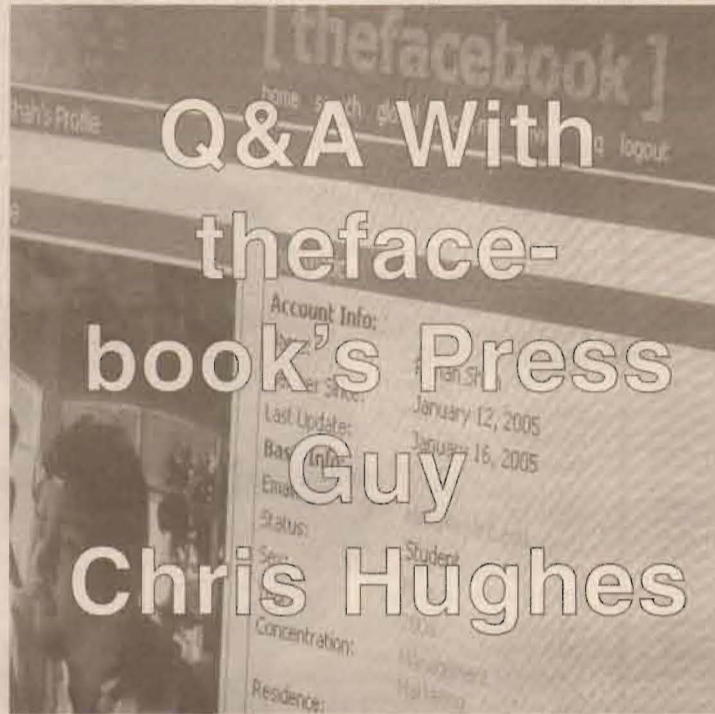
Thefacebook, while original and more successful, is similar to other profile services, did you model it off any others? Why do you think thefacebook has become more successful?

No, we didn't really model the site off of any other services. It was modeled more along the lines of those boring facebooks handed out at the beginning of the year. I think the site is popular because it's versatile. Different students use thefacebook in different ways, but in general, our users return to the site to find information of their peers, to make connections with friends and acquaintances, and to communicate with one another.

It's a reference tool and a means of communication. I think that combination and the fact that it's fun to use, keeps people coming back.

What kind of process is in place for starting up thefacebook at new schools?

Our criteria for choosing which schools to add is pretty simple: the more requests we receive from a school to be added to the network, the higher the likelihood we'll add it.



How many people and schools have signed up as part of thefacebook?

335 schools with 1,560,000 registered members.

How many people are you friends with on your thefacebook profile? Do you guys compete?

I think I have around 400 friends altogether. Nah, we don't really compete.

In that you are providing a free service, how does thefacebook cover its cost? Is it profitable? (Sorry this is mostly a business school I have to ask, we are kind of one-track minded here.)

We support the site through advertising revenue, both from corporations and an "announcement" scheme. For the announcements, a student can pay about \$12 a day and have thefacebook display an announcement similar in style to Google ads to all users of thefacebook at her particular school.

Can people remain a part of thefacebook after graduation?

Absolutely. We have a lot of alums on the network.

Besides expansion, do you have plans for new features?

There are a lot of plans for thefacebook in the future. We will continue to expand to as many schools as possible. Alongside general expansion, we will review and update the features that we have and add new ones. We are also planning on hosting some events on college campuses, most prominently a National Beirut Championship in February. Finally, we are partnering the site with another project called wirehog, which has already happened for students at a limited number of schools. For more information, check out www.wirehog.com.

In 5-4-3-2-1...WJMF is Back On-air and Live

The radio waves of 88.7 FM are once again filled with the voices of WJMF's DJs. The radio station resumed live broadcast on Wednesday, February 2 at 6 PM. The first show of the new debut was Freshman Jeff Larson and Bobby Corrigan's *Out of Control Rock and Roll*, playing music from the 90's to

present with shout outs to the 70s and 80s. The radio station had been long silenced after Hall 6 was closed down for restoration to the residence hall during the final weeks of spring 2004. The WJMF studio is relocated in Koffler. It also required renovations to accommodate the station and a new television studio.

The consensus from the student body and the past DJ's express excitement to get back on the air," explained Adam Muccino, General Manger of WJMF. It was kind of hard to have a radio station without a radio signal" he continued "we all have a common interest, we like being on the air...we

are excited to do what we joined the group to do in a new improved environment."

