Joanna T. Lau, president of LAU technologies in Littleton, MA, will speak at the Graduate School Commencement on Friday, May 16. Henrique de Campos Meirelles, president and chief operating officer of BankBoston, will be the keynote speaker at the Undergraduate Commencement on Saturday, May 17. Their respective stellar accomplishments in high technology and international finance exemplify Bryant's highest business

Ms. Lau, in addition to being president of LAU Technologies, is one of the founders of the company that has grown to employ more than 200 people and manufacture electronic systems for the US military and for commercial applications.

She was also with GE Aerospace, GE Consumer Electronics, GE Aircraft Engine, and Digital Equipment Corporation. Her professional experiences range form commercial to military system design and manufacturing operations, and her contributions to the Factory of the Future at GE Aircraft Engine earned her its "Young Engineering Award"in 1987.

Ms. Lau received the First Annual Leadership Award to Women in Business in 1993 form The New England Council. She was named the 1995 National Turnaround Entrepreneur of the Year, and the 1995 Small-Business Person of the Year for Massachusetts. She received the 1997 Boston Chamber of Commerce Pinnacle Award for achievement in business.

She earned a B.S. form SUNY at Stony Brook, and M.S. form Old Dominion University, and an M.B.A. from Boston University.

Our undergraduate keynote speaker, Henrique Meirelles, is an international financier from BankBoston, a super-regional bank holding company assets of \$62.3 billion and some 23,000 employ-

Meirelles joined BankBoston in 1974 as managing director of Boston Leasing. In 1978, he became vice president of the bank in the Sao Paulo area of Brazil and was appointed head of the Commercial Bank in Brazil two years later. He was promoted to deputy country manager in 1981 and became president and regional manager of BankBoston in Brazil in 1984. When BankBoston acquired BayBank N.A. in July 1996, Meirelles was named president and chief operating officer.

He holds a degree from the University of Sao Paulo and an M.B.A. from the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro. He has also completed the Advanced Management Program at Harvard Business School. Meirelles is chairman of the board

of the Brazilian Association of International Banks and in 1996 was named "Most Influential Banker of the Year'by Latin Trade magazine.

Information on our other three honorary degree recipients follows:

Robert K. Kraft is owner and chief executive officer of the New England Patriots and owner of Foxboro Stadium. Kraft purchased the Patriots in 1994 and has kept the team within the region and provided stable local ownership for the franchise for the first time in nearly a decade. In a success story followed by millions of sports fans, the Patriots won the American Football Conference championship in 1997, participating in the Super Bowl for only the second time in the Franchise's history

Barbara A. Papitto was a member of the Bryant Board of Trustees form 1987 through 1996 when she was named honorary trustee. She earned both her B.S. and M.B.A. degrees at Bryant, and chaired the Bryant Annual Fund drive from 1985-87. She has provided her leadership perspective on both the Executive Alumni Board and the Graduate School Advisory Council. Ms. Pa-

pitto is also very active in the community. She is past president of the Nickerson House Community Center in Providence, where she chaired a successful one-million-dollar capital campaign; is a member of the corporation of St. Mary's Home for Children in North Providence; a guild member of the Hibiscus Children's Center in Jensen Beach FI; and has served as an allocation panel member of the Emergency and Disaster Services Panel of the United Way.

Christian Schwarz-Schilling, a native of Innsbruck, Austria, was educated in Germany where he subsequently managed a manufacturing plant. In 1960 he joined the Christian Democratic Party and has served as a member of Parliament for 37 years, focusing on economic political developments. In 1982 he became minister of Post and Telecommunications, heading the largest single government-owned company-the German Bundespostwhich employed more than 550,000 people. It was upon his initiative that the people of the former East Germany were given speedy access to telephones in their homes. More telephones were connected in the short time after reunification than had been during the entire rule of the former East German govern-

Students launch drive/ plea on Internet

A coalition of student leaders from U.S. PIRG, the U.S. Student Association (USSA), and Rock The Vote, ing in our future by passing a budjoined prominent Senators in Washington D.C., to launch a campaign on the Internet demanding that Congress "eliminate financial barriers to college education.'

