

# Senator Chafee Leads Republican Candidate Forum

U.S. Senator John Chafee visited Bryant in an effort to encourage support for Rhode Island Republican candidates on Sunday night. Chafee was a guest of the Bryant College Republicans and the Rhode Island Federation of College Republicans.

Chafee, former Secretary of the Navy and governor of Rhode Island, was recently recognized for his health care package, Health Equity and Access Reform Today (HEART). HEART is a "middle of the road" plan falling somewhere between Clinton's health plan and ideas presented by Chafee's more conservative counterparts.

While Chafee promotes Clinton's push for universal access, he opposes Clinton's desire to make all businesses, especially small ones, pay for the coverage of their employees.

He also prefers relying on competition among health care operators as opposed to government intervention.

Chafee presently is also the ranking Republican of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee, which last year established new laws to protect wetlands by further regulating construction near wetlands and setting new building guidelines.

In his short speech, Chafee emphasized his concern for a lack of Republican representation in the state of Rhode Island.

"One nice thing about being a Republican in Rhode Island, is there is plenty of work to do. There are not many of us around." He added, "No election is easy for a republican in this state...we need all the help we can get."


Chafee then introduced and handed over the platform to the four republican candidates for the state's two congressional districts.

The four contenders for the House of Representatives seats are, in the first district, Paul Green, Val Southern, and Dr. Kevin Vigilante, and unopposed in the second district, Dr. John Elliot,

The First Congressional District seat will be empty this fall since Congressman Ron Machtley is running for governor. Rhode Island State Representative Patrick Kennedy will be running on the Democratic ticket.

The candidate forum attracted students and representatives from many local colleges other than Bryant, including Brown University, Rhode Island College, the University of Rhode Island, Providence College, and Johnson & Wales University.

Participants had the opportunity not only to listen to the guest speakers, but also to meet them and col-

lect information on how to become campaign volunteers.

Despite advertising the forum in The Archway and posting fliers around campus, few members of the Bryant community were in attendance. Paul V. Liss, co-vice chairman of the Bryant College Republicans said, "The turnout was kind of disappointing. We tried to get the word out since it was a great opportunity to hear one of the greatest Senators speak. Chafee certainly shows how the Republicans are well represented."

Also speaking were Linc Almond, candidate for governor, and Republican Party Chairman John Holmes

The main focus of the retreat was to develop ways to reduce alcohol use and abuse on campus. Together with Residence Life and Bryant Center Operations, the peer educators began the dance club on April 8.

"I think it's going to be successful-it's just a matter of time. We've had a good turnout so far, but we need to build on it to make sure the program continues," said Flanigan.

Directions is located in South

Dining Hall every Friday from 9:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. Music is provided by various DJs as black lights and strobe lights illuminate the room. In addition, snacks and "mocktails," such as Sex on the Beach and Piña Colada, provided by BACCHUS, are available.

A \$1.00 donation per student is used as a fund-raiser for various causes, such as the John DeShaw Memorial Fund. Student organizations are welcome to work the door and keep the proceeds.

"We are trying to provide students with as many alternatives to drinking as possible, especially on Friday and Saturday nights," Horridge commented. "We're pooling our resources for next semester and hope the program will continue successfully."

On April 29, the dance club will begin immediately following the scheduled comedian. Also, on May 6, freshmen are admitted free and the first 50 students will receive free Bryant College key chains.


Placing the blame on one organization or criticizing those who aren't involved is not the answer to the problem.

# **Behind The Scenes of Spring Weekend**

To the Editor:

I would like to begin by saying I hope everyone has a great Spring Weekend. The Student Programming Board has been working vigorously to put together a fun and exciting weekend to be enjoyed by all, but planning has not been very easy this year. This letter is not just a response to Chris Talmadge's letter to the editor in last week's Archway, but also a clarification of the Spring Weekend planning process, particularly the process of contracting a band.

In January, I made the first contact with our agent. He gave us a list of current available bands. Next, SPB members voted on their choice out of those within our price range. The top five choices from this vote were included in a letter to the editor of The Archway. Students were encouraged to respond and provide input as to their favorite band. As a result of this poll, The Mighty Mighty Bosstones were the overwhelming first

Negotiations began and the contract was being formed when the Bosstones became concerned about any competition a performance at Bryant posed to their performance in Providence two nights before their play date here. Reassurances were made that there would be no

problems, yet two days before Spring Break, they canceled. With only six weeks left until Spring Weekend, most "big bands" were already contracted, including the others on the survey.

Our next option was to try and outbid other schools. Unfortunately, the bands didn't want to make any changes. Through selection in our programming meetings, a bid was placed on Peter Wolf of the J. Geils Band. Soon after our bid was accepted, Peter Wolf was offered a tour in California and he canceled all of his East coast performances. There was now less than four weeks left.

Options were limited, so a decision was made at one of the Spring Weekend planning meetings to find cover bands. Cover bands would allow students to hear music they would recognize rather than booking some exotic band that no one has ever heard of. As a result, The Machine and Shoot the Moon were selected.

An important clarification to be made is that no one has declared Bryant an alternative campus. Of the five bands listed on the survey, two were alternative, two were rock, and one was rap. As for the final selections made, Shoot the Moon is alternative, Superbug is rock, and The Machine, which plays Pink Floyd music is definitely not alternative. Illegal Entry to Motor Vehicle April 12, 1994 - Department of Public Safety officers took a walkin report from a complainant that his vehicle had been illegally entered. # **A Better Wav** To the Editor:

Conflict is an inevitable part of life, and in fact, can provide the impetus for personal growth and development. Some ways of dealing with and working through conflict, however, don't result in learning at all, and are counter productive to the goals of the College. And that is particularly the case when people use their fists to solve problems rather than reason.

