World News



BOSTON, MA.—Eighteen-year-old Scott Krueger, a freshman at MIT, died late Monday after spending three days in an alcohol-induced coma. He had been found unconscious in his room at Phi Gamma Delta, where he had celebrated his official linking with his fraternity "big brother" that night. Since the incident, MIT has forbidden the fraternity to serve alcohol and Phi Gamma Delta has also been charged with serving alcohol to minors, a charge that may force the frat to surrender its dormitory license to city of Boston. Police are still investigating the events that led to the freshman's death.

PEARL, Miss. - Students ran screaming from a parking lot as a student opened fire at a high school early Wednesday, killing at least two students, including a former girlfriend, and injuring six others. The boy's mother was later found dead, her throat slit. An 18-year-old junior, Luke Woodham, was arrested and charged with murder. "This was a disgruntled girlfriend-boyfriend thing," a police official said. "People were laying everywhere bleeding," said a student who witnessed the school attack.

CHICAGO - A class-action settlement reached by Hooters means men will soon join women as servers at the restaurants that feature women in skimpy attire. A report in Tuesday's Chicago Sun-Times says Hooters will pay \$3.75 million to settle a lawsuit by men who were denied employment - but the deal ensures that women will still comprise the majority of the work staff. Hooters originally defended its all-female staff, saying "female sexuality is a bona fide occupation." There is no word on what type of uniform male employees will wear.

NEW YORK - Wall Street is applauding WorldCom Inc.'s announcement that it wants to buy MCI Communications Corp. for \$29.4 billion. The bid tops a deal MCI was on the verge of closing with British Telecommunications PLC. If successful, the merger would be the largest in U.S. corporate history.

The two largest Web warriors aren't just making browsers. They're making a statement. Now that Apple has fallen, Netscape carries the standard against Microsoft. Which company's program you paste on your PC desktop says as much about your politics as it does your software preferences. This week the battle is renewed. Microsoft's Internet Explorer 4.0 officially hit town Tuesday, and Netscape's Communicator 4.0, the latest evolution of its Navigator Web browser, has been out since June.

Elton John's *Candle in the Wind 1997*, released last Tuesday, has already sold 2.8 million copies, making it the fastest selling single in the United States since SoundScan began such tracking in 1991. A&M Records has stopped taking orders because demand has "gone beyond our production capabilities," says John Rotella, vice president of sales and marketing. "We need to fulfill the existing orders, and that will take a few weeks. Beyond that, we're still undecided if we will continue production for any more singles." The biggest-selling single in a one-week period had been Whitney Houston's *I Will Always Love You*, which sold more than 600,000 copies during Christmas week of 1992.

The alphabet soup of labels for parents concerned about the content of TV programs gets thicker Wednesday. Nine months after broadcast and cable networks began labeling their shows with voluntary age-based ratings, a second round of labels is joining those TV-G, TV-PG, TV-14 and TV-MA designations: V (violence); S (sexual situations); L (coarse language); and D (suggestive dialogue). Five of the six broadcast networks have signed on for the new labels, with NBC the exception. Most cable networks are participating.

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Alumni Day hits campus

change in customers' wants and needs. Dustin encouraged the students he met with to do an internship because the "more experience you have the better you can become." Dustin has been very busy in the field of management; he will be moving to Hong Kong to become an Assistant Vice President for his company.

Other schools who like the idea of students learning from their predecessors have closely watched this program. This was a student initiative to get the program on the go and help them interact with what is going on in the world.

There are only a few programs like this in the country. Our campus is ahead and will continue to listen to the needs of its students.

In Response

Due to the amount of fan mail I have received from the editorial "The Wrong Image" in the September 18 issue of *The Archway*, I have decided to respond to these letters.

First and foremost, since an editorial is an opinion, it is unreasonable and illogical for anyone to consider suing for slander because of opinions. First of all, slander deals with verbal communication, and since this is a newspaper, you can only sue for libel—which deals with written communication. Just thought you might want to know what the correct terminology is if you are calling your lawyer. Secondly, the editorial did not mention any names or organizations that might be involved in any incidents, therefore your case has no legs to stand on.

Now, let's get to the real issue. In the editorial, I did mention that there are Greeks who do represent this campus well. For example, I know of many Greeks who are involved in the many different organizations at Bryant. Yes, we have Greeks who are RAs, Senators, Orientation Leaders, and so forth. Their leadership on campus is what makes Bryant the way it is today.

