## World News



WASHINGTON - Teamsters President Ron Carey was disqualified from a re-run election, according to a court-appointed monitor Monday. Carey was found involved in an illegal scheme to funnel union funds into his campaign. Carey's re-election victory over challenger James P. Hoffa last year was set aside Aug. 22 by a federal monitor who found that an illegal fund-raising scheme may have contributed to his slim victory.

NEW YORK - The mother of 8-month-old Matthew Eappen is furious that British au pair Louise Woodward won celebrity along with her freedom in a Massachusetts courtroom. Deborah Eappen told Time magazine that she's also angry with Judge Hiller Zobel, who reduced Woodward's second-degree murder conviction to manslaughter and set her free. "Louise took away Matthew, and the judge took away justice," she said.

NEW YORK - The famous Barbie will go under the knife, only this time it will be to reduce and not to add on. The Wall Street Journal reported Monday that Barbie will undergo some cosmetic changes - including breast reduction, facial reconstruction and hip slimming - in an effort to give her a more realistic appearance. "Her profile will be less graduated," said Jean McKenzie, head of Mattel, Inc.'s Barbie division. One estimate puts the current Barbie's measurements at an unlikely 38-18-34 in human terms. The new Barbie will be unveiled in January and will be phased in gradually.

WAUKESHA, Wis. - It started as a schoolyard prank. Now four boys ages 12 and 13 who gave a classmate a wedgie must apologize and perform community service if they want disorderly conduct citations dropped. Three of the Merton Intermediate School students agreed to apologize. The fourth hired lawyer Kevin innocuous prank, and it was grossly overblown by the school district," Keane said. Superintendent Mark Flynn said the school reacted appropriately by asking a sheriff's deputy to investigate. Five boys were suspended from school for three days, and four of them received \$141 disorderly conduct citations. Officials said the boys also yanked their classmate's underwear in an earlier incident. The boy was not seriously injured either time.

PASADENA, Calif. - NASA's \$141 million Deep Space 1 spacecraft, scheduled to launch next July, will test a dozen advanced technologies for future missions. Members of the DS1 science team held a briefing Wednesday to discuss the capabilities of its 5-foot-high workhorse. During its two-year mission, DS1 will use high-tech monitors to analyze an asteroid from a distance of just five miles, conduct gravity tests of Mars and study the nucleus of a comet.

NEW YORK - With families of victims looking on, the FBI announced Tuesday it has found no proof that terrorism brought down TWA Flight 800, a crash that killed 230 people in 1996. Agents conducted more than 7,000 interviews in the \$12 million investigation, one of the largest in U.S. history. A CIA video simulation shown during the news conference concluded that what some eyewitnesses thought was a missile hitting the plane actually was the burning of leaking fuel after the plane had already exploded.

DENVER - One of the weapons supposedly stolen in the robbery that allegedly financed the Oklahoma City bombing actually was registered to defendant Terry Nichols, a witness acknowledged Tuesday. Karen Anderson, a partner of Arkansas gun dealer Roger Moore, had testified that guns stolen in the robbery were found in Nichols' home after the Oklahoma City bombing. But Tuesday, defense attorney Michael Tigar showed Anderson a record of a gun Nichols purchased in 1993. It matched the serial number of an identical weapon on a list of weapons stolen from her partner.

Eleven states have had confirmed cases of influenza-type illnesses and a number of others have unconfirmed cases, announced experts at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta. But it's not too late to get a flu vaccination. "The flu vaccine is highly successful, does not cause flu and causes only minor side effects," advises one health expert. Other guidelines for preventing and treating colds and flu were also released.

## Bryant Men's Basketball defeats Merrimack by a 3 point shot at the buzzer

MEN'S BASKETBALL: BRYANT 81, MERRIMACK 80

Sophomore **Jason Bennett's** (Seekonk, MA/St. Raphael) three-pointer at the buzzer lifted Bryant College past Merrimack College, 81-80, in a Northeast-10 Conference game tonight.

This is Bryant's second straight last-second win and third consecutive victory after dropping its opener. The Bulldogs defeated AIC, 78-77, in overtime Sunday.

Bryant improves to 3-1 overall, 3-1 in the conference. Merrimack drops to 4-2, 1-2 in the NE-10.

Merrimack held its biggest lead of the game, 72-61, with 5:25 left when a Fred Wande three-pointer sparked a 9-2 run. Bennett scored six points in the spurt, including a three-point play with 2:39 left to cut the lead to 74-72. A jumper by freshman guard Shawn Brown extended the lead to four with 2:06 left, but a pair of Wande free throws got Bryant within two with 1:52 to play. Another Brown basket put the Warriors up, 78-74 at 1:43, but a trey by freshman guard Chris Rose made the score 78-77. After Brown tossed in his third straight bucket with :58 left to give Merrimack a 80-77 edge, Bryant junior forward Keith Miller converted on only one of two free throws, but Bryant controlled the rebound only to turn the ball over with :16 to play. With :10 left, senior guard Kirk Stockwood missed the front end of a one and one, and Bennett grabbed the rebound. Bryant freshman point guard Aaron Bowles broke the Merrimack pressure and drove the lane, then kicked the ball out to Bennett for the game-winning three-pointer.

Miller had 20 points and 15 rebounds for the Bulldogs. Junior forward Jim Burton chipped in with 15 points and 10 boards, and Bennett added 17 points.