That new improved environment is really the key to the station's move. In Hall 6, the radio station was located in the front of a suite. The new location in Koffler places the studio in a central location with a window facing out onto campus. Muccino explained, "The greatest difference between the old studio and the new is that we can't take showers, we don't have a shower anymore." The Converted studio in Hall 6 came complete with a full suite bathroom. More seriously, he continued, "the radio station stands out a little more which will help to attract more listeners on campus."

With the recent facilities update, Muccino hopes to eventually upgrade equipment over time. Plans are already in place to mount a speaker on the outside of the studio to play whatever is on the air out toward the center of campus. Sound quality has already been increased just

by the simple rewiring of current equipment. Presently, the transmitter remains untouched on the roof of the MAC but Muccino reports

"Plans are underway to reposition the PODS to broadcast the signal further out beyond campus."

Over the nine month hiatus the radio station stayed active on campus. "We put ourselves out there to student groups that needed still sound support, and as a result we have DJ'd more events this semester than in years past," explained Muccino, adding that he will continue providing this service to the campus.

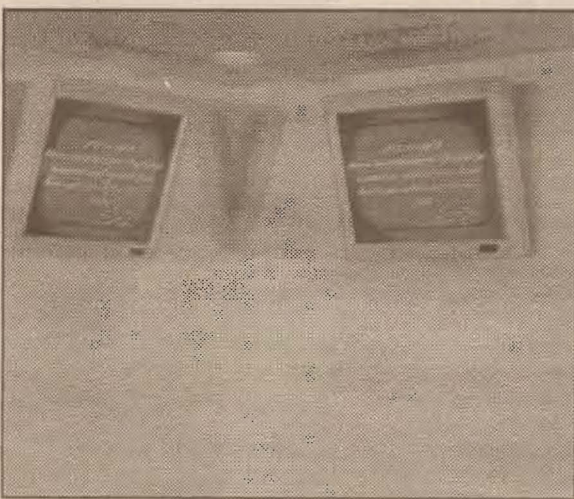

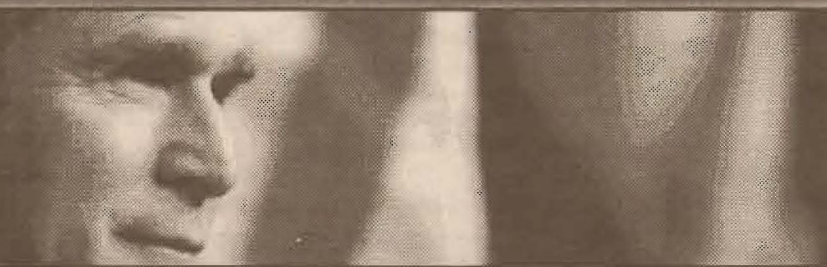

The Portfolio: The LowDow(n) on Investing

Have you ever overheard those two guys talking about how much cash they just made with their investments in the stock market and thought to yourself, "Wow, how can I do that?" Well if you have, and want to learn the ropes you have come to the right place.

The two of us have been investing for a little over three years, and have been through our share of ups and downs.

However, after the first year of rocky trading, our portfolios have continued to grow with impressive gains. While we share many of the same ideas about the companies, in which we invest our money, we share just as many opposing views. Sometimes Louis is right, and sometimes Pete is right; but in

the end all that matters is that we come out on top.

There are many great investment opportunities out there, both long and short term, and we thought it would be an interesting idea to start writing about investing and investment opportunities that may be worth investigating.

All it takes is a deposit of \$500 to get a brokerage account up and running. There are a number of online brokerage sites that you can trade with, and the cost per trade is a nominal cost. We prefer to use Ameritrade since it offers live streaming, news, and a nice display. Ameritrade charges \$10.99 a trade, but Ameritrade will charge a fee if you don't maintain a minimum account balance of \$1,000 or make a certain number of trades in your account after 6 months. Other sites include: Scottrade which charges \$7 a trade and has no extra fees or charges, eTrade, which

requires a \$1,000 minimum and charges \$19.99 a trade, Fidelity, which charges \$19.95 a trade, and others like Schwab and TD Waterhouse, which offer trades for less than \$20.

The way we see it, an investment of \$500 is not a substantial amount, and it is not as if you are blowing it away on something that you would later regret.