However, if you go back and read the editorial again, the message that should have gotten across was that I have a true disdain for those individuals in Greek organizations that destroy College property. Now the Greek organizations on this campus are saying that is not true, then let me point out the fact that damage bills for Hall 1 and 2 (primarily Greek) are the highest on campus. Cannot argue with those numbers—can you?

I also questioned the leadership of these organizations for several reasons. How can Greek organizations continue to allow individuals in the Greek community to destroy school property the way it has been in the past. Second, the Greek columns are self-convicting and troublesome. For example, in last week's issue, a fraternity decided to ridicule its RA for doing his/her job in their weekly column. Mature or immature, you tell me. As leaders of these organizations, certainly you have some control over what is written in your columns. Hence, if you want to portray a positive image, that would be a good place to start.

Also, when statistics, such as 83% of Presidents and CEO's were Greek are tossed out there in defense of Greek organizations, I have only one response: How many are from Bryant College? You cannot use national figures from the past fifty or sixty years of college life to defend yourselves. The figure that Greek organizations should be concerned with is the number of CEO's from Bryant. Is it important to Bryant College that a University of Michigan Greek is CEO of some company?

Another interesting defense was the amount of community service that Greeks do. I will acknowledge that your efforts there are good. However, to say that you invested over 4000 man-hours is a relatively deceiving figure. Take into account that there are over 300 Greek members, that works out to about 13.33 hours per person—which is about the nation's average.

Finally, let it be said here and now, I do not have a negative perspective on all Greek organizations. There are good fraternities and sororities at Bryant. However, there is always room for improvement. Just remember, if you want Greeks to be looked upon as leaders of the campus then be careful of what you write in your weekly columns. It's like a political game, a single bad incident can ruin all the good that you have done. Remember that when you talk about your image.

Vehicle Boot

I tried to be a cool dude!

Welcome back to Bryant! I am feeling the vibrating energy of the returning students and the new freshmen as the campus literally comes back to life.

I am reminded of my first year as a freshman at Beloit College in Wisconsin. One of the my main anxieties during my freshman year was that someone would find out my real age. My birthday is in September and I turned seventeen during my first week of college. Being a year or two younger than everyone else made me feel uncomfortable. My second major anxiety was that someone would see me with my ultra thick glasses and realize that I was quite near sighted. I was convinced that both of these conditions combined would ruin my social life completely. So I grew long hair and a beard and wore contact lenses 16-18 hours a day. I also carefully observed what the other "cool" students did and tried to hang out with them.

I noticed that many of the "cool" people got drunk often and virtually chain smoked during parties. This



was hard for me to emulate as I did not like either smoking or drinking. My "cool" friends often told tall tales "the day after". Typically, these stories went like this: "And then I got so drunk man that I didn't know what I was saying or doing. By end of the night I was puking all over the place. They had to carry me back to my dorm. And since this morning I have had the worst hangover and I can't remember a thing! My head really hurts. Boy was last night fun or what?!" This kind of talk always went completely over my head. I blamed myself for not being cool enough to understand.

One day I asked one of my "cool" friends, while he was sober, to tell me really why drinking at parties leads to having more fun. My cool friend explained it very clearly, "Well it kind of loosens you up. It's easy to talk to people. You can say things to people when you are drunk and they don't hold it against you. And it's great for getting to know girls." After that lucid explanation, I tried drinking a bit.

The problem was that drinking did not agree with my constitution. It made me nauseous and I did not like the feeling of being tipsy. So I hit upon a clever solution. I started drinking 7-UP at parties but gave the impression to everyone that it was Gin and Tonic. I occasionally acted silly and brash to reinforce the notion that I was feeling "quite good". I never had a hangover and thought I had the best of both worlds.

Finally, in the desire to fall in with the "ultra cool" group, I started smoking cigarettes while I drank my 7-UP. However, being conscious of health issues at an early age, I could never bring myself to inhale the smoke into my lungs. Instead, I would take the smoke in my mouth and blow it out of the side

in as cool a way as is possible. Sometimes I also tried to make smoke rings come out of my mouth by twisting my lips in a strange manner. I never became good at it.

After about a year of heavy 7-UP drinking combined with pretend smoking I could no longer live a lie and slowly gave up both. I have not engaged in pretend smoking for over two decades and I almost never drink. In retrospect, I can understand why I did what I did as a freshman. My need to be accepted by my peers was so strong that it made me act out of character.