In a press conference last week, Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle (D-SD) and Senators Kennedy (D-MA), Boxer (D-CA), and Reed (D-RI) lauded the efforts of the students and pledged their commitment to higher education.

"We're going to work together to make sure that education is a priority in this budget," said Senator

Last month, President Clinton submitted higher education budget proposals to Congress which include increasing Pell Grants and generating tax credits for some families with college students. The budget has yet to be approved by Congress.

"Currently, higher education is considered an expenditure rather than an investment,' said Kristen Brengal, a senior at Rutgers Univer-

sity and Chair of the New Jersey PIRG student chapters. "Congress must show a commitment to investget that supports higher education."

Although not in attendance, Senaor Olympia Snowe (R-VT) issued a statement in support of the effort: "I cannot think of a greater issue for the future of this country than to provide adequate funding for higher eduction.

Utilizing links on the World Wide Web, students are encouraged to sign the petition to Congress to increase financial aid, reduce the cost of student loans, and "provide significant relief to low and middle income students.

This Web petition is a new tool for students who have been organizing to keep the doors of college open to all," said Kazim Ali, President of USSA.

As part of the publicity to reach out to college students, the MTVspawned organization Rock The Vote will be promoting the website -www.pirg.org/student/aid/petition on MTV, on radio stations and through several popular musicians.

Such artists as Chuck D. from Public Enemy and singer Shawn Colvin have recorded radio ads

"Through this Web petition, we can generate a strong message to Congress," said Mark Strama, program director for Rock The Vote The website can be reached through many links - including the U.S. Congress, the student organizations and MTV - at: www.pirg.org/student/aid/petition.

To the editor:



4/21/97 FIRE ALARM: A fire alarm was activated in the Unistructure because of a smoke detector activation. No cause could be determined for the activation. The smoke detector in question was replaced.

4/21/97 VANDALISM TO A VEHICLE: A student reported to DPS that sometime the previous night somebody had scratched both sides of her car while it was parked in one of the lots. The radio antenna was also broken. DPS is investigating.

4/21/97 FIRE ALARM: DPS responded to a fire alarm in one of the residence halls. The cause of the alarm was found to be a rate of rise detector. The detector was replaced, and the alarm was reset.

4/22/97 VEHICLE TOW: While on patrol, DPS officers noticed a vehicle illegally parked in one of the lots. A check showed seven outstanding violations. The vehicle was cited again and towed off campus.

4/22/97 ALCOHOL VIOLA-TION: While on foot patrol in the Hall village, DPS officers found two students with open containers of alcohol. Both students were cooperative and the alcohol was destroyed. Charges have been

4/22/97 ASSAULT: A disagreement between suite mates led to a minor physical altercation. One student contacted DPS after being struck by the other suite mate. DPS is investigating. Charges have been filed.

4/22/97 VANDALISM: A student reported damage to the grass caused by a vehicle in the Hall village. DPS was able to locate the vehicle responsible. A fee for repair of the damaged area has been assessed, and the operator has been charged.

4/22/97 ALCOHOL VIOLA-TION: DPS was dispatched to the Hall village for a complaint of open containers. Upon arrival, two students were found with open containers of alcohol. One student was very cooperative and disposed of the alcohol. The second student also disposed of the alcohol but was very loud and abusive to DPS officers. Charges have been filed. 4/23/97 THEFT: A student reported to DPS that a toolbox containing tools had been taken from his vehicle while it had been parked. Because of the value of the tools, the student was also advised to file a report with the Smithfield Police Department. DPS is also investigating.

4/24/97 VEHICLE TOWED: While on routine patrol, DPS officers spotted a vehicle illegally parked in one of the lots. A check showed six outstanding violations. The vehicle was cited and towed off campus.