## New Haven defeats Bryant in Four Sets at NCAAs

The Bryant Women's Volleyball team ended its season with a heart-felt loss to New Haven in the first round of the NCAA tournament the Friday before Thanksgiving. This was the first time Bryant played in the tournament since the 1994 season when they lost to New Haven in the second round. With numerous Bulldog fans in the crowd cheering their support, the ladies began the first set a little sluggishly, likely because of nerves, awe, and tournament inexperience. However, after being down 4-11, they rallied back but came up just short and lost the first game 12-15.

In the second game, the bulldogs focused on communication and defense against the big and strong front line of New Haven. With a team effort, they won the second game 16-14, but dropped the third and fourth games 11-15 and 10-15. Bryant seemed frustrated in the fourth game, but still pulled back after being down 3-10. The experienced, well-rounded, and hard hitting New Haven team eventually closed in and took control.

Marcie Monaco played an excellent game, registering 36 digs and 15 kills, which led her to make the NCAA Division II Women's Volleyball Northeast Region All-Tournament Team. Jennifer Carvalho also played well for Bryant with 42 assists, 18 digs, and 8 kills. Other influential forces included Monica Carnevalini (12 kills, 23 digs), Olga Perez Bonnelly (12 kills, 14 digs), and Janet Rooney (11 kills, 3 blocks). Overall the match was well-played and demonstrated the achievements of this Bryant team and its coaching staff, Theresa and Ted Garlacy.

The seniors playing in their final match at Bryant were captains Carvalho and Wendy Jackson, Rooney, and Bonnelly. Bryant concluded their season with a 28-13 record, while New Haven improved their tally to 41-6 with a four-set defeat over Pace. New Haven moves on to the Elite 8 for the fifth consecutive year and will play December 5-7.

### Bryant College Decoration Regulations

As we enter the holiday season, please keep in mind the necessity for safety when placing holiday decorations in residence halls and townhouses.

The following guidelines have been established to help provide continued safety for ALL campus residents:

1. Natural trees wreaths are NOT permitted in the halls or townhouses. Artificial trees are allowed. Violation of this rule will result in a \$50.00 fine to each person living in area where violation occurs.
2. UL approved lights may be used in moderation on your tree and in your windows. DO NOT place lights on doors, ceilings or near flammable objects.
3. Candles or open flames are NOT allowed in the residence halls or townhouses at any time of the year.
4. Please refrain from placing excess paper or wrapping paper in rooms.
5. Hallway decorations, door decorations, decorations in lounges or any common area are strictly prohibited.
6. Remember, extension cords are not allowed. You may use power strips with circuit breakers.
7. Be sure that room and suite exits are NOT BLOCKED.
8. Finally, if you use spray snow on your windows, please remove it prior to leaving for the semester break.

Careful attention to these guidelines will help ensure a safe holiday period in the halls and townhouses. If you have any questions, please direct them to your RA, the Office of Residence Life, or the Fire and Safety Coordinator in the Department of Public Safety.

## Woonsocket's Museum of Work and Culture really hits the mark!

"Really impressed" and "long overdue" are a few of the comments I would make about the recently opened Museum of Work and Culture in Woonsocket.

They sensitively focus on the Canadian French millworkers far and away the major component in Woonsocket's once booming textile industry, and follow them on their long journey from simple farms in 19th century Quebec to the rapidly expanding mills of the Blackstone Valley. It chronicles their evolution from an agrarian people to an industrial one, where they produced their own unique culture. (Happily some remnants of this still exist today!) "La Survivance" is explained as a conscious effort to protect their French heritage in a new and often hostile environment, a task at which they succeeded for almost 100 years. As surely as the mill work changed the newcomers, they changed it and the environment around them.

The first exhibit is of a simple 1800's Quebec farmhouse. From there, you visit a replica of Most Precious Blood Church, complete with pews where you can sit and watch a movie of Woonsocket. You can then head out onto the shop floor and try to operate a loom at its dizzying pace.

The second floor contains a Woonsocket three decker house where the supposed residents

spiel to you when you press their door buzzers. The corporate boardroom has telephones which you can pick up and listen to how the mill owners felt about their workers and their efforts to unionize. Actual newspapers from the day adorn the tables talking about roundups of "radicals," and "agitators."

In a parodial school classroom, a statue of priest lectures you about straying from the fold. In the late 1920's, the Manville Jencke's Mill closed—a disaster for the local area.) Other mills demanded that workers work 10 extra hours a week, operate more machines, and do it for less salary! Rebellion resulted. The church exhorted the faithful to comply and wait for their reward "in the next world." Many workers were gravitating to the organizing drives of the ITU (International Textile Union), and a schism developed in the formerly closed French Canadian community. Many began to see themselves not only as French, but as members of a emerging multi-ethnic American working class—much to the priests' chagrin.

The "union hall" features a movie narrated by Anne Burlak ("The Red Flame") and Larry Spitz, who along with Belgian born Joseph Schmetz were charismatic leaders of the ITU. Anne and Larry are still an inspiration in their old age, although the clergy claimed they were "straight from hell."

During the early 1930's, the Great Depression caused conditions to deteriorate rapidly for workers in the mills. Most owners were not implementing reforms mandated by President Roosevelt's National Labor Act. A general strike of all New England Mills occurred. Long simmering frustrations in Woonsocket (in Pawtucket and Central Falls as well) exploded into riots in September 1934. Machine guns were mounted on mill rooves in three locations to fire on striking workers. People were shot and killed.