Although I was immature in some ways at 17, I was lucky because I never became a smoker or a drinker. Many young people, once they become addicted to nicotine, find it very difficult to give up. This habit is easy to cultivate but very difficult to break. Alcohol, of course, can play havoc with your body and mind both. It is the cause of much destruction in the lives of people. The grief suffered by parents whose children are harmed due to alcohol related incidents is indescribable.

I hope you will be careful with yourself this year at Bryant. When we are young we do many things to impress our peers and to be accepted. Many people try smoking, alcohol and other drugs when they come to college and are away from home for the first time. These things have the potential to ruin your life. I have come to the conclusion that although life offers no guarantees to anyone, still, over the long run, people who avoid alcohol, drugs and cigarettes have much more fun and tend to lead healthier lives.

If you have none of these habits, find others like yourself and keep their company for support. If you have one or more of these habits, then the best time to give them up is when you are young. When we are young we have the strength and the will power and can easily make very positive changes in our lives which go with us until the end. As we get older and the habits become more ingrained, it becomes more difficult (but certainly not impossible) to kick the addictions. For those who feel they cannot give up their addiction or do not want to, my advice would be to be moderate and manage your behavior in such a way so that it is not destructive to yourself or others.

The Value of Business Periodical Special Issues

Business periodical special issues contain valuable information frequently drawn upon by business reference librarians, but generally unknown to most students. Trip Wyckoff, a reference librarian at the Houston Public Library, has succeeded in making special issues more accessible to both librarians and patrons with his new book, *The Directory of Business Periodical Special Issues* (REF HF5351 .D574x). To clarify what Wyckoff and other librarians mean by the term, a "special issue" is "any regularly published special editorial content in a periodical." The content of special issues might include such information as salary surveys, ranking lists, and/or statistical supplements. Wyckoff's book is arranged by journal title and includes the address and phone number of each journal publisher, where the particular journal is indexed, and the date, name/content of the particular special issue. It is especially helpful that the author considers journal indexes as special issues and also that he includes an excellent subject index to draw upon.

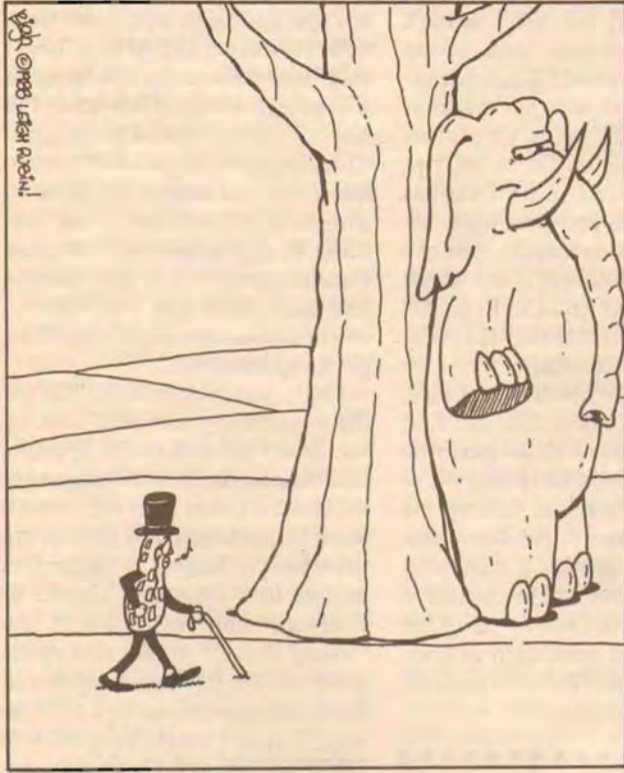

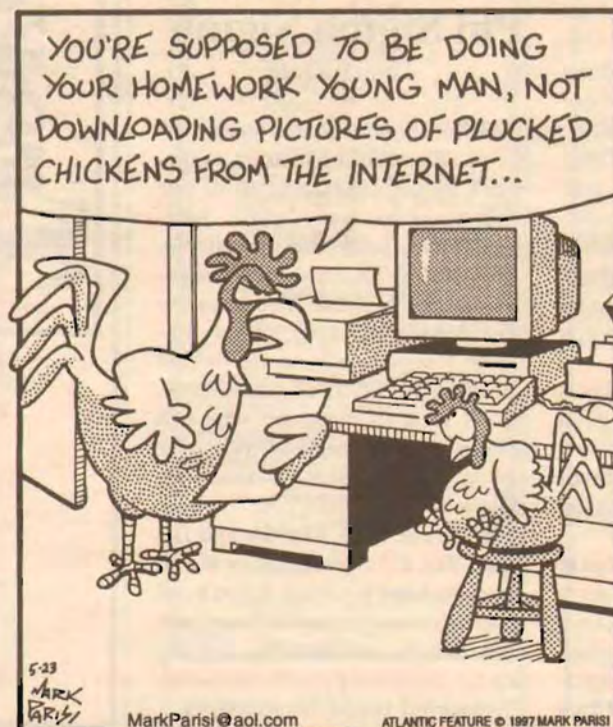

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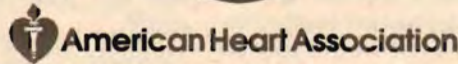