4/24/97 VEHICLE TOWED: While on patrol, a DPS officer spotted an illegally parked vehicle in a fire lane. A check of the vehicle showed three other outstanding violations. The vehicle was cited and towed off campus.

4/24/97 VEHICLE BOOTED: While on patrol, DPS officers spotted an illegally parked vehicle in one of the lots. A check showed seven other outstanding violations. The vehicle was cited and a vehicle boot was placed on the vehicle until all fines could be paid.

4/24/97 DRUG/ALCOHOL VIOLATION: While on patrol, DPS officers observed a student acting suspiciously and carrying what appeared to be a very heavy book bag. After being questioned, it was determined that the book bag was filled with alcohol. A small bag of marijuana was also found on the student. As the student was a minor, the alcohol was destroyed. The marijuana was seized by the officers. Charges have been filed.

4/25/97 VANDALISM: DPS was contacted by housekeeping personnel and notified that one of the dryers in one of the residence halls had been damaged. No moneys appeared to have been taken. The private contractor responsible for the machines was contacted.

4/25/97 THEFT: DPS was contacted by bookstore employees reporting a possible theft. They told DPS that a student had sold back a book that was reported stolen to them by another student. DPS is investigating; charges have not yet been filed.

4/25/97 ASSAULT: DPS officers encountered a female student who appeared to be upset. The student also appeared to have some minor injuries to the face. The student refused medical attention and did not want to file a complaint.

Later, the student changed her mind and filed a complaint with the police. Both DPS and Smithfield Police are investigating. Campus charges have been filed.

4/26/97 ASSAULT: DPS received a report that an assault had occurred in the senior apartment area. DPS arrived on the scene and spoke with two victims who gave DPS descriptions of the suspects who identified themselves as FBI agents. A third victim was also found but refused to cooperate with DPS. Students agreed to press criminal charges if the suspects could be located. Descriptions of the suspects and their vehicle was given to all DPS officers and to the Smithfield Police. Further action will be taken when the suspects are located.

4/26/97 MISSING PROP-ERTY: A student contacted DPS to advise that he had lost his wallet sometime the previous evening. The wallet had a small amount of eash and several credit cards. The student was advised to cancel all cards.

4/26/97 VANDALISM: DPS was called to one of the residence halls for a report of vandalism. It was determined that one stall door and two toilets had been damaged in one of the men's rooms. The damage has been repaired, and DPS is investigating.

4/26/97 ASSAULT: While at the spring weekend activities at the field, DPS officers were advised of an underage student in the beer garden. The student was located, and it was determined that she was underage. When asked to leave the area, the student became loud and abusive and refused to leave. DPS officers then began to escort out the student, who continued to be abusive and resist the officers, making it necessary for officers to physically restrain her. At one point, the student managed to free an arm and strike out at a DPS officer. The student again was physically restrained by officers and escorted off the field. The student was released into the custody of suite mates and warned not to return. Charges have

4/26/97 ASSAULT: While stationed at the beer garden DPS officers observed a male and a female run out of the beer garden and fall to the grass and begin fighting. Both students were separated by DPS. It was determined that the male student had apparently struck the female student. The female did wish to file criminal charges. The male student was taken into custody by

DPS and later turned over to Smithfield Police and charged with Domestic Assault. Campus charges have also been filed.

4/26/97 VANDALISM: A student residing in the townhouses contacted DPS to report a broken window. The student thought he heard somebody falling down the stairs. When he went to check but found only the broken window. DPS is still investigating this incident.

4/27/97 VANDALISM: DPS was contacted by the Residence Life staff reporting that a fire extinguisher had been discharged in one of the halls. There are no suspects at this time. Anyone with information may contact the DPS TIPS line.

4/28/97 VEHICLE BOOTED:

While on patrol, DPS officers found a vehicle parked illegally in one of the lots. It was later determined that three other outstanding tickets had been found. A citation was issued, and the vehicle was booted pending payment of fines.