I feel there are many parallels to this today. Management's perpetual excuse of "global competition" is used to justify "outsourcing," "downsizing," and other mass rounds of layoffs (topped by Kodak, among major employers in November who each announced tens of thousands of layoffs. In Kodak's case "bad business decisions" may have been the reason, but the worker will pay. So much for "The Recovery," at least as far as the hourly worker goes.). Without a strong tradition of collective bargaining, it's easy to see what future awaits the average worker, who, despite his best efforts, has no security and a declining living standard to boot.

Perhaps besides the history and culture so beautifully offered, this museum makes a simple point that fairness and ethics need to be priorities of business just as surely as profit.

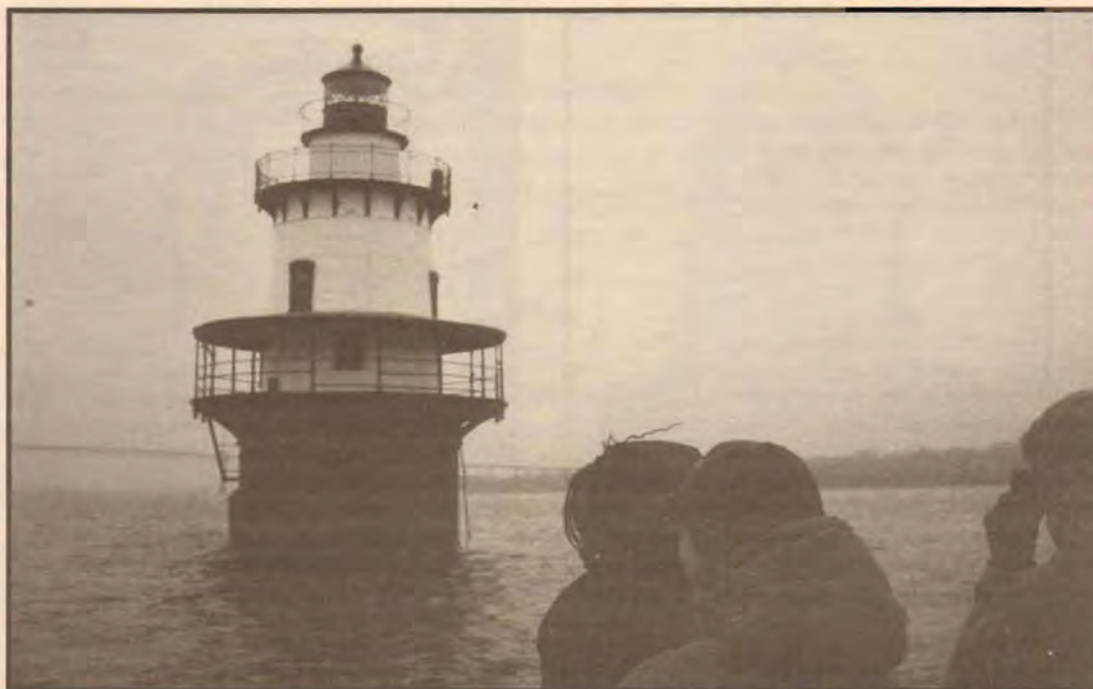
## BOAC Lighthouse Trip

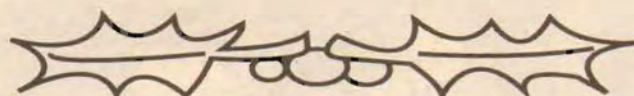

Their purpose was to see some of Rhode Island's many lighthouses from the perspective they were meant to be seen: the water. Students Leslie Lawrence, Stephanie Sedivy, and Shannon Naujock, along with Professors Larry and Dana Lowe and myself, spent over two hours aboard the charter boat, *Seaward*. Departing from Warwick, they first visited Warwick Neck Light. While just offshore the skipper, Captain Rick Cataldi, explained how the light and its accompanying fog-horn work to keep mariners off the rocks. When some BOAC members expressed concern about the depth of the water

under the boat, Capt. Rick allayed their fears by pointing out the boat's electronic depth finder.

The next two lighthouses were single towers standing in the middle of the water. Conimicut Light marks a shoal beside the shipping channel. Hog Island Light is no longer active but once marked the entrance to Mt. Hope Bay between Bristol and Portsmouth. At Hog Island Light, Capt. Rick mentioned that the lighthouse keeper and his wife used to live year-round in the tiny interior, an existence that may sound romantic at first, but most people today would soon find these circumstances to be rather bleak. Now all lighthouses in Rhode Island are automated. The trip finished with a look at Sandy Point Light on Prudence Island, a summer resort with seventy year-round residents who rely on a ferry to get to and from the island.

#### French Mixed Baby Greens with Creamy Dressing

*Mesclun avec Vinaigrette à la Crème*

6 cups mixed baby greens or desired salad greens, torn into bite-size pieces	2 tablespoons low-sodium chicken broth
2 tablespoons white wine vinegar or tarragon vinegar	1 tablespoon minced fresh herbs (such as basil, dill, chives, or marjoram)
2 tablespoons olive oil (extra-virgin preferred)	1 tablespoon nonfat or low-fat sour cream

Place baby greens in a salad bowl. Cover with plastic wrap and chill until serving time.

For the dressing, combine remaining ingredients, except sour cream, in a jar with a tight-fitting lid. Cover and shake until well combined. Add sour cream. Cover and shake well. Dressing can be chilled, covered, until serving time or used right away.

Before serving, drizzle dressing over greens. Toss gently until well coated. Serve immediately.