Blueberry Banana Muffins

Preheat oven to 400° F. Lightly spray muffin tin with vegetable oil. In a bowl, combine flours, sugar, wheat germ, baking powder, salt and spices. Stir until well mixed. Set aside. In another bowl, mash banana. Add margarine, egg substitute, and orange juice to it. Whisk until well blended. Stir banana mixture into dry ingredients, mixing just until moistened. (Mixture may be lumpy.) With rubber spatula, carefully fold blueberries into batter. Pour batter evenly into 12 muffin cups. Bake 15 minutes. Serves 12; 1 muffin per serving.

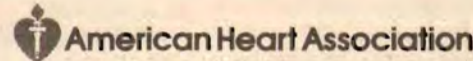

Preheat oven to 375° F. In a medium bowl, stir together oats, flour, brown sugar and cinnamon. Cut in margarine until mixture is crumbly. Place drained apples in an 8-inch-square baking pan or glass baking dish. Sprinkle with oat mixture. Bake, uncovered, 30 minutes or until topping is light brown. Serve warm. Serves 9; 1/2 cup per serving. Preparation time: 5 minutes. Cooking time: 30 minutes.

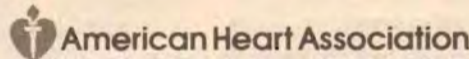

| 1 cup chopped green bell pepper | 2 bay leaves |
| 2 cups chopped celery | 16 ounces spaghetti |
| 1 28-ounce can Italian plum tomatoes | 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese |
| 1 6-ounce can no-salt-added tomato paste | |

Sauté ground meat in a stockpot over medium-high heat, stirring frequently, until no longer pink. Add onions and continue to sauté. When onions are slightly brown, add bell pepper and celery. Cook slightly. Add all other ingredients except spaghetti and Parmesan cheese. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 2 hours.

Allow to cool, then cover and place in refrigerator overnight. Skim off the fat that hardens on the surface.

Cook spaghetti according to package directions, omitting salt. Meanwhile, heat sauce, stirring occasionally. Drain spaghetti and serve individual portions with sauce on top. Sprinkle each serving of spaghetti with Parmesan cheese. Makes 8 servings.

'97-'98 NHL Preview

This should be an interesting year for the NHL. Not only will the league be experimenting with a new all-star game format; there will also be a break in February for the Winter Olympics. It also will be a season without Mario Lemieux. The race for the Stanley Cup will have no clear favorite too. This should be fun.

The new all-star game format will feature players from North America against players from Europe and beyond. New ballots have already been made to accompany the changes. It should be interesting to see players who are teammates in the regular season go against each other in the all-star game.

These teammates may also be going against each other in the Winter Olympics as well. The NHL will be taking a two week break in February that will allow its players to compete for their country. The five teams that represent the best chances of winning the Stanley Cup seemed to have rested on their accomplishments. Colorado stood still in the off season except for the big paycheck to Joe Sakic. New Jersey was quiet as well.

The rest of league couldn't make any big moves to rise to the upper crust of the league though. Vancouver made the biggest move by signing Mar Messier, but questions are already looming about his abilities. Anaheim still needs to worry about signing Paul Kariya. Edmonton made a great run in the playoffs, but didn't go out and get the veteran leadership they needed. Bret Hull may be leaving St. Louis and play in his father's footsteps in Chicago.

Even with all the changes that may be going on, nothing really matters in the NHL regular season. What matters in what happens in the playoffs. If a team can get hot then there is no telling where they can go. Injuries and suspensions also can affect the play of any team. But on with it, people want to know what to expect from this league in 1997-98.

Atlantic

The Philadelphia Flyers will try to roll over opponents this year, especially since they still do not have a legitimate No. 1 goalie. Eric Lindros and John LeClair should provide the offense. Chris Gratton and Luke Richardson will provide the help along the lines. But the lack of a strong goalie will hurt the Flyers. Contract talks for Lindros and Leclair could also provide a distraction. That may open the door for the defensive minded New Jersey Devils. The Devils still have the best goalie in the conference with Martin Brodeur. But add Doug Gilmour to the mix and the Devils could go far this year.