The end of the semester is drawing near and finals are just two weeks away. Many people become frustrated, nervous, and anxious during this time of the year. If you

do, you may suffer from test anxiety. Here is a list of common systems:

Mental Distrac-

Physical Symptoms such as fidgeting, "butterflies" in your stomach, increased heart rate or quickened breathing, headache, etc.

anxiety is caused by
a fear of failure, intense pressure, and
bad past experiences.

If you suffer from test anxiety, here are some ways to control the feeling. Studying effectively will increase your confidence and thus lessen the feeling of anxiety. 


On April 7, 1997 (that fine 70 degree day), I was cutting down John Mowry Rd. to speak to a professor about a possible job placement at the Economic Center of Rhode Island on campus. It was about 4:00 p.m., and the professor no longer was in. I was on my way back to the Unistructure when from the corner of my eye I saw the men's and women's rugby teams in practice. Since the nice weather was detracting from my desire to go indoors and get busy right away, I decided to check out the practice already in progress.

As the cliché goes "curiosity killed the cat." I drove down the steep hill to the fields. For someone whose been up and down the hilly terrain at Bryant for the past four years and had never encountered any problems, the day of trouble was lurking. It just happened that the knob on my scooter for regulating the battery power versus manual power was caught in middle ground, and as I went down hill it slipped to the manual side and sent me careening down the hill despite my efforts to brake using my feet. That is when I called out for help and professor Larry Lowe's rugby bunch sprung into action to provide me with a rescue

The last I remember that day was their approach to my scooter (the Harley). Apparently, from what I heard from public safety and my family, the group managed to stop my scooter, but not me so I flew off and stopped myself using my head. You can say—using a feline metaphor—that I must have lost three lives on that hill, which leaves me very lucky to be alive (you see, I've had big falls like this one before, but those are different stories for another time).

The week off from school is somewhat blurry between intensive care, X-rays and MRI scans, which showed a couple of hematomas that had formed on both sides of my head, which, had they not improved, would have needed surgery, enough to make me a December 1997 graduate. To make a long story shorter, those hematomas have shrunk considerably, the lumps and bruises have healed, my headaches have leared up, my optic nerve have remained intact, and my hip replacement has stayed in place; I have a new perspective on life and really realize that any of these things could have led to my demise, which is the ultimate reason why I want to thank my rescuers, public safety, and the concern of professors, Health Services, many of the ARA members, and note takers (and most of all to God for protecting and healing me). You all were the inspiration to get on my feet and finish up for graduation. I thank you all from the heart.

On a light note, I have a suggestion, perhaps SPB and other campus organizations could sponsor a fund-raiser to get an airbag, seat belts, and a rear-cjecting parachute for when I'm flying low and need to stop on a dime!







Bulldog Weekly Roundup

BASEBALL:

After a 6-3 week, the Bulldogs (19-18, 12-9 NE-10) closed in on a spot in next weekend's NORTH-EAST-10 baseball tournament.

Bryant opened the week with a 10-6 loss at Bentley Monday, but bounced back by pounding Assumption, 16-6. The Bulldogs collected a season-high 21 hits and three home runs. Freshmen Mike Anzalone (Walpole, MA/Walpole) and Martin Riggione (Orange, CT/Amity) each belted their first collegiate long balls, while sophomore designated hitter Ron Yuhas (Groton, CT/ Fitch) had four hits, including his first home run of the season. Sophomore third baseman Keith Masterson (Medway, MA/ Medway) had three hits and four

Bryant made it two in a row the following day, defeating Quinnipiac, 7-1. Senior lefthander Matt Goodfinger (Randolph, MA/Randolph) went the distance to earn his fourth win, allowing just six hits. Junior Luke Robustelli (Bristol, CT/Bristol) went 2-for-4 with five stolen bases and three runs scored and Brian Hurleigh (E. Williston, NY/Wheatley School) had three hits and four RBI.