¼ cup cider vinegar	8 peach halves, canned in natural juices, no sugar added
¼ cup sugar	
1 stick cinnamon	
1 teaspoon whole cloves	

Drain juice from peaches, reserving fruit and 1 cup of juice. In a saucepan, combine vinegar, sugar, cinnamon, cloves and 1 cup juice reserved from peaches.

Place pan over medium-high heat and bring to a boil. Boil until liquid is reduced by about half. Remove spices from mixture, reserving cloves. Set liquid aside.

Stick cloves into peach halves and pour prepared liquid over peaches. Cover and refrigerate overnight.

Serve with low-fat baked ham or as part of a fruit salad.

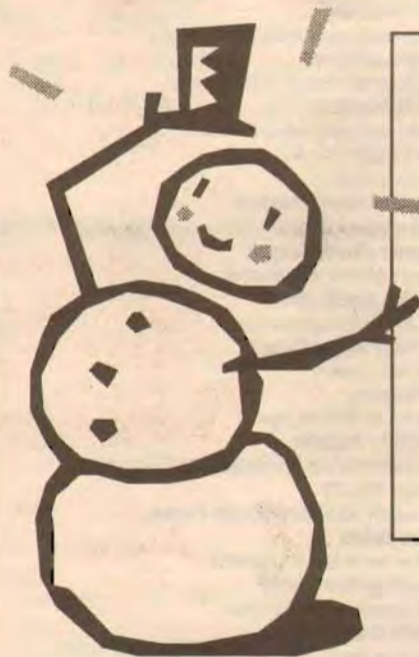

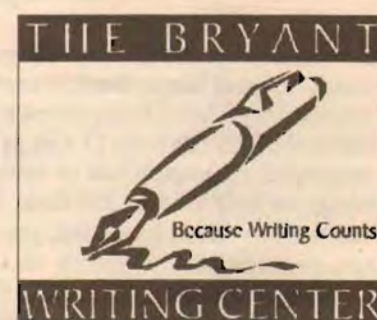

## VOLLEYBALL:

### CARVALHO NAMED TO AVCA ALL-NORTHEAST REGION SQUAD

Bryant College senior setter **Jennifer Carvalho** (East Providence, RI/East Providence) has been named to the American Volleyball Coaches Association Division II All-Northeast Region team.

She is the first Bulldog to make the team since Meribah Dean was honored in 1995.

Carvalho had a spectacular senior season. The two-time Northeast-10 All-Conference choice (1996, 1997) rewrote the NE-10 record book this fall, breaking records for career as-

sists (4,728), assists in a season (1,545) and in a match (86). She led the Northeast-10 in assists for the third time on four seasons (10.7).

Carvalho led Bryant (28-13) to the NCAA Division II Volleyball Tournament for the second time in four years. The Bulldogs dropped a 3-1 decision to Northeast region champion New Haven in the regional semi-final.

Bryant was the only non-scholarship school in the 32-team field.

## DIVISION II MEN'S BASKETBALL:

### BRYANT STUNS 13TH-RANKED ST. MICHAEL'S, 81-68

Sophomore guard Jason Bennett poured in a career-high 31 points, including a school-record tying seven three-pointers, as Bryant College upset 13th-ranked St. Michael's College, 81-68, in a Northeast-10 Conference game tonight.

Six of Bennett's record-tying treys came in the second half as Bryant shot a perfect 10-10 from long distance in that half.

Bryant has defeated St. Michael's five of the last six.

The game did not start off well for the home team. The Purple Knights jumped out to an 11-4 lead capped by a three-point play by senior center Jay Wandtke. Bennett's first points got Bryant within one at 11-10 at 14:55. The teams traded baskets until sophomore forward Earl Jones gave Bryant its first lead at 18-16 at 6:34. A 6-0 run gave the Knights a 31-25 advantage with 2:10 remaining, but a Jim Burton three-point play with :19 left closed the gap to three (31-28).

The Knights extended their lead to 39-32 on a three-point play by senior Geoff Card, but Bennett's first trey of the second half cut the lead to four and sparked an 12-4 run that put Bryant in front, 44-43. Bennett's second trey of the half tied the game at 50-50 with 12:00 left. Bryant took the lead for good at 53-50 on Burton's three-pointer with 11:19 left. The Bulldogs pushed the advantage to five at 57-52, then used three Bennett treys and a pair of Burton three-pointers to increase the lead to 71-60 with 4:56 left. While the Bulldogs were connecting on threes, the Knights managed just one field goal in a crucial 7:23 stretch late in the second half.

**How and when did you first get interested in karate?**

Lynn: When I was thirteen, I joined because my brother did. It seemed like fun.

**When do you practice and compete during the week and year?**

Lynn: We practice three times a week. Tournaments are generally all year around, and participation is optional.

Kristin: He teaches all of the classes, along with some other Bryant graduates who earned black belts from Sifu.

Kristin: Definitely, you really learn a valuable skill.

Lynn: Everyone should learn a type of self-defense.

Kristin: You meet a lot of interesting people and have a sense of accomplishment when you earn the next belt.