If either of these two teams has a set back then all eyes will be focused on the New York Rangers and Florida Panthers to make a run. The Rangers lost Messier to free agency, but they did pick up Pat LaFontaine on Monday night from the Buffalo Sabres. If LaFontaine can return to form the Rangers will be able to pick up the leadership and scoring that the absence of Messier showed. Also with the addition of Mike Keane and Kevin Stevens the Rangers will be a force on special teams. The Panthers however, went out and picked up Esa Tikkanen and Dave Gagner. The two will provide a scoring punch while goalie John Vanbiesbrouck should continue to play well behind a young aggressive defense.

The Tampa Bay Lightning, Washington Capitals, and New Islanders will probably be fighting for the leftovers from the table. All three did very little to improve over the summer and will be struggling to make the playoffs. The Capitals stand out the best because they do have

Adam Oates and Peter Bondra in their corner. And new coach Ron Wilson will try to add life back into their skates. The Islanders have the next best chance if Travis Green comes back from a holdout to help the emerging Ziggy Palffy.

Northeast

This could be the worst division in the entire league. There is only one team that has a shot at making a serious impact and even they aren't really that good. The Buffalo Sabres will be the team to watch this season. If Dominik Hasek has another strong season and can bury some of his mental problems the Sabres should be on the top. But the Sabres are lacking depth and talent especially since they traded LaFontaine on Monday.

The rest of the conference is mixed up. The Pittsburgh Penguins have to deal with life without Super Mario. Will Jaromir Jagr continue to play well? If so then the Penguins will make a run at the playoffs. The Ottawa Senators will be waiting in the wings if Buffalo and Pittsburgh can't live up to expectations. The Senators have young talent everywhere thanks to having so many No. 1 picks in the early nineties that got confidence with last season's playoff run.

The once proud Montreal Canadiens should have a strong offense behind Vincent Damphousse and Mark Recchi, but the problem is this team doesn't have a defense that could stop junior hockey players. Goaltender Jocelyn Thibault can be good but if he faces too many bad situations he will be hard pressed to stop the puck. Hartford moved south to become the Carolina Hurricanes. The team also became more aggressive in acquiring talent. The addition of goalie Trevor Kidd was a positive move. And with another top goalie in Sean Burke as a backup, the 'Canes now have leverage to acquire more talent. The Boston Bruins got the No. 1 pick and took Joe Thornton. But that won't help them for a while. With Thornton on the shelf for the first two months, the focus

will again be on Ray Bourque to help the Bruins return to the playoffs.

Central

All the focus will be on two teams in the conference. Can the Detroit Red Wings defend the Stanley Cup without Mike Vernon, Sergei Fedorov, and Vladimir Konstantinov. If they can then the coaching of Scotty Bowman may be the best in the history. This season every team will test the Wings and that includes last year's division champs the Dallas Stars. The Stars have added Ed Belfour between the pipes to backup an already strong defense. The addition of Shawn Chambers should help solidify the defense even more. But the Stars need center Mike Modano back to be strong offensively. The embarrassing early playoff exit will add fuel to the Stars fire.

The Phoenix Coyotes could be a force if center Jeremy Roenick can return to form. Add Keith Tkachuk to the picture and the desert could be a tough time for teams. The rest of the three will be playing for respect. The St. Louis Blues and the Chicago Blackhawks will be fighting for a playoff spot. But lack of talent will make it very difficult for the two to compete with the heavyweights. Chicago has the stronger team if they can get Brett Hull form the Blues. Chris Chelios makes for a strong defense that will be physical with most teams. If Hull does leave then coach Joel Quenneville will have an even harder time cleaning the mess that Mike Keenan left. No real talent and an aging goalie in Grant Fuhr will be the only thing Blues will be able to put up. The Toronto Maple Leafs have two strong players in Felix Potvin and Mats Sundin, but no two players can help this team. A strong and exciting offensive game can't make up the slack for a poor defensive team. Look for them at the bottom of the standings.

Pacific

No one team should dominate a division like the Colorado Avalanche will. Not because there is lack of talent on other teams, but because the Avs have too much

talent. No other team has two superstar centers (Sakic and Peter Forsberg), a host of talented wingers (Valeri Kamensky, Claude Lemieux, and Adam Deadmarsh), a solid defense (Sandis Osolinsh, Adam Foote, and Uwe Krupp) all being backed up by a fearless goalie (Patrick Roy). Plus a tough playoff loss to the Red Wings will be more than enough to motivate Colorado. Look for the Avalanche to win the division early, like the previous years.