Violence on campus has become the subject of numerous research projects, books, journal articles and conferences. A number of Bryant staff members, administrators and students have attended these programs in the past to try to reduce the number of violent acts on campus and help build a more cooperative community. One thing they have learned is that violent acts can be as subtle as a prank phone call or offhand comment to as flagrant as a physical or sexual assault. None of these behaviors has any place on the Bryant campus because each simply results in more violence.

As we enter the last part of the

semester, the potential for violence increases as the level of stress and fatigue increases. Tempers can flare in the classroom or residence halls, and result in violence perpetrated against another student, an administrator, staff or faculty member. And remember that threats and intimidation perpetrated against any member of the campus community are a form of violence that will only create the climate for a potentially violent "payback."

When you are the victim of violence, you can fight back - using all the official means available to you, such as reporting the violent behavior to your Resident Assistant, Resident Director, Public Safety, the Dean of Students or any other campus official.

One way or the other, we are all victims of campus violence - let's all be involved in combating it. It seems to me that would be a better way for us to deal with conflict and grow as a community.

# **Gambling: Addictive But Treatable**

We are all attracted to money, but afford. As their debts increase, so how far will we go to get it? Like alcohol and drugs, people can become addicted to money. These people suffer from the addiction of compulsive gambling. It has been estimated that at least 88 million American adults participate in some form of gambling. Of this number, there are approximately 143,000 problem gamblers in Massachusetts alone, and it is estimated that an additional 143,000 are at serious risk of becoming compulsive gamblers. Why has gambling become such a growing problem in our society today?

With the popularity of state lotteries, casinos, race tracks and bingo halls, gambling has become an accepted and even encouraged habit. Therefore, how can one recognize gambling as a disease? People suffering from this addiction look normal. They do not appear "stoned," stumble around, or slur words. Still, gambling, like other addictions, is considered to be a progressive disease. First, the gambler views gambling as a solution to the stresses and financial pressures of everyday life. The possibility of winning "big" lures many people to stay in action long after losing more than they can does their need to recover these losses. It is at this point that individuals become completely preoccupied with their addiction, isolating themselves from family and

Many gamblers are in denial. Therefore, they need help in recognizing the symptoms of their disease. It is often the family, a friend, or employer who first recognizes the problem. To determine whether or not you or someone you know is a compulsive gambler, consider the following points. Do you (they):

- Feel an uncontrollable urge to

-Experience an emotional "high" regardless of wins or losses.

- Lie, cheat, steal, beg, and borrow to keep on gambling.

-Gamble to the point that it interferes with school, work, friends, and family?

Compulsive gambling treatment is available. The Massachusetts Council on Compulsive Gambling operates a free confidential information and referral service. The toll free number for the Council is 1-800-426-1234. The Rhode Island Council on Problem Gambling may be reached at 1-401-724-0610. Anyone experiencing a problem with excessive gambling or who is affected by someone's gambling may call either number for referral information or to request literature. Also, Gamblers Anonymous (G.A.) and Gam-Anon (for those affected by compulsive gamblers) self-help groups are available. These groups provide confidential help and care for gamblers and their families.

For help on campus, students, staff, and faculty may contact Counseling Services at 232-6045 for referral to outside agencies or organizations. Students may also contact the Peer Educators through Health Services, 232-6220. The Peer Educators have developed educational programs and presentations on gambling and other addictive behaviors and can present these to groups, organizations or residence hall floors. If you or someone you know may have a gambling problem, don't wait - call for help now.

# **Kurt Cobain Finds Nirvana**

Music was everywhere, and for better or worse, it could not be avoided. Simply put, if you did not like music, you would not have enjoyed living in Seattle.

Even more so than Seattle, though, the small capitol city of Olympia seemed to overflow with basement bands. Olympia mostly consists of politicians and blue collar workers, but fortunately it was also the home of my first institution of higher learning (The Evergreen State College), and some guy named Kurt Cobain.

For those of you who have never heard of Evergreen (most people), it is a small liberal arts refuge for that endangered species which flourished a couple of decades ago: the

Unbeknownst to most people, these long haired, second hand clothed, and Birkenstock-wearing students that swarm over the Evergreen campus on a daily basis were largely responsible for that unfortunate "grunge" style that somehow permeated pop culture and became the darling of the fashion industry. # **Corporate Annual Reports**

When read with caution, corporate annual reports are an excellent source to consult for determining current and future performance of a company. Annual reports are written and filed with the SEC as a result of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934. This important act was passed to protect potential investors from fraudulent and extravagant claims put forth by companies. Today, all corporations with more than 500 shareholders and a million dollars in assets must publish an annual report within 90 days of the end of the fiscal year. It is important to remember that annual reports are written by the companies them-

selves, and the writers attempt as best they can-through glossy pictures and sometimes ambiguous text-to convey a positive corporate image. Read the footnotes presented at the end of the document to clarify any ambiguities in the text. Also, the Accountant's Report, sometimes labeled "The Report of the Independent Certified Accountant" will set forth any warnings or qualifications on the information reported.

The corporate records collection at Hodgson Memorial Library is being expanded. Nearly 500 additional records are being requested from businesses both local and nation-wide. Here is a listing of sources from which we are currently requesting corporate records:

All the Fortune 500 companies, the Fortune 50 Retail, over 3 dozen Rhode Island public companies, companies that regularly interview at Bryant, every company listed in Hoover's Handbook of American Business (over 500), Connecticut and Massachusetts public companies with at least \$100 million in assets or over 600 employees.

Materials include, but are not always limited to, annual reports and 10-K filings for the last 2 years. In some cases we also retain companies' mission and ethics statements


Megan McInerney placed second in the discus with a toss of 108 feet and second in the hammer throw with a toss of 102 feet.