The Lady Bulldogs will be very young this year after graduating 85 percent of their offense from last season's team. Despite the losses of Mary Beth Feeney and Kristen Regan, the women return some quality players and add a few with needed height. The lone senior, Rebecca Hardt, is a quick (50 career steals) and athletic forward who is coming off an injury-prone junior year. She and returning starter Jennifer MacDonald, a sophomore, will be experienced keys to the Bulldog offense in the paint and outside. MacDonald broke two of Bryant's records last year, one for the most single-game three-pointers and the other for the most three-pointers in a season by a freshman. MacDonald is a versatile player who can handle the ball, shoot well from the perimeter, and rebound well. Also, in the front court will be sophomore Suzanne Herzog and three freshmen, Stephanie Tobey, Ali Curry, and Kristine Kironyo, all of which are six feet taller or more. Herzog had a productive off-season, and Tobey shows much promise in the center position. There should be a definite turnaround from last year when the ladies team finished last in the league in rebounds.

As for the backcourt, Bryant's team is composed of all freshmen and sophomores. Karla Bowen, a sophomore who played point guard last season when Feeney was on the sidelines with injuries, will be competing with freshman Katie Mahoney for the starting point position. Heather Chase will be starting as the second guard, and Kelly Charette will be expected to provide a boost from the bench. Although the backcourt is young and relatively inexperienced, its flexibility and athletic mix will hopefully become strengths for the team.

The Northeast-10 conference should be very strong once again, with Bentley ranked second in the nation according to some preseason publications. Other strong competitors should be 1997 Northeast Regional finalist Stonehill; St. Anselm, who made the NCAA Tournament last year; AIC; and Assumption. The Lady Bulldogs face a very difficult and competitive schedule in the powerful NE-10 conference, especially since they play six conference games before Christmas. Some tough non-conference teams on the schedule include 20th-ranked UMass-Lowell and 12th-ranked Bowie (MD). Fortunately, five of Bryant's first six games are at home, so hopefully that can be used to the team's advantage as the young Lady Bulldog begin their season. Once some experience is gained and chemistry is developed, anything is possible for the Bryant women's team.

(AP)- The funny green goo of Robin Williams' "Flubber" topped the Thanksgivings holiday box office with \$36.4 million, bouncing ahead of "Alien Resurrection," according to industry estimates Sunday.

The latest sequel to "Alien" was the only other film to debut in wide release over the five-day weekend, grossing \$27.2 million, according to Exhibitor Relations Co Inc.

"Flubber", Disney's remake of its 1961 comedy "The Absent Minded Professor." Didn't come close to beating last year's record Thanksgiving opening of \$45.1 million for another Disney remake, the live action version of "101 Dalmatians." But the "101 Dalmatians" was the only wide-release premiere that weekend.

Phil Barlow, president of distribution for Disney's Buena Vista Pictures, called "Flubber" ticket sales "fantastic, terrific and all those other words I wished I had saved up."

"We were expecting a very big gross. I don't think anyone could logically expect this gross," he said. "It's fun to know the public likes to watch good old-fashioned fun."

A PG-13 comedy, the British import "Bean" was No. 9 but had the lowest audience drop-off of any top 10 film. Its take of \$4.1 million was off just 4 percent from a week earlier.

Family-oriented movies often do better during the holiday weekends, said industry analyst David Davis, a vice president at the investment banking firm Houlihan, Lokey,

Howard & Zukin.

Davis noted that Fox's animated musical "Anastasia" also performed well in its second week against Disney's re-release of "The Little Mermaid." "Anastasia" fell from No. 2 to No. 3 in its second week with \$16.7 million. "The Little Mermaid" was No. 8 with \$4.7 million in ticket sales.

"It puts Fox on the map and establishes them as the leading competitor to Disney," Davis said.

Moviegoers should prepare for a busy holiday movie season, with a slew of releases every weekend between now and the end of the year.

"It's going to be brutal," Davis said of the studios' competition to get an audience. "If you're not in that elite pack, if you don't finish one, two, you're going to get lost."

## Business Briefing

NEW YORK - The manufacturing sector's growth rate slowed during November as the nation's factories received fewer orders and production dipped slightly. The National Association of Purchasing Management says its monthly index of business activity fell to 54.4% from 56.0% in October. In a separate report, the Commerce Department says construction spending edged up 0.1% in October, the fourth consecutive month without a decline, reflecting gains in housing and government projects.

WorldCom bought MCI Communications Corp. for \$37 billion last month. The new company, MCI WorldCom, will be a telecommunications behemoth selling full range of services, from local to long distance to Internet service to more than 22 million customers worldwide. The deal would eclipse the largest U.S. merger so far, a \$25.6 billion marriage between Bell Atlantic Corp. and Nynex Corp., which was completed in August.

America Online, Inc. reported a \$19.2 million quarterly (ended Sept. 30) profit amid a surge of new subscribers. The nation's largest online service provider said its profit came to about 16 cents a share. Revenues jumped nearly 50% to a record \$521.6 million from \$350.0 million.

CLEVELAND, Ohio - National City Corp. says it will acquire First of America Bank Corp. in a stock deal worth \$6.6 billion. The deal will create the 13th largest banking company in the United States. National City, based in Cleveland, Ohio, is a bank holding company with \$53 billion in assets. First of America is based in Kalamazoo, Mich., and has \$22 billion in assets. Together, National City and First of America will serve more than eight million households in six states.

United Parcel Service (UPS) reported a quarterly loss of \$10 million for July-September. UPS blames net loss on the 15 day Teamsters strike in early August. The strike, which ended with a new five-year contract for the company's 185,000 Teamsters, was the first nationwide strike in the company's 90-year history.

Workplace productivity- the keys to Americans' living standards- shot up 4.5% at an annual rate during the July-September quarter. The surge was the fastest increase in more than five years. Productivity is considered to be the key to Americans' standard of living since greater efficiency means businesses can increase wages without raising prices as workers produce more with the same amount of work.