Bryant set its sights on a threegame weekend set with St. Michael's after a 14-4 loss to first-place Merrimack Thursday. In game one, senior righthander Chris Baldwin (Wolcott, CT/Wolcott) picked up the 'W' allowing just three hits and striking out seven. Masterson tallied three hits and three RBI and sophomore centerfielder Jason Eldridge (Belchertown, MA/ Belchertown) scored four times and had three hits. On Saturday, Bryant took a 12-11 decision in the first game, thanks to three RBI from Yuhas and fine relief job from senior Steve Martin (Milford, MA/Mt. St. Charles). Baldwin started game two, tossing seven innings and striking out five to pick up his second win in as many days. Yuhas drove in four runs and junior rightfielder Bill DiStefano (Norwalk, CT/ Norwalk) collected a double, and homer and three RBI. Riggione went 3-for-4 with a double and a

The Bulldogs ended the week with a split at St. Anselm. DiStefano was 4-for-10 with six RBI, two home runs and a double in the twinbill. Senior second baseman Vic Donato (Port Chester, NY/Port Chester) had three hits, including a double and a home run in the nightcap.

Several Bulldogs posted big numbers. Robustelli had 15 hits, scored 15 runs and stole 16 bases. Yuhas hit .447 and drove in 16 runs. DiStefano hit .444, scored seven runs, hit three HR and drove in 11 and was named to the NE-10 Weekly Honor Roll. Baldwin upped his record to 3-1 and lowered his earned run average to a team-best 2.88.

SOFTBALL:

Bryant (8-18, 4-12 NE-10) recorded a 2-4 mark last week.

Junior Stephanie Zanfagna (N. Providence, RI/N. Providence) went 3-for-5 in a doubleheader loss to Stonehill Tuesday.

Bryant also dropped a pair at UMass-Lowell Thursday. In the first game, sophomore leftfielder Mary Bucki (Providence. RI/Classical) had two hits, scored a run and stole a base in game one, a 9-3 loss. The Bulldogs dropped an 8-6 decision in the second game despite two hits and four RBI from senior Kristin Regan (W. Bridgewater, MA/W. Bridgewater) and two hits from freshman Lauren Satterlee (Greenlawn, NY/Harborfields).

On Friday, Bryant swept a twinbill from NE-10 foe St. Michael's. Satterlee's RBI single in the seventh gave Bryant a 5-4 win in game one. Junior second baseman January Spalatro (Shrewsbury, MA/Shrewsbury) went 2-for-3 with three RBI and Zanfagna went the distance on the mound to earn her third win

In game two, Satterlee went 2for-3 with a run scored and a RBI and freshman hurler Jenna Goldberg (Port Jefferson, NY/ Comsewegue) fired a six-hitter in the Bulldogs' 4-2 victory.

GOLF:

The Bulldogs head to Evansville, IN this weekend's NCAA Division II North Regional. Bryant will battle Bentley, UMass-Lowell, Indiana (PA), Slippery Rock (PA), Longwood (VA), Indianapolis, Bellarmine (KY), Oakland (MI), Saginaw Valley (MI) and Ferris State (MI) for the right to go to the Division II Finals in Scottsdale, AZ, May 20-23.



MEN'S TENNIS:

Bryant (5-7, 5-4 NE-10) closed out the season with losses to UMass-Lowell (5-4) and Rhode Island College (5-4).

TRACK AND FIELD:

The Bulldogs competed at the Brown University Invitational last weekend.

On the men's side, sophomore Matt Roloff (South Portland, ME/South Portland) shaved 37 seconds off his previous personal best in the 5,000 meters, recording a 15:40.64, third among Division II runners. Junior Jeff Pennini (Hanson, MA/Whitman-Hanson) recorded a season-best in the shot put with a throw of 110' 8". Freshman Elgin Booth's (Plaistow, NH/Timberlane) 2:06.39 in the 800 meters was also a personal best.

Sophomore Jackie Ely (Bohemia, NY/Connetquot) ran a season-best 5:01.02 in the 1,500 meters. Sophomore Michele Mottola (Stoneham, MA/Stoneham) finished fourth in the 5,000 with a time of 19:20.10, a personal best.