Three teams should emerge as runner up to the Avs. The Vancouver Canucks, the Anaheim Mighty Ducks, and the Edmonton Oilers will make a run at next in line. The Oilers have the best potential of the teams. They have the best all around talent next to the Avs and a surprising playoff run last spring helped boosted their confidence. The Canucks who made the big move by signing Messier are excited, but they forgot to take care of their own players. Pavel Bure has demanded a trade and Alexander Mogilny is waiting for a 5million-dollar check or he'll be looking for a new address. The Ducks should be strong if they can get Kariya signed, but a coaching change may hurt this team. The Ducks still have Teemu Selanne, but life with out Kariya will leave Selanne as a marked man for most defenses. The Ducks need to get Kariya in camp for them to be a contender.

The Calgary Flames, Los Angeles Kings, and the San Jose Sharks will be fighting for one of the few playoff spots. The Flames will have to deal with a young team trying to play with the big boys. The Kings have the most talent in a while especially with the return of Luc Robitaille, but he won't be able to help them. Goalie Stephane Fiset is good enough to get this team into the playoffs, but he must remain healthy. The Sharks brought in Mike Vernon after losing Ed Belfour. But unless Patrick Marleau displays his talents, it will be a long year for the Conn Smythe winner. A weak defense will allow for plenty of pucks to fly at Vernon.

Athlete's Corner: Beth Anderson, Women's Tennis

Hometown: West Boylston, Massachusetts
High School: Wachusett Regional
Number of Years Played Tennis: Eight
Position: #3 Singles, #2 Doubles

When did you start playing tennis and how did it evolve?

I probably picked up my first racquet in elementary school and then started playing competitively in high school. My family plays a lot of tennis and got me involved at an early age. If it weren't for them, I probably wouldn't have been so motivated to start playing. I have been fortunate enough to play tennis on my own time and then teach tennis to beginners during the summer.

I've "heard" that tennis matches often vary in length.

Can you explain what a typical tennis match involves?
I think that the length of a certain match depends on the competition you are up against. If your opponent is on the more competitive side you will have to work harder and stronger to win the match. Where as if your opponent is less competitive, the match is usually quicker.

Since a tennis match can last for over two hours, how do you and the team prepare for endurance?

We practice every day we don't have a match. We do lapses around the track, line sprints, hitting drills, and challenge matches.

How does tennis develop as a team sport in scoring and the team attitude?

In scoring it is based on how you do individually and then it branches out to a team score. Each position gets a point for the team. It is basically you as an individual and then a conglomerate of scores. As far as a team attitude goes we are always cheering each other on and building up each other's confidence. We pick each other up when they are down.

How important is mental toughness in tennis? How do you prepare for it?

Mental toughness is the most important aspect in tennis. In order to maintain composure when you are a couple points behind, you have to keep your mind focused on the point you are playing at that moment instead of think of past points. You have to take one point at a time. I need to be well rested and focused. I need to be thinking about tennis and not anything else going on in my life.

What is your biggest strength individually? To the team?

I don't think I have one strength over another. You have to have physical strength (power and spin), mental toughness, game strategies and tactics, and overall focus. I feel as if all of us on the team all play at the same level. We are all in it together and don't dwell on each other's faults because we are so equal in playing ability. Each player knows that each teammate played the best they could.

Do you feel tennis is a dying sport?

I personally don't feel it is a dying sport just because it is a game you can play when you are young or old. You can play with friends for fun, or you could play it competitively. I think that the media is doing more with tennis than it has in the past with publicizing the US Open and Wimbledon. It is always on the sports channels.

Tennis can be a lifelong sport. Do you play to continue playing later in life?

I definitely see myself playing tennis for a good part of my life, at least until I can't walk anymore. I think it will become a hobby for me after I retire and keep me in shape. Our Coach [Coker] is an inspiration to us. He is on the court by 7:15 many mornings playing tennis on his own time. He runs both the women and men's teams. He is probably out there for almost four hours every afternoon.

What is unique about the tennis team?

I think our team is unique because of our close relationships with one another due to the fact that we only have 13 players on the team. We can easily get to know one another. We have a lot in common since we have equal motivation to do well on the court and in school. And, how could I forget our similarities on where to eat after a match? The most frequently asked question after a match is "Where is the closest Boston Market?"