Consumer confidence fell sharply in October, reinforcing hopes that the Federal Reserve would not have to raise interest rates to brake the economy. The consumer confidence report is based on a survey of 5,000 U.S. households. Of that number, only 33% rated current business conditions as good, down from nearly 40% in September.

Microsoft has narrowed the gap between rival Netscape Communications. In a recent report by Dataquest, Netscape had a 57.6% of the Web browser business in the third quarter down from 73% in the fourth quarter of 1996. Microsoft meanwhile has doubled their market share to 39.4% in the last nine months.

NEW YORK - Ford Motor Co. is planning to name William Clay Ford Jr. as chairman, making him the first Ford family member to head the company since 1980. The 40-year-old Ford, head of the company's finance committee, will succeed Alex Trotman when he retires at the end of 1999, Time magazine reports in its Dec. 8 issue. The last family member to run the company was Henry Ford II, who was chairman from 1945-1980.

TOKYO - Japan's sales of new cars, trucks, and buses fell by 23.5% in November, the biggest decline in more than 23 years, a dealers' association said Monday. Total vehicle sales in November were 388,247, said the Japan Automobile Dealers Association. Sales of passenger cars declined 21.8% from November last year to 277,881, it said. It was the biggest decline since a 27.1% drop in August 1974 when oil prices were rising sharply.

## Nagano promises high-tech Olympics

NAGANO, Japan - Some athletes won't be able to pick up their equipment unless a machine recognizes the iris patterns in their eyes.

A fingerprint check will be needed to enter the labs that test for doping.

"This is going to be the high-tech Olympics," Makoto Kobayashi, director general of Nagano's 1998 Olympic organizing committee, said Thursday. "We'd like to show Japan's technology to the rest of the world."

The latest technology is intended to do everything from helping to control traffic and forecast weather to improving the sights and sounds relayed to television viewers.

On the security side, the iris checks will be for competitors taking their guns out of the storage room for the biathlon, a sport that combines target shooting with cross-country skiing.

To take athletes and coaches to

the skiing and skating sites, 41 buses with new gasoline-electric hybrid engines will be used to keep down pollution. Three electric cars and 60 natural gas vehicles are also in the fleet.

To relay traffic information and adjust traffic signals, infrared sensors will be installed above roads.

For the skiers, newly developed radar is intended to provide swifter and more accurate weather information.

Technology is supposed to be among distinctive Japanese touches to the games.

Others show off Japan's ancient culture: medals with designs in lacquer set in the center, sumo wrestlers performing traditional rites at the opening ceremony, and runners carrying torches made of pine strips.

To help spectators see it all more clearly, organizers are setting up a theater for three-dimensional high-definition television broadcasts.

Viewers will have to wear special

goggles.

High-definition television, seen as the next major leap in broadcasting, has a much sharper picture and wider screen than conventional TV.

Japan already has been broadcasting nearly 10 hours of high-definition TV programs a day in an experiment begun in 1991, although its current system doesn't match standards being adopted for future use in other nations.

For the sounds of the games, microphones in the ice will pick up skaters' slashing blades.

## Clinton Signs Amtrak Rescue Bill

WASHINGTON - President Clinton signed into law Tuesday a rescue package that gives financially crippled Amtrak new leeway to manage itself more competitively.

"Amtrak will no longer be shackled," Transportation Secretary Rodney Slater said outside the White House. Where Congress once mandated route selections for the federally subsidized railway, he said, "Amtrak will be able now to make decisions based on the needs of its customers."

Clinton, noting that Amtrak is the only alternative to a car for many

rural residents, called the enactment an "opportunity to set Amtrak on a course to continue these services into the 21st century."

The legislation, passed last month by the House and Senate after weeks of intense wrangling, was propelled by the threat of a national Amtrak strike earlier this fall.

"Everyone, when faced with the possibility there would not be an Amtrak, realized there had to be one. And that's why we have this bill today and Amtrak has a future," said Rep. Bob Wise, D-W.Va.

The legislation provides \$3.4 billion for regular Amtrak operating and capital expenses through 2000

and dictates changes in Amtrak management practices, labor rules and legal liabilities designed to make the railway more competitive. After 2000, the railway will also be able to contract out more work than is now allowed.

As a bonus, Clinton's signature on the bill Tuesday released \$2.3 billion for capital investments such as new cars and track improvements.

Amtrak must renew its line of credit with banks this month. Without the backing of the rescue package, it was uncertain whether banks would extend the railway the money it needs to stave off bankruptcy.

## Microsoft's Impending Battle

What's the big deal? If the consumer is happy, why is the government sticking their noses in? The Justice Department is trying to stop Microsoft from being the most dominant company in the software market. The goal of the Justice Department is to stop Microsoft from forcing PC makers to bundle its Internet Explorer with every copy of the Windows operating system.

The problem of trying to apply anti-trust laws to software is that many computer users need a single standard for their operating systems. When an operating system has more applications, the more satisfaction the customer gets.

Part of the problem is that in 1995, an agreement was made that allowed Microsoft to develop "integrated products." So, the Justice

Department may have little power in fighting off Microsoft. Bill Gates says that if the Justice Department were to step in, it would be like the government deciding that in 1932 that cars shouldn't have radios because that would hurt the radio makers.

Even if Microsoft were to lose in court, the company could easily comply with the Justice Department's demands, giving the PC maker a choice. The choice would be to offer the PC maker an operating system with and without Internet Explorer for the same price.