While investing \$500 may not allow you to diversify into a number of different stocks which would be ideal, it helps a beginner to gain some invaluable experience. This investment will allow the newfound investor to become involved in researching stocks, following the stock performance and the market itself, while evaluating your investment choice from time to time.

Hopefully, a few months after the initial investment and some portfolio growth, you can get yourself into a habit of making regular deposits into your account. One thing we urge is

that when you put your money into an account like this, leave it and do not withdraw your money. With a constant influx of money into your account and no withdrawals, your portfolio value can show even more significant gains.

Another thing to keep in mind is that you do not need to be an expert to start investing your money. Think about a product, service, or company that you enjoy and think would be a good investment. This is where it all starts. After you figure out which stock you might want to invest in, all you have to do is pull up some information on it. This can be done at a number of websites, we prefer to use Yahoo's Finance section. There you can browse through recent news reports about the company, find a link to their homepage where you can search through their investor relations page, and get technical charts on the companies past stock performance. Yahoo!

Finance also has a great message board to learn more about the company from other interested investors.

If all goes as planned you can expect to see our new investment ideas, and a little analysis on each of them twice a month. Pete will be writing about smaller companies that are great values and have potential for substantial growth, while Louis will be focusing on the technology spectrum. Keep in mind we are not professional investors. We are only offering up our ideas, and it is up to you to think them through and analyze them for yourself. Bulldog Bites: Weekly Athletic Scoreboard

MEN'S BASKETBALL (13-6, 9-6 NE-10)
Red-Hot Bulldogs Winners of Six Straight; Visit Lowell Wednesday and Host Southern N.H. Saturday
 Bryant improved its winning streak to six games with three wins this past week, defeating Pace (88-60), Southern Connecticut (80-47), and Franklin Pierce (68-56). During its current streak, Bryant has outscored opponents by an average of 20.5 points per game. Mike Williams needs 12 rebounds to move into second all-time for career rebounds at Bryant University. Williams has 857 rebounds entering Wednesday's game at UMass Lowell. With 67 three-pointers this season, junior guard John Williams has matched his freshman total for three's in a season. Williams currently leads the Northeast-10 Conference in 3-point FG percentage (.479) and three's per game (3.72). He is second overall in the conference in scoring with 20.6 ppg. Bryant is fourth in the conference in scoring with 78.3 ppg, but more importantly, second in the conference in scoring defense (65.6 ppg) and leading the NE-10 with a 40.4 field goal percentage defense. The Bulldogs were ranked No. 10 in last week's NCAA Northeast Regional poll released on Wednesday.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL (13-7, 8-7 NE-10)
Bulldogs Drop Pair of Conference Games Last Week
 The Bryant women's basketball team, ranked No. 6 in last week's NCAA Northeast Region poll, dropped two of three last week. On Thursday, the Bulldogs fell to Southern Connecticut 75-54 with the lone highlight coming from senior Lindsay Hermann who notched her 1,000th career point. The Bulldogs dropped a tough 54-52 decision at home to Franklin Pierce on Saturday. The Bulldogs will look to rebound Wednesday when the team heads to UMass Lowell for a 5:30 p.m. game.

Cegarra Notches Win In Shot Put; Greigre Earns NCAA Provisional Mark in Men's 200M at Wesleyan Saturday
 The Bryant men's and women's indoor track & field teams returned to action Saturday at the Wesleyan Invitational after being idle for nearly a month. Sophomore Jessica Cegarra won the women's shot put while sophomore Hafiz Greigre placed second in the men's 200 meter in an NCAA provisional qualifying time of 22.22 seconds. Greigre

also placed second in the men's long jump with a mark of 21 feet, 9 inches. Holly Resendes was third in the women's 5,000 meters in 19 minutes, 14.31 seconds while teammate Nicole Radzik was closed behind Resendes, finishing in fifth in 19:54.12.

Jennifer Carvalho '98, baseball star Jason Eldridge '99, men's golf all-American Scott Trethewey '91, and longtime coach and administrator Bob Reall of Lincoln, R.I. were all honored by their former teammates, coaches and friends during the induction dinner ceremony.