PC makers would never choose the system without the Internet program because of the many of features available to Internet Explorer users. PC makers state that Microsoft does not force them to install their Internet Explorer program. According to Mal Ranson, Senior Vice President of Packard Bell NEC, Inc., "If our customers

say that they want to use Netscape Navigator, we will give it to them."

Another PC manufacturer states that customers would most likely demand the Windows operating system with Internet Explorer even if the products were not sold as a set.

Microsoft has expanded its operating system in the past years. The company began with MS-DOS OPERATING SYSTEM (MS-DOS), and as the system improved, back-up utilities and disk compression became standard features, unlike earlier versions where they were add-on features from other software companies.

Adding utilities as a part of the Windows operating system has made the Windows system that much more worthwhile to the customer. Continually adding in features to the operating system will make the product a better buy in the future.

## Credit Card Companies Raise Student Interest

(NSNS)- Credit Card companies that lure students into applying for credit cards with free T-shirts, mugs, and pens might soon become a rare sight on college campuses if some students and administrators have their way.

Opponents of the credit card companies claim that the aggressive marketing practices used by credit card companies unethically target college students with no money and no credit history. The result is thousands of students with severe debt problems.

A bad credit record can adversely affect a student's ability to finance a house, secure a car loan, or even get a job.

A recent survey, conducted by the National Credit Card Counseling Service, reveals that credit card ownership among college students has dramatically risen over the past five years. The survey reports that 64 percent of all students have

credit cards and twenty percent have four or more credit cards.

"We have noticed a huge increase in student credit card debt," says Alan Franklin, President of the American Credit Alliance, a credit card counseling service. "Giving a credit card to a student is like putting a steak in front of a mountain lion and expecting it not to touch it."

According to Franklin, students are attractive targets for credit card companies because the companies assume students will be able to repay their debt in the future when they get a job, or their parents will pay the debt if the students gets in trouble.

"Frankly, credit card companies issue cards to student irresponsibly," said B.J. Danielson, who has written several books on credit card debt and currently directs a credit card counseling service, Credit Master. "Students can receive a

credit card without the necessary income to support what they are spending. Students do not have to go through normal qualifying process credit card companies use for other applicants."

Angered by credit card companies' aggressive marketing tactics, several colleges have taken steps to ban credit cards from their campuses. For example, John Jay College in New York, prohibits any type of display tables set up by credit card companies to recruit students as well as banning any credit card inserts in textbooks sold at campus bookstores.

Credit card companies have since started to offer booklets on fiscal responsibility to student card holders, but this is a small consolation for the thousands of students already deeply indebted to credit card companies.

## Tips for Managing Your Money During College

Adriane Berg's offers advise about money management during the college years as a means of building wealth for later in life. Berg is a financial expert, author of 22 books, including best seller "Your Wealth Building Years, 18-38." Berg is also a columnist for the Microsoft Money Insider personal finance online service that offers up-to-date key financial topics, including college planning, home ownership and financial lifestyles.

Berg provides three tips for students to help them manage what little money they do have in col-

lege.

1. Set a monthly budget that includes tuition-related expenses (tuition, room and board, books) and nontuition-related expenses (travel, transportation, food, personal, entertainment). By considering all potential expenses, students can work with their parents to plan a realistic budget.

2. Skip fancy gourmet coffees; brew your own cup from your apartment or dorm. If you can save an average of \$1.74 each day, you should have \$500 available by the end of the school year that can be put in a mutual fund or be used for

spring break.

3. Many banks offer debit cards that students can use instead of credit cards to pay for expenses. Debit cards are limited by the amount of money held in the account of the bank that issued it, unlike credit cards that can be used continually, accumulating huge balances every month. This is a great way for parents and students to work together and get off on the right foot by not allowing students to spend more money than they have.

## Hot Stocks

This year in the US acquisitions worth \$ 700 billions have taken place. The reason is that companies are paying through stocks for acquisitions instead of paying cash. There are still blue chip companies with high price/earning ratios and they are using their stock as the takeover currency. Some of the examples are the \$13.3 billion bid for ITT by real estate investment trust by the name of Starwood Lodging and the more recent \$4.5 billion telecommunication giant WorldCom's \$ 30 billion bid for MCI. In both cases the acquirers propose to pay the stockholders of the target company with stock.

Buying a fast growing company is the easiest way to keep increasing the earnings at the pace Wall Street asks come to expect. Thus the companies that use their stocks to purchase companies with a low P/E ratio to boost their earnings immediately. Some analysts on Wall Street suggest that it is best to buy cheap stock in consolidating companies and then wait for the consolidators to come and buy the companies where the stocks have been bought. These analysts narrow down companies that promise long term growth so that even if these companies are not taken over the stockholders still do well.

### Stocks to consider

#### 1) Frontier Corp.

Frontier is the fifth largest telecommunications company in the US, a \$ 2.6 billion company trades at a P/E of just 17 compared with it's competitor WorldCom that trades at 34.4. By the end of 1998 Frontier is expected to complete the installation of it's \$450 million fibre-optic network that will help it to increase their net profit margin from 5% this year to 10% by the end of 1999. According to sources from Merrill Lynch the stock is expected to hit \$ 28 in the next 12 months for a 37% return.

#### 2) PHARMACIA & UPJOHN

Pharmacia & Upjohn, Inc. quoted at \$ 34 is a global pharmaceutical group engaged in the research, development, manufacture and sale of pharmaceutical and healthcare products. P&U derives most of it's business from overseas sales. The company is currently introducing new products in the markets. The company is currently introducing a number of new products with significant market potential, in particular Xalatan, Detrusitol and Edronax. Hassan reported that Xalatan, a novel therapy for glaucoma, is making a good contribution to the top line and that the company expects immediate top-line contributions from Edronax and Detrusitol. It is estimated that the drug sales could hit a record of \$ 700 million in the next 3 years. Advisors expect that stock price to hit \$ 48 in a year for a 57% return.

#### 3) COMPUSERVE CORP DEL

CompuServe, H&R Block and WorldCom entered into a merger agreement pursuant to which WorldCom will acquire CompuServe in a stock-for-stock transaction valued at approximately \$1.2 billion. H&R Block owns approximately 80 percent of

CompuServe. The closing of the transaction is still subject to obtaining certain foreign regulatory approvals, CompuServe shareholder approval, and customary closing conditions. H&R Block has agreed to vote all of its shares in favor of the

merger. The closing is expected to occur during the first quarter of calendar 1998.

During the past six months there has been growth in the price of the CompuServe stock and at present trades at \$ 13 3/8. Analysts suggest that it is expected to grow steadily in the future.

## Women in Today's Business

More women than ever before are turning to entrepreneurship as a way to take charge of their destinies. For a long time women's participation in our capitalist market was considered secondary to that of men. It wasn't that long ago that those women stayed at home with their children while their husbands went to work every day. In 1960 only 33% of women worked. Today nearly 45% of the workforce is women, and nearly 60% of all the new entrants into the job market are women. It may be surprising to find out the chances that you may find yourself working for a woman may be higher than you previously thought. According to the National Foundation for Women Business Owners, one quarter of all U.S. employees' work for a women-owned firm in 1995. This translates to 7.95 million women-owned firms employing 18.5 million workers. Also in a recent survey conducted by the consulting firm George S. May International, nearly half of 900 chief executive officers of small or mid-sized companies surveyed said it was either highly likely or somewhat likely that their next CEO would be a woman. This is even though women currently run only 5% of these companies. It can be said that women's potential to contribute to the process of economic growth had been largely ignored in the past. Obviously that old point of view no longer makes economic sense because women have the skills, ideas and motivation to contribute to our economic and cultural advancement.

In 1992 women owned 34.1 percent of all U.S. nonfarm businesses and women entrepreneurs raked in total revenue of about \$1.5 trillion with average annual revenues of about \$246,000. In a report by The National Foundation of Women Business Owners and Dun and Bradstreet it is stated that women own about 7.7 million U.S. businesses. They also state that this number has grown at an average annual rate of 8.4 percent since 1979, this is double the rate of male-owned businesses. They point out also that women-owned businesses are just as financially stable and creditworthy as other U.S. businesses. According to Women-owned Business Breaking Boundaries, Dun and Bradstreet, 1995, 92% of businesses owned by women pay their bills within 30 days, 59% are a low credit risk and 85.3% have a low risk of failure. While this is impressive, women entrepreneurs still face major challenges and obstacles in starting, running and growing their businesses. In an Avon Report survey of 450 women business owners from 1987 to 1989 women faced obstacles such as

- Low self-esteem and/or fear of risks: 40%
- Balancing work with time spent with family: 32%
- Lack of support: 28%
- Raising capital: 21%
- Difficulty establishing credit: 9%
- Lack of management experience: 6%

Some programs have been created to address these problems. The Clinton administration and the U.S. Small Business Administration have taken these problems very seriously and have been working together to address them. SBA officials have been working for months to develop a "virtual women's center" which would work in alliance with the 54 women's business centers nationwide. Women-owned businesses can access the virtual business center to receive help in preparing business plans, applying for government contracts, finding new sources of capital and eventually will be allowed women entrepreneurs to apply for government loans electronically. The service will be available at the 54 women's business centers in 28 states. SBA officials, through various corporate grants, are setting up 200 computers at these centers to develop the service. The idea is that the site, Office of Women's Business Ownership at [www.sbaonline.sba.gov/womeninbusiness/](http://www.sbaonline.sba.gov/womeninbusiness/), will hopefully be used by the millions of women entrepreneurs that need help to grow their businesses and grasp opportunities.

A place where women are seizing the opportunity to create new businesses is on the web. With the coming of the Internet, more and more women are choosing to work from their homes, enjoying such things as scheduling their own hours, the ability to be with their kids, and getting the satisfaction of knowing you are running your own business.

Debbie Kesling has been making teddy bears for thirteen years. Last year she ventured onto the Internet and established her web site at [www.cybearspace.com/](http://www.cybearspace.com/) where she offers her miniature teddy bears and her new book *How to Make Enchanting Teddy Bears* to the public. She quickly points out the advantages such as overcoming the hassle of doing over-sea business with the use of e-mail, and establishing closer ties to her customers, who then purchase more of her teddy bears. Along with the improved communication are problems such as customers expecting her to be on-line twenty-four hours a day, just like the Internet. If the Internet is a place where you could find a home for your business, Debbie's first bit of advice is to accept credit cards. It also helps to have enough money to keep enough inventory on hand and last of all just do what you enjoy doing and everything will follow.

Have you ever heard of a business arrangement where two business partners have never spoken or physically met? Margie Alexander and Robin Krauss met on the Internet and have never heard each other's voices but that has not seemed to bother them as they created Shift, a T-shirt design business where they sell their uncommon creations to the Internet.