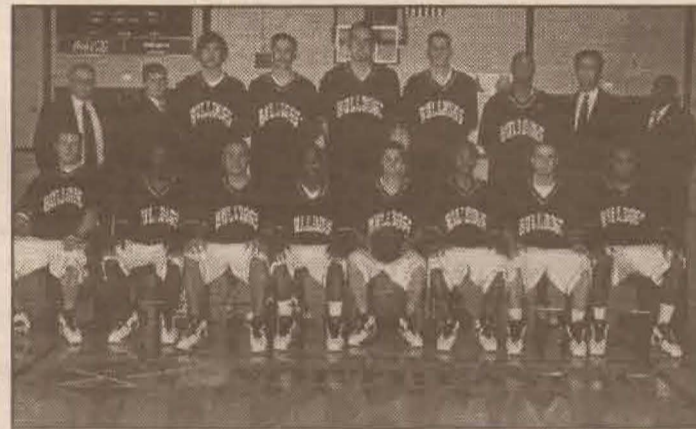

Ruminations on College Life

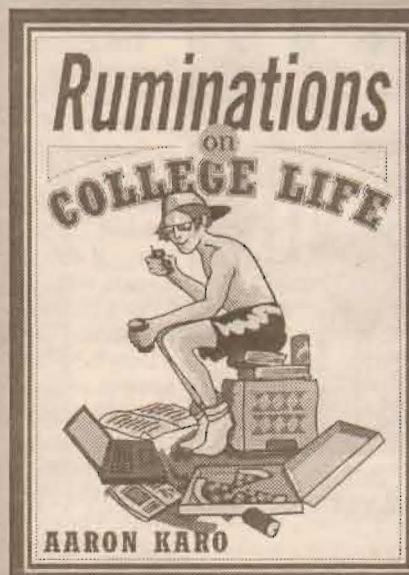

Cancer. Growing up I never understood what it was, in fact I had no clue. Although I always knew it was bad, real bad. I can remember seeing my aunt smoking cigarettes and asking her to stop because I knew that she would get cancer and I would miss her and her visits. It was a strange thing for a six year-old to say, but in a spunky family like mine, it was hardly unlikely.

Looking back, I realize now that no matter who you are, you are connected to cancer in some form. Yet it's not until it comes into your inner circle that you truly recognize the pain and suffering cancer patients endure. I never understood; in fact, as it was happening in front of me, I didn't know what was happening. All I knew was that it was

bad and that I should find a way to help out. Unfortunately it took the death of my best friend's mother to give me the motivation to help out.

In all actuality, my best friend's mom was my second mom. She took care of me when my mom could not and she treated me like one of her own. She was the mother of three by birth but by choice she was the mother of a whole team. Throughout her battle with cancer, she never showed any fear, nor did she stop caring for others. At her worst, all she cared about was making sure her daughters were going to be OK.

She was one of the most remarkable women I have ever met. She was also one of my greatest teachers. Before I met her I was like most teenage girls; I dreaded my mother. To me, my mom was some lady who thought she

understood me, but I knew that she didn't and never could because I was growing up in the 90's. I didn't have all the answers but I knew my mom didn't either; we were just too different, and besides, I thought, I have my friends. She made my views change. In fact, now I can't wait to talk to my mom because there are times when she's the only one who gets me.

However, it wasn't until my best friend's mom had the battle with cancer that things really started to make sense and I realized my mom understood more than I thought.

I spent the days after her death in a fog. At the time, I was alone because my parents had taken their first trip to Europe. I can't even tell you what happened; all I know is that I laid in my parents bed just waiting for them to come home because I had never felt so lost or lonely

before.

It was the first time since I was a kid that I honestly needed my mom and dad; they were the only two people on the face of the earth that could make me feel better. We had to be there for each other, because in actuality, we had all lost a best friend.

You see what I didn't understand about cancer is that it kills people. As silly and uneducated as that sounds, unless you really sit down and think about it you may not understand that either. Cancer makes you suffer and then it takes away everything you have. It is possibly the final chapter in your story. Possibly.

We can change this, and if nothing else we can start to change it. Relay for Life is an event done from heart to heart around the country to help raise money for the American Cancer Society. Relay for Life, to be held at Bryant University on

April 22-23, is an opportunity for groups of people to walk or run to raise money for cancer. Come out and celebrate the possibility, the idea that things can and will change. A Relay for Life kick off will be held in the Rotunda on February 9th, from 9:00 AM-2:00 PM.

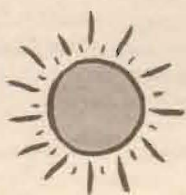
